## Palo Duro River Authority has priority

A municipal water supply reservoir for six North Plains cities -- the Palo Duro River Authority lake in Hansford county -- has a top development priority from the Texas Water Development board.

The top ranking among state water projects is reported by Johnnie Lee of Spearman, general manager of the PDRA, who talked with officials of the state board recently at an Austin meeting.

Lee will return to Austin this week to discuss the new state water bill with the commission and the effect of the bill on the Palo Duro project.

"We have the only major water project in Texas that is ready for construction," the PDRA manager declares. "All we lack is the financing."

The Palo Duro lake will store some 69,000 acre feet of water behind a dam at the junction of the Palo Duro and Horse creeks, northwest of Spearman.

It will provide a water supply for Dumas, Sunray and Cactus in

Moore county; for the City of Stinnett, and the cities of Gruver and Spearman in Hansford counties.

The state agency has indicated that it could put \$15 million in the project in storage purchases, grants and loans.

"I anticipate the new Texas Water Plan, passed by the Legislature, will help us tremendously with the financing," Lee believes. "However, we will have to wait until after the general election in November since it involves a constitutional amendment."

The water plan amendment will be on the November ballot and must be approved statewide to become effective.

"Since Perryton will not be in the Palo Duro Authority, the cost of the project has been scaled down about \$2.5 million, our engineers say," Lee continues.

Cost of the dam, water plant and piping system has been estimated at \$56 million. Lee says the project now will cost about \$53 million.


### Edward Beck receives national award

### Export program worth \$127.6 million

WASHINGTON - U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm and Agriculture Secretary John Block have announced a \$2 billion program aimed at drastically expanding the export of American agricultural products.

"This action will breathe new life into our export program," Gramm said, noting that the Texas share will amount to at least \$127.6 million with the possibility of that figure climbing much higher.

The Export Enhancement Program, which will provide government-owned surplus commodities as bonuses to exporters who arrange sales of American agricultural products to foreign markets, begins June 1.

"The EEP is designed not to

replace current sales, but to be used as an incentive to increase competition," Gramm explained.

"This program will place American agriculture on a more even footing with our foreign competitors. It will be aimed directly at opening markets which have been taken over by nations which use unfair trade practices."

"This program should prove particularly helpful in regaining foreign markets for Texas agricultural products," he said.

The Export Enhancement Program, long anticipated by Texas farmers and agricultural exporters, will be administered by the Department of Agriculture.

"Regaining markets and open-

ing new markets for Texas farmers and ranchers will go a long way toward making rural America not just a good place to live, but a good place to make a living again," Senator Gramm said.

## Taxpayers may protest property values

Taxpayers in the Hansford County Appraisal District will have an opportunity next month to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. Protest hearings by the appraisal review board (ARB) begin on June 10, 1985.

When the ARB concludes its hearing and approves a final roll of property appraisals, local governments will levy their taxes against values from that roll.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the district, said that a taxpayer who wants to lodge a protest of a proposed value must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB.

According to Mrs. Peddy, the ARB is a group of appraisal district residents appointed by the district's directors to see that property values are equal and uniform and to consider claims for exemptions and agricultural value.

Property owners need appear before only the one review panel, the chief appraiser noted, instead of one for each taxing unit. "They may protest any of seven specific actions of the appraisal office, any time before the ARB approves the appraisal records," she said.

The seven protest areas are:  
-the appraised or agricultural value of the property;  
-unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property in comparison to the weighted average level of appraisals of other property in the district;  
-inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;  
-denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;  
-denial of agricultural-use, open-space or timber productivity valuation;  
-identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;  
-determination that the taxpayer is

the owner of the property.

The taxpayer may also protest any other action of the appraisal office that applies to him and adversely affects him. However, Mrs. Peddy said that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear any protest of those matters.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal office. "But a letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable as a notice," the chief appraiser said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property which is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some determination of the appraisal office."

The ARB will schedule a hearing after the property owner files the protest notice and will inform him of the time, date and place at least 15 days before the scheduled date.

The taxpayer is then entitled to appear in person to offer evidence or argument, but he may also offer the evidence or argument by affidavit without appearing personally.

After the ARB makes its decision on the protest, both the property owner and the chief appraiser will be notified of the result by certified mail.

Mrs. Peddy said that protest hearings will be held for one day, and the ARB expects to be able to approve the appraisal records in July.

A pamphlet issued by the State Property Tax Board in Austin and available from the appraisal office explains how to prepare and present an appeal. 
