## PDRA proposes budget

The Palo Duro River Authority (PDRA) budget, effective July 1, is tied to consideration of a proposed bond election - to be held possibly as early as August 9 - to raise an estimated \$12 million. The money would be used to fund the construction of a 4,900 - foot earthen dam in Northwestern Hansford County. The money would also furnish recreational facilities for the lake the dam would create.

The bond issue would raise only an estimated half the cost of the dam. The Texas Water Development Commission will provide another \$10 million for storage in the lake.

States fund will be provided through the Texas Water Plan at 7.65 percent interest following a reduction in interest rates by the state agency. Interest was previously charged at 9.1 percent.

The PDRA directors will consider the proposed budget in their June meeting to be held Tuesday, June 10, at 2 p.m., in Spearman, at the Pittman - Shield-knight building.

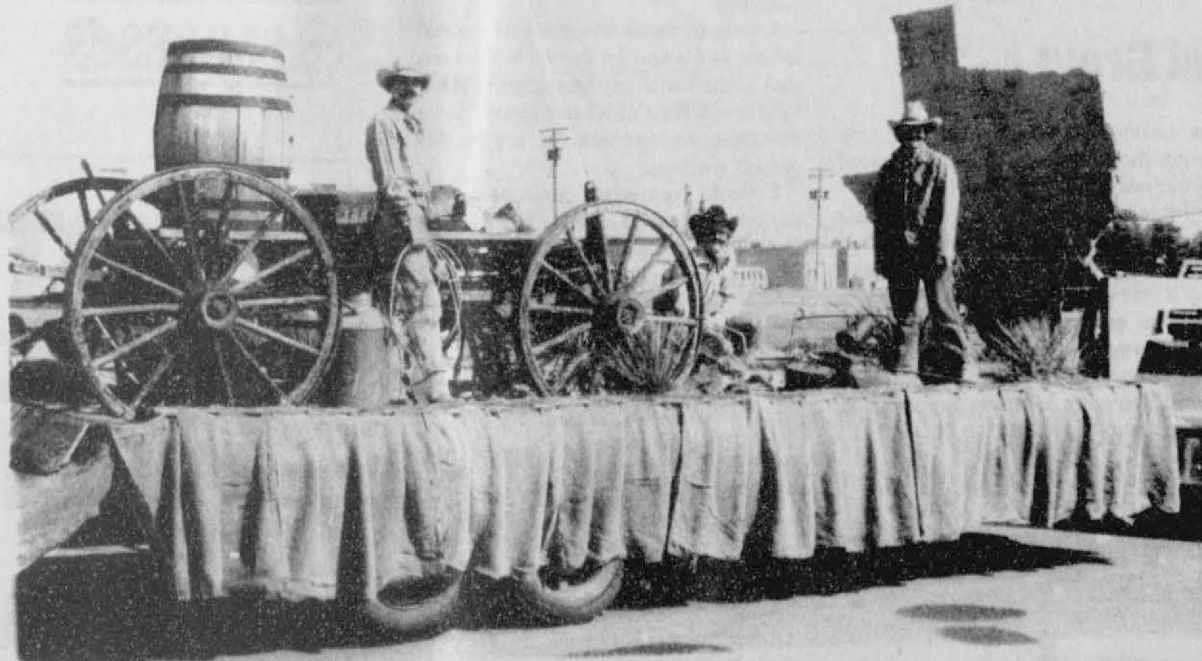
To finance the general operations budget, the directors will consider a tax rate of .0119 cents per \$100 of value.

The Palo Duro authority has used that rate for the last 10 years, a period when the authority was essentially a single county taxing entity, notes Johnnie Lee of Spearman, general manager.

Johnnie Lee believes no increase in the rate will be necessary to finance the larger budget since the district will have a larger tax base for revenues.

"The major expense for the district will be in engineering fees for design of the Palo Duro dam and plans for its construction," Lee explains. "The additional costs will run from \$60,000 to \$90,000 more."

The district spent \$15,000 on engineering during the current year which ended June 30, according to its amended budget.

# The Live Oak Fund

For the past 5 months residents of the quiet ranching community of Hansford County in the Texas Panhandle have been struggling with crisis - not farm foreclosures but something equally threatening to their way of life. On December 16, 1985, they read in the Amarillo Globe News that American Natural Resources - a Detroit based company - was planning to build a PCB waste dump on the land that had supported them for four generations.

Hansford County is one of the most prosperous agricultural areas in Texas, and it's fourth generation farmers and ranchers describe themselves as people who "tend to mind their own business". But with their land, health, and even their way of life suddenly threatened, they are fighting.

Their first meeting drew 500 people, and it was only a matter of days before Citizens Against Poisonous Pollutants was formed. Now they are taking their fight across the state and the country.

Last week they received their first outside support - a grant of \$2500 from the Live Oak Fund.

In Houston, the ACLU chapter has been receiving 30 to 40 calls a month concerning rights abuses related to AIDS. Houston has one of the largest numbers of AIDS cases in country, and abuses have gone to the extent of employees being fired because they did volunteer service work with AIDS victims. There has been no coordinated program of legal assistance in Texas to date.

This week the Clark Read Foundation of the Houston ACLU will begin a pilot project of attorney training and telephone assistance for Victims of AIDS related discrimination. Seed money for this project came from the Live Oak Fund.

As Texas' only public foundations committed to supporting community based activism, the Live Oak Fund supported nine other organizations this spring, including ADAPT a group of disabled activists fighting for accessible public transit; a group of students at Texas A&M forming a chapter of the National Organization for Women; and Refugio Del Rio Grande, a refugee camp in Harlingen offering legal assistance and sanctuary to war refugees from Central America.

The Live Oak Fund for Change is an unendowed public foundation supporting community activism on issues of poverty and social justice, environmental

tal safety, peace and disarmament. Live Oak accepts proposals from community groups twice a year, and has a statewide Board which currently distributes \$50,000 annually in grants. The fund itself is supported by over 500 contributors, both large and small.

1) American Disabled for Accessible Public Transportation \$2800. Austin - Continued funding for education and organizing campaign to win 100% accessible public transportation.

2) American Friends Service Committee \$1200. Austin - Live Oak Funds provided to assist in organizing opposition to war in Central America throughout Texas.

3) Citizen's Against Poisonous Pollutants \$2500. (see above text)

4) Clark Read Foundation \$250. (see above text)

5) Dallas Peace Center \$2000. Dallas - Seed money to organize Sept. conference uniting peace activists with low income and minority activists.

10) Refugio Del Rio Grande \$2500. Harlingen - a new project providing legal assistance and sanctuary to war refugees from Central America.

11) Texans for a Bilateral Nuclear Freeze \$1750. Dallas - Grant given for seed money to begin organizing project in East Dallas black community to oppose the nuclear arms race.

# Heavy Rains Stop Harvest

## in Spearman and Gruver

Some of the area wheat has been ready to cut since the end of May, but recent rains have slowed the wheat harvest this year. Forecast of warm weather have farmers gearing up to start their harvest in earnest.

Area Soil Conservationists said the overall production is expected to be lower this year as compared to the last few harvests. Part of this is due to the farm program, but a dry winter also hurt the crop.

Conservationists don't think the rain

was heavy enough to hurt the crop though the recent moisture has slowed the harvest.

"I think the wheat is alright once it's dried. The only problems will be in low areas where water is still standing and they'll have to wait for the ground to dry," an area conversationist pointed out. "Though the crop is probably going to be down over last year, I think there is still going to be some pretty good dryland wheat."

# Hansford County Number 1

## Last Quarter shows 35.7 % increase

Hansford County reported the biggest economic increase among north-eastern Panhandle counties according to a sales and use tax analysis by the State Comptroller of Public Accounts. Hansford had \$27,879,319 in gross sales from 255 reporting outlets, which was 35.7 percent better than 1984.

Counties showing increases included Ochiltree, with a 2.4 percent increase, and Lipscomb, with a 29.5 percent increase.

Showing decreases were Gray County with \$118,089,844 from 1,069 outlets; Hemphill with a 33 percent decrease; Hutchinson with a 1.5 percent decrease; and Roberts with a 18.5 percent decrease. State totals showed 435,232 outlets reporting \$105,221,160,766 in gross sales for the fourth quarter of 1985, compared with \$97,918,128,723, or a 7.5 percent increase. Of this total, \$26,618,758,545 was subject to tax.

# Downward Slide In Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said a downward slide in sales tax collection last month confirmed that the energy collapse has spread to other sectors of the Texas economy. Bullock said there was a 4.4 percent falloff in sales tax collections in May compared to the same month a year ago. "The downturn in oil has finally set in motion a wave that's soaking the rest of the Texas economy," Bullock said. He said collections in May this year amounted to \$438.4 million compared to \$458.7 million for the same month last year. Bullock said the \$20.3 million drop was due to declines in retail sales, services, construction and oil and gas. Last month, he said, taxes attributable to retail sales were up 10.9 percent while May's collections showed a 10.7 percent decline. Texas from services were down 12.7 percent in May, reversing a 15.5 percent gain in April.

Texas from oil and gas were off by about 40 percent and construction was down about 18.5 percent. He said last month's sales tax collections were the first time this year that the monthly income has fallen below the same month of the previous year. Bullock said the downturn had been predicted because of falling oil prices.

# River Valley Folk Festival To Be Held

The River Valley Folk Festival to be held in Canadian on Saturday, June 21, will be the first stop on their summer tour for the famed Kwahadi Indian Dancers of Amarillo. From Canadian the troop will go to Perryton for a performance and then head southeast where they will go as far as Florida to perform their colorful and authentic Indian dances.

They will perform in Canadian at 11 O'clock Saturday morning at the Hemphill County Exhibition Building as one of the events in the Folk Festival being sponsored by the River Valley Pioneer Museum.

The Kwahadi Dancers are members of Explorer Post 80, Boy Scouts of America. The group has performed over a period of 41 years, with more than a thousand boys involved at one time or another in the performance of the stirring and visually pleasing dances. They have researched the dances, costumes music, traditions and ceremonies connected with each tribal dance in order to bring authenticity to their performances.

A feature which will have special appeal for their audience will be a large Indian teepee which they will set up as part of the scenery for their show.

## Richard Tracy native of Spearman helps to restore older homes in Waco.

Richard Tracy, board member of Historic Waco Foundation, sees the drive to raise money for restoration of the Madison Cooper House as a way for the people of Waco to show appreciation for the Copper Foundation.

Mr. Tracy says the effort for the Madison Cooper place is coming along right on schedule. He said "We've been raising money for a little over a month and are approximately half way to our goal of \$75,000.00."

Mr. Tracy was recently asked why the Cooper Foundation hadn't been able to do this on their own. He went on to explain that the Historic Waco Foundation is involved because the house has to become a civic project for the Cooper Foundation to put money into it. The Foundation cannot spend money on itself. We are the vehicle through which the house is being made a civic project. A pledge of \$150,000 has been made by the Cooper Foundation toward the restoration once our part of the fund raising, is completed.

This house will be a Monument to Madison Cooper, and Historic Waco Foundation feels the house should be saved so future generations appreciate the architectural beauty and significance of the house as well as have that tangible Monument to Madison Cooper and his generosity to Waco.

Many people wonder why since Waco has saved half a dozen homes. Why they need another.

The answer is that Waco has four houses that are Historic Waco Foundation homes. There are additional houses that are in the Pope Foundation. It's the Historic Waco Foundation's feelings that you can't save too many of those houses. The Cooper house is unique in that it is a turn-of-the-Century house. The others are older, built in the 1800's.

The Cooper House will be used in several capacities determined by the Cooper Foundation trustees. The extra space that they do not occupy as their office space will be made available for office space for civic organizations that are trying to get started. The trustees already have given Brazos Foundation office space.

Some of the historical points of interest of Madison Cooper are: He was a very unusual man. He was born in 1894. He lived in Waco all of his life except for the period of time that he went to the University of Texas. He was very proud of Waco.

He was also a very civic minded person, contributed personally during his life to numerous organizations and in 1943 he founded the Cooper Foundation in Memory of his parents. He's also well known as the author of "Sironia, Texas" which was a controversial novel back in the 50's.

There is some talk of making the third floor of the house into a museum. This floor contains the office where he wrote "Sironia, Texas." It will display the personal memorabilia that is still in the

house. Basically the entire house except for the conversion of some bedrooms on the second floor into office space is exactly as it was when he died in 1956.

This house is unique in that it is one of very few houses in Waco that represent this period of architecture. The Rotan-Dossett house on Columbus is a similar period house. This isn't your typical victorian gingerbread house. It's a combination Greek Revival with traditional Victorian.

Why the sudden interest in 1985 instead of doing something before? The reason is that for several years the discussion had been going on by the Cooper Trustees about what to do with the house. The discussion was generated by the condition the house is in. It reached a point where something had to be done. Historic Waco Foundation has been aware of the talk of tearing down the house and we felt we should make a firm effort to save the house.

What is the purpose of the Historic Waco Foundation? It's chartered purpose is to preserve and enhance the decorative arts and architecture in a historical perspective. They operate four houses as house museums which are open to the public. They have the annual docent lectures with prominent people in the field of restoration coming into speak.

Mr. Tracy was asked why he was interested in Waco's historical preservation? His answer was "I've lived in Waco since 1971 and have always had an interest in the things the HWF tries to preserve and make people take notice of. I'd love to own a house like the Cooper house."

People can help by continuing to support and donate. The campaign was kicked off by the Brazos River Festival with a direct mail Solicitation. Also the Civic Theater is putting on a John Anderson's production of "Sironia, Texas" and we will be getting a portion of the proceeds of that production. People who buy a ticket are contributing toward the project. The address to mail contributions is, A Continuing Legacy, P.O. Box 21463, Waco 76702.

Many people have asked about a reprint of the novel but we are not financially stabilized to do that at this point. We have reprinted the Marion Travis biography of Madison Cooper, and that book will be available at the Civic Theater and can also be purchased from the HWF office at 1524 Washington.

There are about 1,300 members of the Historic Waco Foundation. This foundation is constantly visited by historical organizations from other cities and our houses are held up to be outstanding examples of restoration work. I think we rate a little higher than the average city size.

Mr. Tracy is from Spearman. He went to Baylor straight out of high school and went to Baylor Law School.

He moved to Waco in 1971 and found a job with a law firm and has been very happy ever since.

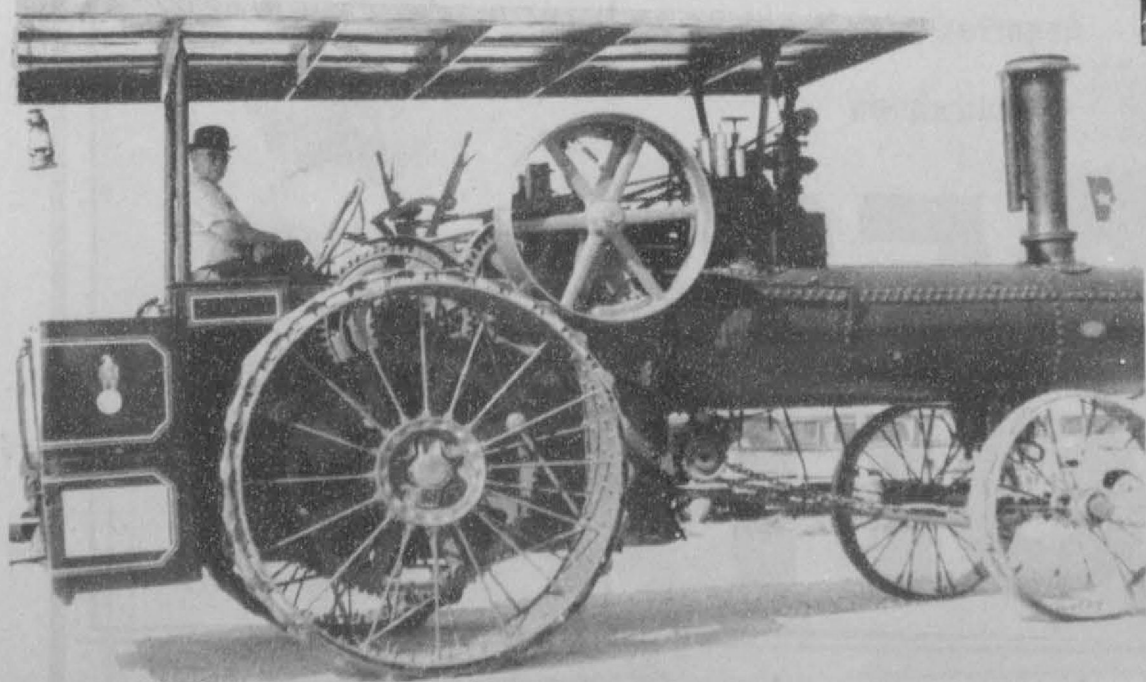

As soon as the blossoms fade on lilacs they should be pruned (prune back limb when cutting flowers for display) as lilacs stop growth after blossoming.

Children who suffer from allergies should wear allergy bracelets. These are especially good for school-age children who have outstanding allergies--especially from medication and insect stings.

Remember to wear dark sun glasses in bright sun light. This will protect your eyes from the glare of the sun on sand or water. Do not look directly into the sun.
