## New school rules go into effect

### Obituary

A new game plan for extra curricular participation went into effect last week in Texas schools--one that Hansford County schools believe will be workable once the problems are determined and ironed out.

And, the method of determining eligibility for participation will be changed beginning with the fourth and fifth six weeks grading periods of the school year.

The whole thing is part of the 1984 education reform bill passed by the Texas Legislature and now in the interpretive stages by the Texas Education Agency and the State Board of Education.

Primarily, starting January 1, the number of hours an individual student may spend on extra curricular participation after school hours is specified and definite--no more than 8 hours in any one activity or 20 hours over-all.

Actually, though, it is a little more complicated than that. The first "performance" at the beginning of the week, including travel time, will be counted as a flat 2 hours. As an example, if basketball teams travel to Perryton for Tuesday night games, only two hours will go on the record even though six hours may be spent going to Perryton, playing the game, and coming home.

Then if the team must travel again this week, on Friday to Canadian, or the farthest point in the district, and leave at 2:00 p.m., the time charged will be only from departure, about 2:00 p.m. until regular classes are dismissed at 3:45 p.m., a total of slightly less than 2 hours.

With the two trips during that week counting four hours the coaches are left with four hours for after school workouts. Class time does not count.

Every coach will keep a record--on a calendar--of time spent after

school." The athletic directors in each school will provide coaches with the calendars and all they will have to do is make notes on the days.

Where the rub comes in--and officials are not certain how rough it will be--will be on those Spearman and Gruver students who are involved in more than one activity in a week or weeks.

Schools will be starting one-act plays--and some of those practices will be before school. Teachers suppose that before school counts the same as after school, so there is a possibility that an athlete who has practice in the afternoon could spend time in another activity before school.

Teachers, then, will have to keep records of student participation--and, believe administrators, students would have to stay up with the time they spend.

Teachers do not know, nor do TEA guidelines tell, whether the time records will be on an "honor" systems or will have to be accounted for.

Since a ten day absence rule on extra curricular activities became effective with the opening of the fall term, some changes may have to be made in certain areas.

For instance, the Hansford County Junior Livestock Show and Sale is an integral part of the vocational agricultural program at both Spearman and Gruver Schools.

And, participation by some students in the show is through the Hansford County Extension Service 4-H Youth Program. When the show opens, students will not be in the community buildings with their animals except during after school hours or during the Vo-Ag classes. School officials probably will advise stock show entrants that no absences from school will be requested

during the day. Most teachers say their students will not miss any class work during the livestock show.

There is a difference in co-curricular and extra curricular, and we probably are in the co-curricular part.

Co-curricular activities are defined as an "extension of class room instruction in which participation is by the entire class or a significant portion thereof," the TEA regulations state.

However, absence from classes other than the co-curricular course would be counted in the 10-day rule, according to the TEA guidelines.

Now, another thorn that has been irritating some school officials throughout the state is deter-

mining the eligibility for participation in extra curricular activities.

Extra Curricular takes in a whole range from athletic competition to literary events, in University Interscholastic League in addition to school-related clubs and organizations.

In the past, eligibility has been checked weekly on such as athletic teams--a student was required to have a passing grade in at least four classes to be able to compete.

Beginning with the fifth six weeks of the school year, March 4, a student must post a passing mark in every course for the previous six weeks, to be eligible.

In other words, implementation actually begins with the fourth six weeks, which starts Jan. 21, because UIL eligibility for the next

six weeks will be based on a student's classroom performance in the fourth six weeks.

The only exception to this rule is an option to be exercised by a principal if a student has an average of less than 70 in an honors class, the principal may allow participation.

Strangely enough, the rules have a quirk that some school officials find slightly amusing--eligibility for the first six weeks of the fall semester will not be based on the last six weeks of the previous spring.

So, while the rules run through the school year, the summer vacation just wipes out everything. It's a whole new ball game every fall.





The latest in all-weather clothing is "bion-coated" fabric that is waterproof, yet breathable. Developed by Biotex Corporation, bion-coated fabric has been tested in ski jackets and found to keep skiers dry and comfortable.

This new fabric coating differs from the brand of breathable fabrics now found in clothing for sailors, skiers, and joggers. The brand now in use contains a thin sheet of Teflon-like material sandwiched between a fabric and a lining.

Bion-coated fabrics are also breathable and waterproof. Winter skiers can look for the first Bion-coated one-piece ski suits under the Robert John label. Next year Biotex will make available Bion-coated tents, running suits and rugged outerwear such as hiking jackets, mountain climbing and foul weather gear.

The coating material was developed by a chemical engineer working on polyurethane materials to make the ideal wound dressing for surgical incisions, cuts and burns. He came up with a wound dressing by changing

the basic molecular structure of polyurethane film and then realized it had many other uses. The wound dressing, when sprayed on as a fabric coating, produced a breathable, waterproof fabric.

If this winter is anything like last winter, some Texans will find themselves confronted with frozen plumbing.

Even in a normal moderate Texas winter, it's possible to have pipes freeze because of a sudden drop in temperature.

Pipes are most likely to freeze if homeowners turn the heat off while they go away on vacation. Whenever the house will not be lived in for a period of time, set the thermostat at 55 degrees Fahrenheit.

Pipes are most likely to freeze if homeowners turn the heat off while they go away on vacation. Whenever the house will not be lived in for a period of time, set the thermostat at 55 degrees Fahrenheit to protect the plumbing.

Should the pipes freeze, there are two important rules for thawing them in a way that won't do more damage in the process.

First, always open faucets connected to the pipe being thawed. When faucets are left closed during the thawing process, the pipe may burst if steam develops in the blocked pipe.

Second, don't use open flame heat sources to thaw pipes. The pipes could be damaged and dry or flammable materials near the pipe may ignite.

The safest and most effective way to thaw pipes is to use electric heating tape.

Simply wrap the tape around the pipe at the points most likely to be frozen, and plug it into an appropriate outlet to start the thawing process.

One advantage of electric heating tape is that it can be left in place on pipes likely to freeze frequently during the cold season and plugged in when needed. Consumers should check to make sure the heating tape bears an Underwriter's Laboratories (UL) label.

Other means of thawing pipes include the following:

Hair dryers or other hot air gun-type heater -- Use the high heat settings and direct the hot air along the frozen pipe. Clear cobwebs and flammable material from the area to be heated.

Vacuum cleaners -- Connect the vacuum cleaner hose to the discharge outlet of the machine and blow air from the vacuum cleaner and the room onto the pipe. This is good if the room is warm and the pipes are in cupboards, closets or under floors and in walls where air can be easily blown.

Small fans -- If the room is above 40 degrees Fahrenheit, direct the fan onto the area where the pipe is frozen. This works well if the pipes are in cupboards or closets.

Hot water and rag -- Wrap the pipe with rags and pour hot water on the rags. Continue pouring hot water until the pipe thaws. This technique is not suitable where water will damage walls, floors and other areas.

Homeowners can save themselves the trouble of having to thaw pipes if they'll simply wrap any exposed pipes or encase them in insulated tubing before the worst of the winter cold is here.
