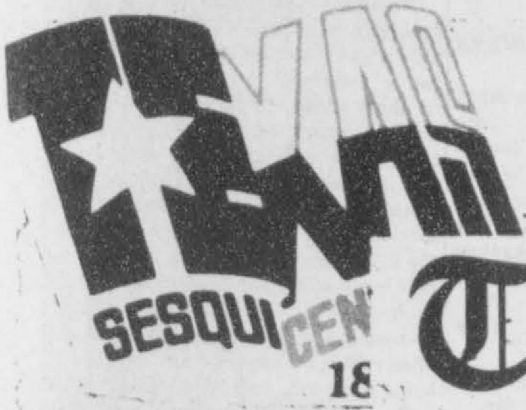

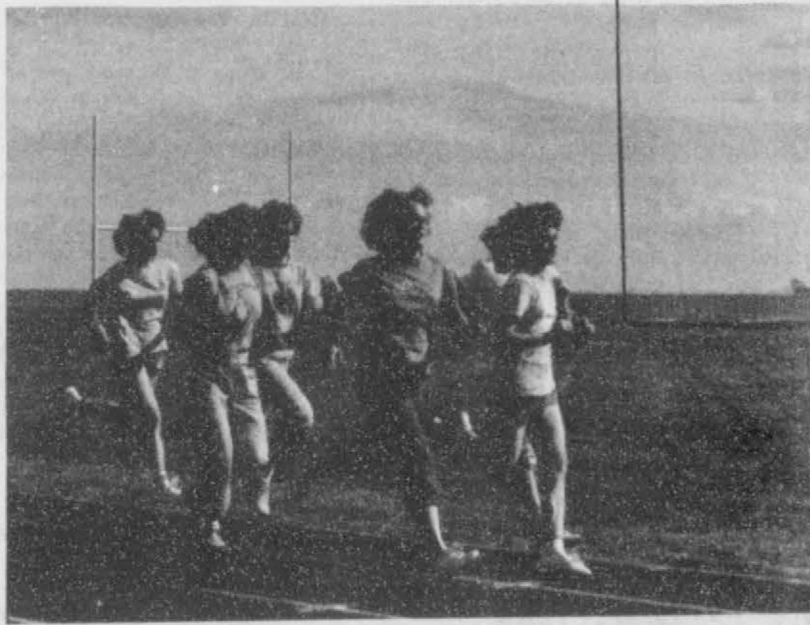
SCORING: All scoring will be done in accordance with UIL rules.

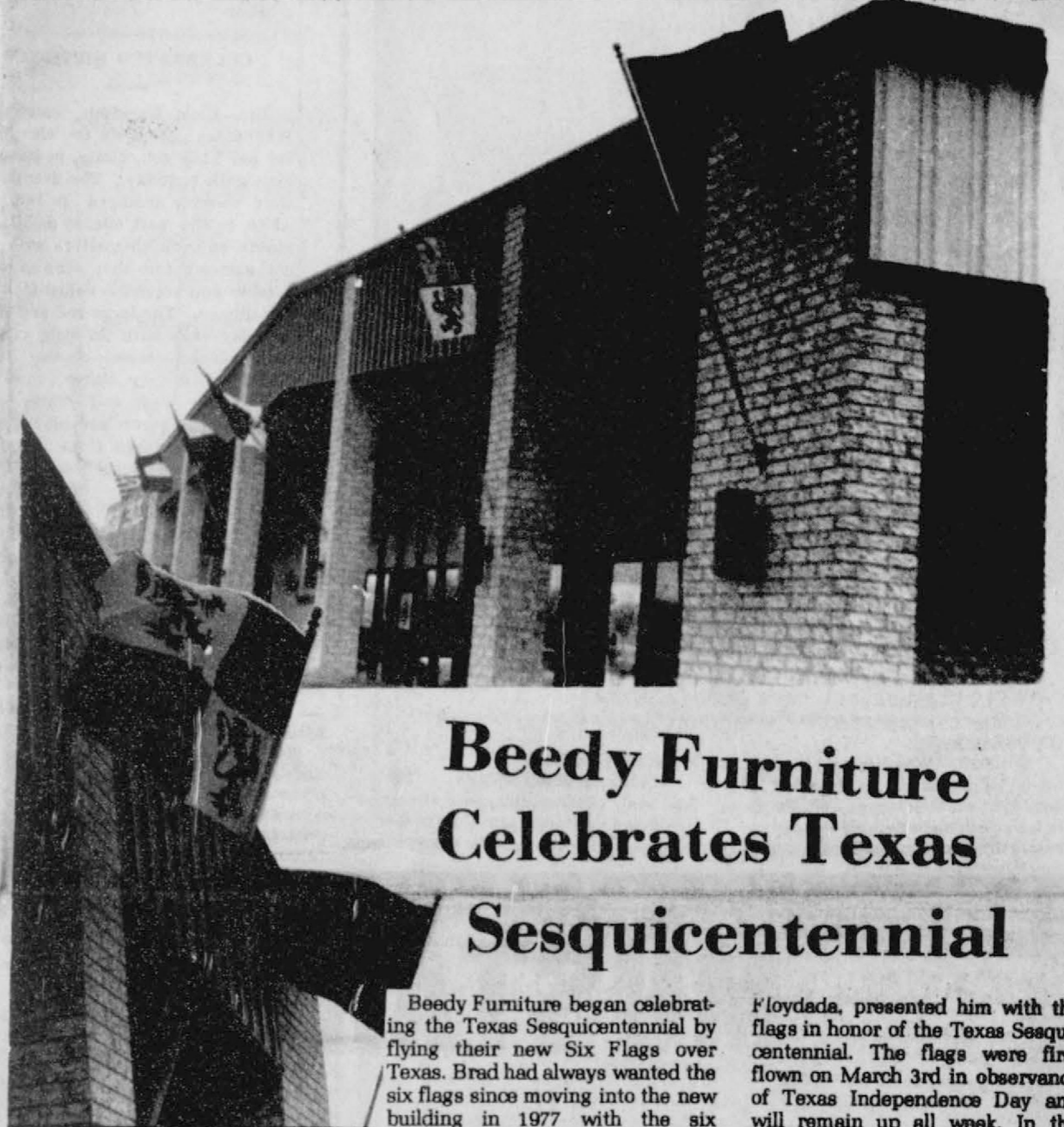
GRUVER - Wilma Jean Byrd, 52, died Friday.

1986 FARM PROGRAM

Producers may sign up in the 1986 wheat and feed grain program between March 3 and April 11, 1986. Since this is a short sign up period we are going to ask that producers call and set up an appointment to sign up. If we work together this procedure should avoid the long waiting lines we have experienced in the past. We will allow 30 minutes per farm but we expect that if you will know what you are going to do it will only take 15 minutes per farm, and this will give us extra time to figure payments.

ADVANCE PAYMENTS

Due to recent change in procedure we are not allowed to make advance payments until May 1, 1986. The chart below will show the advance payment rate and the yield that will be used.

* This yield will be determined by the producers intended acreage. If you intend to harvest an irrigated crop you will be paid on an irrigated yield.

** All diversion payments will be made on a dry yield until after certification and the land is determined to meet the irrigation requirement of being irrigated 2 of the last 3 years. You must request Advance payments during the sign up period.

1985 CROP LOAN DEADLINES

March 31, 1986 is the last day to request 1985 crop wheat loans. May 31, 1986 is the final day to request corn and grain sorghum loans.

CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM

A new 10 year Conservation Reserve Program has been enacted for 1986. We will accept request for participation in the CRP from March 3 thru March 14, 1986. Other sign up periods are scheduled for 1986, 1987, 1988 and 1989.

In order to participate you must have qualifying land. Land eligibility will be determined by the Soil Conservation Service at the time of sign up.

Eight business firms of Spearman handling tractors, combines, plows and automobiles are sponsoring a mammoth joint demonstration of their wares, to be held in Spearman on March 16 and 17. The firms are to have a machine of each make sold in Spearman, placed on a convenient vacant lot near the main section, with a competent demonstrator in charge, and for two days nothing else except explain the mechanism and general make-up of power-farming machinery and automobiles. Much advertising matter is being sent out, and it is thought that a big crowd will be here each day. Farming conditions are improving every day, and the north plains seem to be the natural home of power farming machinery, hence the intense interest in these lines.

On Friday and Saturday, March 16 and 17, anyone who is interested may come to Spearman and see in actual operation any of the several different makes of tractors, combines, trucks, plows and automobiles sold here. This can not but be an interesting program, especially to farmers, and all are especially invited to come, look and listen.

The demonstration has been arranged merely as a convenience to farmers. They are invited to come, investigate as much as they please, at no expense whatever, and will be placed under no obligation to anyone. Remember the big Machinery Show in Spearman, March 16 and 17.

THREE WAY READY TO DRILL AGAIN

Drillers at the Three Way Test, northeast of Spearman, are again about ready to send the bit toward China, with no limit as to depth they will go. Those interested state that they will go as deep as possible, or until oil is found. They have the hole straight-reamed to the bottom, a new boiler has recently been installed, and it now looks like they are in shape to go beyond the 4,000-foot mark within the next few weeks. The hole is now 3358 feet deep. Experts claim that this is one of the most promising wildcat tests in this section, but that the well must be a deep one; deeper than the average for this country.

JUST A LITTLE TROUBLE AT THE COOTS WELL

The drilling crew on the Coots wildcat test, 18 miles northeast of Spearman, has been experiencing just a bit of trouble and has done very little drilling during the past ten days. At 1706 feet, they had to straight ream, then they had to straighten the hole. Next their boiler gave trouble and now they have a string of tools in the hole. Everything is straightened out now except the lost tools and this will take only a short time. They expect to be making hole the latter part of the week.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN DIED AT RIO VISTA

Mrs. Lucile Wilbanks received a message on Friday of last week, stating that her grandfather, W. P. Kizzar, had died at his home at Rio Vista on Thursday, March 1. Deceased was 86 years old at the time of his death. He was a veteran of the civil war.

There's one exercise that everyone - from toddlers to oldsters and from weekend joggers to pro athletes - can do, and that's stretch.

The wonderful thing about stretching is that you don't have to be in top physical condition or have special athletic skills, also you can do it any time, like at the start of your day, at work to release nervous tension, when watching tv or in the car.

Simply stretch any part of your body to the point where you feel a mild tension, and relax as you hold the stretch. The whole process should take 10-30 seconds.

Those few seconds of stretching, if done on a regular basis, will reduce muscle tension and make your body feel more relaxed. It will increase your range of motion and help your coordination.

Stretching should always be done before and after physical activity like running, skiing, tennis or swimming. It prepares your body for the activity and can prevent injuries such as muscle strains.

Stretching also has some psychological benefits since it can be a good stress and tension reducer. Plus, it just feels good.

March is a turning-point, when winter at times gives way to warmer weather and signs of spring appear. In early colonial days, the year began in March.

The name of the month comes from Mars, in ancient Italian the name of the God of War.

Spring begins on the 20th this year. St. Patrick's Day is the

17th. Maryland Day falls on March 25. Albany became capital of New York on March 10, 1797, and the United States Military Academy was established at West Point on March 16, 1802.

In Massachusetts, Evacuation Day in Boston is commemorated on March 17. The so-called Boston Massacre took place in March of 1770.

For Texas, March is historical. On March 2, 1836, even while Santa Anna was besieging the Alamo, Texas was declared independent. March 6 is Alamo Day in Texas, anniversary of its fall in 1836.

March 3 is the birthday anniversary of Alexander Graham Bell; March 7, that of Luther Burbank; March 8, that of Simon Cameron, who founded a political dynasty in Pennsylvania.

March 16, that of President James Madison; March 17, that of Roger B. Taney, fifteenth justice of the United States Supreme Court; March 18, that of Grover Cleveland, the only American president to serve two non-consecutive terms as president; March 18, that of William Jennings Bryan, and March 29,

that of President John Tyler, the tenth president of the United States.

Girl's Scout Day is March 12, and March 30 is the anniversary of the day in 1868 when Russia ceded Alaska to the United States for \$7,200,000.

Good Friday (the 28th) and Easter (the 30th) are also in March.

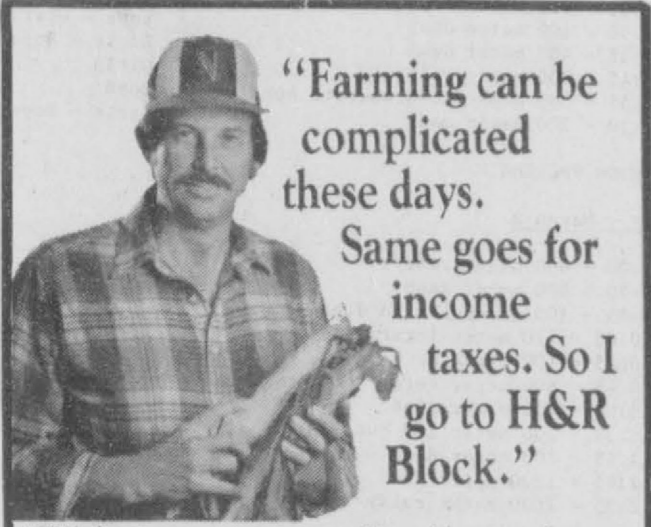

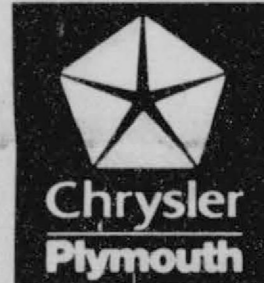

The Alamo

On the sixth of March, 1836, Mexican General Santa Anna committed an error which made certain independence for Texas. Texans had proclaimed a revolution (with an eye on later admission to the United States) and Mexican soldiers were seeking to put down the insurrection. The Mexican Government had a good legal case.

General Santa Anna arrived before the Texas-manned mission, which had been converted into a fort, with several thousand troops. For ten days he bombarded the Texans but failed to breach the fort's walls. During this time, also, thirty-two volunteers arrived to bolster the defenses.

On the 6th, Mexicans attacked in overwhelming force. The Texans and other U.S. defenders turned them back. The Mexicans attacked again and were repulsed

a second time. But Santa Anna persisted. His third wave overran the fort. Only five defenders were taken alive, one of them being David Crockett. Santa Anna ordered them executed.

The cold-blooded order infuriated Texans, and U.S. citizens everywhere. Six weeks later a revenge-minded force of Texans and others met Santa Anna in the battle of San Jacinto, sweeping his forces from the field to the cry of, "Remember the Alamo," and winning independence for Texas.

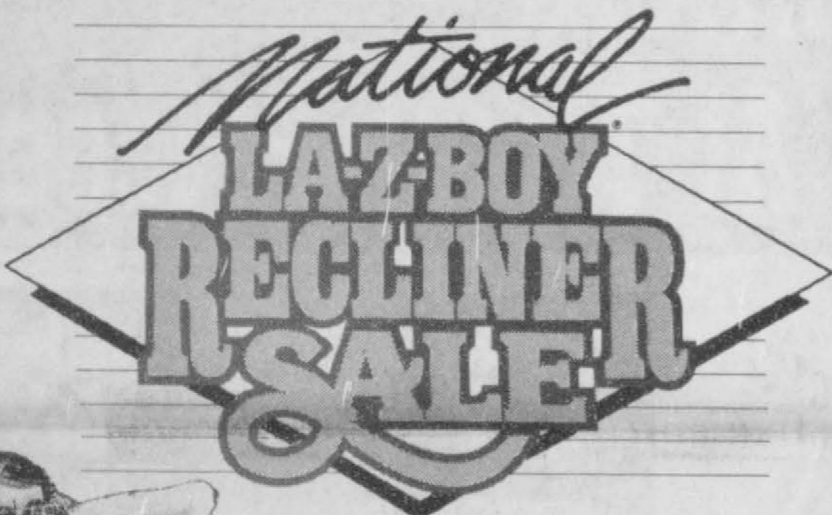
