Can you believe? Our favorite project is now a reality! The Shelter is now ready for use, complete with a highly qualified and delightful Superintendent.

Thanks to all you warm-hearted people, from those who donated the use of the building to those who helped to furnish it, down to those who merely loaned us a dolly for moving the heavy things, and to those who made donations of food, or funds for same. Thanks, thanks, and more thanks!

Also to those other givers who continue to serve our clients, such as the answering service, which makes our 24-hour telephone service possible. And to those volunteers who serve in various capacities, such as manning the telephone, attending to filing, baby-sitting when necessary, or as counselors to those in need. This is a wonderful core of women (and an occasional man!), but their ranks are thinning, some because of moves away from the area, one or two because of new babies of their own. So we are always in need of more volunteers. Please call the office (435-5008) if you think you would like to become a volunteer.

For our counseling volunteers, we have regular monthly in-service training periods to fine-tune our ability to serve. Last Saturday we had an outstanding one. Ochiltree General Hospital gave us a short course in the treatment of rape victims. This emphasized the importance of the victim's not even going to the bathroom before receiving care. The Texas Department of Human Services gave a shop course on protective services

for victims of battering and/or of rape or molestation. It was pointed out that if a child tells anyone about the possibility of battering or of molestation, that person (18 years old or older) is held responsible for reporting it to an agency within 48 hours for professional investigation. We've long known this to be true for battering, etc. It is now true for sexual molestation of any type.

Joe Hannon, the Police Chief, also gave a course on legal aspects. He pointed out that arrest for battering is now a possibility even without the victim's filing a complaint. He stated that arrest, including a possible fine, is a deterrent to future batterings. And battering must be stopped. Children are always victims of a violent household, whether or not they are themselves abused. They pay an awful price in fear, in hate for the batterer. They may grow up to be too timid to fend for themselves in

an adequate way. They may themselves become batters. Or they may simply become delinquent. They too may need counselling. It is partly because of this continuing incidence of ill effects that is prompting the legal crack-down on the batterers.

Rape is another form of violence prompted by anger. The victim suffers greatly from this violation of his/her person. And so does the spouse or other family member who is aware. Of course the victim (and the family) frequently goes

through the anguish by deciding to move away - far away from the scene of the assault on his/her personhood. This is understandable. It is a horrible experience. But unless the violator is caught, he remains free to act in the same way toward another victim, or even (horrible to contemplate) to the same one. This too must be stopped. But even if you, as a victim, are unwilling to pursue the violator, please get help in recovering from the outrage by calling the Panhandle Crisis Center.

In order to fulfill our obligations as recipients of grant moneys, as well as to acquaint more people with our facility and its services, the Panhandle Crisis Center will hold a guest night in Booker, at 8:00p.m., Monday, April 7, at the Meeting Room of the First Bank and Trust Company. Anyone with interest in or curiosity about our work is urged to attend. We will hold another guest night in Hansford County. Watch for the announcement.

A Question of Burning Dinner Was Late

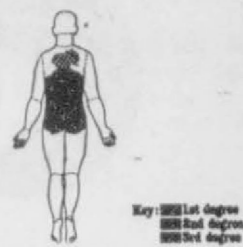
Kathy, 18 months

How it Happened:

Friends were coming in half an hour, and Margaret was late in starting dinner. She had prepared a beef stew the night before. She took it out of the refrigerator and put it on the stove to warm. Then she started cleaning carrots at the sink.

Kathy was drawing pictures on the floor. After a while she got bored. She wanted to see what her mother was doing. She got up, went over to her mother and pulled on her skirt. Margaret looked down, "Not now, Sweetie, I have to fix dinner." Kathy cried a little and reached out her arms to be picked up. "Not now, Kathy, you'll have to wait," Margaret said. "Here, play with your bear," she added, handing Kathy her teddy bear. Kathy was quiet for a few seconds, but then she started to howl. She wanted to be where Mommy was. "All Right!" Margaret said, picking Kathy up and setting her on the counter between the sink and the stove. "But sit there quietly." Margaret turned her back slightly to reach up and get salt from the cupboard.

Suddenly Kathy began to yell. The edge of her cotton dress had caught fire on the burner. Within seconds the back of her dress was engulfed in flames. Margaret pushed her down on the counter and rolled her to smother the flames. As soon as the flames were out, she removed Kathy's smoldering dress and applied cool water to her burns.

Medical Record:

Deep 3rd degree burns over entire back, including buttocks; 2nd degree burns on left arm and abdomen.

Hospitalization:

39 days, during hospitalization, child was operated on three times for grafting of her back and arm. During healing, she was tormented by itching, which was relieved somewhat by medication. Her back is quite scarred, but the scars do not seem to hinder her movement.

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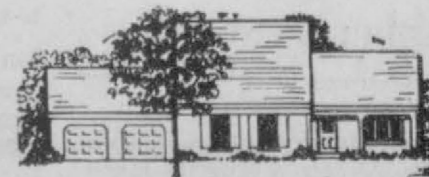

Maines Brothers concert benefits charity

"When the four Maines Brothers and their three pals get up a full head of steam, there isn't a rowdier, hotter, more likable country band around."

The quote is from a February review in People magazine of the latest Maines Brothers Band LP, "The Boys Are Back in Town."

The Maines Brothers are scheduled for a benefit dance in Perryton for Ochiltree County's Children's Protective Service, April 12 from 9 p.m. to midnight at the Expo Center.

Donations for tickets are \$10 per person.

Although the Lubbock-based band has never had a top twenty hit, they are considered a very good

dance band as well as a band that has songs easy to listen to. "There's just enough flavor of rock, mostly from Donnie Maines drumming, to spice up the good-time feeling generated by Richard Bowden's fiddling," the People review said. "Such bands...are creating a kind of scaled-down country revival of the Big Band

Era that's a joy to listen to."

After recording four albums on Texas Soul Records, the band signed with Mercury Records in Nashville. The band has also begun to perform nationally.

A song from their newest LP, "Danger Zone," appeared on the country charts at number 60 four weeks ago, and seems to be doing well. This follows the aggressive country sound they debuted nationally last year with the LP "High Rollin'."

"This is definitely our best effort," Lloyd Maines, the eldest of the group said. "We feel with this album we can bridge the gap to young people and re-ignite a genuine interest in the spirit of country music."

"The Boys Are Back in Town" states the case with songwriting from Dobbie Gray, Wendy Waldman, Billy Burnett, Mike Smotherman and bandmember Jerry Brownlow.

"We've been together now almost eight years," lead vocalist Kenny Maines said, "and we feel like we're all brothers. A lot of people don't stay together, yet we've proven over the years we have that stability. We're seven guys movin' in the same direction."

Each member of the band has a full musical background. The four Maines Brothers began their career as the "Little Maines Brothers Band" at a young age, to complement a popular Texas band fronted by their father and uncles. Richard Bowden, Jerry Brownlow and Cary Banks came with the group later.

ROTARY NEWS!

Lemuel Phillips, who just finished a revival at the Church of Christ in Spearman, presented the Rotary Program at noon Monday. He is an expert on Rotary Clubs, and we think you will enjoy this story...

Rotary Foundation Originated with Arch Clumph, then President of Rotary International, in 1917. It was further organized into an Unincorporated Foundation in 1978, to be funded only by free will contributions. In 1947 Paul P. Harris, Founder of Rotary, died. Memorial Gifts were sent to the Foundation by Rotarians from around the world. From these contributions 18 Graduate Scholarships were awarded in 1948 to students to study in a Foreign Country for one year and serve as Ambassadors of goodwill and Friendship.

Since 1948 some \$200 million have been contributed to the Foundation, perhaps 50 per cent of which has been given in the past 5 or 6 years.

The foundation now sponsors 5 basic programs: 1. Scholarships (Which has been expanded to include the following: A. Graduate; B. Undergraduate; C. Journalism; D. Teacher of the Handicapped; E. Vocational Teachers)

Over 15,000 such Scholarships have been granted and continues at the rate of about 1,000 annually. 2. Teaching Grants to University Professors (\$10,000) of developed Nations to teach for one year in a developing nation.

3. Group Study Exchange Teams, consisting of either 5 young men (Not Rotary connected) and a Rotarian Sponsor to spend 4 to 6

weeks in A Foreign Country learning as much as possible about them and their way of life, or 4 young ladies (not Rotary Connected), a Rotarian sponsor and his wife. The team members must be between the ages of 25 and 35 years of age.

4. Special Grants, Which are matching and Grants given to a Rotary Club or district in a developing nation for a project to benefit that community or country. Usually the Sponsoring Rotary Club or district from a developed Nation will provide 1/2 the funds. There is no minimum cost project, but there is a \$50,000 maximum cost.

5. Health, Hunger and Humanity, (3-H) Program Natural Divides into: A) Health: Prevention of Polio; Primary health care and health education; treatment and rehabilitation.

B) Hunger: Food production, preservation, and distribution, community development, with particular emphasis on income improvement.

C) Humanity: literary; vocational training and emergency assistance.

The most ambitious program to date is the eradication of polio worldwide by the 100th anniversary of Rotary in 2005.

Alex Deford was born Saturday, October 30, 1971. She died Saturday, January 19, 1980 of cystic fibrosis.

Alex was an incredible child who never gave up and really never quit fighting. She was a feisty, funny little girl with an enormous love of and zest for life. Alex virtually transcended her debilitating disease and was an inspiration to everyone around her. When she died, her family was devastated, but her courage, spirit and hope were captured by her writer-father, Frank Deford, in the book *Alex: The Life of a Child*.

This April, the movie version of *Alex: The Life of a Child* will air on ABC Television. Craig T. Nelson, star of *Pottergeist* and *Call to Glory* plays Frank Deford, Bonnie Bedelia portrays his wife and 8-year-old Gennie James from *Places in the Heart* is Alex.

Angie Pugh has been appointed chairperson of the annual Cystic Fibrosis "Bike For Breath" Bike-A-Thon sponsored by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The event is scheduled to start at Spearman High School on Sunday, May 4 from 2 to 5 p.m. Proceeds will benefit the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation's programs in research, care and education. "Anyone who wants to ride bikes for health, fun and prizes can register," according to Pugh. "Participants will collect pledges for each mile they ride on a bicycle course."

Prizes in the Bike-A-Thon will be awarded to participants based on the amount of money they collect and include T-shirts, athletic bags, headset radios, AM/FM cassette recorders, and Sony Walkman's. Area grand prizes include a color television

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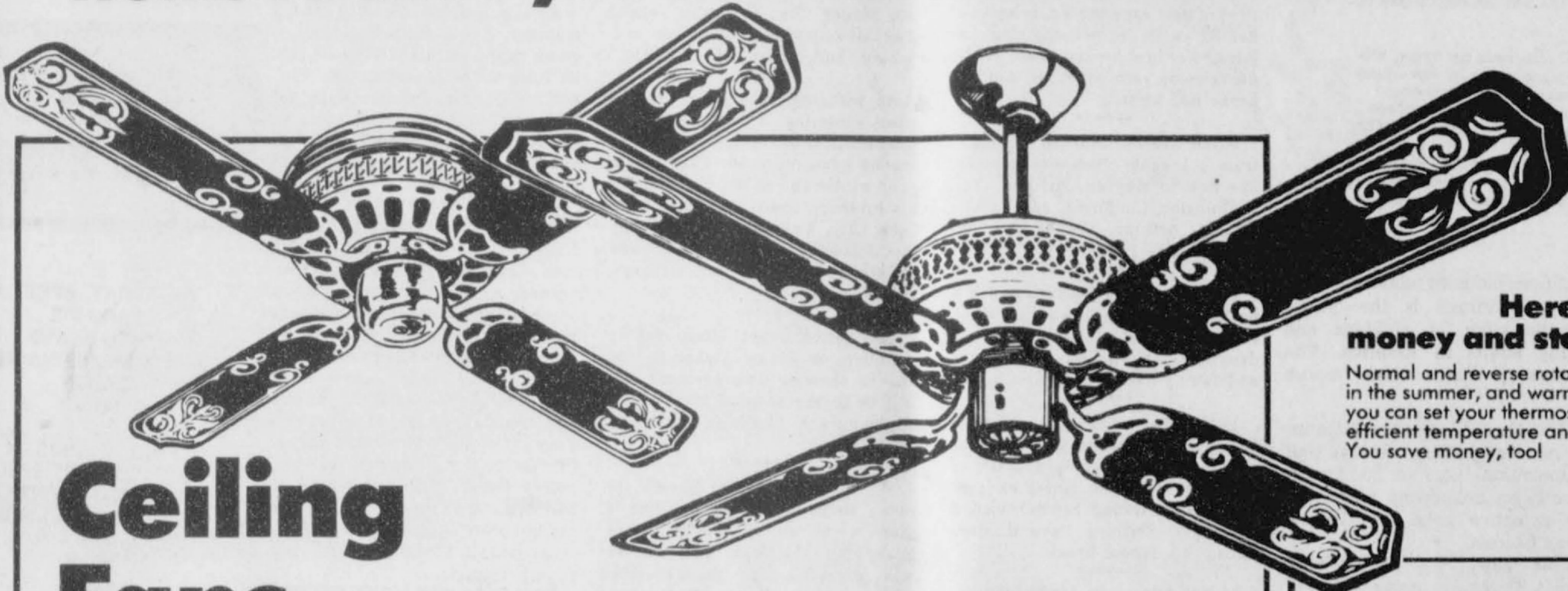
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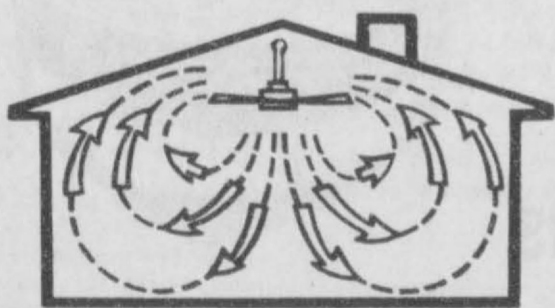
