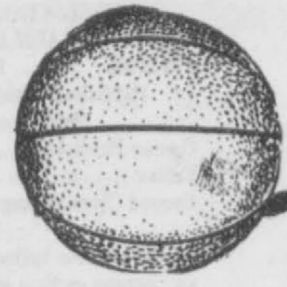

It has been my pleasure and good fortune to serve as one of your Aldermen for the past six years. I will appreciate your support and vote in the April election.

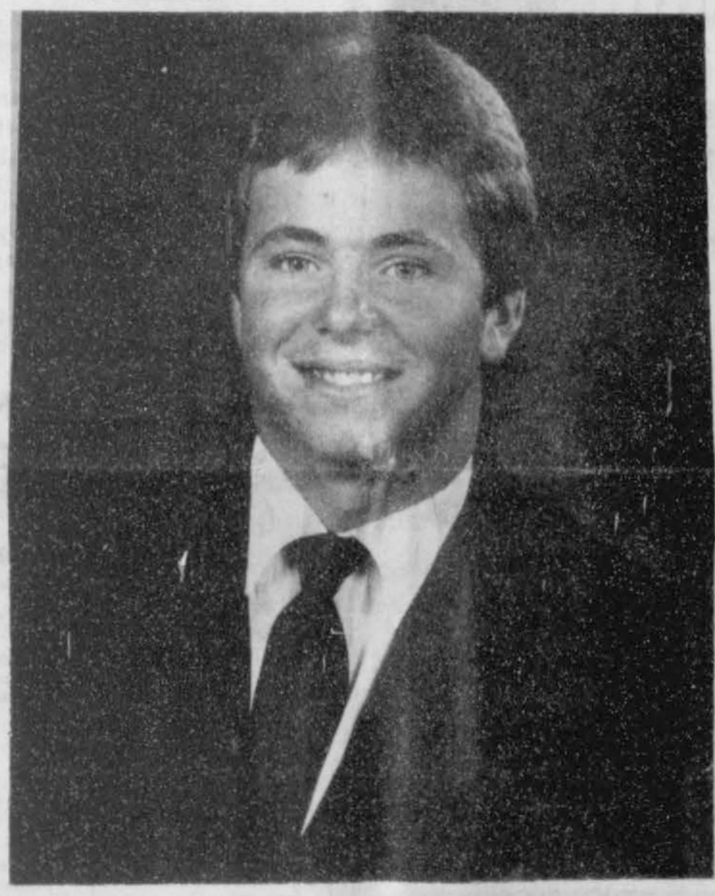

Spearman Chamber of Commerce

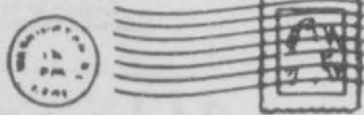

TV COMMENTARY

THE buyout of ABC by Capital Cities lessens the strong influence on U.S. network television of Leonard Goldenson. THE Capital Cities Chairman, Tom Murphy, has retained Goldenson as chairman of the executive committee of the new Capital Cities-ABC. NEVERTHELESS, Goldenson's direct rule over operations at ABC is being ended. He's 79. CRITICS of ABC feel it's time he goes. He is held responsible rightly or wrongly for cheapening entertainment, for sensationalism (stunts which can cost lives), for overstress on Israel and Israel's claims, for oversteering sex, etc. HIS backers say he put ABC on

the map with his drive. He inflicted Barbara Walters on viewers, but he put ABC on the map financially. CAPITAL CITIES and Murphy will now try to do at ABC what Grant Tinker has done at NBC. When Tinker took over from Fred Silverman at NBC four years ago Silverman, like Goldenson today, led a network at the bottom. NBC was barely breaking even. It was third in the ratings, etc. Tinker has turned things around. The 59-year-old chief executive at NBC has pulled the network up in ratings, and profits have soared. NBC, in fact, was the first network—in 1985—to sell over \$1 billion worth of prime time advertising before the current season began.

"Coping With Change"

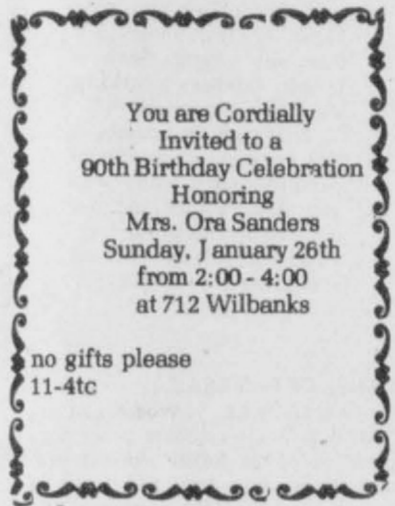
To keep stress at a minimum, Baylor specialists suggest: —learn as much as possible about a new locale before moving.

HOME ECONOMICS BRIEFS

BE WARY OF WEIGHT LOSS PLANS -- Some commercial weight-loss businesses may help you shed more dollars than weight, cautions a family economics expert. "Advertising that promises a specific weight loss for a set fee can be misleading," says Nancy L. Granovsky. "Because the diet plan may also require the purchase of expensive dietary supplements, which raises the consumer's cost." These supplements and special foods are often marked up by 300 percent or more and may be of questionable nutritive value, says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist.

HIGH FIBER FOODS -- The person who eats a balanced diet containing the recommended four servings of vegetables and fruit each day, as well as four servings of whole grain breads and cereals, should be able to get enough fiber from regular foods, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt. Vegetables, fruits and whole grains are the most common food sources of fiber, she adds. Some of the foods highest in fiber include broccoli, raw cabbage and carrots, dried beans and peas, wheat bran, oatmeal, dried prunes, unpeeled apples and other fruits with skins.

PROS AND CONS OF FIBER -- Nutrition research over the years has identified several useful properties of dietary fibers, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt. Reduction of cholesterol absorbed by the intestine, alteration of the ratio of types of fats absorbed or changes in the transit time of digested food through the intestine have all been reported. However, the researchers also point out that high bulk diets may cause a loss in the absorption of essential vitamins or minerals, says Hunt. Reduced absorption of proteins, fats, minerals and vitamins can result from 35 grams of dietary fiber per 1000 calories per day. Research is continuing to determine both the best types and amounts of fiber for a healthful diet.

Karen's Kozy Korner

FIT FOR LIFE



County Extension Agent Karen Babitzke recently completed training to conduct a "Fit for Life" course in Hansford County.

Only 25 of 250 County Extension home economists in Texas were selected to participate in the training session, which was held December 3-5 in Dallas.

Karen will be conducting the 12 week "Fit for Life" course in February, March and April on every Tuesday. February 4 will be the orientation meeting. They will be held at noon and 5:30 as two separate sessions for your convenience with limited spaces. The place is the Extension Homemakers Clubroom (309 N. Bernice). A charge of \$25.00 will need to be collected before the first meeting. This is to help curtail expenses of the program. To enroll in this nutrition and fitness program contact the County Extension office 659-2030 or 733-2901. State which time you prefer. Participants in the course will be a part of the 25 county pilot program and be contributing to an Extension Service research on nutrition and fitness, she says.

"The Fit for Life concept is simple," Karen says. "It means eating nutritious meals and snacks and engaging in moderate exercise. It's the only proven way to keep your weight under control," she adds.

Karen and the other home economists were trained by registered dietitians, fitness experts, and Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutrition and health specialists.

They were also taught how to modify eating habits and set up an individual exercise program.

"Unfortunately, many people try to lose weight on a crash diet without exercise," says the home economist. "That may work for a short time, but research shows that 95 percent of the people who lose weight this way gain it back within a year", she explains. Make plans to join in on this program.

Are you thinking about going on a diet? Before you spend your money for a particular diet book, class or plan, here are some questions to ask:

Is the effectiveness of the program well-documented or is it based on testimonials by "successful" clients.

Does the program make sensational claims that you can "eat all you want" or "lose ten pounds over night"? If so, what's the scientific evidence for these claims.

Is the program supervised by qualified personnel, such as a medical doctor or registered dietitian?

Does the program focus on diet alone, or does it also include behavior and lifestyle modification for permanent weight control? Does the staff have any expertise in these areas.

Are the diets nutritionally balanced to include foods from the major food groups of protein foods like meat, poultry, and fish; fruits and vegetables; dairy products; grains and cereals?

Does the program suggest unreasonably rapid weight loss over a short period of time?

Does the program require the purchase of special foods, devices, supplements, books or other extras and can the purchase be justified?

SESQUICENTENNIAL QUILTING BEE TO BE HELD FEBRUARY 21, 22, 23

Canyon, TX--The Texas 1986 Sesquicentennial Quilting Bee will be held February 21, 22, and 23 in Canyon at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. The Quilting Bee is co-sponsored by the Museum and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, according to Museum curator JoAnne Arasin.

The Quilting Bee is the final event in the 1985-1986 Panhandle-wide Sesquicentennial Quilting Project. Quilt block competitions have been held in the top 26 counties, with local quilters entering their own special quilt blocks designed to represent a specific characteristic of each quilter's own county.

The top blocks were chosen in each county by panels of judges. Entries were evaluated on overall appearance, workmanship, originality of design, adherence to theme, appropriateness of material, and use of color.

The first-place blocks will arrive in Canyon at the Museum on February 1, where on February 21, 22, and 23 they will become part of a queen-size Sesquicentennial Quilt. Each county will have a block, and the remaining four blocks will represent the Museum, the Extension Service, the Sesquicentennial, and the Panhandle.

"During the Quilting Bee, area quilters will come to the Museum to actually finish the quilt. We'll set up a quilting frame in the Museum's front hall, and the public can watch as the quilt actually takes shape," she said.

Anyone with quilting experience is eligible to participate in the quilting bee, Arasin said. Each quilter will be assigned a 20-minute session. Reservations must be made in advance, and each quilter may have only one 20-minute slot. The Quilting Bee will take place three days in February, she added. The days and times are: Friday, February 21, from 12 to 5 p.m.; Saturday, February 22, from 8 to 12 p.m.; and Sunday, February 23, from 2 to 6 p.m.

"We hope that quilters will join us from all of the top 26 counties of the Panhandle, because the Panhandle Quilt is the only Panhandle-wide activity celebrating the Sesquicentennial. All the names of the quilters will be entered in a special book to document the occasion for posterity. Also, the Panhandle's Quilting Bee is the only activity of its type this year in the entire state of Texas," Arasin noted.
