



He also was a member of the track team, competing in shot put and discus.

Invited to play in the 1981 Greenbelt Bowl at Childress, Ray was unable to participate and shortly afterwards his illness was diagnosed.

He attended Midwestern State University at Wichita Falls and Texas Tech University before his death, at age 20, on May 20, 1983.
