Fire Truck Fund Gets Boost

Captain Charles Littlejohn of the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department announced this week that the Texas Farm Bureau had donated \$225.00 to the fund for the purchase of a new fire truck for the department.

Also, Plains Restaurant,

announced that they would give 50¢ per steak sold during Fire Prevention Week, to the fund and Spearman Texaco owner, Mark Brand, said he would donate 1¢ per gallon of gas sold during the week to the fund.

Littlejohn stated that if enough funds are raised that probably a used fire truck from one of the larger cities could be purchased. A new truck which would meet the department needs would cost approximately \$48,000.

County Commissioners met in a special meeting Monday at the courthouse with REA officials in an attempt to negotiate removal of REA lines from the right-of-way of the new highway to be built South of Spearman.

Gina Hutchison Is State 4-H Winner



COLLEGE STATION-- Gina Lee Hutchison, a Hansford County 4-H member who has conducted an outstanding project program during her eight years in 4-H, has been named a state winner in the Santa Fe Achievement Awards Program.

Gina will receive an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 30-Dec. 4, announce state 4-H officials at Texas A&M University. The trip is sponsored by the Santa Fe Railway System, which provides a total of eight trips to the Congress along with four \$500 scholarships.

The 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dwight E. Hutchison of Route 2, Spearman, Gina is a senior at the local high school and is a member of the Future Finders 4-H Club.

During her 4-H career, Gina has completed 109 projects in such areas as junior leadership, foods and nutrition, clothing, home management, soil

conservation, poultry, food preservation, public speaking, home environment, money management, child care, electric, automotive and gardening.

As a junior leader for the past five years, she has assisted some 35 younger 4-H members in various project groups.

Gina was named the Hansford County Gold Star Girl in 1973 and won the Farm Bureau Award for being the Outstanding 4-H Girl in the county. She has won blue ribbons with her entries in county and district food shows for the past six years, winning first place in district competition in 1970 and 1971. She was named the District Bake Show Queen at the Tri State Fair in Amarillo in 1970 and received a \$100 U. S. Savings Bond.

Gina has also captured many top awards in 4-H dress revue competition. She has held all the offices of her local club and has served on the Hansford County 4-H Council.

236 County Youth In 4-H

4-H is as American as baseball or apple pie. This American educational program for youth had its beginning around the turn of the century. In fact, it followed on the heels of a Com Club organized in Jack County, Texas in 1908. And 4-H has flourished ever since.

During National 4-H Week which is October 5-11, 4-H members throughout Texas and the Nation will reflect on the proud heritage of the 4-H program and will look toward the future with anticipation, points out Joe Van Zandt, County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Theme of this year's observance is "4-H--'76... Spirit of Tomorrow."

The nation boasts a total of some 7.2 million 4-H youth between the ages of 9 and 19. More than 215,000 of these are Texans. Youth enrolled in the 4-H program in Hansford County total 236, notes Joe Van Zandt.

The 4-H program continues to grow throughout the state and nation. National enrollment last year increased almost 37 percent over 1973.

And more and more 4-Hers are coming from urban areas, points out Van Zandt. In Texas about 24 percent of the 4-H youth now come from larger urban and suburban areas. However, well over half the Texas 4-Hers live on farms and ranches or in towns of under 10,000 population.

Adult volunteer leaders are a valuable asset to 4-H as they give freely of their time and talents in assisting in the educational efforts of the 4-H program. There are about a half million 4-H volunteer leaders across the country and more than 21,000 of these are in Texas.

Hansford County is proud to have the leadership of 40 volunteers who contribute much to the overall success of 4-H.

The 4-H program also receives widespread financial support from various businesses, corporation and foundations all over the nation. In

RICE PUDDING - Heat 2 c. water to boiling. Add 1/2 c. uncooked rice, 1/2 t. salt; 1/2 c. raisins and 1 T. oleo. Lower to simmer and cook for 30 minutes. Mix 2 c. instant non-fat dry milk and 1/2 c. sugar. Stir into 1 c. warm water until mixed. Add 1 t. vanilla. Stir into rice. Stir over low heat until heated through. Cool to thicken. Makes 6 servings.

RAISIN SQUARES - Cream together well 3/4 c. shortening and 1 c. brown sugar. Add 1/2 t. vanilla, 1 t. soda; 1/2 t. salt; 1 c. flour and 1 3/4 c. oatmeal. Mix until crumbly. Put 1/2 mixture in 9x13 greased

pan. Mix together 1 c. raisins, 1/2 lemon (juice and grated rind), 1/2 t. cinnamon, 1/8 c. flour; 1 c. chopped nuts and 1 c. water. Cook until thickened. Spread over crust then crumble remaining crust on top. Bake at 350 F. for 20-30 minutes. Makes 36 bars. Have you ever wondered about the secret to happiness? FEDERAL TRACTOR LAW -- Tractor Roll-Over Protective Structures (ROPS) - Farmers with employees that operate tractors are now required to train these employees on the safe operation of tractors, especially regarding the prevention of rollovers. This training shall be provided at the time of initial assignment and at least annually thereafter.

The required training became effective June 1 and is part of OSHA, which requires all tractors to be manufactured with ROPS and seat belts avert Oct. 25, 1976.

The required tractor safety training includes the following operating instructions:

1. Securely fasten the seat belt if the tractor has a ROPS.
 2. Where possible, avoid operating the tractor near ditches, embankments and holes.
 3. Reduce speed when turning, crossing slopes, and on rough, slick or muddy surfaces.
 4. Stay off slopes too steep for safe operation.
 5. Watch the direction, especially at row ends, on roads and around trees.
 6. Do not permit others to ride.
 7. Operate the tractor smoothly--no jerky turns, starts or stops.
 8. Hitch only to the drawbar and hitch points recommended by the tractor manufacturer.
 9. When the tractor is stopped, set the brakes securely and use the park lock if available.
- Operators of tractors equipped with ROPS are required to wear seat belts to keep them inside the protective structure in case of a turnover. Operators of tractors without ROPS should not wear seat belts.

A concession stand will be available at the show and the proceeds from this will go to Happy Homes Home Demonstration Club.

The clinic and the show are free of charge and should not only be educational but a whole lot of fun.

Final Passage of Beef Research Act Announced

WASHINGTON, D. C. Congressman Jack Hightower today announced final passage of the Beef Research and Information Act by the House of Representatives.

The bill, H. R. 7656, passed by a margin of 40 votes, 229 to 189.

"I am delighted with this action by the House," the Congressman said. "In approving the bill by such a substantial margin the House has firmly endorsed and commended the beef industry's desire and intent to 'help itself.'"

Hightower said the bill will enable cattlemen to conduct a referendum on whether a two-thirds majority favors a uniform collection to establish a fund for research, consumer and producer information and market development. The program is voluntary, allowing any producer to get his assessment refunded upon request.

The Congressman said there had been intense lobbying against the bill by organized consumer groups, prompting the House leadership to postpone final consideration three times.

Representative Fred Richmond, Democrat of Brooklyn, N. Y., offered an amendment that would have mandated that 50 percent of the 68 member beef board must be made up of consumers. His amendment was resoundingly defeated by voice vote.

"Beef industry leaders believe the program must have extensive input from consumers," Hightower said, "but they believe, and the House concurred, that those who finance the program should control it."

The Congressman said the program will cost the government nothing. The U. S. Department of Agriculture will conduct

the referendum. As originally proposed producers would reimburse the department for all administrative expenses if the referendum passed.

An amendment was approved by the House that provides for the posting of surety bonds prior to the referendum sufficient to pay the costs of the referendum, should the referendum fail.

"In passing this bill today," Hightower said, "we took a positive step toward enacting legislation that will be of benefit to all Americans, at no cost to the taxpayers. It is seldom that we are given such an opportunity."

"I was pleased to be a co-sponsor of the bill."

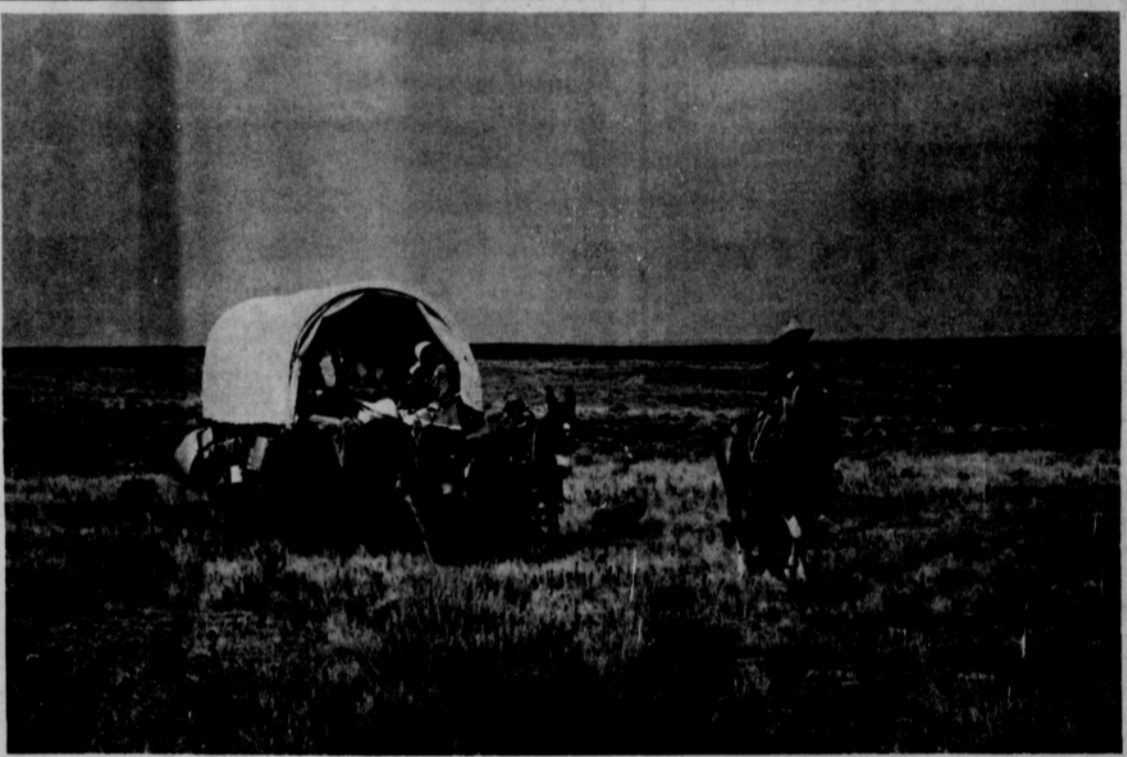
