In special Dallas meeting . . .

PDRA to frame project

Directors of the Palo Duro River Authority, representing Moore and Hansford counties, made a beginning step toward construction of a municipal water reservoir Tuesday at a special meeting Dallas with engineers, financial advisors and bond attorneys.

The meeting in Dallas began at 8:30 a.m. in the Diamond Shamrock Towers.

"The special meeting was called by the board last Tuesday to be ready to move on the construction project once the Texas Water Development Commission gets its financing in order," explains Johnnie Lee of Spearman, PDRA general manager.

Directors who attended the Tuesday meeting were: Orval Allen, Jerry Thompson and Dr. Arthur Davidson, all of Moore county, and Robert Novak and Kenneth Evans, both of Spearman.

"There was a quorum present to meet with representatives from the Freese and Nichols engineering firm, bond attorney Pete Tart of Dallas and financial advisor Bob Davis of Austin," the PDRA manager reports.

Lee notes that the board decided earlier this year to go ahead with the project since the state water development commission

was willing to "loan" the river authority half the estimated cost for construction of the dam.

Estimated cost of the dam and recreation facilities around the lake has been placed at \$24 million, a 1984 estimate by the Fort Worth firm.

It will be located in northwestern Hansford county at the junctions of the Palo Duro and Horse creeks. The 4,900-foot long earthen dam will impound a lake with a storage capacity of 60,900 acre feet of water.

"We've talked about this project and decided to go ahead with it," Lee says. "Now the board needs to meet with these people and decide on the finances which will be required."

In other developments, the PDRA has received a 5-year extension of its permit to impound water flowing down the Palo Duro Creek in Moore and Hansford counties.

The Palo Duro has its beginning in western Moore county. Two branches of the creek—one north of Dumas and the other through Cactus—flow water through Moore county to the north and east.

The 5-year extension was issued recently by the Texas Water Development Commission, acting on an application by the Palo Duro authority, reports Johnnie Lee of Spearman, PDRA manager.

The extension will be good to Jan. 1, 1992.

Water from the reservoir is earmarked to supply the cities of Dumas, Cactus, Sunray, Gruver, Spearman and Stinnett.

The project suffered a setback recently, however, when the Texas Water Development Commission postponed a May 15 hearing on water plan funds.

The hitch is the tax reform package pending in the U.S. Congress.

"We want to make sure that municipal bonds remain tax-exempt."

Through the Texas Water Plan, the state commission will purchase storage in the lake which will finance approximately half the dam construction cost. The remainder will come from a revenue bond issue voted by residents in Moore and Hansford counties and the City of Stinnett.

Lee notes that reports from the engineering firm are projecting lower construction costs. He adds that bond advisors are forecasting interest rates in the 6-7 percent range.

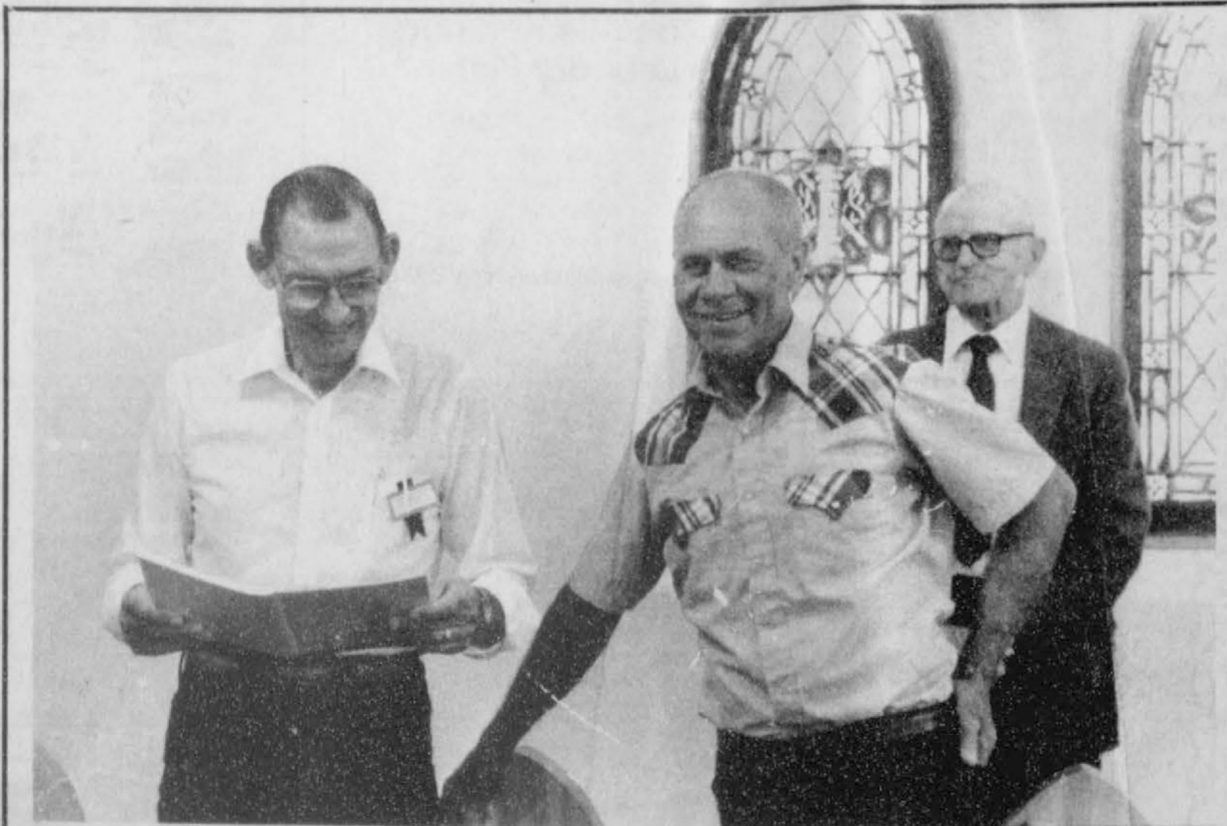

Around two-hundred and fifty visitors were met at the door by Ingeborg Sogn in her Norwegian Bunad. (Folk Costume). There were visitors from Colorado, California, Ohio, Kansas, and in Texas—Houston, Waco, Clifton, Rockwall and Vernon; and a great number from the Panhandles of Oklahoma and Texas.

Jon Olsen, wearing his Bunad, rang the church bell to begin the festivities. Several of the visitors got to ring the bell.

In the sanctuary, Amelia Johnson greeted many area organists and arranged for each of them to

play the Pipe Organ. We all enjoyed the 'concert'.

The large display in the Parish Hall was poured over by the visitors and members alike. There were many items that came from Norway, Denmark, Sweden and Holland which included an old spinning wheel from Norway. Some of the early Oslo items were lefse rolling pins, sad irons, and old books. Then there were several fine old quilts and a coverlet that was made from homegrown cotton and wool in Tennessee. The cotton and wool were carded, spun, dyed and woven into a beautiful coverlet that is around one hundred years old. There was also on exhibit many recently made things such as a large doll house, embroidery, tatting, crocheting, rosemaking, painting and portraiture.

The refreshment table was laden with Scandinavian delicacies such as: Krumkaka, Sandbakkels, Fattigmand, Lefse, Lebkuchen, Gjetost (a Norwegian cheese) and the following yeast breads—Swedish Rye, Saffron, Julekage and Finnish Cardamom. Mary Olsen gave a demonstration on making lefse and needless to say, it was all eaten! Joyce Johnson was to demonstrate making Rosettes, but things didn't pan out, but the Rosette irons were on exhibit.

Melyn Johnson led the children in outdoor games and contests. They reported all had lots of fun.

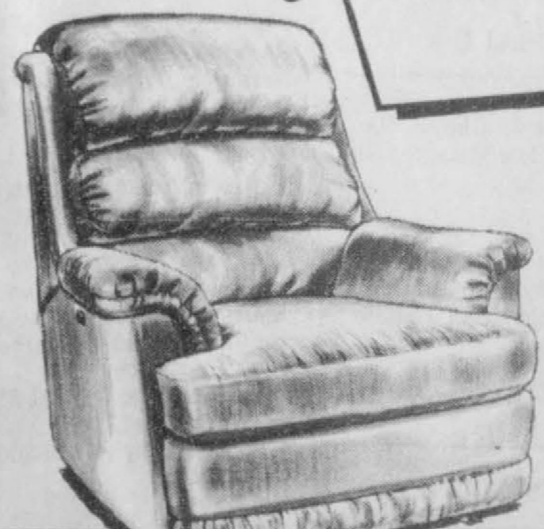

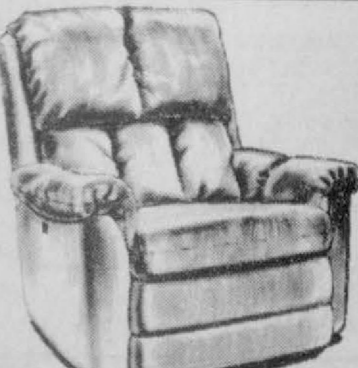

Polls show that most families, regardless of income, worry to some extent about finances. But healthy families seem to be able to deal with it better - mostly because they have some money management skills.

In her book *Stress and the Healthy Family*, researcher DeLores Curran says that her studies of stress-effective families shows they use four common money management techniques.

First, they learn to control money stresses together. In two-paycheck families they may pay different bills out of each check, and in other families there may be separate accounts for household expenses and discretionary money. But in general, money is not considered to belong to one partner or the other, but is theirs as a family.

Second, these families budget, although how tightly they budget varies widely. The families tend to plan for fixed monthly costs like a home, car and medical and insurance payments and then divide the rest into savings, food clothing, recreation and miscellaneous.

Setting aside some savings for emergencies is an especially important feature of the budget, because it means that the family doesn't fall apart when something out of the ordinary happens.

Curran also found that when money gets tight, healthy families tend to scale down more effective-

ly than others. They do this by revising their expectations. So, for example, the family that has taken an expensive vacation each summer may settle for a nearby weekend camping trip when finances are reduced.

Other families who refuse to lower their expectations often depend more on credit, which can add to their financial stress in the long run.

Fourth, stress-effective families develop methods for making major purchases without the need for painful arguments. Couples tend to respect each other's daily decisions on spending unless there's an unusual reason such as high monthly bills or loss of a job.

But for major purchases, such as a new car, furniture or trips, these couples share their own feelings, fears and attitudes and take into consideration the different attitudes of their partner. This makes it possible for them to strike a compromise.

The skills of sharing, budgeting, revising expectations and compromising may not seem like much, but evidently they add up to a family that can handle finances without it becoming a major problem in their lives.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural extension service serve people of all ages, regardless of social economic level, race, color, sex, Religion, handicapp or national origin.

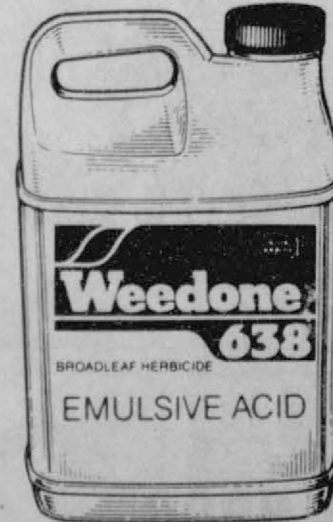





Asthma is Serious

Children with asthma often must assume responsibility for their health to keep from developing severe illness, a Baylor College of Medicine asthma specialist said.

"Some asthmatic children resent their parents and doctors for telling them what to do," said William T. Shearer, M.D., Ph.D., professor of pediatric allergy and immunology at Baylor. "They fight back by not taking their medicine, because they think it shows they are in control."

But this way of being in control can lead to life-threatening attacks of asthma, Shearer said.

He urges parents and physicians to work as a team to control the disease. When the asthmatic child approaches adolescence, he should be taught to manage his disease, which means taking medications regularly and knowing and avoiding the causes of the asthma, Shearer said.

There are nine to ten million asthmatics in the United States, and thirty percent of them are children under age 15. Asthma is often related to allergies and is more common in males.

Asthma is caused when the small air passages in the lungs become narrow because of an allergy or irritants such as smoke and air pollution. Breathing becomes difficult because air collected in the lungs cannot be blown out. The first symptoms of an asthma attack are coughing, a tightness in the chest and tiredness. The disease is best treated

when medicines are taken regularly because certain drug levels must be in the blood constantly.

"In some children, asthma can be a psychosomatic illness," Shearer said. "While the physical symptoms are real, there is a strong relationship between emotional upset and the onset of an asthma attack."

All children with asthma know about this relationship, he said, "but there is a particular group of children who control their parents by intentionally upsetting themselves and having an asthma attack."

To avoid this situation, physicians and parents must work together to treat the disease by communicating well, Shearer said. The physician should be willing to educate the parents about asthma and to receive late night phone calls. The parents must know the signs of an asthma attack and know when and how much medication to give the child. If the asthma is a result of an allergy, the cause--whether it be a pet or cigarette smoke--must be removed from the home.

The parents' responsibilities should shift to the child before he reaches adolescence, Shearer said, because many of the psychological problems related to asthma develop in teenagers.

"Adolescence is the time when children start fighting for independence," he said. "Giving them responsibility for managing their asthma will help them gain that independence."

Assembly of components is nearing completion, and testing will begin soon on General Telephone's new advanced technology digital switching system at Spearman, according to Robert J. Meyers, Operations Manager.

The conversion from a mechanical step-by-step switch system to a computerized system will bring the latest in telephone technology to Spearman customers in November of this year.

Meyers said, "the difference between step-by-step switching and digital switching is like the difference between airplanes and spaceships."

The digital switching system

takes the company into the "space age" of telephone switching. It's one of the best digital switches on the market."

"The Spearman office processes hundreds of call each day. The new digital switch is able to handle these calls faster and more efficiently. It is also less expensive to maintain than the step-by-step switch and is self-diagnostic (finds its own malfunctions)" he continued.

"Conversion to this switch is necessary because within the near future, industry changes, such as equal access will require the new technology", stated Meyers.

With the new switch, custom

calling features will be made available to customers in Spearman. These features include call forwarding, call waiting, speed calling and three-way calling.

Extensive outside plant cable work is also underway in Spearman said Meyers. The new digital switch is very sensitive to the quality of outside cable facilities, which generated upgrading and additions in and around the city. GTE technicians will place about 93 miles, (over 500,00 feet) of new cable, much of which will be buried along the right-of-way in the rural areas south of Spearman.

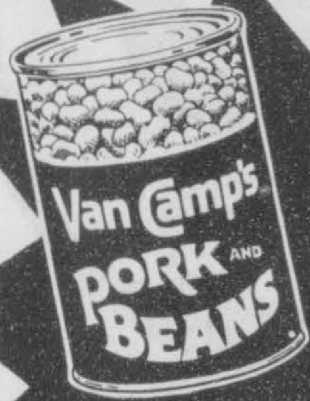

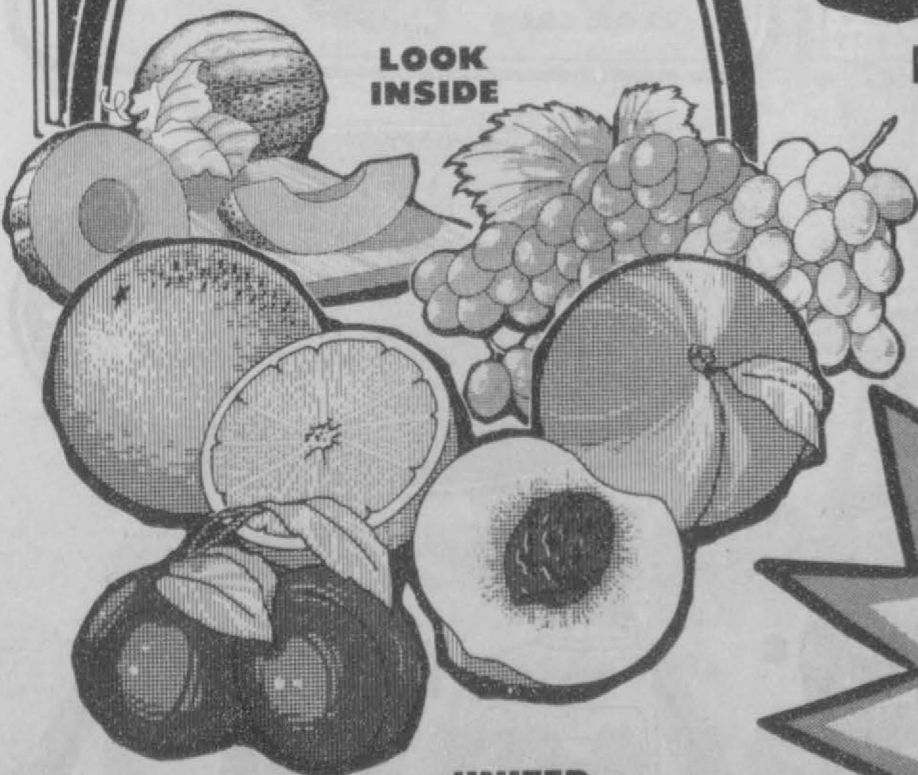

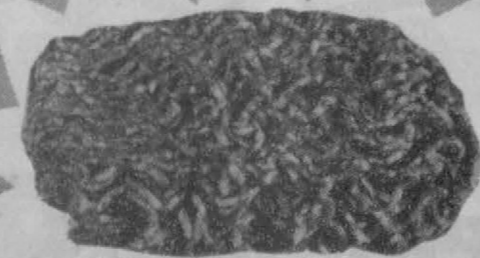
