



## Ol Doc's Comments

As the end of the school year arrives, many horse owners will once again hit the trail. It may be rodeos, playdays, horse shows, endurance contests, gathering cattle, trail rides or just riding around your own neighborhood. It is not uncommon for many horses to be idle through the winter while school is in session, and those same horses be very active through the summer months.

If your horse will soon be doubling his workload, you should do your best so that your horse can do his best.


Things to consider are nutrition, current vaccinations, deworming, care while trailering, and care before and after heavy exercise.

Nurtitional requirements of a horse under heavy use can be almost twice that of a non-active equine. Roughage, which is clean and of high quality, should be fed daily. A roughage such as coastal hay can stimulate intestinal motility and aid in the prevention of some forms of colic. Protein and calorie levels in the concentrate fed may vary. Therefore, adjustments in concentration percent and amount fed should be made routinely to achieve the desired result. Slowly adjusting the amount of concentrate fed in proportion to the amount of exercise your horse gets can be one way of maintaining proper weight and

An important part of any equine diet is water. Most people don't enjoy drinking stagnant or dirty water and neither does your horse. Routine cleaning of water troughs can aid in proper nutrition and prevention in the spread

disease. Vitamin and mineral additives can be of benefit when used properly. Your veterinarian should be able to recommend a basic nutritional program for your horse during both active and inactive months.

Proper mastication or chewing of food greatly helps your horse to receive maximum nutritional benefit from the ration fed. Dental care, such as floating mine eyes shall behold and not another. the teeth, may be needed to insure

proper grinding of food by your horse. Before traveling to events where strange horses are in contact with each other, annual vaccinations should be given. Depending on where you live, your veterilnarian may vary his recommendation for inocluations. A basic program may include VEWT, Influenza, and Rabies vaccinations. VEWT (Venezuelan, Eastern and Western Encephalomyelitis plus Tetanus Toxoid) is commonly referred to as a sleeping sickness and tetanus combination shot. The Influenza vaccine helps to protect against one of the respiratory diseases that horses might contract when exposed to those with the disease. Rabies is a deadly viral disease which can infect any warm blooded mammal including horses and man.

While visiting your veterinarian, you may also want to request a health certificate and a Coggins test. A Coggins test detects EIA (Equine Infectious Anemia) which is a disease spread by biting flies. Many equine event committees will require your horse to have a negative Coggins test as well as a current health paper to be eligible to participate in their equine

Parasite control requirements will vary with stable or pasture conditions. In general, the more concentrated the

horse population or the smaller the area where a horse is kept will result in a more frequent need for deworming. An annual plan with set scheduled dates to deworm should be put in writing and marked on your calendar. Your veterinarian can help you assess both the need of frequency for deworming and which particular anthelmintic drugs to use at different times of the year.

When moving a horse by trailer a little forethought and planning can make the trip much more enjoyable for both your horse and you. First, if your horse is inexperienced in loading into a trailer, you should practice loading and unloading at home. Several days of such practice might prevent delays and possible injury to an inexperienced animal on the day you have an activity to haul your horse to.

Leg wraps can help prevent damage to the lower extrmities of your horse. Rubber hoof covers might be considered for both hauling in a trailer and riding on hard surfaces such as asphault pavement during a parade.

Stopping every three to four hours on long trips to unload your horse and let him stretch out will make the trip easier for your equine.

If you park the trailer when the horse will remain inside, such as at a restaurant during lunch, try your best to leave the trailer in the shade. Also, remember to allow proper air ventilat-

ion by opening windows and air vents. When your trailer is in motion, please drive carefully and smoothly. Avoid quick stops and starts. Slow down for sharp curves and turns.

When heavy exercise is planned, a slow warm up period before and a slow cool down period after is advised. A warm up can prevent pulled muscles and will usually aid your horse to do better in a strenuous event. A cool down period will aid in the prevention of laminitis (founder), muscle soreness and some respiratory diseases.

Finally, I wish to say that a little "horse sense" and planning ahead can make your horse activities more enjoyable for both you and your horse. Gary Lackey, DVM



A New Look For The Statue of Liberty

Ninety-six Rotary clubs in the U.S. have contributed a total of \$30,844.00 to a nationwide effort to raise funds for the restoration of the Statue of Liberty, one of the country's greatest national monuments. ## Spider



Brown Recluse (Fiddleback) Spider

Gay Lyn Kile found out the hard way just how painful the bite of a brown recluse spider can be.

She woke up Tuesday, May 6 with a sore leg, but didn't think much about it. She went on to work, but during the day the leg began to hurt even more. After a visit to her doctor, he said it looked like a blood vessel had broken. Later that evening, the pain became so tremendous, that she returned to the doctor the next morning.

He determined it was some kind of insect bite and gave her antibotics and painkillers, but by Friday her calf had turned brown, purple, and black with a ring around it. Her doctor then sent her to Dr. Steve Urban in Amarillo for treat-

By a lucky coincidence, a doctor from Vanderbilt University had spoken in Amarillo on the subject of brown recluse spider bites last year, and Urban, who had helped sponsor the talk, recognized the signs immediately. Gay was given a new medicine, Dapsone, which has been effective in treating the bites, along with a painkiller, and sent home.

By the next Friday she had begun vemiting and experiencing unbearable pain. After calling Dr. Urban, her husband took her to Amarillo, where she was admitted to High Plains Baptist Hospital. On Saturday, a team of doctors decided they needed to do surgery to remove the dead skin, which was a result of the bite. The damage

skin, and went clear to the muscle. After the layers of skin and fatty tissue were removed, the surgeons grafted a piece of her skin from her thigh into the wound. Gay spent 11 days in the Amarillo hospital before finally returning home.

penetrated all three layers of her

But her ordeal is far from over. The spider's toxin also made her anemic, and did some damage to her liver. She is also taking therapy on her leg, and is now walking with the aid of a walker. She can only tolerate doing the therapy for a short time right now, but hopes she will be walking without the walker by the end of next week.

She believes the spider bit her in

bed during the night.

Gay is one of the estimated 50-100 Texans seriously bitten by brown recluse spiders each year. Another 500-1,000 non-serious bites are also estimated. A rather unassuming creature, as compared with a tarantula, the brown recluse nonetheless has venom more potent than a cobra or other snake venoms. Fortunately, it can only inject a small amount.

Distinguished by the violinshaped spot on his back, the spider is usually found under stones or in tree trunks outside, and indoors can be found in undisturbed closets, drawers, and under furniture, sometimes in bedding. They can

live a long time without food or water, and have probably been carried from its native home in the south central United States to other parts of the country in shipping crates and boxes.

The venom from the spider destroys blood vessel walls and local tissue surrounding the bite, literally killing the skin. The bite is exceedingly venomous, and affects both the nervous system and the blood stream.

Symptoms appear within 6-8 hours after the bite, with inflamations and tenderness at the site of the bite. After 12-24 hours, the victim experiences high fever, chills, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. Thirty-six hours after being bitten, the victim may have a measle-like rash, and after two days, the skin around the bite turns tions and a broken kneecap. I white, and the death of the skin

even narcotics may not give relief. Bites are rare, however, and usually occur when the spider is trapped in sheets or blankets, or cornered in some way.

Dr. Claude Betty, new county health officer, said his clinic sees about four or five people a year who are bitten by brown recluse spiders. There are all degrees of severity, he said, although to his knowledge no one else locally has had the severe problems Gay had.

About the only first aid for such a bite, Betty said, is to apply an ice pack. Usually the person doesn't know when it happens, he said, and it's not until a few hours later when the symptoms are noticeable. Treatments for the bites include antibiotics, either orally, or by shots and topical ointments.

Dr. John Phillips, who initially treated Gay, said he has seen four persons in the six years he has been here that he is sure were bitten by brown recluses. The severity of the reaction to the venom, he said, depends on the person's own immune system, where they are bitten, and how much venom was in-

Phillips added that he sees many more rattlesnake bites between five and eight, a year, than he does brown recluse bites. He also doesn't feel the brown recluses are in epidemic proportions in the area. "You have to hunt far and wide for them," he said.

Gay is at home now, and probably won't return to her job as a teller at First National Bank until July. She is also having her house sprayed again.

In a rather bizarre coincidence, Gay's mother, Wilma Gipson, was visiting in Florida, and flew home immediately upon learning Gay was going to have surgery. Gay's father, Frank, was in Perryton helping take care of her. Sitting next to her on the flight from Dallas to Amarillo, a young man was in the assigned seat next to her. He said he was flying to Amarillo because his sister had just been bitten by a brown recluse spider, and was in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Mrs. Gipson kept in touch with the young man while he was in Amarillo.

"I'll be glad when a few more weeks pass and it's over," Gay said. "I've had two cesarean secthought that was painful, but not compared to this."


