Bowen opens new business



From behind the wheel, Larry Bowen lifted a hand and waved to the crowd lining the parade route. He was driving an Ariens 19-horse tractor, pulling a trailer with walkbehind mower, a rear tine tiller, a front tine tiller and his own specialty

The vehicle immediately behind his as the parade moved down Mein Street was an 8-horse riding mower driven by his wife Kathy.

It was the Bowens' way of boosting their community by participating in the Hansford Roundup Parade and at the same time promoting Larry's business. Bowen is owner of Complete Small Engine Repair Service, and the local authorized dealer for Ariens lawn and garden equipment.

It was back on Saturday, May 28, that the Bowens rode in the parade, and reflecting back, Larry admits participating in the Hansford Roundup was "a lot of fun."

He said he wild like to do such things a lot more often but he simply

does not have the time. Right now he and employee Hilous Hargrove are doing a brisk business in small engine repairs.

Bowen officially keeps his shop open from 5 to 8 p.m., but he and Hargrove have been logging a lot of extra work hours because of the growing demand for their services.

"We work on all types of two and four-cycle engines including repairs, tune-ups and overhauls," he said.

In addition, Complete Small Engine Repair Service carries a large supply of parts for two and four-cycle engines, "and we can get replacement engines on request," he added.

Bowen said, "Our customers find we are very competitive with our prices--very competitive."

Besides being the authorized dealer for Ariens lawn and garden equipment, Bowen can also "get any commercial lawn and garden equipment customers want in within two to three days of the time it is ordered." he said.

A graduate of Belsaw Institute of Small Engine Repairs, Kansas City, Mo., Bowen is certified in small engine repairs and in advanced small engine repairs. He has lived in Spearman most of his life, attended all 12 years of public school here, and was graduated from Spearman High School. He and his wife, the former Kathy Dowdy, have two children, Lorrie, 4, and Rodney, 1.

"It's a challenge--and my goal--to make Spearman TG&Y a better store than it has been in the past."

That's the comment of Jay Johnson, new manager of the TG&Y store in Plains Shopping Center.

A veteran of five years service with TG&Y, Johnson took over the management of the store here on June 1, coming here from Guymon, Okla. where he had served as co-manager for the company.

Born and reared in Borger and a graduate of Borger High School. Johnson began his career with TG&Y in the Borger store. In his four-year stint in the Borger store, he worked his way up from stock clerk to assistant manager before moving on to Guymon.

Johnson said the people he has met here have been very friendly and he is finding he likes Spearman very much.

Hansford County and the TG&Y here are not entirely new experiences for Johnson. While he was still working for the Borger store, "I came over here and helped them do a relay (one of the periodic rearrangements of the floor plan and merchandise displays). I met a lot of fine Hansford County people then, and many of the employees I met then are still here and know me," he related.

"It's the customers who make the money, the customers who bring it to us, and it's the customers we want to please.

"This Spearman store has quite a potential to be a good business for the community."

Johnson said he comes from a "customer service" background. For many years my family owned and operated the Johnson's Bakery in Borger. "My grandfather owned it and it became a real family enterprise with the whole family involved in its operation," he said, although his parents now both work for Phillips Petroleum.

"My brother owns Casino de Madiera Restaurant in Borger, so you could say he's in the food service end of customer service," Johnson said.

Johnson is married to the former Donna Thomas, also a graduate of Borger High School. They have moved to Spearman and now reside at 301½ S. Archer.

Apostolic Faith Church Revival




REV. HOWARD WHITELEY

New manager at Consumers Sales Co.

It's a long ways from coaching along the sideline of the Minneapolis, Kansas football field to managing a Co-op sales firm in Spearman, Texas.

That's the "route" taken by Gene Harris, who taught and served as head football and wrestling coach for three years in the rural Kansas community before moving here to take over as manager of Consumer Sales Company on May 16.

Yet Harris is not exactly a stranger to Co-op work, and is having no problem adjusting from gridiron coach to Consumer's manager. Back in his home town of Wahoo, Nebraska, Harris said he "grew up in a co-op," where his father has served as general manager since 1963.

Gene worked seven years in the Wahoo co-op himself, but this is his first stint at managing. Harris attended Wahoo schools and was graduated from Wahoo High School, where he starred in football.

He went on to play football four years at Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln. Harris was graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan with a bachelor's in physical education, but worked another year with Wahoo co-op before going into coaching and teaching five years ago.

Leaving the teaching and coaching profession for the manager's post here was not a spur of the moment thing, or snap decision. Harris said he enjoys coaching, but he also enjoys co-op work.

With his background in co-op before he ever entered college, Harris "pre-determined" before enrolling at Nebraska Wesleyan that he would coach for five years, then reassess his situation and decide which of the two "routes's to take. When his five years were up he did, and his decision led him to Spearman.

"I could not see any opportunity for advancement in the teaching field unless I pursued the administration degree, and I had no desire at this point to be an administrator in a school system," he said. "I had several chances to quit teaching and go into co-op work, but they were not opportunities like this.

"There is real opportunity hereand a real challenge-and I'm interested in that.

Harris, his wife Kerri, and their children Eugene III, 3, and Cortny, 11 months, have moved here and he commented, "I think we are really going to enjoy living here. The people we've met have been real friendly."







National farm groups resist target prize freeze

Grain Sorghum Producers Association has expressed opposition to a proposed freeze of 1984-85 target prices. The Agricultural Act of 1981 set annual increases for

target prices to offset the increases in the cost of production. Secretary of Agriculture John Block has asked Congress to freeze targets at the 1983 level.

Grain sorghum targets for 1983 are \$4.85 per hundred-weight and, as currently set in the law, will be \$5.14 in 1984 and \$5.40 in 1985. Corn will increase from \$5.11 cwt. in 1983 to \$5.14 in '84 and \$5.68 in '85 if the current law is allowed to stand.

In letters to members of the Senate and House Agriculture Committees and other members of Congress, GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp pointed out that the 1984 grain sorghum target prices, as they now stand, are still 22% below the national average cost of production. Target prices are

the only real price protection farmers have under the present program. Secretary Block has stated that the target prices are too high and will encourage overproduction and increase government cost.





The tri-state area's top high school rodeo cowboys have their sights set on Hadley Reed this week as the Tri-State High School Rodeo Association (TSHSRA) unwinds in Amarillo.

That's because all those hoping to win this year's TSHSRA All-Around Cowboy honors know Reed of Spearman is the one they'll have to beat. Reed, who will be a senior next school year at Spearman High School, is this year's all-around point leader going into the finals which open Thursday and run through Saturday at Fair Park Coliseum in Tri-State Fairgrounds.

To date, the versatile Reed has amassed 159 points in the various rodeo events. His closest competition, going into the finals comes from Danny Johnson of Canadian with 1291/2 points.

Hadley leads the bareback bronc riding standings with 74 points and calf roping with 43.2. He is in a three-way tie for 13th place in ribbon roping with 9 points and is tied for sixth in the team roping stats with 33

His lofty berth in the finals is no fluke, veteran rodeo observers say. Reed was reared on a farm and has been rodeoing since he was six years old. His father, A.D. Reed, is an old rodeo'er. A.D. used to rope and ride bulls.

Suzanne Hart, who was recently graduated from Gruver High School, heads up a strong trio of entries in the girls' competition. She is currently number two in the barrel racing standings with 42 points, sixth in breakaway roping with 16 points, and seventh in pole bending with 9 points.





Tanning Pills --

An inside dye job Even here in sunny Texas, some people will go to unbelievable lengths to get a tan. The latest fad for those in pursuit of the "bronzed look," is a tanning pill.

The tanning pill was first developed in Europe, spread to Canada, and can now be found in this country. While the pills are not illegal, the Food and Drug Administration is warning consumers to avoid using them until appropriate well-conducted studies can be done.

The pills contain two food colors which are chemical replicas of substances that occur naturally in some plants such as carrots, peaches and melons. After a week or two of taking the pills, the dye accumulates in the skin, giving

the appearance of a tan. But there are problems with the "tan." First, it doesn't look quite right. It has a distinct orange tinge that shows especially on the palms and soles of the feet. Second, this "tan" is no protection against sunburn.

More importantly, tanning pills have not been tested for safety. They contain synthetic versions of natural coloring substances beta-carotene and canthaxanthin. Although these additives go into many processed foods, tanning tablets contain 20 to 30 times what would be found in a normal

Some complaints of sideeffects from tanning pills including nausea, diarrhea, stomach cramps, itching and skin welts, have been report-
