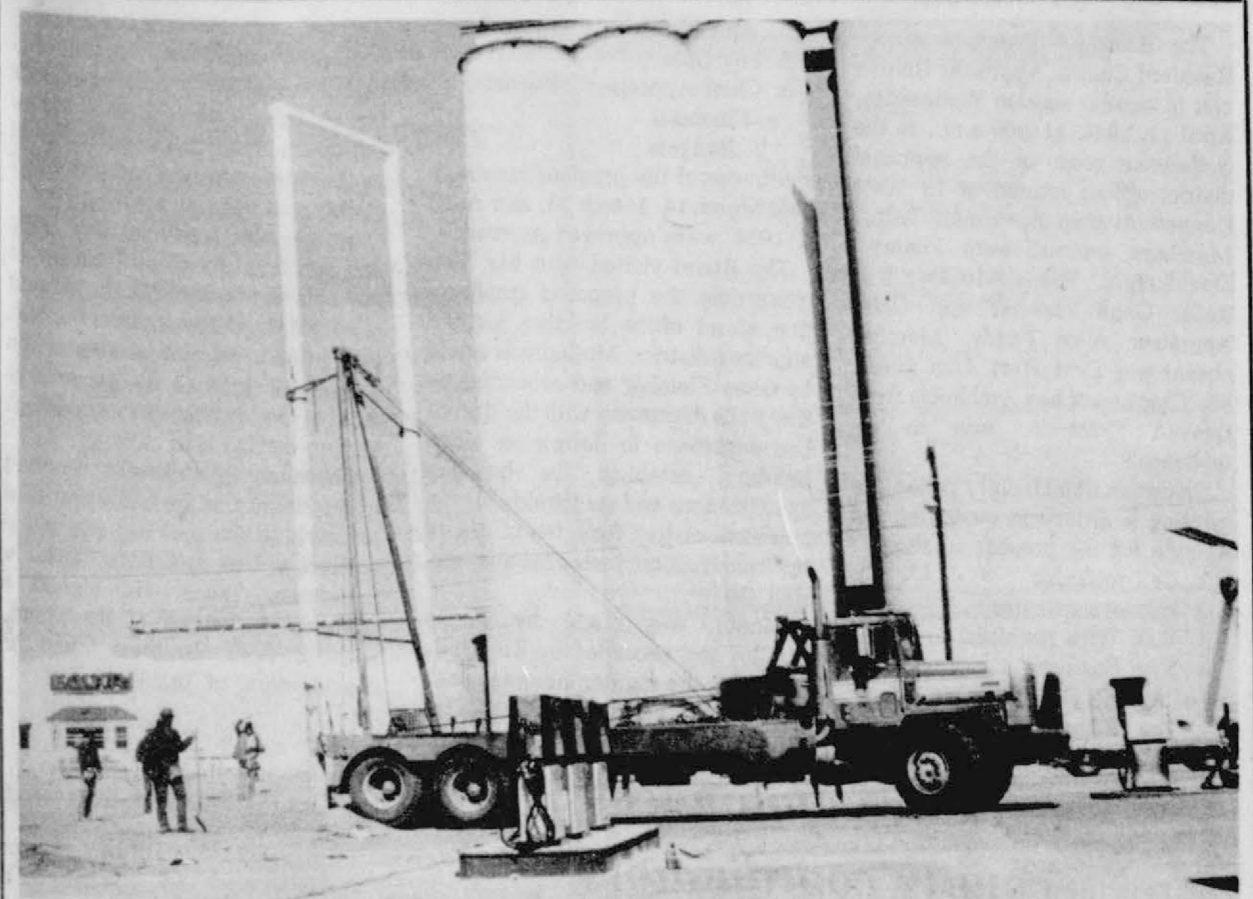




The 28,000 pound vault door was moved from the old First State Bank building to their new home this week. Workers above right, prepare to make way for the large door.

New physician for Gruver Clinic hired

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District was held on April 12, 1984 in the hospital board room.

Two new board members, Jerry Hunt and Dwight Hutchison were administered the oath of office.

Jack Oakes was elected president, Alton Ellsworth, Vice-president, Leslie Barkley, secretary-treasurer.

The monthly financial statement was presented and the board approved bills for payment.

The board discussed Hansford County Appraisal Districts request for use of refunds for a proposed new building. A motion was made by Leslie Barkley and seconded by John Trindle that the District be allowed to use the refund that would be due Hansford County Hospital District, as a down payment on a

proposed building that the appraisal district is considering building. This amount is to be applied as part of the down payment. John Trindle made a motion that the Hansford County Appraisal District be informed of the Hospital District's decision. The hospital district feels that they would like to go ahead and have the building paid off in a lump sum as their part goes in the amount of \$7,183.00 per the material submitted to them. They also asked the appraisal district to consider a permanent building of a solid structure and not a tin building. The motion was passed by all board members present.

A contract with Dr. Juan Viola to be the physician at the clinic in Gruver was considered and approved.

The Medical Staff's appointments were approved.

The staff voted to accept Dr. Viola, general practitioner to the Medical Staff of Hansford County Hospital District with all privileges set forth by the Medical Staff Bylaws. The Medical Staff also asked for Dr. Edward Quiro's application to Courtesy Staff for one year. Both resolutions were accepted.

Ray Wasil, Hansford Manor Administrator, gave the Manor report. Present for the meeting were Jack Oakes, Alton Ellsworth, Leslie Barkley, Jerry Hunt, John Trindle, Dwight Hutchison, board members and administrators, Albert LaRochelle, Ray Wasil, Randy Abernathy and Gary McGee, and Dr. David McClellan, chief of the medical staff.

Absentee balloting underway

Absentee balloting for the primary elections in Hansford County began Monday morning and continues through May 1, four days before the May 5 primaries.

Hansford County residents may vote absentee on weekdays at Hansford County Clerk's office in the courthouse.

Those eligible to vote absentee are registered voters who expect to be out of the county on May 5, and those who are 65 or older.

Board hires architect

The Board of Directors of the Hansford County Appraisal District met in regular session Wednesday, April 11, 1984, at 9:00 a.m., in the conference room of the appraisal district offices located at 13 West Kenneth Avenue, Spearman, Texas. Members present were Jimmy Shieldknight, Thane McCloy, Roy Bulls, Gene Fletcher and Chief Appraiser Alice Peddy. Member absent was Lynn Hart. One guest, Mr. Chic Lee of Lee Architects from Denver, Colorado, was in attendance.

Chairman Shieldknight called the meeting to order and presented the Agenda for the present meeting:

Minutes of the previous meetings held March 14, March 26, and April 5, 1984, were approved as read.

The Board visited with Mr. Lee concerning the proposed construction of an office building for the appraisal district. Motion was made by Gene Fletcher and seconded by Roy Bulls to contract with the firm of Lee Architects to design an office building, establish the building specifications and solicit bids for the appraisal district for a fee of 8% of the construction costs. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Thane McCloy and seconded by Roy Bulls to change the regular meetings each month from 3:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. Motion carried 4-0.

Chief Appraiser Alice Peddy presented the 1985 preliminary budget for review and discussion. A few changes were recommended by the Board of which will be recorded by the chief appraiser and presented at the next regular meeting.

Motion was made by Roy Bulls and seconded by Gene Fletcher to pay bills as presented in the amount of \$5,323.88 and to approve the bills paid prior to regular session in the amount of \$225.14 as per attachment to the Minutes of this meeting. Motion carried 4-0.

Chairman Shieldknight reported to the Board that he had negotiated to purchase the building site of Lot 4, Block 1, Unit 2, Golden Circle, in Spearman, Texas. He signed a contract, on behalf of the Board, with Boxwell Brothers for the consideration of \$8,250.00.

If you were not enrolled in the program and now wish to enroll you must do so by May 4, 1984. All signatures will be required to be in this office by May 18, 1984.

"Revised 84 Wheat Program"

1. 20% non-paid diversion
2. 10% paid diversion at \$2.70 X farm yield*
3. 20% optional PIK at 85% of farm yield*
4. Haying and grazing ACR--wheat cover only.

If you wish to have wheat cover on ACR you must submit a request to the COC, in writing, and pay a field visit fee.

*Farm yields will be determined by type (Irr-dry) of ACR (set aside) designated.

Land Productivity Valuation



MAY BRING YOU
TAX RELIEF
ON YOUR
PROPERTY TAXES

Under the Texas Property Tax Code, farmers and ranchers who qualify may have their agricultural land taxed on the basis of productivity rather than market value. Productivity valuation may lower the 1984 taxes on your agricultural or open-space land.

If you have never received open-space (1-d-1) valuation on your land, or if your land has been receiving agricultural (1-d) valuation, you must make application to the appraisal district office before May 1, 1984, to be entitled to tax relief this year.

If your land received open-space (1-d-1) valuation in 1983, there will be no requirement for you to reapply for 1984 in this appraisal district. Remember, however, that annual applications are required for agricultural (1-d) valuation.

The first Easter trail Peter Cottontail hopped down was in Pennsylvania, and that first trip took place in 1728, long before commercial egg dyes became popular.

Back then many Pennsylvania Dutch children used natural dyes from herbs and foods to dye the eggs that were then exchanged as tokens of good times to come.

This Easter your children might enjoy making their own dye (with your help) as well as coloring the eggs. They might even learn something about the many uses of foodstuffs along the way.

For softer, lighter shades, prepare the dye and strain it to remove the herbs, roots or foodstuff used to obtain the color. Then, dip and turn pre-cooked eggs in the dye until you get a pretty shade. To create a deeper shade, simply make the dye and cook the eggs at the same time, allowing the eggs to simmer for as long as 20 minutes to reach the deepest hues.

Another method of dyeing eggs is to wrap raw eggs in bits of dye-making plant or food, and then tie them in cheesecloth. When the eggs are boiled the dye is transferred directly to the eggshell, leaving a unique mottled effect.

Adding vinegar or alum to the dyeing mixture will increase the strength of the dye. Here are some "recipes" for various colors:
For yellow dye use chamomile tea or dandelion blossoms, pour boiling water over the tea or blossoms, cover and let stand for half an hour. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Make gold dye by simmering two tablespoons of turmeric for 20 minutes. Add a teaspoon of vinegar before dyeing eggs. Since turmeric does not dissolve, the coloring will be slightly marbled.

A brass-brown shade results from onion skins, even red onion skins. Place the skins in a pan of water and simmer until the desired shade is obtained. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Lavender-blue eggs can be made with blueberries or grapes. Crush the berries or grapes by hand or in blender. Add water and simmer for a few minutes. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye. Use a similar method to make robins-egg blue from cabbage.

Mint leaves will make pale green Easter eggs. Pour boiling water over mint leaves, cover and let simmer for half an hour. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye.

Any of the dye-stuffs can be wrapped around or folded against a raw egg and enclosed in cheesecloth and then boiled to obtain unusual patterns of color on the egg. EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS CONDUCTED BY THE TEXAS AGRICULTURAL

ladder will present their findings. Included on the agenda will be a discussion of other educational proposals of the Select Committee on Public Education headed by H. Ross Perot.

"The Select Committee is nearing completion of its report to the Legislature concerning proposed improvements to public education. While many of the recommendations may become the law in Texas, I have strong reserva-

tions to several of the proposals."

"The career ladder-based compensation program for teachers is one of the most important recommendations. I need the views of the educational community before I can make a decision on what it will mean to teachers in the Panhandle. This is the best opportunity educational interests in the Panhandle will have to be fully informed on the subject and to express their views," Sarpalius said.

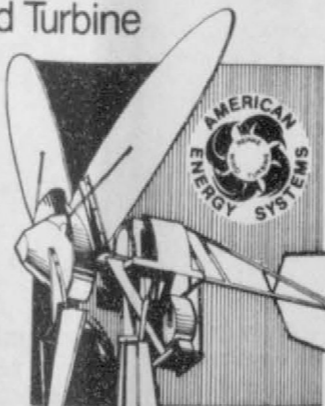

WHAT ARE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains exemptions.

A homestead exemption is a reduction in the taxable value of your residence homestead. Various types of homestead exemptions are available in Texas and, if you qualify, they can reduce your total property tax bill. Read on for details.

What Exemptions Are Available?

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are disabled or over 65.

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market or flood control tax rate, and may offer optional exemptions to the disabled and elderly.

Cities and other taxing districts may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly.

All taxing units offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.

Additionally, some taxing units offer a local option, percentage homestead exemption to resident homeowners.

How Do I Apply?

If you received a residence homestead exemption on your present homestead in 1983, it will not be necessary for you to make a new application for 1984 in this appraisal district.

If you were 65 or disabled on January 1 and have not previously filed for the over-65 or disability homestead exemption, you will need to make application this year.

Or, if you have never received a homestead exemption on your present home, an original application should be filed in 1984.

Applications for all exemptions should be made to the county appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available from the appraisal office.

Is There a Deadline?

For 1984, applications should be filed before May 1. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in certain instances, you can fully protect your rights by applying before May 1.

The State Property Tax Board has a pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, to help you understand your local property taxes. Get a free copy at the appraisal district office or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

Erickson publishes "Alkali County Tales"

When Eastern publishers told Perryton, Texas, author John Erickson that his humor books wouldn't sell, he started his own publishing company, Maverick Books.

That was in September of 1982. When his first book, "The Devil In Texas", sold 5,000 copies in four months, it was clear that someone in New York had made a mistake.

And that was just fine with Erickson.

Since then, Maverick Books has grown and flourished, and John Erickson keeps writing books that are tickling funny-bones all over the United States, as well as in Australia, Ireland, and Canada.

In his latest Maverick book, "Alkali County Tales" (Maverick Books, \$5.95), he's mining the same rich seam of ore he tapped in "The Devil In Texas" and "Cowboys Are Partly Human"—cattle, horses, ranch folks, and life in the western heartland.

Alkali County is the mythical setting for these stories. "In my mind," says the author, "Alkali County is somewhere between Rosston, Oklahoma, and Canadian, Texas. But it could be anywhere in the West."

One of the citizens of Alkali County is Willie Onthenext-ranch, a grouchy rancher who never stops searching for a way to beat the system and make the cattle business pay off.

Willie's not a bad fellow, but he has a tendency to cut corners, open his mouth when he shouldn't, and scheme up ways of beating widow women out of a nickel.

He's also something of a philosopher. It was Willie who said, "Christmas beats tuna fish sandwiches," and "Having neighbors is a pain in the neck, but having enemies might be even worse."

Another citizen of Alkali County is Dr. Barley McOatwheat, a brilliant scientist at the Alkali County Experiment Station. McOatwheat and his

faithful secretary, Miss Mattie Sparrow, apply all the powers of modern science to the problems of agriculture.

For example, Dr. McOatwheat has discovered that ordinary tank water is poisonous. If you breathe it for up to

ten minutes, it'll kill you.

He has also found an alternative to high-priced beef, a revolutionary new source of cheap protein: stray cats.

It all adds up to another delightful reading experience from Maverick Books and the

author "Western Horseman Magazine" has called "one of the best storytellers in the contemporary West."

John Erickson, wife Kristine, and their three children live in Perryton, where the award-winning author is putting the finishing touches on his next book, a biography of cartoonist Ace Reid, due from Maverick Books in September.

WHAT IS TAX RENDITION?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains the process.

Rendition is the method through which a taxpayer reports or lists the taxable property he owned or managed and controlled on January 1 of the current tax year. It is also the means by which a taxpayer is allowed to record his own opinion of what the value of that property should be.

Not every taxpayer is required to file a rendition, but there are important reasons why a taxpayer may wish to do so.

Renditions must be filed: (1) for all tangible personal property used for the production of income; or (2) on any other taxable property if required by the chief appraiser.

Renditions may be filed by any taxpayer who wishes to preserve certain valuable rights.

Even if you aren't required to prepare and file a rendition on your property, there are several good reasons why you should do so:

- As previously noted, by filing a rendition, you have placed into the record your own opinion as to the value of your property.
- You create a responsibility on the part of the chief appraiser and the appraisal review board to notify you if they intend to increase the value of your property by any amount over what you have rendered.
- Further, you have the right to protest to the appraisal review board either the increase in value or any other decision affecting the taxability of your property.
- You place your correct mailing address on record, thus ensuring receipt of tax

statements. If your statement goes to an inaccurate or old address, you may be liable for penalty and interest if your taxes are paid late.

In addition to a rendition, you also may file a special report called a report of decreased value if the value of your property decreased during the preceding tax year for any reason other than normal depreciation. The appraisal office will view the property and verify any reported change in appraised value and its cause and nature.

Renditions and other property reports should be filed with the county appraisal district office at any time from January 1 through April 30.

Rendition forms for various types of property, as well as other property report forms, are available from the appraisal district office. Your appraisal district can also give you a free copy of the Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities pamphlet which explains exemptions, appeal rights, and other details of the local property tax system in Texas. Or, contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

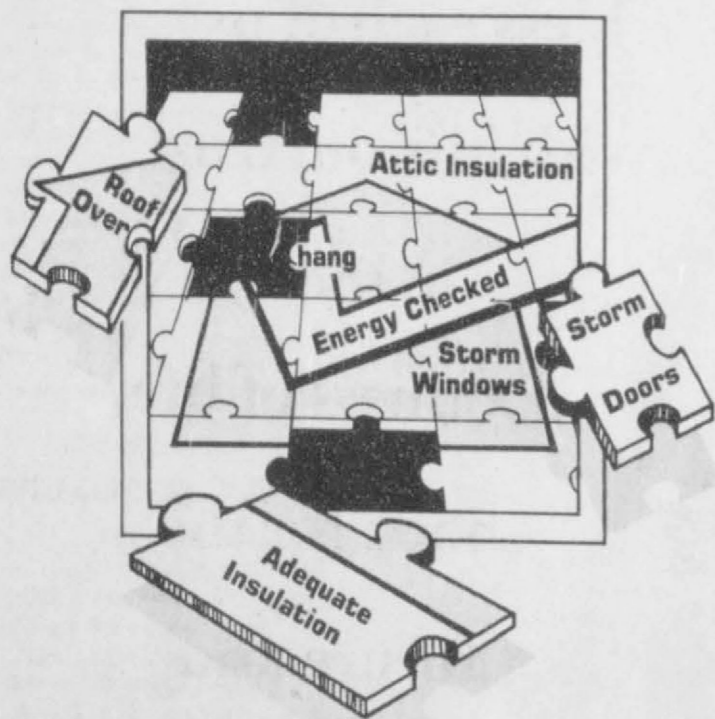

"I am a statistic"

by Fran Maupin

I am a statistic. I have involuntarily joined the estimated 870,000 people in these United States who will be diagnosed as having cancer in 1984--or one of the 44,500 in the state of Texas or one of the estimated 19 in our Hansford County (ACS Facts and Figures 1984.)

This is the saga of one Fran Maupin of Gruver, Texas, and her recent bout with this dreaded disease.

I had noticed a spot on the tip of my nose about the size of a pin head which for no good reason would bleed and then quit--still for no good reason--and not be noticeable for some time--days, weeks. Each time this occurred I would think I had scratched it, irritated it with something, or it was just something "abnormally normal". It really wasn't all that noticeable.

Then one day, being farmers and ranchers, had some "extra" time in Amarillo whilst a truck was being repaired. My best friend, my confidante and husband Bill suggested (because I had been a bit griper than usual)--that we go to Dr. A.B. Goldston, physician and surgeon par excellence and an associate of ours in the American Cancer Society--he, having served as President of the Texas Division in recent years.

Upon examination, he decided to take a biopsy of the "thing"--saying that he had probably removed it all in so doing--it was that small. However, one week later, February 27 and another visit to Dr. Goldston's revealed in part the pathological report (Dr. John V. Denko, Amarillo Laboratory Pathology) basal cell carcinoma, skin of nose.

I am one of the more fortunate to hear these words for cancer of the skin, like all other cancers, is a disease of the cells, but most cases of skin cancer fall into one of two types: basal cells which are located in the lowest part of the epidermis or squamous cell cancer (squamous cells make up most of the skin area.)

"Of the two, basal cells occur most frequently and grow more slowly. Basal cell cancer very rarely spreads through the blood or lymph to distant organs." (U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services--"What You Need To Know About Cancer of the Skin".)

An appointment was made at the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center for that afternoon. This is truly a fantastic

place where no stone has been returned to wage all-out war against cancer. It is a beautiful edifice inhabited by skilled, caring, and wonderful people. Here we met Amarillo's very special radiation oncologists, Dr. Joseph Arko and Dr. Daniel Epley--the only two such qualified persons in all of the Texas Panhandle ("Impact of Cancer on Texas, published by the Texas Department of Health. The University of Texas System Cancer Center, M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, 1984) along with their amazingly well qualified staff and volunteers. Here a new life style began especially for me.

It was determined that I would have radiation therapy--the use of high energy rays to stop cancer cells from growing and multiplying by using a machine at some distance from the body which beams the high energy rays to the cancer. Radiation can reduce pressure, bleeding, pain or other symptoms cancer can cause.

Here, too, we met other specialists, Thelma, Carol, Danny, Allen, Sally and others--each had a specific part in determining my treatment. The dosimetrist computed the dosage of radiation--different for everyone. The amount of radiation is expressed in "rads" which means "radiation absorbed dose"--and refers to the amount of radiation that is absorbed by tissue.

Here these skilled people took time to patiently explain and reassure Bill and me. Lines were drawn (in indelible red) around the treatment area (not really very attractive cosmetically speaking)--marks which must not be washed off. Some areas are marked with tattoo marks.

A schedule was set up for one treatment per day, Monday through Friday. This timing is in order to protect normal tissue with a little radiation each day rather than a lot of radiation all at once (mine varied from a minute to 1 1/2 minutes).

Pictures were taken (not my best angle) for future reference and appointments set up on a weekly schedule (9:00 a.m. Monday thru Friday) at the Radiation Department of St. Anthony's Hospital--where the machine best suited to my skin cancer on my nose was located. It also was determined that I could commute to Amarillo each day.

Tuesday, February 28 was my first introduction to a new lifestyle. Here in the

radiation department at St. Anthony's we found some familiar faces and many others but all skilled, caring personnel. We also met many courageous cancer patients awaiting treatments--some coming from other areas--others hospital patients, and others staying at the Ronald McDonald House while taking treatments at either St. Anthony's or the Harrington Center.

The first series of treatments at St. Anthony's February 28 was from a machine not unlike an x-ray machine in appearance--but I will add--a bit scary never-the-less.

Carol, the radiation therapist, who had several years of schooling in radiology and radiation therapy explained some of the procedures in the treatment room as she positioned me on a table under the machine. She covered all but the marked area of my face with special shreds of lead and had me insert a 'personalized' lead piece up my nose. She explained that I must stay very still to assure that the radiation reached the same area each time.

She also told me that she would not stay in the room but would be in the control room where she could see me at all times and could talk to me by intercom. One of the oncologists checked the procedure.

And so began my series of radiation therapy--the machine making a pulsating noise not unlike our microwave oven on defrost or warm--and by my counting to myself to help keep me from flying off into space--scary-oh yes!--but comforting to know that this machine was now striking against the cancer I now had.

The daily trips continued (leaving Gruver at pre-dawn) with the help of Bill, family and friends taking turns accompanying me until February 9 when some new suspicious spots appeared.

An appointment was set up with Dr. Goldston, the consulting physician, for the 16th when he examined carefully the new spots. It was decided to continue the treatments.

(An aside)--Dr. Goldston and Dr. Arko gave us weekend permission to attend the 1984 Buddy Werner Colorado State Finals at Ski Sunlight near Glenwood Springs in which our granddaughter Megan Nuttal was a participant. I was to protect my nose with cover at all times when on the slope--no problem--for all skiers use zinc oxide for an excellent cover. Armed with a generous supply of zinc oxide Bill and I went for a brief winter outing--it was great!--but would you believe that out of all the people on the slopes that day I was the only one sporting a zinc oxide nose!!

Tuesday, March 20, Bill and I arrived for my 9 a.m. St. Anthony's radiation date only to learn the radiation tube was non-functioning and we were sent to the Harrington Center to complete my treatments.

The Center radiation treatment room manned by several skilled radiology technicians resembles a spaceship and the radiation machine was almost gargantuan (at least to me)--The whole radiation assembly is moveable. Again the technicians zeroed that big machine in on my nose and again the untreated area was meticulously covered. The machine here sounded like the cracking of a neon sign.

I now have had 3,400 miles (at least) of treatments and have reported to Dr. Arko again for my follow up. Still under observation are the 'new spots' which have not grown. The tip of my nose now sports baby like skin--and a reddish hue! I am to check with Dr. Goldston in one month and our oncologists at the same time.

The cause of skin cancer is still unknown but this cancer, like all others, is a disease of the cells--over-exposure to the sun is one of the contributing factors in the development of skin cancer. We are a nation of sun worshippers which has apparently escalated the number of skin cancers.

My wonderful progress can be attributed to years of research requiring millions of dollars, to specifically, Dr. A.B. Goldston; Dr. Joseph Arko; Dr. Daniel Epley; to their exceptional staffs; to volunteers like Diane and Sue; the active American Cancer Society and specifically our Sandy St. John, District-ACS supervisor, to those caring, praying and loving people in Gruver town but mostly our faith in God.

Color my world bright with faith, courage, hope, love and a dash of good sense to know that a little bit of Old Sol goes a long way.

I am a statistic--but I now fall in the 420,000 in the United States who are taking treatments or will be cured in 1984; or to bring this figure to Texas--I am now one of the 20,600 who will be treated or cured in 1984--and to bring this home to Hansford County--I am 1 of the 7 who will be treated or cured in 1984--How blessed can I be?

Use your 'cents', to fight cancer--you're worth it!--I know!

Democratic candidates not on primary ballot

The names of Democratic Presidential contenders will not appear on the May 5, 1984 Texas Democratic Primary ballot.

Texas Democratic Party Chairman Bob Slagle today reminded all Texas Democrats that in order to express their preference for the presidential candidate of their choice they must attend their precinct convention on Saturday, May 5, 1984.

Democratic Precinct conventions will be held across the state beginning at 7:15 p.m. on Saturday, May 5, 1984 in Texas' nearly 7,000 precincts. The location of the precinct convention is usually at the polling place where Democrats voted earlier in the day. However Slagle urged all Democrats to check with their Precinct Chair or Election Judge when they vote on May 5 to confirm the exact location of their precinct convention.

"Precinct conventions will convene promptly at 7:15 p.m. on May 5," Slagle said.

He added that the precinct convention would be called to order by the Democratic Precinct Chair. If the Chair is absent, however, any qualified Democratic voter may convene the convention.

In order to attend the precinct convention a voter must have voted in the Democratic Primary, May 5 -- either in person or absentee. At the time of voting the individual's blue voter registration card is marked "voted democratic primary". This stamped voter registration card or other evidence of having voted is the "ticket" for admission to the Democratic Party precinct convention.

Slagle stated that the convention method of expressing presidential preference and electing delegates to the National Convention has been the traditional method of choosing the Party's delegates in Texas. Only in 1976 and 1980, had the Party deviated from tradition using in 1976 a direct election of delegates and in 1980 a non-binding preference election combined with the precinct convention system. Precinct conventions are frequently called caucuses in other states.

"Texas will be crucial in choosing the Democratic presidential nominee in 1984," Slagle said.

"I hope to see the best turnout over at the precinct conventions to ensure that the delegates we elect to the National Convention are truly representative of the choices of the Democrats of

the delegate selection process. Slagle urged that interested groups contact the State Party office to arrange a workshop in their area. One page summaries of the delegate selection process are available free of charge from the State Party Office in both English and Spanish.

Slagle requested the assistance of the Texas press in publicizing the process through public service announcements to increase voter participation.

Texas," he added.

Precinct Convention attendees will caucus by candidate choice and uncommitted preference to elect their proportionate number of delegates to County and in some urban areas Senate District conventions to be held on May 19, 1984. At the County and Senate District conventions delegates will caucus to elect delegates to the State Convention to be held this year in Houston on June 15 and 16. Delegates at the State Convention will elect 185 Texas delegates and 67 alternates to the National Convention. Fourteen Texas Democratic congressmen and Senator Lloyd Bentsen have already been elected delegates by the House and Senate Democratic caucuses.

"Based on the delegate count for Mondale, Hart and Jackson at this point," Slagle said "our 200 delegates to the National Convention could be a key factor in choosing our Nominee.

The Texas Democratic Party has been holding workshops and seminars across the State since January to educate voters on

BUSINESS OUTLOOK

By Edward Thorlund Chances are improving Congress will act to reduce huge deficits which have been depressing the stock market and adding to the pressure for higher interest rates.

The House has two packages, one by the Democrats which would cut the deficit over \$200 billion in the next three years. This one includes far more reductions in defense spending than President Reagan will accept.

House Republicans, not to be outdone, have a bill which also calls for over \$200 billion in cuts. The Democratic version is likely to pass the House but in the Senate a G.O.P. version will emerge.

White House agreement to a \$150 billion deficit reduction package was obtained by key Republican senators a month ago. But there are two other Senate bills, increasing savings, which have a chance in the Senate.

Even if the \$150 billion version passes the Senate, which Majority Leader Howard Baker says is likely, it will have to be reconciled in conference committee with the House-passed bill.

Since both House Democrats and Republicans favor greater cuts than the Senate's \$150 billion G.O.P. version, it seems likely a compromise figure somewhere between \$150 and \$200 billion will be worked out by conferees.

If something like \$170 billion in deficit reduction is the final version which passes both houses and goes to the White House, Mr. Reagan would be hesitant to veto it in this election year. Polls show Americans gravely concerned over deficits.

If such a bill passes in early summer, as now seems likely, it may lessen the pessimism of Wall Street.

- Se requiere manifiestos para: (1) toda propiedad de bienes muebles tangibles (tangible personal property) que se usa en la producción de ingresos; o (2) cualquier otra propiedad sujeta a impuestos si el evaluador (chief appraiser) lo requiere. Se permite manifiestos de cualquier contribuyente quien quiere proteger ciertos derechos importantes.

- Usted establece su dirección correcta asegurando recibo de su estado de cuenta de impuestos. Si su cuenta de impuestos es enviada a una dirección incorrecta, usted será responsable de pagar las multas e intereses a sus impuestos si estos son pagados tarde.

Aunque no requiere que usted haga manifiesto de su propiedad, hay varias razones buenas por las cuales debe hacerlo:

- Como se notó anteriormente, cuando hace manifiesto, usted registra su opinión del valor de su propiedad. Usted crea una responsabilidad por parte del evaluador principal y la junta de reunión de valuación (appraisal review board) para que le notifiquen si ellos intentan aumentar el valor de su propiedad sobre el valor que usted estimó.

Además, usted puede registrar un reporte especial, que se llama reporte de valor disminuido, si el valor de su propiedad bajó por alguna razón aparte de depreciación normal. El distrito de valuación (appraisal district) inspeccionará la propiedad para verificar algún cambio de valor registrado, y su causa y carácter.

Manifiestos y otros reportes de propiedad deben registrarse con la oficina del distrito de valuación de su condado entre el 1º de Enero y el 30 de Abril.

Formas de manifiesto para varias clases de propiedad, y otras formas para registrar propiedades están disponibles en la oficina del distrito de valuación. Su distrito de valuación también ofrece una copia gratis del panfleto ¡Los Derechos, Remedios y las Responsabilidades del Contribuyente a los Impuestos! que explica exenciones, derechos de protesta, y otros detalles del sistema de impuestos sobre propiedad en Texas. O, haga contacto con el State Property Tax Board en Austin.
