School budgets in County

Texans increased spending on local public schools by \$552 million last year, as trustees in 1,069 school districts adopted school budgets totaling \$9.0 billion. That provided more than \$200 in additional funds for each of the 2,727,512 students in the state, according to the Texas Research League.

Local Property taxpayers were tagged for an additional \$327 million to pay for the increase. The remainder was funded by increases in state and federal aid programs and by higher local fees.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks for 1984-85 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, and Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted for 1983-84 called for spending \$2713 per student for current operations. Spearman ISD's budget provided for \$3736.55 per student based on the 774 students in average daily attendance in 1982-83.

Gruver school budget for 1983-84 called for almost the identical amount as Spearman with \$3736.97 per student.

Pringle-Morse ISD budget calls for expenditure of \$7353.84 per student.

Four of five of these dollars were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$2,153 per student, as compared to \$2808 in Spearman ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Spearman

ISD in 1982-83 was \$21,173.00 which was 28.8 percent above the minimum salary prescribed by the state. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$19,501 per classroom teacher, or 21.8 percent over the minimum.

There was an average of one teacher for 109 students in Spearman ISD compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio of 1 to 16.4. The pupil-teacher ratio is not the same thing as the average class size because teachers and students are not necessarily in class the same number of hours each day.

Statewide, the ratio of teachers to students has remained the same the past three years. The report notes that during the 1980s school officials have used additional payroll dollars to increase salaries beyond the rate of inflation, whereas during the previous decade more dollars were spent to hire additional teachers while average salaries grew less than the rate of inflation.

Local property taxes were increased by \$327 million for a total of \$3.6 billion last year. Locally, the Spearman ISD's tax levy was decreased by 4.1 percent for 1983-84, as compared to a 10.0 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

School property tax rates in 1982-83 averaged \$0.613 per \$100 of market value (selling price). The school tax on a property selling for \$100,000 was \$613 in the average school district. Locally, the rate on market value in Spearman ISD was \$.72 1/2, or \$725.00 on a property selling for \$100,000.

If the property were a home- stead or owned by a senior

citizen, the school tax would be less because of various exemptions. Open-space land that qualified would be valued on its productivity value rather than market value.

Revenue lost from exemptions totaled \$679 million, which was \$125 million more than that exempted the previous year. To balance school budgets, the revenue loss from exemptions was imposed upon other taxpayers in the school district.

Preparing school budgets for next year, the report noted, will be difficult. Not only did the Special Session of the Legislature provide substantial additional funds, but also changed the method for allocating aid to different districts. School officials also must begin implementing a variety of new educational programs including new curriculum standards.

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
Immunization Clinic August 6

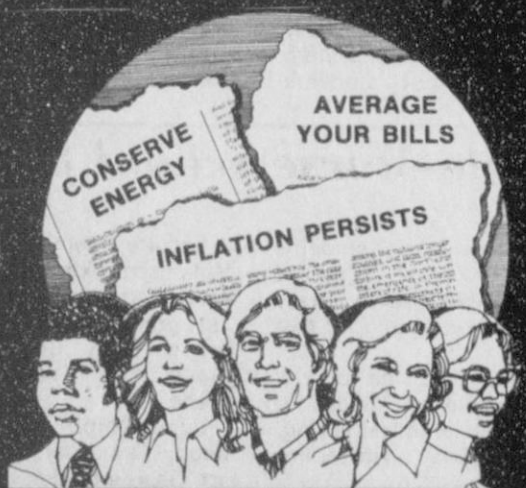

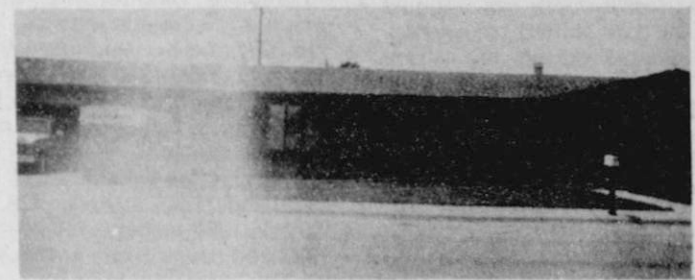

Auto license cost up

The cost to license the family car in Texas, and other motor vehicles, went up for most owners on Wednesday, August 1, when a fee schedule based on the age of the vehicle became effective.

Previously licensing charges were based on how much the automobile weighed.

Beginning Wednesday, the cost of a license with an August renewal date shifted to a schedule, adopted during the recent special session of the Legislature, which is based on the model year.

In simple words this means, the newer the car, the higher the license fee. For most owners, that adds up to an increase in the cost.

The owners of newer model compact cars will pay the biggest increase by the new schedule while those whose family cars are 1978 or older models may pay less.

For example, the owner of a 1982 or newer compact car—it had to weigh less than 3,500 pounds—paid a licensing fee of \$15.80 last year.

The fee for the 1985 sticker will be \$46.30—the same as the fee for a full-size family car.

Owners of 1978 and older model cars, weighing less than 6,000 pounds, will pay a fee of \$28.30 regardless of weight. The license charge for automobile, 1979 through the 1981 models will be \$38.30.

Some Hansford county auto owners beat the Aug. 1 fee increase by renewing license tags in early July.

They paid the "old" fee schedule to Friday, July 13, when Texas Gov. Mark White signed H.B. 122, the legislation which increased Texas license fees.

The old schedule based on automobile weights was autos weighing 3,500 pounds or less \$15.80; those weighing from 3,501 pounds to 4,500 pounds, \$25.80; and those in the 4,501 pound to 6,000 pound range, \$33.80.

The new fee schedule will be, 1978 and older models, \$28.30, 1979 to 1981 models, \$38.30 and 1982 and newer models, \$46.30.

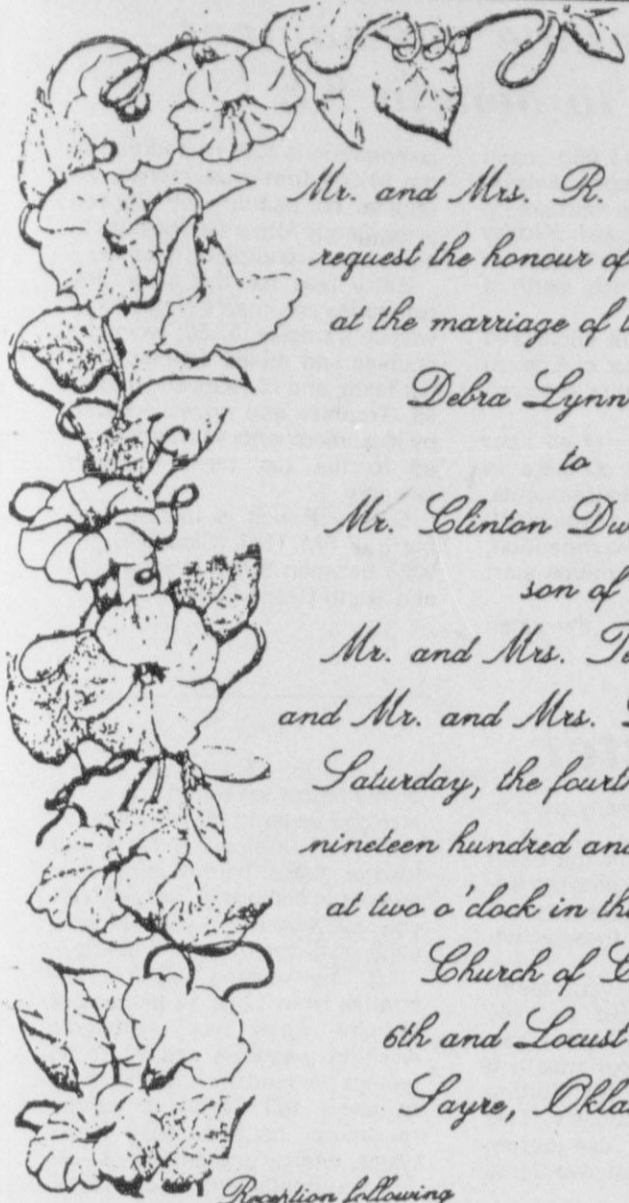

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Public coffee planned for Phil Gramm

U.S. Rep. Phil Gramm, candidate for the U.S. Senate, will attend a public coffee reception for Hansford County residents at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, August 4, at the First State Bank's hospitality room, 30 Southwest Court in Spearman.

Gramm is best known for co-authoring the Reagan economic recovery program, and for resigning from Congress and winning re-election as a Republican after Tip O'Neill stripped him of his Budget Committee seat in reprisal for his successful efforts to control spending.

The congressman, who won the Republican nomination with an extraordinary 73% of the vote against three opponents who spent total of \$4 million, said Texans deserve an issue-oriented campaign in the general election race for the U.S. Senate this year.

"The people of Texas face a dear choice between two dedicated advocates of distinctly dif-

ferent philosophies of government," Gramm said. "I have spent six years in Congress working for a balanced budget, lower taxes, greater economic opportunity for the working people of this country and a strong defense. My opponent has consistently demanded higher taxes,

more spending and less defense."

Where Congressman Gramm introduced a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution on his first day in Congress -- Jan. 3, 1979 -- Lloyd Doggett voted against the resolution adopted by the Texas Legislature which urged approval of the balanced budget amendment. Doggett also has opposed the balanced budget amendment in his primary and runoff campaigns.

A survey conducted on May 8-9 noted Texas pollster Lance Tarrance showed Gramm with an 11-point lead over Doggett.

Congressman Gramm's stop here is part of a 70-city swing aimed at continuing to build on our grassroots base of support for the November general election."

Bullock won't run for governor

Austin--State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that he will not run for governor in 1986.

Almost two years ago Bullock surprised the usual political circles by announcing for the '86 governor's race on general election day in November, 1982, the same day he was reelected to a third term as Comptroller.

"Frankly, there has been no great public clamor for my services as governor," Bullock said. "If I were looking for a draft, I think I can now quit waiting."

"Since my announcement I've had about 100 expressions of support and one \$5 contribution from a Mr. Lan Nelson of Walker County which I am returning," he said.

"Seriously, though," Bullock said, "I respect the Comptroller's office and the Governor's office both too much to continue to hold one office and be a candidate for the other when it works to the detriment of both."

"I hope this announcement ends all speculation on the part of some people as to the political influence on each and every action of the Comptroller's Department," he said.

Bullock said he will "make up my mind at some point in the future as to running or not running again for Comptroller."

"It's two years until the next election and I intend to take it one day at a time," Bullock said.

First speaker of the House of Representatives was Frederick A.C. Mühlenberg, a Federalist from Pennsylvania, who served from 1789 to 1791.

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Social security news

How much of Social Security tax dollar earmarked for paying monthly retirement, disability, and survivors benefits is actually used for this purpose? And how much is used to run the program?

In an opinion poll a few years ago, a majority of people guessed that less than half of each tax dollar went for benefits. And only about one person in 20 said at least 80 percent of the tax money was paid in benefits.

In truth, about 98.6 cents from each tax dollar paid in 1983 went directly to make payments to some 36 million people getting benefits. And only 1.4 cents went for administrative expenses.

It's true that the Social Security Administration's administrative costs—in dollars and cents have gone up over the years as its programs have grown. But the ratio of those costs in relation to tax income has steadily decreased. For example, it took 1.6 cents from each tax dollar to run the program 5 years ago; and about 2.0 cents a decade ago.

Administrative expenses include such items as salaries, rental of property and equipment, building operating expenses, and supplies. They also include payments to the U.S. Treasury Department for collecting Social Security taxes and issuing checks, as well as costs incurred by States in making disability determinations.

Increased program efficiency is expected as the Social Security Administration progresses in its 5-year systems modernization program which began in February 1982. This top agency priority, to modernize its computer systems, should result in faster and better service to the

public and at less cost!

Question: I would like to adopt a disabled child. Currently, she receives Social Security benefits because of her disability. Would adoption cause her benefits to end?

Answer: No, adoption will not cause benefits to stop. However, when a child is adopted, you should contact any Social Security office and report the child's new name, the date of the adoption decree, and the adopting parent's name and address.

Question: Is it possible to get Social Security retirement benefits before age 65?

Answer: Yes. You can start getting retirement benefits as early as age 62. But if you do, your retirement benefits will be reduced. Benefits to people who retire early are reduced to take account of the longer period of time over which they will receive payments.

Question: I asked the Social Security Administration for information about my earnings record. When I got the information, I found that the earnings I had in 1982 and 1983 were not shown on the statement. Why is this?

Answer: All earnings are reported annually after the end of the year. Because of this, and because of the time it takes to credit all the earnings reports to individual records, your 1982 earnings may not be shown on your record until later this year. Your 1983 earnings may not be shown until some time in 1985.

Ways of Saving Water

you will know you have a leak. Repairing a leaking toilet can result in a decrease in water use and a savings of several dollars a month on your water bill.

3. Using the toilet as a trash disposal for facial tissue and other trash results in many unnecessary flushes. Each time you dispose of trash in a trash basket instead of flushing the commode, you save 5 gallons or more of water. Three or four unnecessary flushes per day would result in a waste of 4000 to 5000 gallons of water per month.

4. Bathing in the shower instead of the bathtub will reduce water use by 5 to 10 gallons.

5. Shampooing your hair while taking a shower will require only a little more water than a normal shower and save the 10 to 20

gallons of water normally used in a separate shampoo.

6. Ponding water in the basin for handwashing or shaving instead of letting the faucet run will reduce water use for these activities by about half.

7. When brushing your teeth, turn the water faucet on only when you need to rinse your toothbrush, rinse your mouth or clean the sink rather than letting the water run continuously. This will decrease water use during this activity by almost two-thirds for most folks.

Ten to twelve percent of in-home water use takes place in the kitchen.

8. Running water from the tap until it is cool enough to drink is probably the easiest waste habit to break. This can be done by storing water for drinking in the refrigerator. If you have problems remembering, tie a colored ribbon

on the faucet to remind you of the nice cool water in the refrigerator.

9. Wait until you have a full load of dishes before using your automatic dishwasher. Not only will you save water, but you will save expensive detergent and energy.

10. The washing machine constitutes from 12 to 14 percent of in-home water use. Automatic washing machines use 30 to 60 gallons per load, so it is important to wash full loads to obtain maximum benefits from your water, energy and detergent.

If you implement a good water conservation program in your home but still find your water consumption is high, you might have a water leak between your meter and the house. It is easy to check. Turn off all faucets, indoors and out, and then check your water meter. If it continues to run, you have a leak and need to have it repaired.

Deere & Co. offers safety device

Deere and Company today announced that in the interest of farm safety it will make available to no cost to the farm equipment industry its patents for a transmission device that reduces the risks of tractor accidents.

The special transmission valve, which was developed at the John Deere Product Engineering Center in Waterloo, Iowa, prevents hydraulically activated transmission clutches from engaging unless the clutch pedal has been depressed and released by the operator following each start.

Operators have been injured when they improperly started their tractors by bypassing normal circuitry while standing on the ground. It is a practice that manufacturers have urged farmers not to use and have tried to discourage through other design changes.

The danger in such a start, of course, is that the tractor will move if the transmission is in

gear. With the Deere safety device in the clutch hydraulic circuit, the machine won't go into motion following a start even when it is in gear, at least not until the operator mounts the machine and depresses and releases the clutch pedal.

Currently Deere has the safety feature on its 50 Series row crop and four wheel drive tractors with the Quadrangle transmission, and within the next few months it will be installed on all 50 Series row crop tractors.

This action by Deere marks the fourth time the company made its safety patents available to the entire industry at no cost. In 1971, Deere released its patented roll-over protection structure, and four years later it gave the industry its patented method for covering power take-off shafts to reduce exposure and thus injuries. In 1982, Deere released its patent for a tip-up shield on the tractor which reduces the necessity of removing the shield to accommodate large power take-off connections.

You must be a U.S. citizen and have a valid Texas drivers license. Your eyesight must be no worse than 20/200 correctable to 20/30. Severe color deficiency in your eyesight will be a disqualification."

Major Cawthon also stated that testing will be conducted in Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls on every Tuesday and Thursday, except holidays. Testing will start at 9:00 a.m. each day of the test. 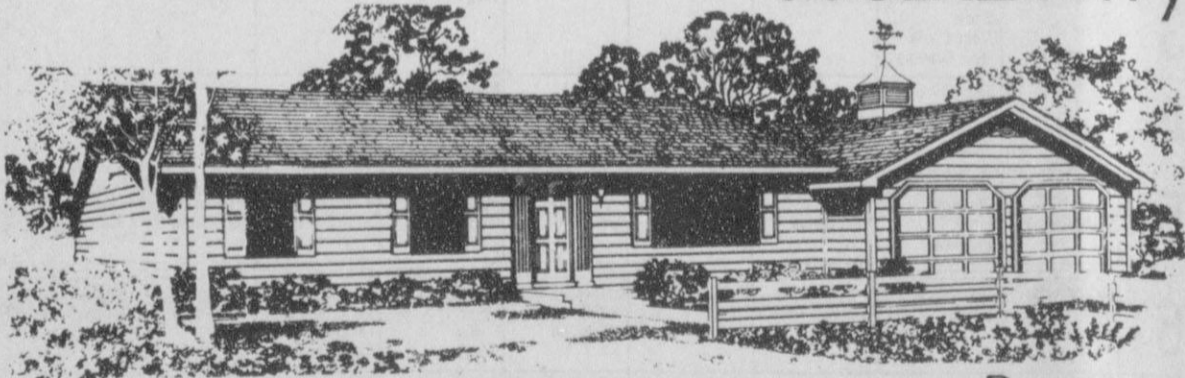

Farm income 57% below parity

July 26, 1984. The District 1 Director for the Texas Farmers Union has announced the June parity index, from figures released by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The farm 'cost-of-living' figure is down to a below-satisfactory 57% says Burton Schubert of Hansford County.

"The farm economy is definitely lagging behind the rest of the American economy; this parity index has gone down as opposed to rising over the past few months. Add that to the increasing interest rates across the country, and the farmers everywhere are hurting," claims Schubert.

The parity index is the relationship between the price received for a commodity, and its pur-

chasing power in today's market place, versus the same transaction performed during the years between 1909 and 1914. It is a yardstick that farmers use to measure the relative strength of farm income today, as compared to the 'Golden Age' of agriculture in the early 1900's.

To illustrate, the price received for a pound of cotton is .72 (cents) as opposed to the parity price of \$1.27. This means that while the cost of living and raw materials has gone up drastically in the past seventy years, that pound of cotton will only purchase a little more than half of what it brought at the beginning of the century.
