HARVEST REPORT

Late evening showers have slowed the harvest somewhat this week but the consensus of elevator operators is that the harvest is well underway for dryland wheat especially. Some irrigated wheat is being received at Holt Equity and Spearman elevators are also receiving some irrigated wheat. Gruver elevator operators had not received any irrigated wheat as of late Monday.

Burt Williams, Hansford County agent, reports that the dryland is average 20 to 25 bushels per acre, with some fields making 12 and others making 30 and 34 bushels.

No irrigated yield has been established since the cutting of the irrigated wheat has not really begun in earnest.

Jim Turner, manager of Equity Elevators in Spearman said that the dryland wheat was averaging around 30 bushels, with some of the irrigated wheat making 50 to 55 bushels to the acre.

Continental Grain spokesman in Gruver said their harvest of dryland wheat was in full swing, with wheat averaging 15 to 25 bushels. They have not had any irrigated wheat.

Gruver Equity manager Clyde Soapes reported a good flow of dryland wheat coming into the elevator but no irrigated being out as of late Monday.

Agco's Brice McRee said they had received some irrigated wheat also, which was making about 60 bushels per acre.

McKibben Equity spokesman said that they were about half thru with the dryland wheat and it would be about another week before irrigated wheat will be cut.

Many farmers who planted dryland wheat on summer fallowed land left out last year for the PIK program are seeing good yields from their crop.

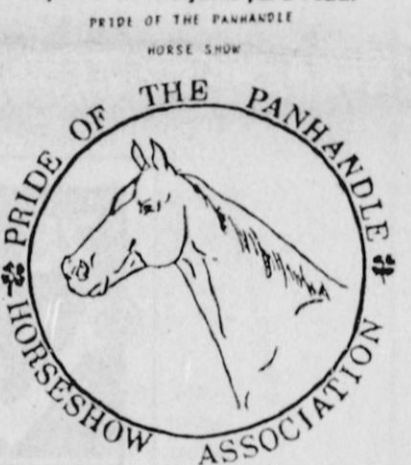
As usual, farmers are facing a poor market for their wheat. Wheat was selling for \$3.28 in Spearman Tuesday.

A check with the ASCS office in Spearman established the USDA loan rate at \$3.26 plus a deficiency payment of up to \$1.08.

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Karen's Kozzy Korner

The summer fun of swimming, cool drinks and even car-washing, all require an ample water supply that we often take for granted.

By now, most Texans should know that our groundwater supplies are being depleted faster than they can be renewed, that means everybody needs to do their part to conserve water.

Here are some suggestions for how to reduce the amount of water we casually waste at home:

Keep a thermos of cold water on the kitchen cabinet or a jar of water in the refrigerator. Running the tap to wait for coffee water sends about five gallons of water per minute down the drain.

Take a quick shower. Every inch of water in a tub represents about 4 1/2 gallons of water and a shower without a water saving device typically uses 5-10 gallons per minute.

Use full loads of laundry to clean those summer clothes. Washing machines can use 40-60 gallons of water per load.

Resist using the toilet for a

trash basket. Every Flush uses 4-7 gallons of water.

Watch out for water hoses with the water left running. A water hose can deliver several hundred gallons of water in an hour. For that reason, it's probably better to fill the kids' wading pool than let them play with the hose.

You can save water as you wash your car too. After you wet the car down, turn the water off or use a hose with a shut-off nozzle. Use buckets of soapy water to wash it and then give the car a final rinse with the hose.

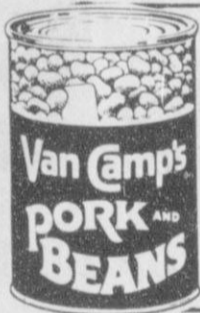

SCS can help with residue management

With wheat harvest now well underway, farmers who plan to rotate portions of their irrigated wheat land back to grain sorghum next year will soon be making a decision on how to manage their wheat residue.

One option is to use herbicides for weed control during the fallow period in lieu of numerous tillage operations. Atrazine should be applied at 3 lbs. per acre (active ingredient) to wheat stubble immediately after wheat harvest before weeds emerge. If broad-leaf weed are present, add 2,4-D at 1 lb. per acre to the spray. If annual grass has emerged before atrazine is applied, a sweep plowing may be necessary. The atrazine will control weeds until sorghum planting.

After planting, a post-emergence herbicide may be needed if sorghum is weedy. Some years, atrazine applied to wheat stubble controls weeds in the sorghum crop. Igran or propazine applied preemergence will assure a weed free crop.

Dryland sorghum following irrigated wheat has also produced very well if conservation tillage and chemical fallow is utilized.

DPS Commander speaks to Rotarians



Bob Russell, Captain in the Texas Highway Patrol for the Amarillo district spoke to Rotarians Monday

day about the new DWI law, and traffic safety.

Bob Russell, district commander of Texas Highway Patrol, spoke to the Spearman Rotary Club Monday regarding various factors that affect safety on the highways.

There are 100 troopers stationed in 31 counties in the Texas Panhandle.

DWI arrests are increasing as a result of the new DWI law which was effective January 1, 1984. Partially as a result of effort of the organization MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving).

Russell stated that 44% of DWI fatal accidents are by persons between the ages of 15 to 24 years. He advocates raising the legal drinking age to 21 years which will reduce the fatality rate in Texas by 28%.

On Saturday nights between 9 p.m. and 3 a.m. Sunday morning one in 10 drivers on the road is drunk, according to Russell. Last year the Texas Highway Patrol had a conviction rate of 17 percent. With the new law now in effect. This year they expect to have a conviction rate of 70%.

Charles Henderson, Texas Highway Patrol supervisor stationed in Borger, was also present and stated that every 16th mile driven on the nation's highway is driven in Texas, and stressed that we need to use safety belts. Of 3823 people killed last year in Texas only 58 were wearing seat belts.

The officers described one accident near Hereford, that involved a car flipping end over end several times and the driver walked away without a scratch. His new bride, not wearing a safety belt, was killed.

The Rotary Club will have installation of officer jointly with the Perryton Rotary Club at the Perryton Senior Center, Friday, June 29th at 7 p.m.

Women Landowners seminar set

A special seminar on Farm and Ranch Business Management for Women Landowners will be held July 11-13 at the Holiday Inn North (77 NE Loop 410) in San Antonio.

The seminar is designed to help women explore income-generating and tax-saving opportunities for their farms and ranches, says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist and attorney with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Estate planning tools which will be discussed include use of corporations and partnerships, selling part of the business, installment sales, oil and gas interests, special farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payments, life insurance and discounted estate taxes (flower bonds).

Joining Hayenga in conducting the seminar will be Robert Kensing of San Angelo, also an Extension Service economist.

Pearson makes Texas rodeo team

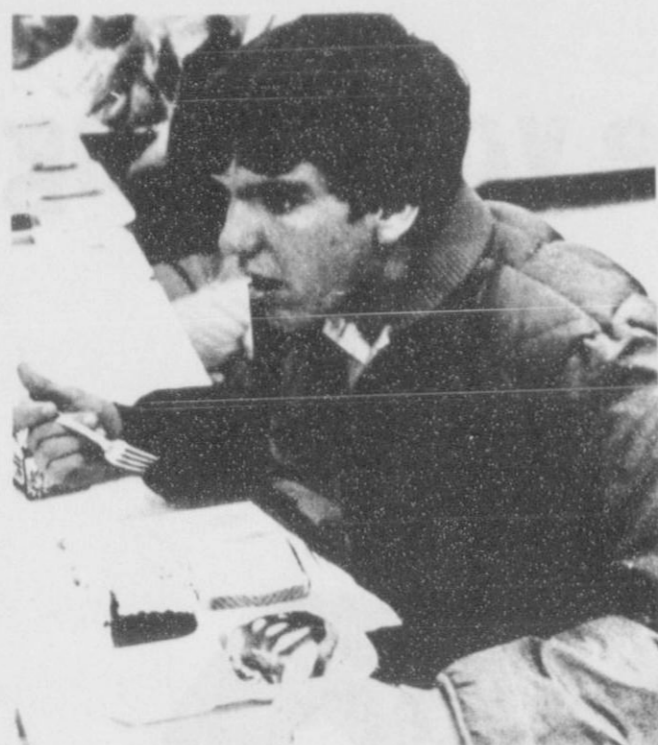

4-H has something for all youth

An American invention, the 4-H program of the Cooperative Extension Service, originated near the beginning of the 20th century as a result of a vital need to improve life in rural areas.

Introducing improved methods of farming and homemaking, 4-H taught youth to "learn-by-doing." Designed for both boys and girls, the first 4-H "projects" included home canning of tomatoes as well as raising corn and hogs, points out Karen Harruff, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The school and the home have a close affiliation in this early 4-H program and adults in the family often were persuaded to adopt new practices as a result of successes experienced by 4-H youth.

In 1914 the Smith-Lever Act established the Cooperative Extension Service, and organizational entity of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the

land-grant college system. Created by this act and subsequent legislation to conduct educational programs of an "informal, non-resident, problem-oriented nature," the Cooperative Extension Service provided the professional staff and support needed to direct the growth of the early 4-H program.

Today's 4-H program involves youth as the primary audience and adults and teens as volunteer leaders, says Harruff.

No single Cooperative Extension Service program is more widely known or recognized than 4-H. The technique of organizing boys and girls into clubs through which Extension programs could help youth learn practical knowledge and skills in agriculture, home economics and related areas was one of the early innovations in education—and it succeeded admirably.

4-H projects, strictly rural in the early days, have now been diversified to appeal to boys and girls in urban areas as well. They

stimulate adults to apply new knowledge and often lead to a closer sense of partnership between parents and their children.

4-H clubs give identity to learning activities, enhance personal development through project work, establish a formal vehicle for involvement of adults, and develop an esprit de corps of great significance. Many clubs today join together in constructive community projects, Harruff says.

In addition to clubs, 4-H uses many other means of meeting the needs of today's youth. Learning opportunities are provided through informal groups, camps, educational television, 4-H programs in schools, family programs and special events.

Through international programs, exchange opportunities and overseas activities also have evolved, and many nations have developed a youth program similar to 4-H.

Wheat growers advised to consider chemical weed control program

Spearman, Texas—Hansford County wheat growers looking to conserve moisture, minimize erosion and reduce costs should seriously consider launching a chemical weed control program.

A chemical weed control program is any system that replaces tillage with a herbicide application for weed control during the fallow season, says Brice McRee of AGCO of Spearman, Inc. in Spearman. For most Hansford County growers, the fallow season is generally the three-month period between continuous winter wheat crops, he adds.

"Moisture retention is clearly one of the most significant benefits of a chemical weed control program," McRee points out. "On most Hansford County farms moisture is one of the most limiting production factors a farmer has to contend with," McRee notes. Research, in fact, has shown that a single disking or deep tillage across a field can extract an inch of moisture, translating into a yield reduction of 3 bushels an acre.

In studies conducted at the Central Great Plains Experiment Station, Akron, Colo., moisture loss to evaporation was reduced by more than 50 percent when farmers reduced tillage by using a chemical weed control program and left a residue cover on the surface. Extra moisture at planting will often produce a good

stand, allowing farmers to graze cattle earlier and longer over the winter months, while also increasing yields at harvest, the dealer suggests.

Soil erosion control is another benefit of a chemical weed control program. During the winter, it's possible for 25 to 30 mph winds to simply blow away soils left unprotected, he points out. Wind erosion can be eliminated, however, with proper management of a residue cover. One USDA study, he notes, showed that soil erosion could be decreased by as much as 90 percent when residue is left on the surface.

Economics and time savings also favor a chemical weed control program, he contends. A grower can save between two and three tillage operations by spraying rather than tilling his fields for weed control during fallow periods. "At the rate of about \$4.50 to \$5.00 per acre for each tillage trip, the cost savings are considerable. Growers will also save time spraying various multiple tillages," he adds.

A typical herbicide program on fallow ground might revolve around an application of Roundup herbicide at the low rate of 12 ounces or 1 pint per acre either after harvest, during fallow or prior to planting, the dealer notes. Such an application will control a broad spectrum of annual and perennial weeds such

as volunteer wheat, pigweed, cheatgrass, kochia, and Russian thistle.

Treatment should be made while weeds are actively growing, and between 4 to 6 inches tall, he adds. For improved broadleaf control, growers may apply Roundup at the 12 ounces or 1 pint rate in a tank mix with a half pint per acre of Banvel or a pint of 2, 4-D.

Roundup can be sprayed with ground equipment or by air. At the 12 ounce rate, growers should use only 3 to 10 gallons of water for ground application, and 3 to 5 gallons of water for ground application, and 3 to 5 gallons for aerial spraying. Flat fan nozzles are recommended over large flood jets and nozzles should be spaced on 20-inch intervals on the boom.

"With a properly-timed herbicide application, wheat growers can control weeds during the fallow season without having to till the ground. This allows them to conserve moisture and minimize erosion, resulting in higher wheat yields in their continuous cropping rotation. The future profitability of our local farmers will be dependent on our ability to manage our soils for future generations. And, chemicals will play a large part in helping reduce tillage and minimize erosion," he concludes.

Camp units elected a member of their group to represent them at the camp Council. The Camp Council planned the program activities which included special recreation times such as: a Beach Party, Halloween Party, with an intriguing Spook House, created an evening of fun of how it was long ago with the Founder of Girl Scouting, Juliette Low, Future Space Olympics stirred a great deal of imagination, while "paper bag" skits encourage creativity

and campfires always a must with singing and a Scout's Own ending camptime.

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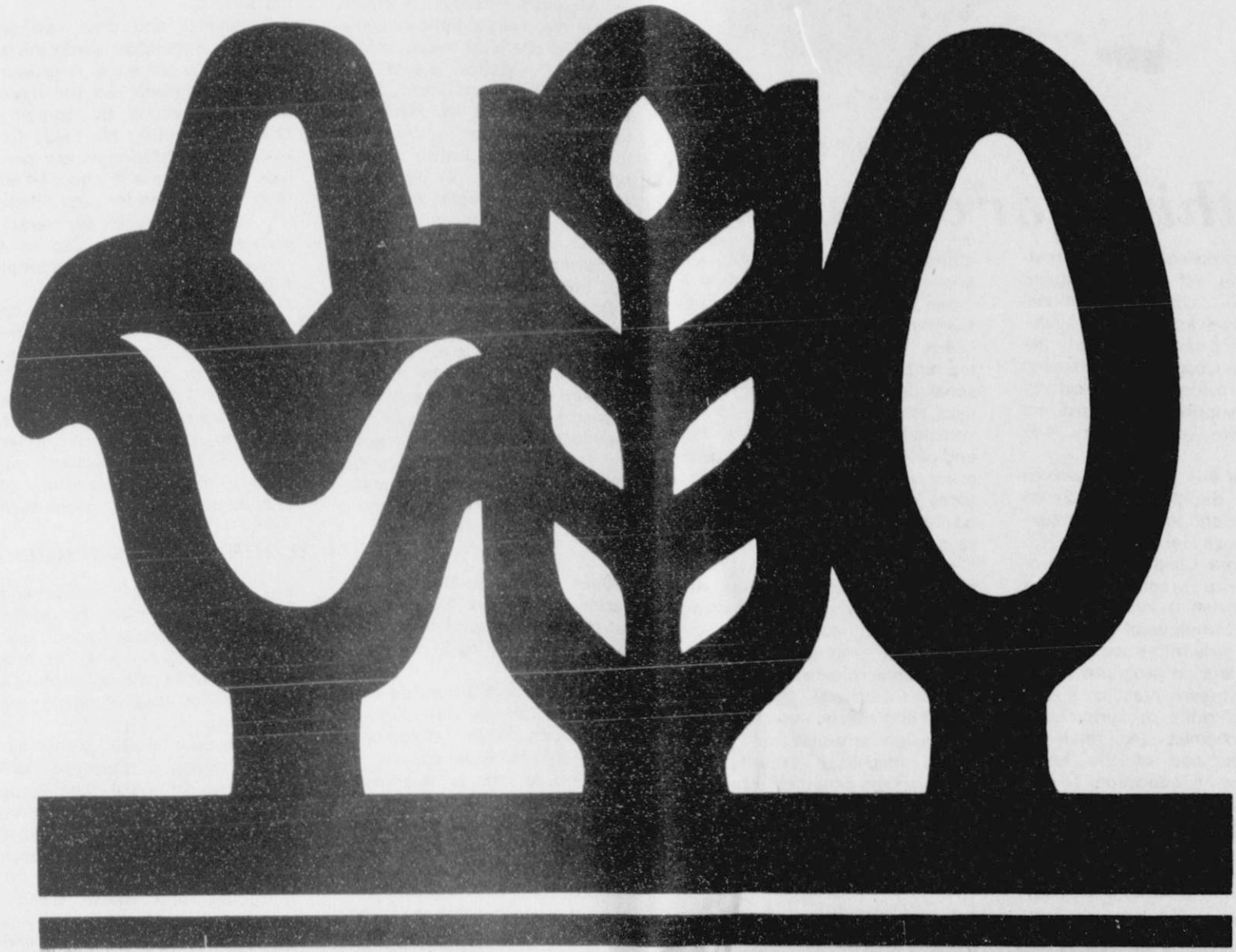
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
