McRee encourages everyone to bring their items to the show barn on Friday, October 5, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. The judging will be from 1:00-3:00 p.m. and the barn will open to the public at 5:00 p.m. to view the exhibits.

A Childrens Petting Zoo will be held in conjunction with the Hansford County Fair. Norma Jean Mackie and Gary York and the FFA students are in charge of this petting zoo and they will have small and large animals for the children to pet and see, such as:

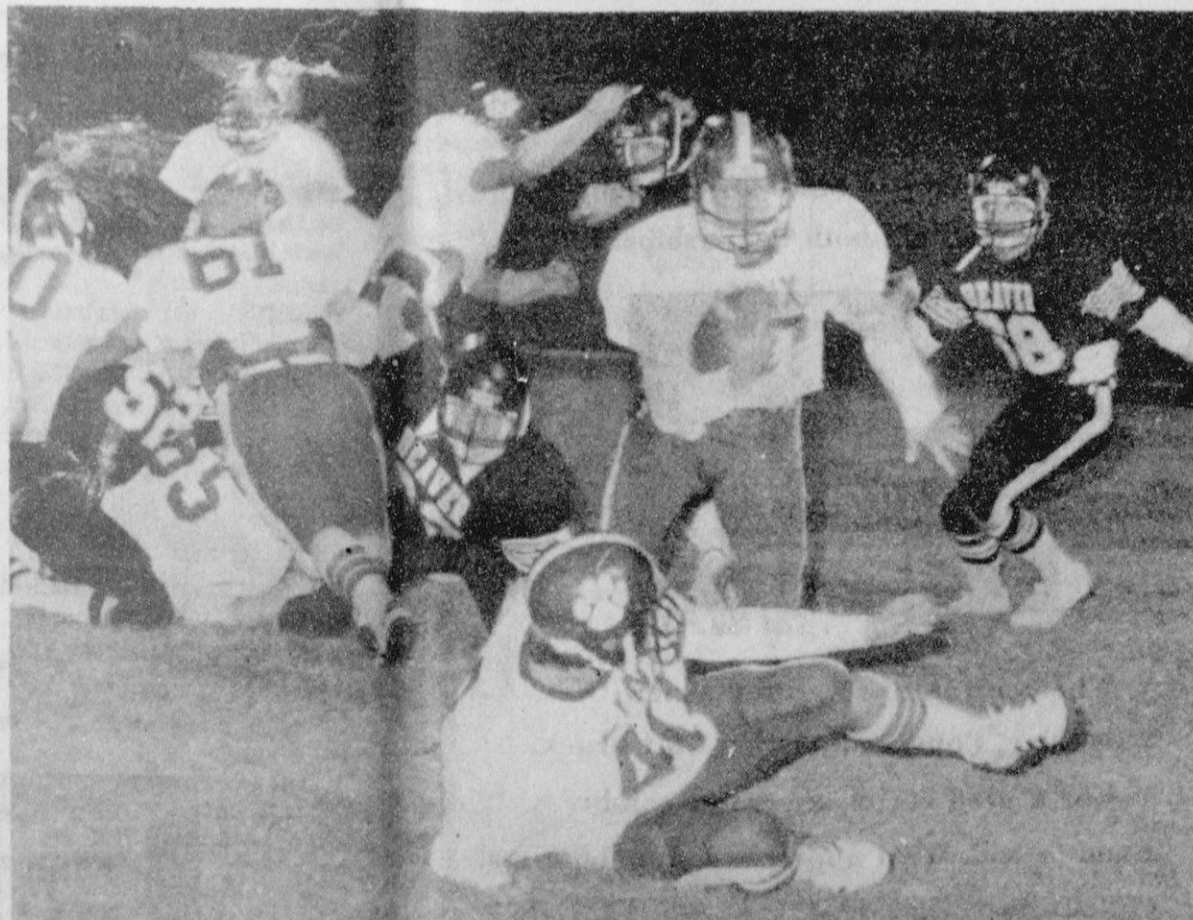

Dam prospects look better

Palo Duro River Authority director Johnny Lee is optimistic this week. Petitions calling for elections were circulated in Perryton, Stinnett, and Moore County last week. These petitions needed 50 signatures of taxpayers on them in order to call an election.

Lee reported Monday that there had been many more signatures than needed on all the petitions.

He stated that he expects the elections to be held the 3rd week in January.

The elections will be asking whether or not to support the effort, via a 2 per cent \$100 valuation tax levy.

The proposed dam is expected to cost approximately 50,000,000.

In addition to serving as a recreational lake, the Palo Duro River Authority has its sights on providing water to the city of Perryton, to Spearman, to Gruver, to Sunray, to Dumas-Cactus, and to Stinnett. Plans are on the drawing board to perhaps include Stratford in the PDRA.

The two cent tax, which the elections will call for, will be used to run and promote the authority project. Hansford County already has a 1-cent tax in effect, and if the other municipalities and counties come in the Hansford rate would go to 2 cents, too.

The tax, according to Lee, will be self-perpetuating, if approved, until the Palo Duro Dam Authority begins to sell water. Once water sales are made, the project will begin to pay for itself, according to Lee.

If the project gets into full swing, voters of the counties in question will be asked to support a tax revenue bond issue. Such an election could be held in April.

"We could start building in a year or a year and half," said Lee, who added that delivery of water could be secured by the year 1990.

As for state aid in the construction of the project, Lee is optimistic. He said the state might be willing to contribute \$10 million for storage rights as well as to purchase some of the bonds. There may be other state aid available, although nothing is concrete at this point, with an optimistic guess at upwards to 30 per cent of the project costs. That would mean the state would come up with \$15 million, while the remainder would come from the cities and counties involved. No federal help is expected.

There is an estimated \$2 billion in tax values in Hansford, Ochiltree, Moore counties and the city of Stinnett. At 2 cents, if each of the respective entities approve the move, the Palo Duro River Authority would have some \$400,000 annually in which to operate.

The lake dam when filled is expected to yield some 9.3 million gallons of water a day, of which 7.5 million gallons will be sold. The water would be allocated on a factor which looks at population and water demands. Lee pointed out the project would be built around the concept similar to that of Greenbelt Lake.

The water sales from the proposed project would cost its users \$2.14 per 1,000 gallons.

Following is the Corps of Engineers Feasibility Report on Palo Duro Creek, Canadian River Basin, Texas.

Feasibility Report on Palo Duro Creek, Canadian River Basin, Texas
28 September 1984

Completion of Studies

The Tulsa District Corps of Engineers has completed a study to determine the advisability of improvements for flood control, municipal and industrial water supply, and recreation on Palo Duro Creek in the vicinity of Spearman, Texas. A study area map is included. This report was prepared in response to a September 1976 Resolution of the Committee on Public Works and Transportation, U.S. House of Representatives.

Findings and Recommendations

The District Engineer concluded that there was a need in the Palo Duro area for water supply storage, including water treatment and conveyance facilities, as well as flood control and flat-water recreation opportunities.

The recommended plan provides for the construction of a multipurpose lake on Palo Duro Creek combined with water treatment facilities and conveyance to the communities of Spearman, Gruver, Sunray, and Perryton. The plan provides for extending the conveyance system to serve the towns of Dumas and Stinnett around the years 2015 and 2034, respectively. The 4,900 foot-long, rolled-earth embankment would be located about 34.7 miles above the mouth of Palo Duro Creek. Maximum height of the dam would be about 170 feet. The lake would cover 7,122 acres at the top of the flood control pool and, periodically, 7,574 acres at the top of the flood control pool. The conservation pool would provide a dependable yield of 7.8 million gallons per day for municipal and industrial water supply uses. The Lake would provide recreational opportunities for an estimated 120,000 visitors per year. The project would prevent an average of \$181,200 in flood damages annually. The plan also includes a regional water treatment plant which would be constructed near Spearman and a pipeline to transport the water to the user towns. Total project cost is \$138,000,000. The non-federal share would be \$111,827,000 based on traditional cost-sharing policies. The administration is reviewing project cost-sharing and financing for all types of water resource development projects. While financing for all types of water resource development projects have not yet been established, the policies ultimately adopted must be satisfactory to the President and the Congress. The benefit-to-cost ratio for the project is 1.2 to 1.0 based on average annual benefits of \$15,241,600 and average annual costs of \$12,912,000.

Before construction begins, the sponsor must agree to comply with the following requirements:

a. Agree to pay the construction cost and annual operation, maintenance, and major replacement costs allocated to water supply storage and conveyance and treatment facilities in accordance with the Water Supply Act of 1958, as amended.

b. Hold and save the United States free from all water-rights claims and damages resulting from construction and operation of the project.

c. Assume 50 percent of the separable recreation costs and 100 percent of the operation and maintenance costs for these separable recreation facilities, in accordance with Public Law 89-72.

d. Administer and assure public access to recreation facilities constructed in conjunction with the project.

I concur with the District Engineer's recommendations. However, the recommendations contained herein reflect the information available at this time and current Departmental policies governing formulation of individual projects. They do not reflect program and budgeting priorities inherent in the formulation of a national Civil Works construction program nor the perspective of higher review levels within the Executive Branch. Consequently, the recommendations may be modified before they are transmitted to the Congress as proposals for authorization and/or implementation funding.

Environmental Effects

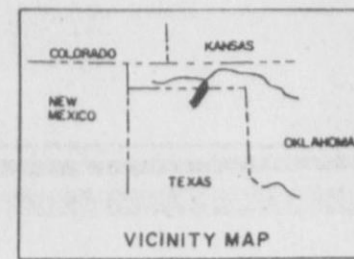
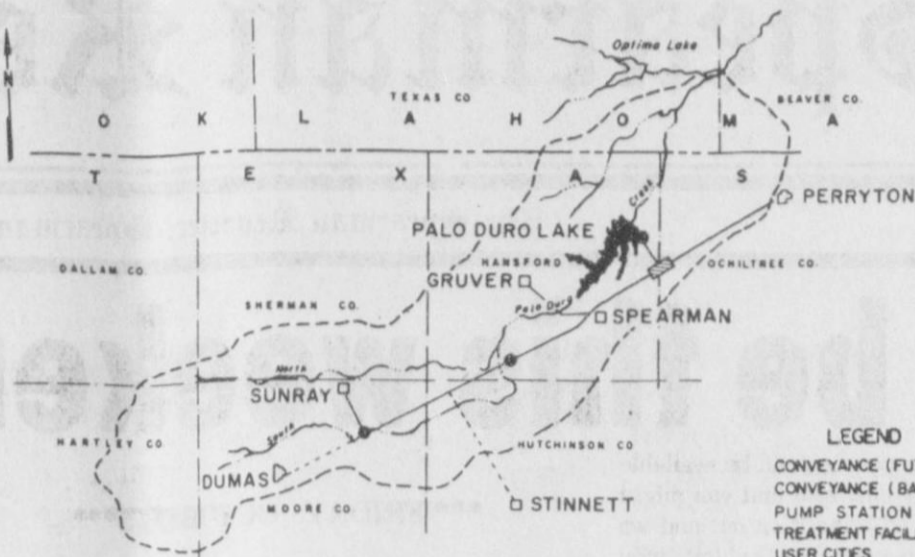
An environmental impact statement was prepared and coordinated with agencies authorized to develop and/or enforce environmental standards. The recommended plan would permanently convert 2,101 acres of terrestrial habitat to aquatic habitat and would occasionally inundate another 5,430 acres between the top of the conservation pool and the top of the flood control pool. Aquatic resources are limited because stream flow in the vicinity of the proposed dam site are intermittent. About 55 cultural resource sites would be permanently or intermittently inundated by the proposed pool. The project would stabilize and enhance long-term economic productivity of the basin by providing a dependable water supply, downstream flood protection and recreational opportunities.

Public Involvement and Participation

Public participation in the planning process has been achieved through a series of public information meetings with governing bodies, organizations, and individuals such as the mayors and city commissioners of Gruver and Spearman, Texas; Hansford County Commissioners County; presidents of the Dumas Lions Club and Rotary Club; Soil Conservation Service; Spearman Chamber of Commerce; and Palo Duro River Authority - the local sponsor. Other Federal and State agencies contributing to the study include the U.S. Geological Survey, Bureau of Reclamation, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Texas Department of Water Resources, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the North Plains Water Conservation District No. 2. In early 1983, a public workshop was held in Spearman to present preliminary study findings.

Special Issues

Two features of the recommended plan, the water conveyance and water treatment facilities, are not traditional Corps of Engineers undertakings although the Congressional study resolution specifically directed that water conveyance be considered as a component of any water supply plan. The study indicated that water treatment and conveyance facilities should be an integral part of the solution for two major reasons. First, water treatment, primarily chlorination and filtration, is essential if the local sponsor is to have a reusable product. The water must also be piped to the communities. Second, a regional treatment plant would be about \$5,000,000 cheaper than separate treatment facilities. Therefore, the District Engineer concluded that a withdrawal and conveyance system was an essential component for effective development and use of the water resource and that it would be in the national interest to incorporate water treatment facilities. The project cost of \$138,000,000 includes \$39,610,000 for conveyance facilities and \$11,300,000 for the treatment plant. All costs allocated to the water supply purpose would be reimbursed by the local sponsor.

Review Process

The Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors (BERH) at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, and the Office of the Chief of Engineers in Washington, D.C., will review the study evaluations and report findings prior to acting on my recommendation. After completing these reviews and coordinating with the Governor of Texas and interested Federal agencies, the Chief of Engineers will forward the report to the Secretary of the Army who will, in turn, review and transmit the report and assembled comments to Congress.

Views of Interested Parties

Interested parties are invited to present their views on the report to the BERH. Information furnished by mail is considered as carefully by the Board and bears the same weight as that furnished at public meetings. Any statements submitted should be new and specific in nature and should bear directly on the findings in the report. Written communications should be mailed to the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, Kingman Building, Fort Belvoir, VA 22060, in time to reach the Board by 29 October 1984.

If more time is needed, a written request stating reasons and additional time desired should be mailed to the Board as soon after receipt of this notice as possible.

VOTER REGISTRATION

All canned products must be exhibited in standard regulation glass canning jars. (Size specified for each division). No mayonnaise, coffee, or other odd jars will be accepted. All jars must have a properly sealed lid to be accepted. Jellies and preserves may be sealed with paraffin if desired. Dehydrated foods may be exhibited in closed, see-through packages.

All canning entries must have been canned after August 31, 1983, and canned from fresh products by the person exhibiting.

Fruits and vegetables must have been preserved at least two weeks before exhibition.

An entry must be made, baked, or canned, in its entirety by the individual in whose name the entry is listed.

PDWA annexation . . . Petitions circulated for water authority

Petitions asking the Palo Duro Water Authority, headquartered at Spearman, to annex Moore county began circulating Tuesday afternoon in Dumas and are expected to be filled with names by Thursday.

Fifty registered voters, must sign, with their addresses and voter registration numbers, to complete the petitions, reports Johnnie Lee of Spearman, PDWA general manager.

He expects to have the 50 signatures necessary by Thursday.

Moore county membership in the district has been talked since July when the water authority outlined plans for a \$50-million water supply project for the North Plains.

The project proposes a 2-mile long earthen dam at the junction of the Palo Duro and Horse creeks, north of Spearman.

The lake impounded behind the dam would store 69,000 acre feet of water -- enough to supply Dumas, Cactus and Sunray in Moore county; Gruver and Spearman in Hansford county, and Perryton in Ochiltree county.

Stratford and Sherman county are also being considered for membership in the district.

Included in construction costs are a water treatment plant and a 90-mile pipeline to deliver water to the member cities. Cost of the water at present is estimated at \$2.14 per 1,000 gallons.

"Once the water authority has the signed petitions, the 4-member board will call public hearings on them," Lee says. "After the hearings, an election date will be set in early January."

The PDWA now consists of Hansford county, which includes the cities of Spearman and Gruver, and a mile-square area in Moore county where the Diamond Shamrock McKee plants complex is located.

Lee says that in the annexation elections, the residents of Moore and Ochiltree counties and the City of Stinnett also will vote on a tax levy for maintenance and operation of the district.

The current tax rate is 1-cent per \$100 of value. The PDWA manager expects the rate for the larger district, with a \$2.2 billion valuation, will be two cents per \$100 of value.

The tax will be for the maintenance and operation of the water district. A revenue bond issue will be proposed for the \$50 million.

Moore county would be entitled to have four members serving on the PDWA board if voters decided to join the water authority. The directors would be appointed by county commissioners.

The membership rule would apply to both Ochiltree and Sherman counties. The City of Stinnett, however, would have one representative on the board.

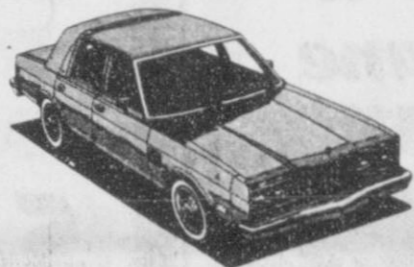
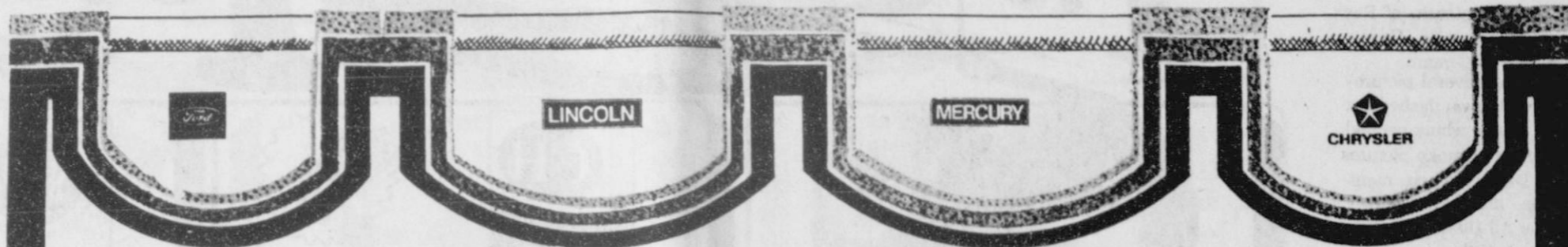

1. Cakes will not be judged in baking pans.

To a considerable degree, then, curiosity is the basis and motivation of much of the world's knowledge.

Mondale's Choice- Bold Or Not?

Ferraro: A Deer-Blacks, The South-

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Walter Mondale's selection of Geraldine Ferraro as his running mate quietly dismayed many conservative Democrats. Despite convention enthusiasm, and jubilation among many organized women's groups, they see the selection as very much a gamble.

These conservative and some moderate Democrats say, off the record: (1)-If Mondale wanted to choose a woman she should have been from the American mainstream, someone like Governor Collins in Kentucky, which would have helped the Democratic ticket in the South, where Mondale is weak.

(2)-Mondale's strength was already in the east, in states like New York. Ferraro's selection might help there. But President Reagan is certain to carry the West. So the South is thus a key area. A radical-backed Italian-American female politician won't help the Democratic ticket there much.

(3)-Ferraro was known to have argued strongly for weeks that Mondale's only consideration in the selection should relate to electoral votes. Critics say the selection should have been related to the question of who was the best qualified individual to be president.

(4)-Few House Democrats believe Ferraro is the best Democrat available to take the helm in an emergency. Some veteran House Democrats say there are a dozen better qualified Democrats in the House, but none rates Ferraro a weakling or incompetent.

As is the rule, Democrats everywhere have rallied around Ferraro. But some of the rallying-round is unconvincing. (Bert Lance's claim that Republican women were calling him and saying they would vote Democratic is suspect as putting the best face on a bad situation in the South.)

Blacks, predominantly Protestant and having supported Jesse Jackson's candidacy, are certain to vote Democratic. But will they now be enthusiastic?

Phyllis Schlafly, who beat the radical militant women's organizations in the E.R.A. fight, brands Ferraro "an advocate of the radical feminist movement." She believes a majority of women outside New York (where there are almost two million Italian-Americans) could vote against her. If that happens, the selection could prove a disaster.

But Mondale's conviction is that women in all parts of the country will vote for him as the first to put a woman on the ticket.

NO CHANGE

John McEnroe swept aside everything in his path and won the singles as most of the experts expected. The same was true of Martina Navratilova. The finals were almost an anticlimax.

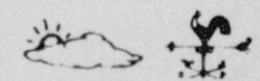
There were some fine matches on the way, however, and one wants to keep a young Australian named Cash. He could be the great white shark of tennis in the years to come. His is a powerful game.

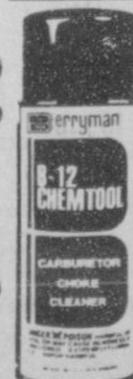

Morse man has record wheat yield

Karl Johnson of Morse has recorded a 91.4 bushel-per-acre yield, adjusted to 13.5 percent moisture, on his land with Pioneer (R) brand 2157 hard red winter wheat.

The average Texas wheat yield last year for Hansford County was 44.2 bushels per acre. A competitive brand yielded 88.8 bushels per acre in the same field.

Johnson, consistently a top producer, reports this year's weather conditions, proper management practices and proper seed selection assisted him in producing this high yield.

He planted 2157 based on the variety's disease resistance, yield potential, and drought and stress tolerance.

"Yield variabilities, to some degree, reflect quality in varietal selections," adds Dale Fain, area extension agronomy specialist at Oklahoma State University. "We recommend growers plant hard red winter seed with good grading qualities."

"Nitrogen levels also are very important," continues Fain. "so we monitor soils regularly and keep as much nitrogen near the surface as possible. This is especially critical with low-tillage practices."

2157 is a new variety offered by Pioneer. It has an excellent yield potential and resistance to Soil Borne Mosaic Virus (SBMV) and other rust diseases. In areas where SBMV was severe this

year, up to 20 percent yielded variances occurred between resistant and non-resistant varieties in several side-by-side field comparisons.

"Oklahoma farmers are losing up to 30 bushels per acre to disease, weeds and/or poor-quality planting seed," points out Charles Ikard, Oklahoma agronomist for Pioneer. "Recent research indicates that light, low quality wheat seed yields less than heavy seed of the same variety."

"Good management practices and planting improved varieties will provide the highest potential for top yields," Ikard says.

Weatherization Assistance available

Governor Mark White announced today that the Texas Department of Community Affairs has released \$2,419,613 to contractors for the continuation of the Weatherization Assistance for Low-Income Persons Program. These funds will be available for the Fiscal Year 1985 program from fuel overcharge funds set aside by the 68th Legislature for this purpose and \$419,613 supplemental grant from the FFY 1984 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) block grant funding. Additional support will be added to the Weatherization Program later in the year from the regular 1985 U.S. Department of Energy funding for this program and from the 1985 LIHEAP funding.

The Weatherization Assistance program provides help to low-income households, with priority to elderly (60+) and handicapped, in weatherizing their homes. Weatherization includes caulking around windows; weatherstripping windows and doors; repairing broken windows; and insulating attics, floors and walls. The major goal is to stop air-infiltration of the home thereby

creating a more healthful living environment, conserving energy and reducing the impact of higher fuel costs on low-income families. The maximum limit per housing unit for the program is \$1,000 unless a special waiver is obtained. Under these guidelines, approximately 2,500 homes will be weatherized with this funding.

Funds are provided through a performance-based contract to approximately 53 contractors to provide these weatherization services statewide. Distribution of the funding is based on a formula considering each area's climatic factor and the number of substandard homes.

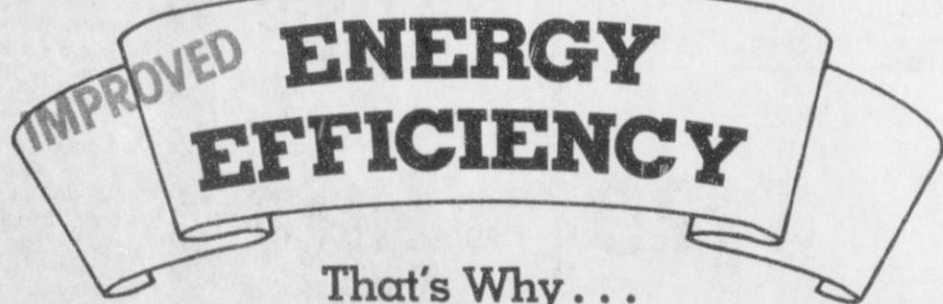

New Sales Tax in effect

Tuesday, Oct. 2, higher sales taxes on retail purchases and for services which have never before been taxed went into effect.

The tax will affect every household in Texas-it covers most repairs, from toasters to TV's.

Some service companies which have never been bothered with collecting state and city sales taxes will now have to collect the tax.

In Gruver and Spearman the tax will be 5.125 percent on a \$1 purchase since both cities have

the one percent city sales tax.

The expanded sales tax list includes alterations, tailoring services, amusements such as a theatre ticket, television cable service, professional baseball, basketball games, rodeos, horse shows, pet shows where admission is charged, dances and amusement rides.

The tax also applies to newspaper, magazine subscriptions.

Taxes on the local paper will be 1 cent if bought singly and \$1.28 on the \$25.00 in county yearly subscription rate.

- Any person violating the general or special rules as published in this premium list will forfeit all privileges and premiums won.
- The Hansford County Fair Board, its officers, and its employees shall not in any way be held responsible for loss, damage or injury to articles, livestock or person, while same is on the Fairgrounds. The Fair Board will take all reasonable precautions to protect the property and exhibits of the concessionaires and exhibitors but will not be liable for, or make payment for any article, animal or property lost, damaged or injured while on the Fairgrounds.
- No claim or suit for injury to any person or property shall be asserted against the Hansford County Fair Board, its officers or agents, by any person, firm or corporation, or their agent, representatives, servants or employees having permits to exhibit or occupy space on the Exposition grounds.
- Any exhibit stand, show or concession falsely entered shall, at the option of the Executive Committee, be removed from the Exposition grounds without any reason being assigned therefore and the refunding of any money paid for such space will be left to the discretion of the Hansford County Executive Committee.
- All entries shall be subject to the special rules of the department under which they are entered. In case of conflict between general and special rules, the latter shall govern.
- All protests shall be passed on by the Executive Committee and must be made in writing accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for protesting; together with a deposit fee of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Parties interested will be notified of the time and place for considering the protest and will be given an opportunity to submit evidence. All protests should be made within 24 hours of the final judging.

HORTICULTURE

All entries must come from gardens or fields where the entrant had done the work or assisted with the work required to raise the product. Characteristics must be "true to type." All specimens in an entry must be uniform in size, shape, color and maturity. All specimens must be trimmed alike, at prime eating quality-never too old or too young, never scratched or bruised. Free from insect and disease damage, drought and nutrient deficiency injury. Must be exhibited clean without having a scrubbed appearance. Leafy vegetables should be briefly soaked and gently sprayed with water, then stored in a cool, damp place for the short period before the show. Fruiting vegetables should be rubbed lightly with a soft cloth as they are rinsed under a gentle stream of water, then carefully dried and stored in a dry, cool place. Root crops should be soaked for several minutes immediately after harvest, and then rubbed gently with a soft cloth under running water to remove soil. Never scrub or brush vegetables intended for a show. Vegetables and fruits should be displayed on a large, white, paper plate.

Karen's Kooky Korner

With literally thousands of cookbooks on the market, from "Cooking with Apples" to "The Cuisine of Zimbabwe," selecting one for yourself or as a gift for a friend is no easy chore.

The first question to ask is what do you, or your friend, want from a cookbook? Almost everyone needs one or two standard cookbooks which will provide a wealth of practical food information and accurate recipes.

Beyond that, consider whether you want the book for background information or good reading. For international cookbooks, authenticity is the key. If the recipes are adapted and use American shortcuts, you may get some tasty dishes but they won't be "foreign."

Make sure that cookbooks on entertaining fit your budget, lifestyle and skills. A book on formal dining might be interesting, but not very useful if outdoor barbecues are more your style of entertaining.

Here are some other guidelines for deciding among cookbooks:

- What kind of recipes does the book contain? Are they what you need and want?
- Are the ingredient listings specific enough that you would know what to buy?

•Does it state the size of the equipment, such as the measurements of pans for baking?

•Are oven temperatures specified? Do the recipes tell you what the food should like like when done or give other detailed cooking instructions?

•Is the book padded with irrelevant recipes or information? Since cookbooks can be costly, consider whether you're getting your money's worth.

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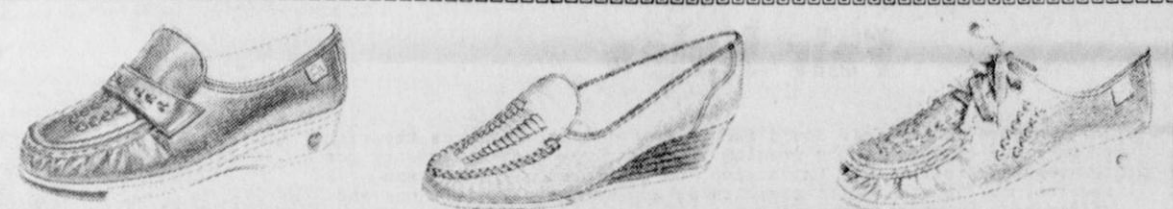

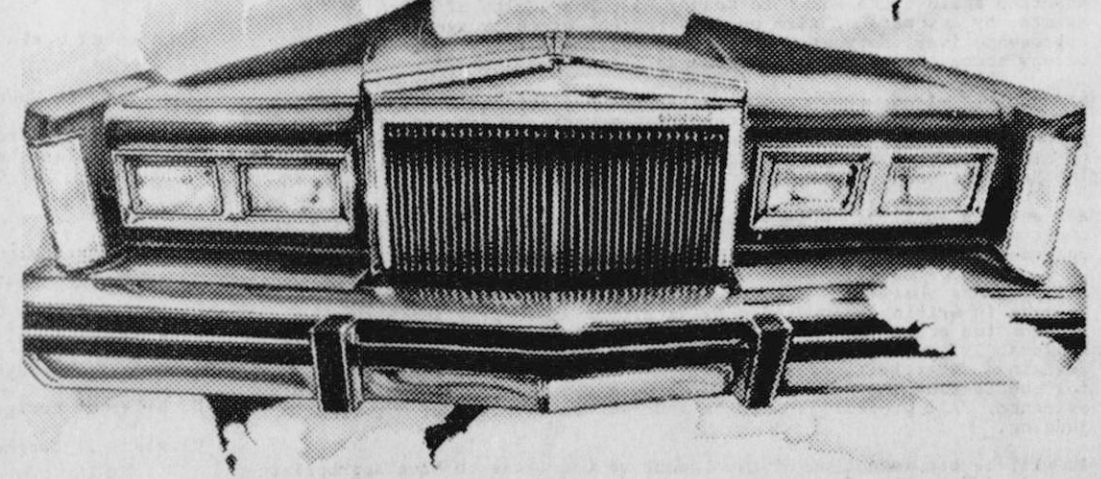
