Two killed at Old Hansford

Two men were killed and six injured—two of the critically—in the grinding, broadside crash of a car and pickup some six miles west of Spearman Monday afternoon.

Brothers Jose Luis Rodriguez, 22, and Reuben Rodriguez, 20, both of 313 S.E. 5th St., Perryton, died in the twisted wreckage of the 1973 Dodge Challenger in which they were passengers, according to the investigating officer, Department of Public Safety Trooper Max Gunn.

Fred Clifford White, 25, of 103 N. Elm, Perryton, the driver of the Dodge, and Timothy Geno Gaines, 27, of 110 Fordham, Perryton, the other passenger in the car, were rushed to Hansford Hospital in Spearman, then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital where they underwent surgery Monday evening and were listed in critical condition, Gunn said.

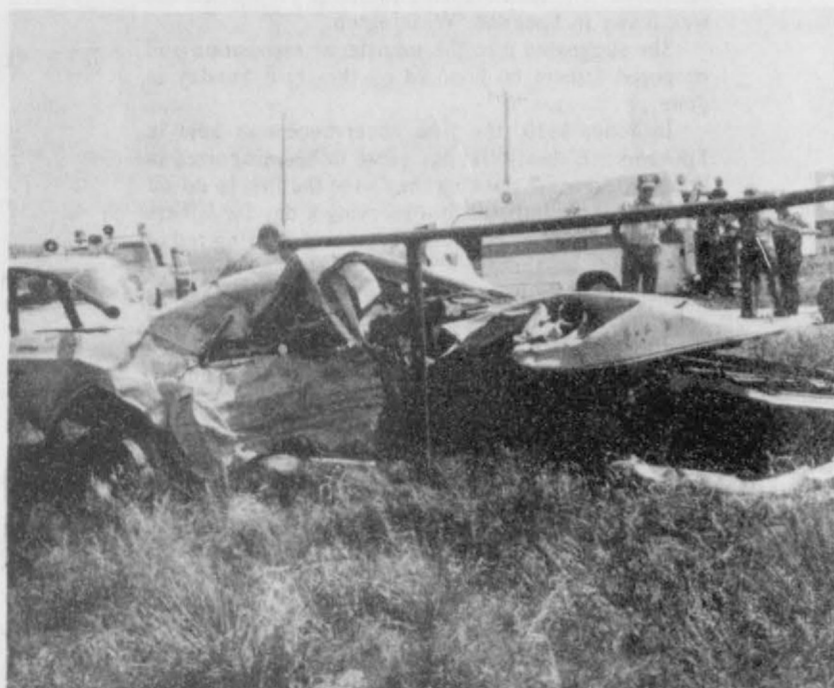
The four men in the car were all employees of Lloyd Jones Co., an oilfield servicing company. They were travelling east on State Highway 15 when the car in which they were riding was in a collision with a westbound 1977 Chevrolet pickup driven by Paul Glen McClendon, 23, of 217 S.E. 3rd St., Perryton.

McClendon and the passengers in the pickup, Albert C. Morris, III, 21, of 1214 S. Eaton, Perryton; Gary Don Umphress, 20, of 1202 Lancaster, Perryton; and Daniel Ray Juarez, 20, of 601 S. Fordham, Perryton, were taken to Hansford Hospital. McClendon, Umphress and Juarez were listed in satisfactory condition at the hospital Monday evening. Morris was treated and released.

The four men in the pickup were all employees of Service Drilling Co. of Perryton, Gunn said.

The accident occurred 6.2 miles west of Spearman, where a three-lane stretch of Hwy. 15 topped a hill. Gunn said the westbound pickup was on the wrong side of the road, and White apparently veered the car into the westbound lane to avoid a crash. But the pickup returned to the far westbound lane, slamming broadside into the right side of the Dodge.

Jose Rodriguez was sitting in the right front seat and his brother Reuben in the right rear when the crash occurred.

Board has busy meet

Spearman Independent School District trustees accepted the resignation of Peggy Lindley, hired four teachers and a library aide, reset the date for the July school board meeting, and heard a number of reports during regular session Monday night.

The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Lindley, wife of the Rev. Al Lindley, former pastor of First United Methodist Church who is moving to Perryton to accept a pastorate there.

Mrs. Lindley who as a Learning and Language Disabilities teacher in the Special Education program here has accepted a position in the Perryton school system.

The board hired Linda Wilkerson to teach Language and Learning Disabilities classes in the kindergarten through fourth grades; Carla McCarter to teach elementary and junior high girls' physical education and serve as assistant coach in high school girls' athletics; Mike Hoover to teach social studies, boys physical education and serve as assistant coach; Paul Ruiz, to teach high school social studies; and Charla Friday as elementary and Junior high library aide.

The trustees voted to move the July meeting date from the 11th to the 18th as Supt. James Cunningham will be gone to the 16th annual IDEA Academy of Fellows for school administrators on July 11.

Brown, Graham and Company of Spearman was chosen by the trustees as the CPA firm to handle the 1982-83 Spearman ISD audit.

Board members heard a report from Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Appraisal District. Mrs. Peddy told the trustees the school district is receiving a refund of \$20,222.42 from the appraisal district because the cost of operating the appraisal district was not as great as budgeted.

She also reported tax collections for the 1982 tax roll are 97.1 percent of the total.

The board also had a first reading on policy amendments and additions required by state regulations and heard a lengthy annual superintendent's report given by Cunningham.

Groundbreaking for museum

PROPOSAL

The Spearman Santa Fe Depot building has been donated to the Stationmaster's House Museum of Hansford County. In order to make the best use of our present site, existing building, and the depot, the members of the Museum board make the following proposals:

1. Attach the depot to the existing building via a 17' X 15' extension from existing building.
2. Place depot over full basement.
3. Place depot and basement North and South behind the existing building.
4. Develop angle parking along street to South of buildings.

The proposals have several advantages. The addition would have an outside entrance which would be handicap accessible. The stairs to the basement would be housed here as well as office space which is currently housed in the very cramped back porch of the Museum. An enclosed connection between the two buildings would also keep the insurance rates lower and security for our collections would be higher than if the buildings were separate.

The enclosed photographs show both buildings. By adding onto the rear of the house, the basic facade is not changed. The outstanding features of both buildings are maintained and the needed extra space is obtained through the addition. An entry with a ramp located on the South side of this space will provide an additional entrance for the public. This area will act as an alternate fire escape and a secured entrance to the basement for public use. The depot and house could be locked separately to keep both buildings secure.

Commissioners Court accepts resignation

Following a closed session on personnel, Hansford County Commissioner's Court voted Monday to accept the resignation of county employee Harold King.

King was a road foreman for the county. No replacement for King was named during the open session. In open session accepted low bids on a mower and on insurance, and held a public hearing on the 1983-84 fiscal year budget which goes into effect Oct. 1.

The commissioners voted to accept the bid of \$6,535 from North Plains Implement Co. for the mower over two other higher bids. The mower is earmarked for use in Precinct 1.

A bid of \$7,042 from Brock Insurance, the lowest of two bids, was accepted by the commissioners for one year's general liability insurance for employees and for coverage of the courthouse on such items as fire and theft.

By using the same shingles and similar siding, the joining addition will maintain a continuance of line and form.

The available lot space was also a deciding factor in the placement of the depot. By placing it north and south, the space between the depot and the alley could be fenced and used for equipment storage such as vintage farm equipment as well as maintenance equipment. This would enable the equipment to be stored properly as well as protected from vandalism and weather. The north and south placement also provides for a visually pleasing effect as well as providing space for future development of the lot.

Being a public building, more parking space will be required. By utilizing city-owned land to the south along the street, ample angle parking can be acquired by removing the curb and paving the 12' into the lot. The ramp will be added to the connecting addition for entry into the museum from this parking area.

As members of the Museum Board, we feel that this is a good proposal and worthy of your consideration and approval.

Today's trend toward smaller living areas means less space for storage. The purpose of storage is to provide a place for items not in use or until they are needed. But most of us have more items to be stored than space in which to store them.

A family storage plan can help utilize limited storage space more effectively. Start by assessing your storage needs. Take a close look at your family's size, composition and lifestyle.

Family composition makes a difference since storage needs change as family members grow and change. In planning for storage space anticipate changes that will take place during the next five years. You may need space to store games and toys right now, for example, but five years from now

you will need space to store teenagers' records and stereo equipment.

Lifestyle must also be considered when planning for storage. Consider storage for hobbies and recreational equipment, whether you live formally or informally and how often you entertain. All of these things will affect the amount and type of storage needed by the family. If you hate to dust and dislike clutter, for instance, adding open shelving for storage wouldn't make much sense.

Examine your home's existing storage space next. Take note of the type, size and flexibility of the present storage facilities. Categorize facilities into built-in or portable storage. Now you are ready to match objects with available storage space.

Take an inventory of items to be stored. Solve part of your storage problem by cleaning out closets and discarding unused items. As you take your inventory note the area where the item is normally used, how often it is used, its approximate height, depth and length and the number of items of this type to be stored.

Now you are ready to develop a storage plan. In deciding where to store an item, keep in mind these simple principles:

- * Store items near their place of first or last use.
- * Place items within easy reach.
- * Keep items that will be used together in the same place.
- * Store things where they will be protected from damage or adverse conditions.

When you are satisfied with your plan, move items to their new location. As your family changes and your storage needs change, reconsider your storage plan to be sure it still meets your needs.

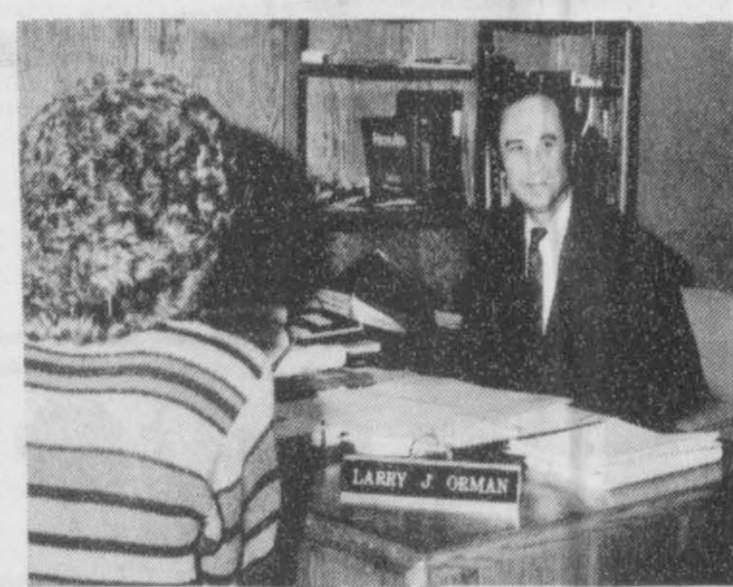

BUSINESS OUTLOOK

One of the more interesting revelations about the bull market of recent months was the disclosure that some of the blue-chip stocks which rose were, in fact, being sold by the institutions.

The big surprise, according to the findings of Computer Directions Advisors, as reported by the Wall Street Journal, is that institutions sold \$394 million of IBM stock from January through March.

Normally, this kind of selling would have depressed almost any stock. But IBM went up, in spite of this institutional selling.

IBM advanced \$5 in the first quarter of 1983. The conclusion must, therefore, be that individuals are back in the market, in strength. The second biggest blue-chip unloaded by the institutions in this period was Exxon, sold to the tune of \$319 million worth by the institutions. Yet Exxon also rose in price.

Other stocks which institutional portfolios sold heavily in the first quarter were General Electric and Minnesota Mining. Both also rose in price.

The strength of the bull market, then, shook off very heavy institutional selling, an impressive indication of broadness of this bull market.

The favorite stock bought by the institutions in the first quarter was an old favorite--American Telephone & Telegraph.

The institutions added \$615 million worth of Ma Bell's shares to their portfolios. Also bought heavily were Signal Cos., Chrysler, Merrill Lynch, Union Pacific, Boeing and Lockheed.

Birth defects seminar planned

HELP CHANGE THE FUTURE....WHY? A community is only as healthy as its children are, who will be the leaders of tomorrow.

The nation's most serious child health problem is birth defects, which every year strikes more than 250,000 babies. They suffer from mental retardation, deafness, blindness, missing limbs, defective blood cells or body chemistry disorders. Babies born prematurely probably have a better chance of survival in the U.S. than anywhere else in the world, thanks to enormous medical strides of past decades. Yet in spite of this, our nation stands embarrassingly behind 16 others in reducing infant mortality.

Doctor Talk

Harold B. Ligon, MD

I've found in private practice that the Influenza A and B vaccines administered in early fall require about six weeks for maximal effect--and are about 70% effective.

Moreover, the vast majority of the 30% who go on and contract the disease have a much lighter clinical case, in general.

There are two messages today. Firstly, there are no effective antibiotics the doctor can prescribe for these viruses. Secondly, some vaccines are effective in prevention.

I recommend the Influenza vaccine yearly (the vaccine may vary from one year to the next, depending on the anticipated threatening viral strain) in the early fall to all adults--and especially to those who are prone to respiratory disease and chronic pulmonary illness.

We have spoken of numerous person-to-person viruses, as above. Of the zoonoses, only a couple are generally known and merit discussion: yellow fever and rabies.

Americans became familiar with yellow fever by virtue of our national interest and involvement in the Panama Canal Zone.

Yellow fever is generally confined to central Africa and areas of Central and South America. It's an acute infection which can be intensely severe.

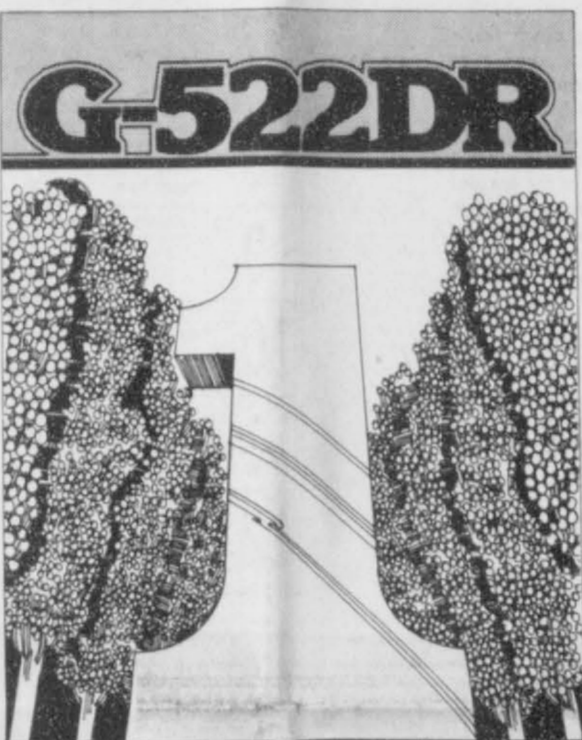

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- How's the new U.S. Football League doing? Tentative statistics are not discouraging.

Some teams seem likely to make money or break even this first year--Denver, which has had its troubles, Tampa and Oakland.

The lowest attendance in the league is at Boston, where the Breakers have averaged only something over 10,000 per game as this is written. They may move.

Yet TV ratings are comparable to NFL TV ratings when the NFL began play. And average attendance at games (25,000 plus as of June 1) is about what the NFL experienced.

The USFL will expand

next year. Teams have already been added in Pittsburgh, Houston and San Diego, and others will be added.

TV money, which really made the league possible, is assured for another year. ABC and ESPN have boosted league capital by \$35 million. And each new team must pay \$6 million to join the league.

So 1984 seems certain to be better--better football and more teams. This time next year the future of the USFL will be much clearer.

By then it will be known whether TV ratings and attendance are moving up or down. Thus far, they're in line with the NFL record in its first year.

RECIPE

By Sarah Anne Sheridan
Old-Fashion baked rice pudding is a good way to use leftover rice.

Rice Pudding

- 1/2 c sugar
- 1/2 t salt
- 1 T flour
- 2 egg yolks
- 3 c milk
- 1 c cooked rice
- 1 t vanilla
- 1/4 c raisins

Combine sugar, salt, flour and cornstarch. In top of a double boiler beat egg yolks slightly. Add sugar mixture and milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until it begins to thicken. Add rice, raisins and vanilla. Pour into a 2 quart baking dish and place in a pan of water (about 1 inch and bake for 10 minutes in a 325 degree oven. Add meringue and bake 20 minutes longer or until brown.

Meringue

- 2 egg whites
- small pinch of salt
- 1/2 t vanilla
- 1/4 c sugar

Beat whites with vanilla and salt until barely stiff. Continue beating while adding sugar gradually. Beat another 1/2 minute. Put on pudding by spoonfuls spreading to edge of dish.

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Planning ahead for a tornado

LUBBOCK—Planning ahead and putting as many walls as possible between your family and a tornado will enhance your chances for survival if your home is struck by the plague of the plains.

Dr. James R. McDonald, who along with other members of Texas Tech University's Civil Engineering Department has been studying tornadoes for more than a decade, said evaluating your home for the strongest room or closet and acquainting family members with a plan of action can save time and lives in an emergency.

"The safest place is still inside a substantial building," McDonald said. "This could be anything from a residence on up to a well-engineered building. Basements are still probably the best place to seek shelter if they are available. If not, the concept of using an interior closet, bathroom or small room is your best bet."

A general guide in determining the best spot, McDonald said, is to have as many walls as possible between you and the outside. Such a shelter should be in the interior of the house and away from exterior walls.

Although tornadoes generally travel from the southwest to the northeast, the winds of a funnel cloud can strike from any exterior wall, because of their rotation, and create hazards of any exterior wall, McDonald said.

"An interior shelter not only gives you protection from the forces of the wind, but also from the impact of flying debris and what we call tornado-generated missiles," McDonald said.

McDonald said there are several misconceptions about tornado preparations, including the precaution of opening all your windows. Benefits of opening windows have been shown by Texas Tech's Insti-

tute of Disaster Research to be of nominal benefit at best and in some cases actually detrimental to the safety of your building or residence. Those findings on window openings have been accepted by the National Weather Service which no longer recommends the procedure.

"You can best spend your time finding a safe place rather than opening windows," McDonald said.

McDonald also cautioned persons living in what the industry calls manufactured homes, or mobile homes as the public generally calls them.

"There has been some publicity in recent weeks stating that these types of homes are as safe as conventionally built residences," he said. "Our evidence does not indicate that and, in fact, most of deaths this year in the state of Texas have been of people living in manufactured-type homes."

The manufactured-home industry has made structural improvements in constructing these units in recent years, McDonald said, but they are still not built to withstand the strong winds of thunderstorms and particularly tornadoes. From a safety aspect, such housing units tend to roll and tumble even though they may be tied down and anchored to specifications.

McDonald said some mobile home parks on the South Plains and nationally are providing or planning storm shelters for their residents. The Institute for Disaster Research offers as a public service plans and specifications for above ground shelters which are large enough to double as a recreation area or some other function.

Plans also are available for constructing an interior storm shelter in new conventional homes or for modifying a room in an existing home.

Knowing when to head for shelter remains a key to protecting yourself and your family, McDonald said, because few people in an area a tornado will strike can actually see its approach.

sight one should not get in a vehicle and try to outrun it in town traffic.

"The Wichita Falls tornado demonstrated this so clearly because 26 of the 40 deaths were in autos," McDonald said. "Only two people died in their homes."

Prepare for Summer Driving

Motorists should prepare themselves for summer driving, according to Major Vernon Cawthon, Commander of Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety. With summer approaching many people are planning vacations and he warned drivers that accidents can spoil vacation trips.

"Summer driving is different because the motorist is trying to get away from it all, and this means getting into unfamiliar environments," he said. "A good rule is to plan your trip before leaving and know highway numbers and streets that you will travel," Cawthon said.

"For the urban driver the expressway can become a bore, luring the weary into a false sense of security. Drivers who normally drive on quiet country roads can panic in the confusion of the multilane mix of car and pedestrian city traffic," he said.

Cawthon said, "Fatigue and lack of alertness is a serious problem on long freeway trips." He advised the motorist to stop every two hours to rest or change drivers and to never drive more than 10 hours each day.

The Major suggested that motorists check all hoses, fan belts, tires and to make sure the vehicle is in good mechanical condition before making any trip. He also advised motorists to get plenty of rest each night. Motorists entering large cities should plan their trips to avoid rush hour traffic, obey speed limits, avoid the use of alcohol when driving and be patient. Drivers who think ahead, stay alert and drive defensively can have a safe trip and a great vacation.

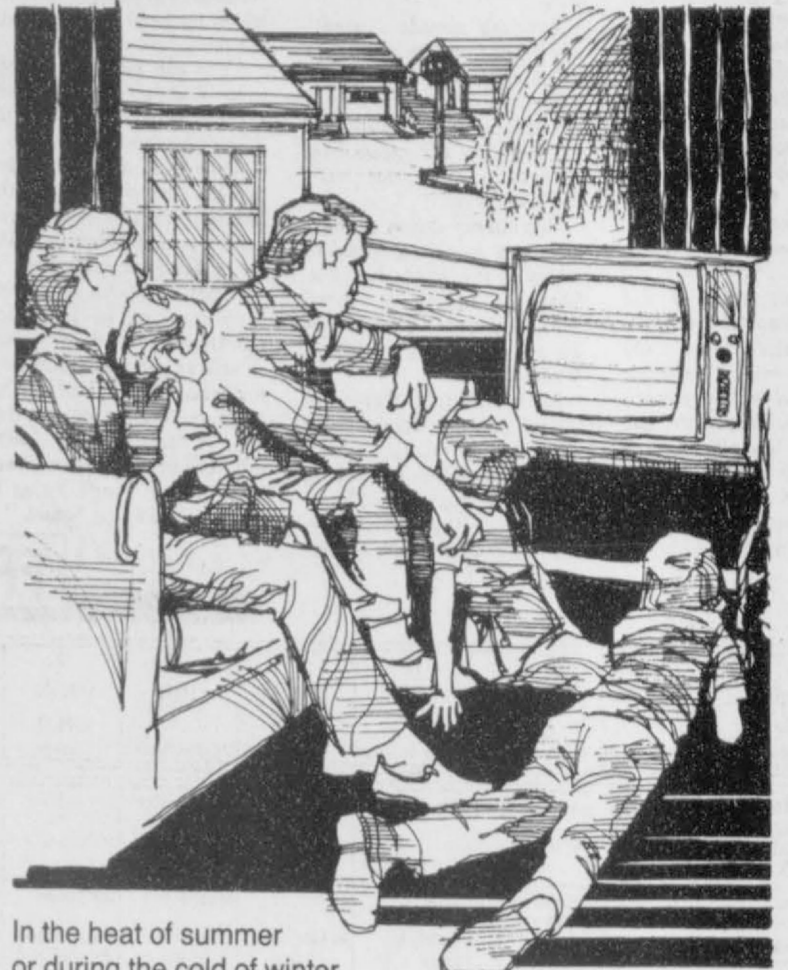

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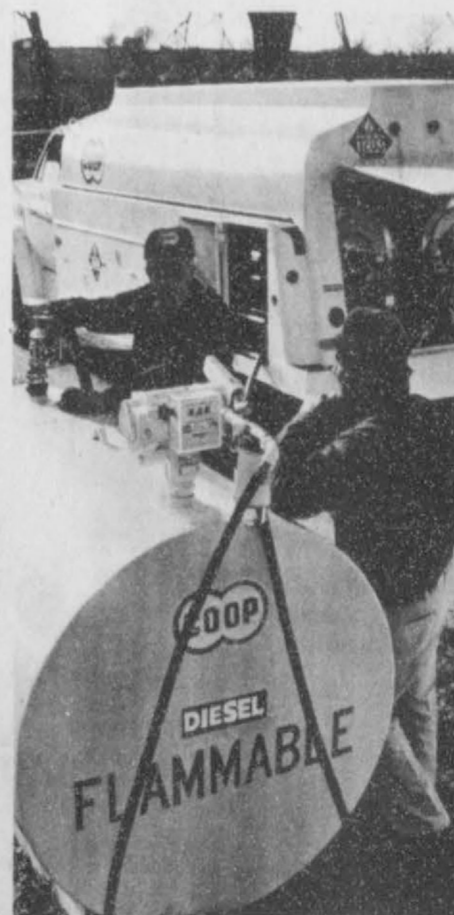
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Sneak preview at Rotary

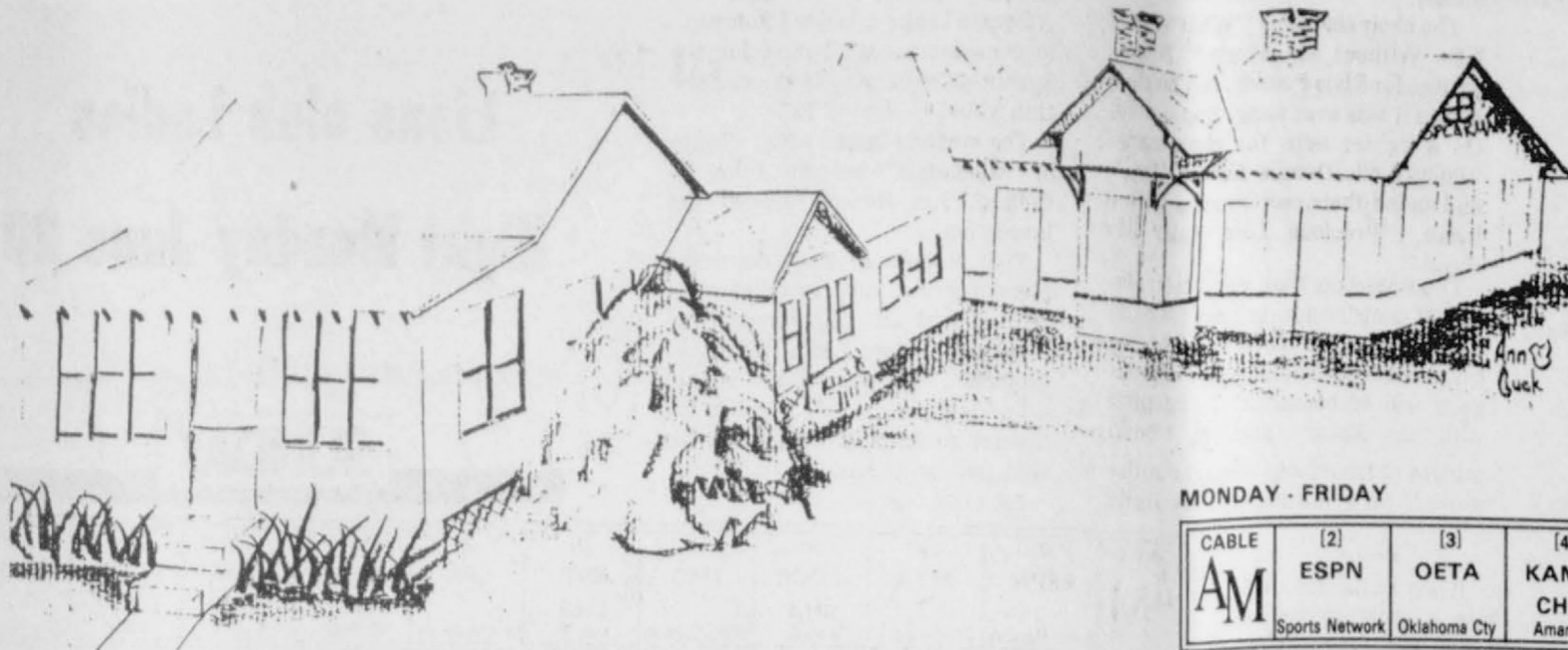
