Lynx nip 'Hounds in memorable showdown

Superlatives fail. This is the one they won't forget, in Spearman or Gruver. The final score was close, 22-18, Lynx, but that doesn't begin to tell the story.

It was homecoming Friday night for the Gruver Greyhounds and the overflow crowd was treated to pre-game and halftime pageantry. But it was the game itself—a fiery rivalry between Hansford County's only two high school football teams—that gave the fans on both sides of the field unforgettable thrills.

For they saw a tremendous, emotion-charged performance by both teams. To the delighted shouts of their homecoming fans, the upset minded Greyhounds struck with lightning rapidity on two razzle dazzled plays, a 44-yard halfback pass on their first play from scrimmage that set up a 24-yard end around scamper for a touchdown and a quick 6-0 Gruver lead.

The 'Hounds kicked off to open the game, and three running tries by the Lynx came up one yard short of a first down, and they punted.

On Gruver's first play from scrimmage, quarterback Chad Logsdon took the snap, and pitched to tailback Rodney Clawson on a play that looked like a sweep right. But as he neared the sideline, Clawson heaved a long pass to swift split end Marshall Cator.

Cator was downed at the Spearman 21. A fast stiffening Lynx defense and a five yard procedure penalty left the 'Hounds facing a third and 13 at the Spearman 24 and it looked like the Lynx would escape the threat. Then on the next play, the 'Hounds worked a slick reverse on an end-around by Cator. The play caught the Lynx defense flowing in the wrong direction and the slender right end raced around the left end and crossed the goal line untouched, a 24-yard scoring dash.

The kick try for point after touchdown was wide and Gruver led with 8:44 left in the first half.

Then it was the Spearman fans turn to scream with glee, as Lynx Mac McLain recovered a 'Hound fumble at midfield and Spearman drove in 11 plays for a touchdown. Aoe running back Julio Vasquez gained 28 on a pitch right.

Vasquez twisted up the middle for three yards, then Lopez fought his way to the 18. The scrambling, gambling Gruver defense almost held. An illegal procedure call before the snap set the Lynx back to the Gruver 23, and a red and black uniformed defender broke through to spill the Lynx ball carrier for a loss on the next play.

Lynx Quarterback Ross Danahue and wide receiver McLain teamed to gain part of it back on a sideline pass to the 18.

Donahue came right back to McLain again, lofting a pass over the defense. Lunging, McLain could only get his finger tips on the ball as the first quarter wound down.

On the first play of the second quarter, Donahue came through again, drilling a strike over the middle to Ricky Lopez who was downed at the six.

For the fourth straight play, Donahue took to the air, lofting a

pass into the end zone. Without turning McLain bent his head back, reached up and took the lob as it cleared his helmet. He tucked the ball in for a touchdown as he was spilled by a shoestring tackle.

Big Mark Guthrie toed the ball through the uprights on the PAT kick and it was 7-6, Spearman, with 11:29 still to play in the first half.

This game had just about everything, even the seldom seen quick kick. Gruver halted a Spearman drive at the Greyhound 15, but could not move the ball and on third and 11 from the 14, the 'Hounds quick kicked, the ball rolling dead at the Gruver 48.

Against the bristling 'Hound defense, the Lynx lost a yard in three tries, but Sutterfield kicked the Hounds into a hole with a punt the Gruver three.

Clawson gained three yards to the six to give the Greyhounds breathing room, and Rod Been second efforted his way to the 11. Another Clawson run carried the ball to the 15, but it all went for nothing for on the next play the option pitch was wide. Lynx Paul Lopez dashed across the line, scooped up the rolling ball and carried it into the end zone. As fumbles can only be recovered, not picked up, the TD did not count, but the Lynx had the ball, just three yards from the Gruver goal.

With the final seconds of the half ticking away, the fans were on their feet, Spearman's shrieking for the TD. Gruver's for the 'Hound goal-line defense to hold. A penalty gained the Lynx half the distance to the goal, and on the next play Vasquez slammed across the goal-line, but an illegal procedure call nullified the touchdown and set the Lynx back to the seven. Donahue kept to the three, but his second and goal pass to big strong end Steve Burke was too tall.

The 'Hounds stopped a pitch left to Vasquez for no gain and the half was over, the Lynx taking their point, 7-6 advantage off the field.

Lightning does strike twice in the same place—the Greyhounds proved it. Just as in their first offensive play of the game, the 'Hounds went for the "homerun" pass on the first scrimmage play of the second half. Agin it worked, this time for a 62-yard scoring play.

On first and 10 from the Gruver 39, Logsdon led Clawson perfectly dropping the ball into the fleet tailback's hands squarely between stride and knifed between the two converging Lynx defensive backs. They collided and fell to the turf and he romped into the endzone for a touchdown. Just 16 seconds into the third quarter, Gruver was back in front, 12-7.

On a two point conversion attempt, Logsdon, threatened by a massive Lynx rush, fired a pass toward Doug Garrett. Garrett dived for the ball but it was too low and the attempt failed.

The next offensive tries by both teams failed to generate much yardage, although the Lynx did gain a couple of first downs on the

Spearman Lynx to 'snake hunt'

In the best physical shape they've been in for several weeks, the Spearman Lynx travel to Stinnett to take on the highly regarded Rattlers in a non-conference football contest Friday. The game starts at 8 p.m.

Lynx Head Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier said the Spearman team escaped Friday's grueling 22-18 victory over Gruver without injuries "and that's a first for us."

Ever since the first pre-season scrimmage the Lynx have been plagued by injuries. Each week more players were added to the "infirmary" list. Against Sanford-Fritch on Sept. 9, four key players, all linemen, some of the biggest players in weight on the team, were out with injuries. Others have been playing at less than full speed.

Lanier said the uniqueness of not having someone injured in the Gruver game was best expressed by Mark Guthrie, the Lynx' standout 211-pound guard.

The coach said Guthrie called out after the victory over Gruver. "Hey, this is a new beginning—we didn't have anybody injured in the game."

According to Lanier, none of the players already injured will be coming off the incapacitated list this week. But he said that Kevin Slaten, the team's 203-pound "quick" tackle, will be at full speed for the first time after suffering a shoulder injury early in the Stratford game.

Billy Haden, 209-pound senior who has been out of action since the pre-season scrimmages, will not be able to play against Stinnett, but he's out of a cast now, and will be back in action in two weeks.

As for Stinnett, "Like always, they'll be rough and tough. They have a good team and good coaching."

The Rattlers should be hungry, as they are winless in two starts. They lost their first game 17-0 to

Panhandle, but made a very credible showing against the state's top ranked 2-A team.

Two weeks ago they battled to a 22-22 draw with a well-regarded Shamrock team that has been surprising experts with their strong showings.

Stinnett has 14 lettermen returning, including six offensive and eight defensive starters from last year's 5-5 team. The Rattlers were 5-2 in 1-2A last year but their losses were 26-25 to White Deer and 21-17 to Stratford. Should district favorite Stratford falter, Stinnett is the

Steve Allen, the entertainer and humorist, took off his glasses the other day. It wasn't to get contact lenses, or a new pair of glasses or even to clean the glasses he has.

"I just spent a few minutes looking at a blurry world," Mr. Allen said, "so I could understand what it's like not to be able to afford to see."

Social service agencies estimate that there are millions of people throughout the world who need glasses but lack the money or access to get them. Thousands of these people are Americans.

Steve Allen, who has worn glasses for "almost a century", has decided to help. He recently volunteered his services to New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., a charity group devoted to providing eyeglasses for those who can't afford them. As New Eyes for the Needy spokesman, Mr. Allen is leading the Short Hills, New Jersey group's appeal for donations.

"We don't want your money," he said. "That's what's so unique about New Eyes. All we want is your old glasses."

New Eyes for the Needy collects discarded eyeglasses, along with old watches, jewelry and silver, and sells the precious metal to a refiner. This finances the group's entire operation, which last year provided new glasses for more than 8,500 Americans.

Over 200,000 pairs of plastic-framed glasses were catalogued and sent overseas.

According to New Eyes president Joan Daeschler, the group has brought better vision to over 2 million people worldwide since it was founded 51 years ago. More than 200 volunteers currently work at the organization, sorting, testing, and cataloging eye-

glasses. Others open the mail, which sometimes includes thank you's for eyeglasses sent to places as far away as Sierra Leone and West Cameroon.

Mr. Allen, with his glasses back on, summed up the group's feeling. "It's one of the few ways you can really do some good in this world," he said, "for the price of a stamp."

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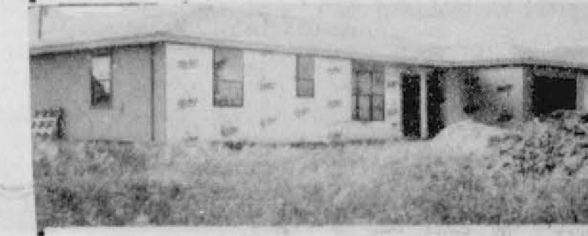

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Star 'Hound end's injury not serious

Gruver Head Coach Barry Haenisch had good news for fans who attended the Spearman-Gruver game Friday night.

Haenisch said Monday that the injury to Marshall Cator, an ace receiver for the Greyhounds, was not nearly as serious as had been feared.

Instead of a back or neck injury as feared, Cator instead suffered severe muscle spasms, Haenisch said.

Cator was injured as his team took to the air trying in the final minutes, to pull off a victory following a rally from two touchdowns back by the Lynx.

The split end for the 'Hounds had layed brilliantly, catching several key passes, including a 44-yarder for Gruver's third TD. He scored the teams first touchdown on a 24-yard end around play.

Cator was hurt with 1:36 left to play when he cut across the middle on a long pass pattern. He leaped for the pass and hauled it in about the Spearman 40, but was hit from behind on a clean but jarring tackle by Julio Vasquez.

Emergency medical personnel worked over him for about 40 minutes on the field while the game was delayed. Coach Haenisch said this was a precaution to insure they did not further injure him in case of a back or neck injury, before moving him into the waiting ambulance.

At the hospital it was learned that Cator had not suffered crippling injuries, but a muscle spasm—very painful but not serious—instead.

Haenisch said that the doctor gave the go-ahead for Cator to return to practice Monday, but Haenisch said, "He may be too sore, we don't want to rush it, and will play it by ear."

The coach added that Cator should be ready for the Greyhounds' game Friday with Panhandle, the number 1 rated 2A team in the state.

As for the game, Haenisch said it was a great contest, except for the fact that Gruver came out on the short end of the score. He said he was proud of the way his team played.

"It lasted just three minutes too long for us," he commented. Spearman's size finally just wore us down."

As for a turning point, he feels the 'Hounds were still very much in the game up until the Cator injury and the penalty on the same play that erased the gain and moved the 'Hounds back into their own territory.

The loss of the 'Hounds number one pass receiver was a big blow, he said, but even with this, the 'Hounds came back in the final minute and completed a pass to the Lynx 28.

"If we hadn't drawn that penalty, it would have been a first down for us at about Spearman's 8 instead of the 28."

A pass interception with 14 seconds left killed Gruver's last hope for victory.

Spearman Head Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier said he was not seriously injured terming the Greyhound receiver a fine player.

As for the game, Lanier said, "It was a typical Spearman-Gruver homecoming battle. They didn't surprise us, we figured it would be nip and tuck all the way."

Speaking of the Lynx rally from two touchdowns back to score the go-ahead touchdown with 2:24 left, he said with a grin, "Oh, we tried to keep it exciting for the fans."

Then turning serious, he added, "Thank goodness our boys had it in them to come back."

"The conversions after touchdowns made the difference," he added, "two kicked by Mark Guthrie and the two point conversion on a pass from Ross Donahue to Steve Burke."

Statistics give additional insight into the hard fought game. Official statistics on the first downs by the game officials give Spearman a 16-13 edge. Unofficial stats show most of Spearman's yardage was gained rushing, while Gruver gained only 66 yards on the ground, but passed for 205 yards.

By contrast, the Lynx rolled up 286 yards rushing, but only gained 75 yards in the air as Donahue connected on five of 11 passing attempts.

Julio Vasquez was again the Lynx rushing leader with 101 yards. Ricky Lopez, who scored the last two Lynx

TDs, gained 98 yards, and Byron Sutterfield added 46.

Commenting on the spectacular running of Lopez late in the game, Lanier said, "They were keying on Julio, so we decided to run some plays that looked like Julio was running the ball, and gave it instead to Ricky."

Lopez' first TD run was almost messed up by a missed blocking assignment, Lanier said. Quarterback Donahue faked to Vasquez and turned toward Lopez, but was hit by a 'Hound tackler who had not been blocked sufficiently.

"We're fortunate Ross was able to set the ball to Lopez," he said.

Lopez' second TD came on a pitchout after a fake handoff to Vasquez.

Lanier said Donahue did a good job passing in the clutch. He completed four of 10, and a couple more of his passes were just off the fingertips of receivers."

On the touchdown pass to Mac (McLain), he called an audible at the line of scrimmage."

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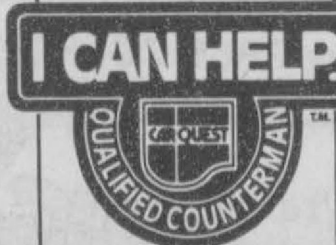

running of Vasquez and Ricky Lopez.

Midway through the third quarter, Gruver got a big break when the wind caught a high Sutterfield punt and blew it back. A big Gruver bounce gave the 'Hounds the ball at the Spearman 26.

A Logsdon-to-Cator throw made it first and 10 on the Spearman 11, but Donahue, in as a defensive back, slowed the drive with back-to-back defensive gems. He first almost intercepted a pass, then Logsdon rolled out and kept, and Donahue, last man between him and six points, knocked his quarterback opponent out of bounds at the Spearman 4.

A big surge by the middle of the Lynx defensive line nailed Logsdon for a loss at the seven and on fourth and goal, Paul Lopez intercepted a Logsdon pass. Electing to run it out instead of kneeling for the touchback that would have given the Lynx the ball at the 20, Lopez ran it out and was downed at the three.

Four plays later the Lynx, bottled up near their goal, punted and from the Spearman 35, the Greyhounds moved in seven plays to score.

Garrett carried on a power sweep left to the 27, a Logsdon pass to Cator was batted away by Vasquez and Garrett cut back off tackle and fought his way to the 24 for a first down.

Been batted to the 20, but Logsdon had to drop on a fumble and the Greyhounds lost to the Spearman 25. Logsdon then hit Clawson with a sideline pass to the 20. With less than a quarter to go, the situation looked black for the Lynx.

It brightened in a hurry. Vasquez fielded the kickoff at the Lynx 25 and returned it to the Spearman 41. On the first and only play of the series, Donahue faked a handoff to Vasquez, banging up the middle, then he was hit, but falling handed off to Ricky Lopez. The transfer student from Gruver dashed around left end, then outspurred his former teammates, racing 59 yards down the sideline for a TD.

On the PAT try, Burke raced

across the end zone and made a finger tip grab of the conversion pass just before stepping out of the back corner of the endzone. Now the Lynx were within three points, 18-15.

Minutes later, with less than seven minutes to play, the Lynx got the ball back on a Gruver punt. They were at their own 28, 72 yards away from a go-ahead touchdown.

Vasquez battled to the 46, breaking two tackles and carrying one Gruver defender on his back. Then he churned to the midfield stripe on the next play. A pitch right to Ricky Lopez carried to the 40, and again Lopez banged ahead, breaking two tackles, to the 35. Vasquez cut off tackle to the 28.

That was the way, the Lynx reckoned. First to Vasquez, then fake to Vasquez and give to Lopez, then to Vasquez. A pitch right to Lopez to the 23, a give to Vasquez to the 20.

On third and two at the 20, the Lynx pulled a cross strategy. Donahue kept straight ahead for a first on the 18. Sutterfield churned to the 17 and a dead ball foul moved the ball to the Gruver 8. An illegal man downfield on an incomplete pass play cost the Lynx five yards and loss of down, and the next play lost to the Greyhound 14.

It looked again like the 'Hounds might hold, but Ricky Lopez had other ideas. Taking a pitch right, he refused to go down. Breaking several tackles, he high kneeed the 14 yards for the TD. Guthrie booted the PAT and it was 21-18 with 2:24 left in the game.

Now the pressure the Lynx had felt much of the game was reversed. But the 'Hounds were not through. In this wild and woolly game, they had one last desperate shot at victory.

Typically they went for the big pass play trying to get it. Scrambling to pass, Logsdon had to keep and rolled to the Gruver 28 and a penalty gave the Greyhounds renewed hope at the Gruver 39. Logsdon then connected with Garrett on a pass to the Spearman 48.

Running behind two blocking backs, Logsdon rolled and threw incomplete to Cator. He came right back to Cator. Cator leaped high and hauled the long pass in but coming down was hit from behind on a clean but bone-jarring tackle by Vasquez. Miraculously, Cator held onto the ball, but he was injured on the play.

Ambulance attendants worked over him for about 40 minutes and

carefully lifted him into the ambulance so as to prevent further damage in case of spinal or neck injury. The injury of Cator threw a sad note on an otherwise fantastic game by both teams and left the homecoming crowd somber, as it was not known at the time that the Greyhound star had only suffered a severe muscle spasm.

To make matters worse, a penalty on the play nullified the great effort by Cator and instead of being in Spearman territory, the ball was moved back to the Gruver 41.

This was fortunate for the Lynx for on the next play tight end Monty Hawkins took a long pass from Clawson and fought his way to the Lynx 28.

With 1:10 left, Logsdon was thrown for a four yard loss and a penalty moved the ball back to the Spearman 38. Damon Goodheart almost intercepted the next pass, but a penalty advanced Gruver to the Spearman 22. But with 14 seconds left, Luis Nava finally dashed the 'Hounds hopes by picking off a pass and returning it to the Spearman 27 for the Lynx.

Donahue tried to end it all by falling on the ball, but Gruver wanted no part of this and was charged with a personal foul when a 'Hound tried to tackle the Lynx quarterback before he reached the turf.

The game ended a play later on the Spearman 27, a performance both teams and their fans will remember with pride for a long, long time.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolition of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack.

The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution

17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to expend public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewerage laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of sanitation sewer laterals on private property."

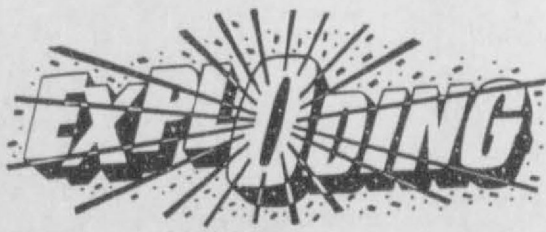

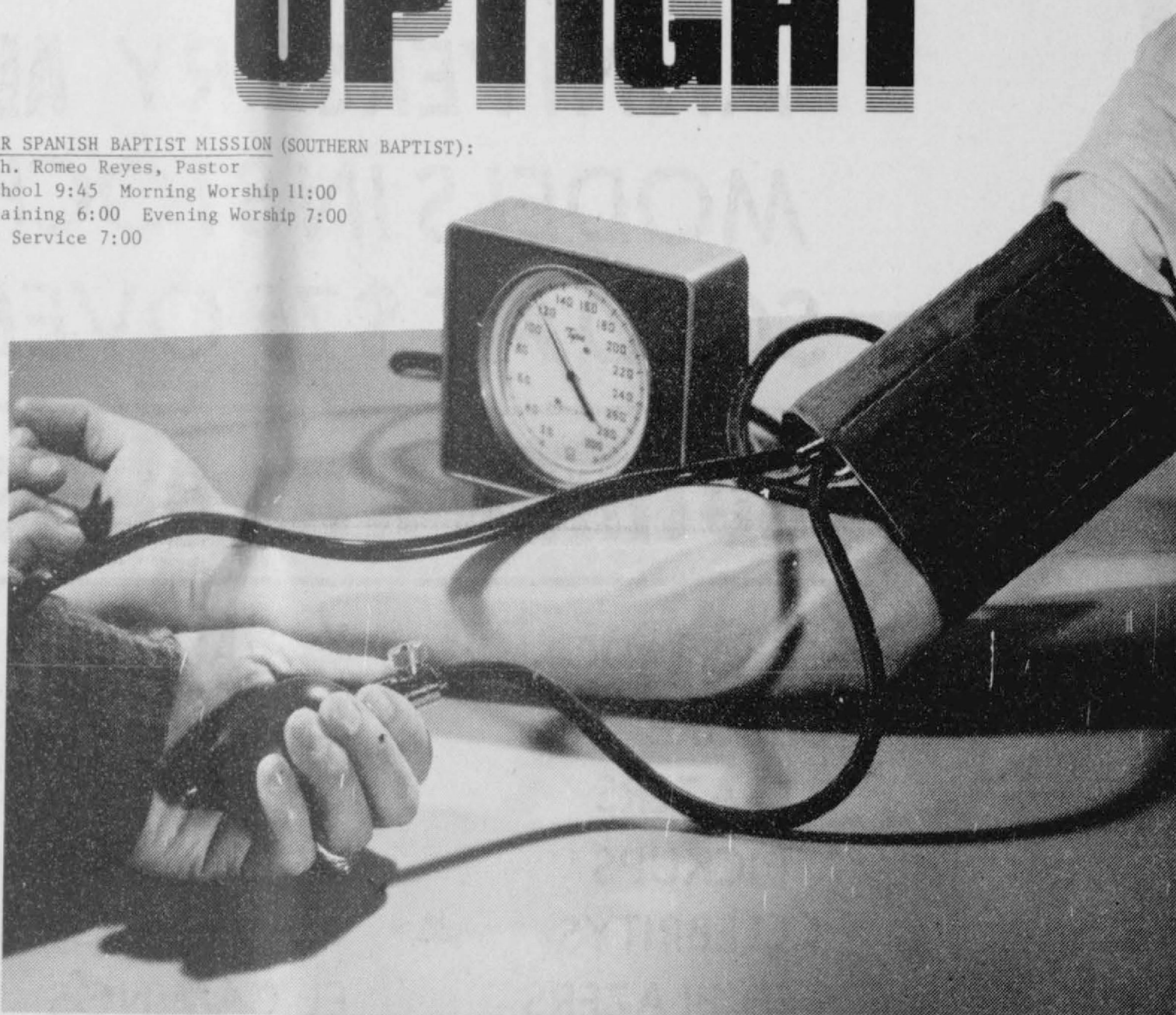
