## Lynx plan to use "Big Mac Attack" Fri!

Fans are still excited over the Spearman-Stratford score at Stratford Friday night. The Lynx won the game 61-14. It was just a perfect night for the Lynx, they could do no wrong. But Friday night it's "an new ball game".

Spearman will be playing the Panhandle Panthers, a team that tied the Borger Bulldogs a couple of weeks ago. The same team from Panhandle also lost to Sanford-Fritch Friday night as the Eagles kicked three field goals to win the game 9-0. It must be noted by fans that Panhandle did not allow the Fritch team to score except on the three kicks. So, this sets up the district's best offense from Spearman against the district's top defense from Panhandle.

The weather could actually decide the outcome Friday night. If it is windy, snowing, or raining the fantastic Lynx aerial game could be in jeopardy.

However, if the Lynx learned anything from the track meet at Stratford, it was that they have a new kicker in Ricky Lopez.

This has been a real problem for the Lynx and Lopez could be the difference Friday night.

The blocking at Stratford was superb. The fleet runners broke lose behind excellent blocking several times. Half back Bob Cook, #10, tailback Monte Morris, #20, fullback Brian Davis, #25, and tailback Ricky Lopez, #31, made excellent runs. None of these would have been possible without the downfield blocking from the entire Lynx team.

Number 61, Damon Goodheart was excellent on the punting. In other words, the entire Lynx offense and defense must be commended for this record game at Stratford.

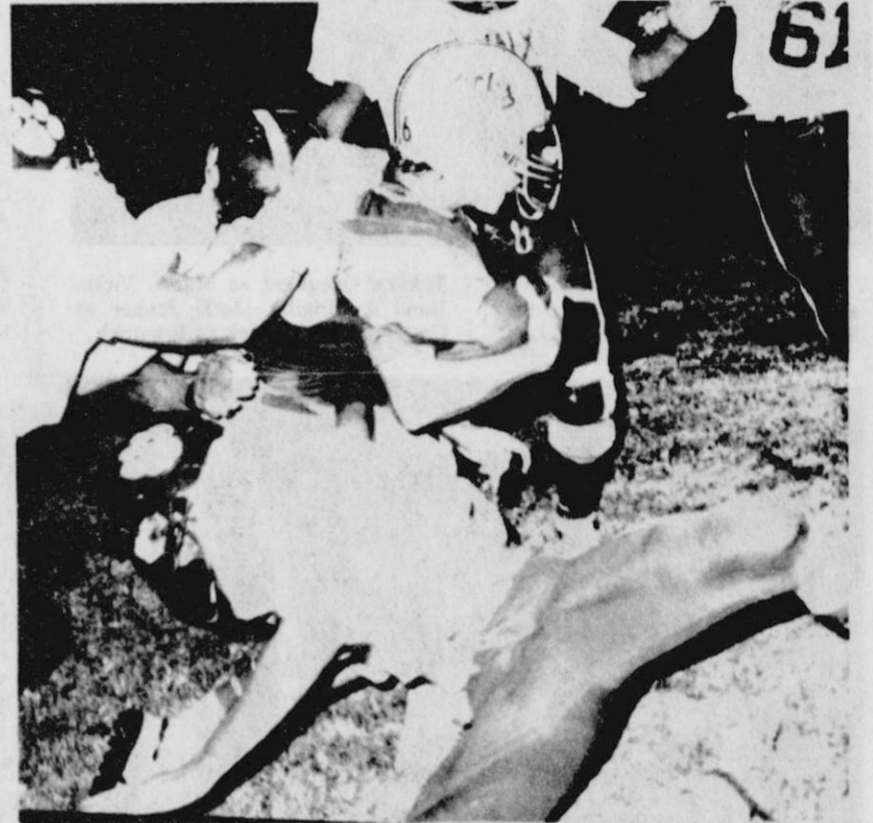

**MACK MCLAIN, Spearman:** One of the most shocking scores from Friday night was Spearman's 61-14 victory over Stratford. Stratford doesn't lose very often, and it hasn't allowed 61 points in a game in at least two decades. But the Lynx poured it on, building a 41-0 lead by halftime and coasting from there. Spearman split end Mack McLain was one of the reasons for Spearman's overwhelming victory. McLain, a team captain, caught three TD passes to help the Lynx improve to 5-1. McLain caught a 50-yard scoring pass from quarterback Ross Donahue for the game's first score. He caught a 25-yard toss for the game's second score. McLain now has caught 26 passes for 634 yards and nine TDs this year.

When NRA sent Doggett a questionnaire simply asking his position on questions such as whether he opposed registration of firearms, opposed banning handguns, and opposed licensing of all gun owners, Doggett refused to even return it. One thing is for sure, if Doggett wins, you lose."

## Appliance Testing Set

An ambitious program designed to assure development of a new generation of high-efficiency appliances was recently initiated by the American Gas Association.

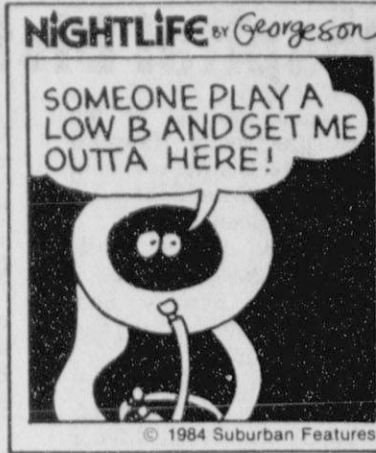
The new program, taking place in a specially constructed house on the grounds of the Association's Laboratories in Cleveland, provides a focal point for the development of new technologies. The contemporary ranch-style house is the site of research and testing to confirm the performance of advanced appliances.

One of the many unique features in the structure is a house-within-a-house concept that provides convenience and flexibility in research without detracting from an attractive, homelike environment. This central core is thermally isolated from a one-story bedroom wing to simulate, for research purposes, a smaller house more representative of contemporary sizes.

Provisions for instrumentation to measure heat loss; heat distribution; air infiltration; indoor air quality; and flows of gas, water, and power to various locations, was unobtrusively incorporated in the house construction. Gas is available in every room for studies of distributed heating as opposed to central heating, for which there will be parallel warm-air and hydronic distribution systems.

High levels of insulation and airtightness have been achieved: R40 walls, R50 ceilings, and .04 air changes per hour. These levels can be relaxed to vary heating/cooling loads and to modify indoor air quality by removing ceiling insulation in the bedroom wing and by deliberately varying the amount of admitted air over a wide range of air changes per hour.

Many different kinds of performance comparisons will be possible in the research and demonstration house. For example: conventional versus advanced appliances; gas versus other energy sources; economics and comfort levels of various modes of space conditioning; oversized versus properly sized equipment; and the effects of varying loads on performance.

## Natural Gas Fuels Autos

A "Rally for Fuel Savings" featuring natural gas powered Ford Ranger trucks will show that natural gas is not only a workable alternative fuel but also is a more acceptable fuel for motor vehicles, according to the American Gas Association (A.G.A.).

The caravan will travel cross-country during the months of September and October, visiting 16 cities along the way. Over the course of the rally, data on the vehicles will be collected and tallied to prove that natural gas is an efficient, economical, and environmentally superior motor fuel.

Because natural gas vehicles emit fewer pollutants into the atmosphere, they would have a beneficial impact on our environment. Also, because it is an abundant domestic resource, the use of natural gas as a motor vehicle fuel would reduce U.S. dependence on foreign oil.

The interest in natural gas vehicles (NGVs), particularly for fleets, is growing, according to the A.G.A. In addition to the economies of use—NGVs cost less to run, about 4.3 cents per mile compared to 6.0 cents per mile for gasoline, and maintenance costs are lower due to the clean-burning characteristics of natural gas—the A.G.A. says. Natural gas is safe, too. Contained in lightweight, composite-reinforced aluminum tanks manufactured by an ALCOA subsidiary, the natural gas has proven to be stable under a variety of rear-end collisions, drops, and even gun shots.

Although the rally is a first, natural-gas-powered vehicles are not new to the market. Italy has about 300,000 natural gas vehicles. New Zealand is converting government-owned vehicles to run on natural gas, and Canada is encouraging the conversion of vehicles to natural gas with an incentive program. There are about 30,000 NGVs operating in the United States.

### Cash Registers: Raking in the Dough

Cash registers became popular collectibles in the late 1960s during one of those recurrent national nostalgia binges we go through every so often. Oddly enough, however, collectors account for only a small fraction of the market for these charming old machines. The lion's share goes to trendy bars, restaurants and other commercial ventures looking for a touch of class.

As collectibles, cash registers have several strikes against them. They're expensive, bulky, difficult and costly to restore and, finally, they're just plain hard to find. On the positive side, however, they're considered excellent investments, based on their general rise in market value since the mid-1970s. Maybe that's why those wily businessmen find them so irresistible.

The average cash register in good working order and in need of little or no restoration sells for something in the range of \$450 to \$1,000. Lesser examples can be found for less than \$200 and a few rarities in excellent condition can bring \$3,000 and more. As with most collectibles, a collection of three or four rare models in excellent condition is worth much more than a collection of a dozen or more common models in less than perfect condition.

Most sought after are machines made prior to 1916, before World War I made brass and bronze prohibitive for commercial use. With covers ornately embossed in stylized floral and scroll motifs, these old machines are virtually indestructible ambassadors of Victorian charm.

Most of the machines now on the collector's market are products of the National Cash Register Co. NCR was dominant in the field from the beginning, when James Ritty, a saloonkeeper in Dayton, Ohio, invented the cash register in 1879 as a way of keeping his bartenders honest. Ritty's machines attracted the attention of local merchant John Patterson, who later bought a controlling interest in the company that became NCR.

Other companies manufactured cash registers, of course, but few were able to compete for long against NCR's innovative sales techniques and constantly improving technology. Of the competitors, the brands most likely to be found today include Ideal, St. Louis and Michigan cash register companies.

### Natural Gas Is Available

Ample supplies of natural gas at moderating prices are now available to U.S. consumers, according to the American Gas Association.

"New discoveries of natural gas during the past several years assure a long-term growing supply of gas energy," A.G.A. President George H. Lawrence says.

This ample supply, he says, can be used to reduce U.S. dependence on foreign oil and can play an important role in working toward the goal of energy independence for America.

Lawrence says the large price increases during the early 1980s are over and that in 1983 a trend of moderating prices began with some parts of the country recording price decreases.

However, he said, certain federal prohibitions on gas use in industrial applications prevent greater gas use and could impact prices in the future.

"The Congress should repeal the Fuel Use Act and incremental pricing provisions of the Natural Gas Policy Act of 1978, so that gas energy supply can be utilized and the trend toward moderating prices will continue," Lawrence says.

"Natural gas is efficient because it is piped directly to the homes of 160 million consumers. It is the cleanest burning fossil fuel and therefore is environmentally preferable. It is also cheaper than electricity and heating oil, Lawrence says.

### You're Cooking

#### Sundown bake for two, four

A baked potato with a special topping makes a meal in itself and also can make a quicky dinner for two or four persons without skimping.

Few go hungry when the topping includes mushrooms and bacon with a cheese sauce.

Serve a green salad or fruit salad to top off the meal.

#### SUNDOWN BAKE

- 4 Idaho potatoes
- 6 slices bacon
- 2 cups sliced mushrooms
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Cheese Sauce\*

Scrub potatoes, dry and prick with fork. Bake in 425-degree oven 55 to 65 minutes, until soft. While potatoes are baking, fry bacon in large skillet until brown; drain and crumble. Pour off all but 2 tablespoons bacon fat. In same skillet, cook mushrooms and green pepper until mushrooms are just tender; remove and reserve. When potatoes are cooked, cut slice from top of each. Carefully scoop out potato without breaking skin, mash potato in large bowl. Beat in milk, egg, butter and salt. Stir in crumbled bacon, mushrooms and green pepper. Pile potato mixture into reserved shells. Bake in 350-degree oven 25 to 30 minutes. Arrange on platter and serve with Cheese Sauce\*. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 4 servings.

#### \*CHEESE SAUCE

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup (4 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese

Melt butter in small saucepan; blend in flour and cook 1 minute. Remove from heat, stir in milk. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Stir in salt, pepper and cheese; stir until cheese melts. Cover and keep warm until serving time. This kitchen-tested recipe makes about 2 cups.

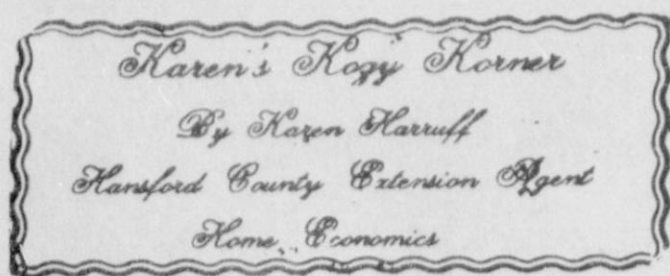

For older children, going trick and treating without their parents gives a feeling of independence. parents can foster this feeling without endangering their child's safety by making arrangements ahead of Halloween.

Get a group of older children together and have one of the parents or another relative supervise. A responsible teenager could also be hired for the task. If you do let your children go without an adult supervisor, make sure you know who their companions will be.

Before sending children out to trick and treat, here are some suggested safety tips that parents can discuss with them:

Only go into familiar neighborhoods along a route planned in advance. The children should have a designated time to return home based on the length of their planned route.

Stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well lit.

Do not enter houses or apartments unless an accompanying adult approves.

Take coins and call if there is a problem or if they will be late.

Children using bicycles should adjust their costumes and use bicycle clips where necessary. Make sure the bike has reflectors, a headlight and a horn or bell.

Walk, do not run, from house to house. Walk on sidewalks, not streets. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic.

Cross streets only at intersections or crosswalks, wait for traffic signals, and look both ways before crossing.
