You have heard of "No Man Land", "North of 36", "West of the Pecos", and "The Cherokee Strip." The map above will introduce you to the "Orphan Strip" of Congressman Marvin Jones' district. Citizens of at least 3 counties in this forgotten area are hoping we can change the title to the center tier of counties to "The home of Lake Marvin Jones. Citizens anticipate this change can be made during the month of July. The Panhandle lake program, now under the supervision of Soil Conservator H. H. Finnell will surely include the Hansford lake as the first to be built as new lakes are designated. A glance at the map will convince anyone that the Palo Duro creek project should rate No. 1. Located within a stone throw of highway 117, this lake would have the chance to service more people from a recreation standpoint than any in the Panhandle except the Amarillo lake Buffalo. Citizens of the large industrial city of Borger are more than a hundred miles from available recreational lakes. Hansford County citizens are nearly 70 miles from a lake. When the approved lakes in the Panhandle are completed a major lake will be located near Perryton, Canadian, Pampa, Amarillo, Tulia and Dalhart. President John McCarty of the Panhandle Water Conservation organization has stated that the Hansford project is No. 1 so far as he knows. Our Congressman Marvin Jones was impressed with the natural advantages of Hansford lake site—a government engineer has complimented Hansford's lake site—Mr. Finnell and Washington will approve SOON—we hope, hope, hope.

Short Wheat Harvest Goes Into Third Week

Rain coming at the wrong time slowed the wheat production in this county to a mere walk compared with the favorable outlook of some three months ago. There are a few scattered fields over the county that are paying for the cutting and some returns for the labor of planting them. Otherwise Hansford County farmers are not breaking even on their wheat. The present harvest is approximately three fourths completed and all the wheat will be harvested, provided decent weather prevails, by the middle of next week. Due to the price of the wheat only a small percent of the wheat is being sold. Most of the farmers are securing loans on their wheat.

40 Farmers Make Application For Tenant Purchase Loans

Lefty Fowler, county supervisor for the Farm Security Administration in Hansford and Hutchinson counties stated this week that there had been 40 applications received before the deadline of June 30th for Tenant Purchase Loans. Under the Bankhead-Jones Act, sharecroppers tenant farmers, farm laborers and others, other than land owners who might be identified as farmers are eligible to apply for a loan.

The tenant purchase committee for Hansford county met this week with Ray Davis chief of the family selection bureau of Amarillo for the purpose of selecting a number of applicants from the list submitted to make tenant purchase loans. The final selection will be taken from this approved list.

10 Hansford Tenant Farmers May Become Land Owners

At the end of the fiscal year July 1, the FSA anticipates 10 farms being purchased for low income tenant farmers.

The tenant purchase program in Hansford county was started last year and 3 farms were bought.

There is a possibility that the remaining 7 farms will be purchased this year. According to the Bankhead-Jones Act the maximum amount of 12,000.00 can be used for the purchase of land and improvements.

Each prospective buyer will choose his own land thru the guidance of the FSA.

Announcement will be made in the paper next week as to when the last half of the band school will open. The tentative date has been set for Aug. 1.

Hot Check Law Explained

The new hot check law which became effective on June 22 reads as follows:

"House Bill No. 190, which repeals Section 4 of Article 1546 of the Penal Code of 1925, makes it unlawful for any person, with intent to defraud, to obtain any money, goods, service, labor, or other thing of

value by giving or drawing any check, draft or order when such person does not have sufficient funds with the drawee to pay the instrument and all other outstanding instruments at the time it was given. Section 4 extends the above provisions to cover the payment for goods and services theretofore received. Section 3 makes it unlawful for a person to secure or retain possession of any personal property to which a lien has attached, by the giving

ing or drawing of such an instrument. In all cases, the non-payment of the instrument upon presentation is prima facie evidence that the person gave or drew it with intent to defraud.

"The following are penalties: First conviction, Less than \$5.00, confinement in county jail not exceeding 2 years or fine not exceeding \$200.00. \$5.00 to \$50.00 Confinement in county jail not exceeding 2 years or fine not exceeding \$500.00 For \$50.00 and over, confinement in penitentiary not less than 2 nor more than 10 years.

Second conviction for same offense. Confinement in county jail not less than 30-days nor more than 2 years.

Third or subsequent conviction for same offense, confinement in the pen for not less than two years nor more than 10.

Section 6 of the Act provides that any person who has filed a complaint or furnished information resulting in the acceptance of a complaint by a district or county attorney shall be guilty of a misdemeanor if he suggests or requests that the case be dismissed, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$100, nor more than \$500.

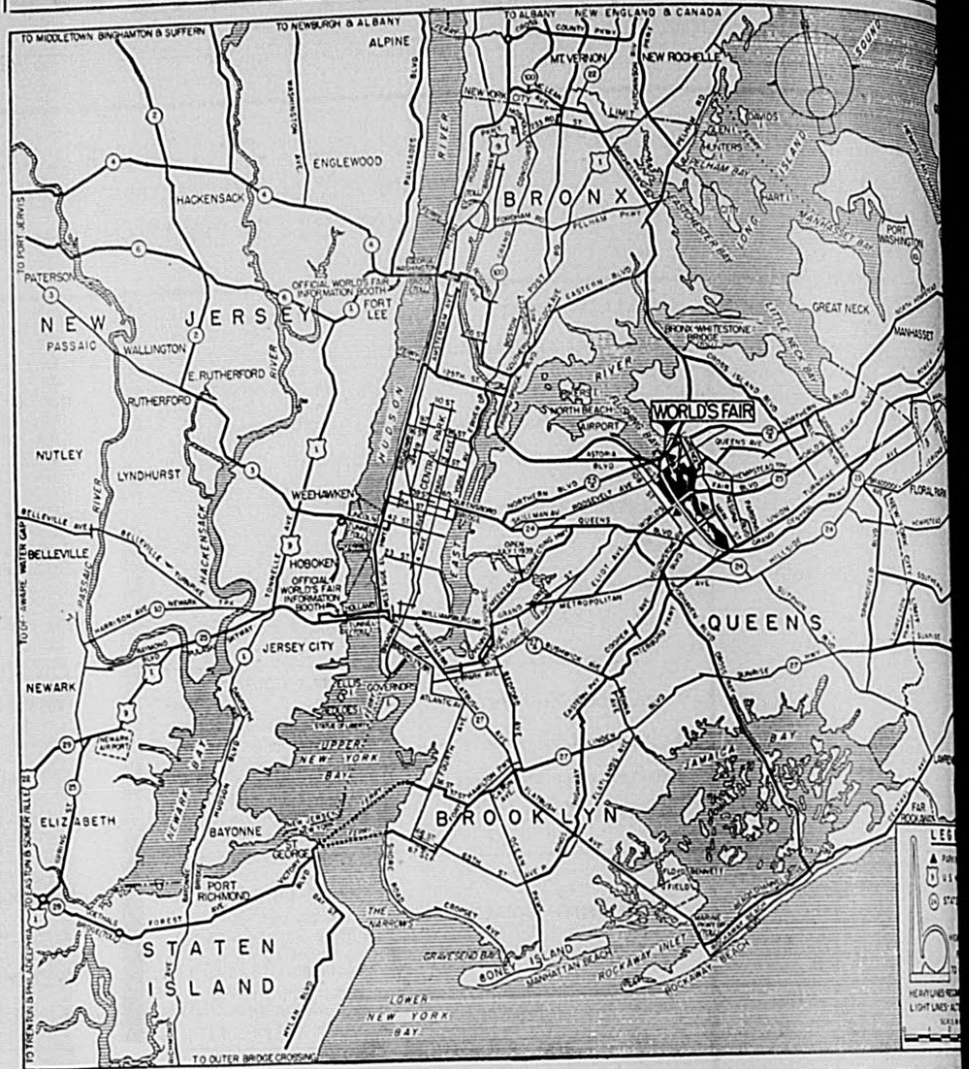

Emil Knutson Tops In Producing Certified Wheat In Texas

Emil Knutson, who farms in the Olso Community, is the champion certified seed grower in Texas. According to the State Inspector, Emil has produced more certified wheat seed this year than all of the other certified seed growers in Texas combined. Two years ago Emil purchased 10 bushels of State Registered Tenmarq wheat from the Experimental station at Ft. Hays, Kans. From this plot he raised enough seed to plant 600 acres of summer fallowed land last fall—and this 600 acres averaged better than 20 bushels per acre this year.

In one field Emil had two bks.

of land—both summer fallowed in the same manner, and both planted at the same time. However, one was planted to certified Tenmarq and the other to Blackhull. The Tenmarq yielded 27-bushels and the Blackhull only 19—a difference of 8 bushels in favor of the Tenmarq.

After July 15, Emil plans to start the sale of his certified seed—and it may be purchased direct from him or from a representative in Spearman.

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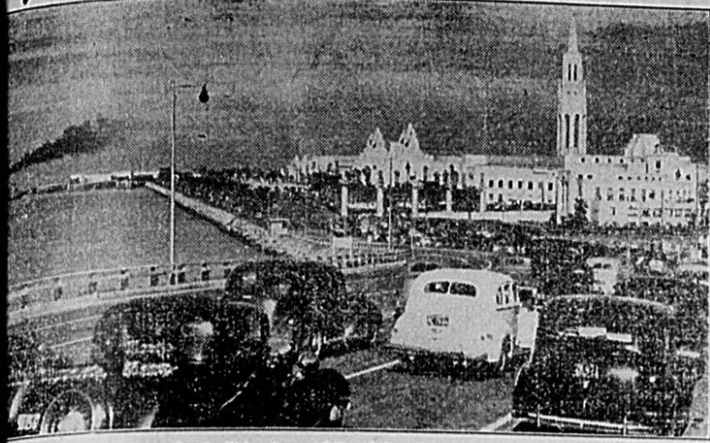

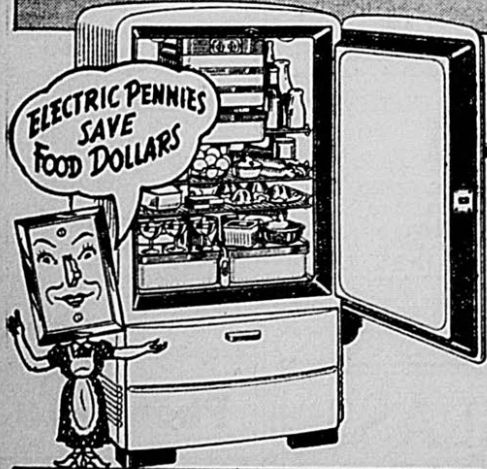
