Absentee ballots ready

Absentee ballots are available at the county clerk's office for the November 8 constitutional election. Eleven propositions will be decided this year, covering a broad range of issues. All county residents are eligible to vote in the election if they have registered within 30 days of November 8. Only seven excuses will be accepted by the board of elections for voters who wish to receive an absentee ballot. Those reasons

- expected absense from the county on the day of the election age of 65 years or older

- religious beliefs which do not allow a person to vote on the day of the election - sickness or physical disability - service as an election clerk or poll wat-

- confinement in jail - service as an administrator of elections

Applications for an absentee ballot can be eleted in the county clerk's office until Friday, Novembr 4, free of charge.

The eleven propositions on the ballot were voted by the state legislature during its last session and are being considered as amendments to the state constitution. They have been simplified for the November ballot, and will be answered by a yes or no vote.

Proposition one would amend the system for distribution of justices of the peace in the state. If approved, a county with more than 30,000 people would be divided into between four and eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with between 18,000 and 30,000 would be divided in two to five precincts, and a county with fewer than 17,000 inhabitants would be designated as a single precinct. However, the county commissioners court would be empowered to create up to four precincts in that county if there were special conditions.

Proposition two would limit a homestead in a city or town to a lot or lots equaling less than one acre of land, together with any improvements to that land.

A third proposition would authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on sales of their products. This money would then be used to finance programs of marketing promotion, research, and education for and about those products.

Another proposition would allow the legislature to prepare an order of succession for members of the legislature in case of enemy attack. It would also allow the legislature to suspend procedural rules in case of attack or the imminent threat of attack. Suspension of the constitutional rules could not exceed two years under a single decree by the governor, but could last longer if it were renewed by the state house and senate.

The legislature would be empowered to enact legislation allowing the use of the permanent school fund and income from it to guarantee bonds issued by the school districts under proposition five. The legislature would also be allowed to appropriate part of the available school fund to administer the permanent school fund.

The state would be permitted to take a

person's wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments if proposition six passed. The state would not be allowed to seize wages for any other purpose, however. Proposition seven would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell state

general obligation bonds for up to \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. Three hundred million dollars worth of bonds would be used by the Veterans' Land Fund to purchase land to be sold to veterans. A Veteran's Housing Assistance fund would also be created with the remaining \$500 million.

The eighth proposition on the ballot would authorize cities and counties to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The veterans' organizations would have to be chartered by the United States Congress and be devoted to "patriotic and public service projects." Fraternal organizations may also be exempted from ad valorem taxes on their property if the ammendment passes, if the organizations were primarily devoted to charitable or benevolent projects. The legislature would set standards for which groups qualified as fraternal organizations.

Proposition nine would authorize the legislature to devise a way by which judges of statutary courts with probate jurisdiction could be assigned to any other similar court or to any constitutional county court in the

Proposition ten would allow the legislature to pass laws to allow a city to use public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewage laterals on public property if it was done together replacement or reloca-tion of sewer mains on that property. The law would further authorize the city to take a lien on the private propery, with the owner's consent, to cover the costs of the

The final proposition on the 1983 ballot would change the board of paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency. governor to revoke paroles.

Lynx lose to Wolves

Sometimes you can play with all heart, and desires, and hustle in the world and still not win in football.

Crippled, hobbled and shorthanded--with a completely makeshift offensive backfield--the Spearman Lynx gave it a good shot, but it was just not enough, and the Lynx fell 22-7 to the Dalhart Wolves Friday night in Dalhart.

The Lynx went into the contest without the services of their leading rusher, Julio Vazquez, out with a knee injury, and their regular starting fullback who quit the team.

It was doubtful whether Ross Donahue, the Lynx' ace signal caller and passer, would be able to play against the Golden Wolves after being carried from the field on a stretcher and rushed by ambulance to the hospital with a dislocated knee in the previous Friday's win over Canadian.

But play he did and turned in a fantastically gutty performance. Hobbled and slowed by the knee, he could not move with his usual authority and finesse. He quickly proved there was nothing wrong with his throwing arm, however when on the Lynx second possession, he dropped back and winged a long touchdown pass to Mac McLain.

Before the game was over, Donahue had taken to the air 27 times, completing nine for 147 yards and the Lynx only touchdown.

Unfortunately for the Lynx, their ground game was not equally up to par. They gained only 90 yards, and quite understandably so. Donahue

at quarterback was the only starter playing his normal position. Jeff Laird, the number one back

up for Vasquez, started at tailback, but he was injured in the game, and Ricky Lopez, the team's starting halfback, moved over to tailback. He had only practiced at this position a couple of days, and from this unacustomed slot, Lopez was not as effective a runner as usual.

To fill the gap at halfback, Head Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier moved up light but swift Monty Morris from the junior varsity. Damon Goodheart, who had played a strong second at fullback this season, moved up to the number one fullback slot. He also handled the punting for the Lynx, and did a creditable job, punting six times for a 36 yards per boot average. There was talent in the Lynx backfield, but the players were not used to playing together as a unit and committed a couple of errors that hurt the Lynx offensive efforts.

The night was clear, but because of a still wet field, and the stout defensive records of both teams, a defensive duel was expected. But in the first few minutes of play, it looked more like there was a wide open offensive duel in the making, as three touchdowns were scored in

the first quarter. The Lynx failed to score in their first offensive series, then it was Dalhart's turn and the Pack scored in a hurry on a 66-yard gallop by Dodd Nolan. The try for extra point

Hansford County Commissioners voted to adjust the salary of a deputy clerk, and granted a country road easement to GTE but delayed a decision on a proposed swap of taxable land by Gruver and Texhoma ISDs during a session at Hansford County Courthouse Mon-

The commissioners voted to adjust the salary of the deputy county and district clerk to bring it into line with the salary of a tax office deputy clerk who had been employed by the county for approximately the same length of time.

An easement was granted to the phone company for the laying of a line along a county road, and other minor adjustments.

The request for a swap of taxable land within the Gruver and Texhoma school districts was made by Jack Freeman, who owns farmland along the Hansford-Sherman County line in Hansford County.

Dan Carthel, who owns land on just the other side of the line in Texhoma, Texas ISD wants his land transferred to the Gruver ISD, as his family's ties, and interests have long been in Gruver and he wants his

children to attend Gruver schools. Freeman agreed to swap land, not the same in acreage, but roughly the same in tax value, to accomodate Carthel. The two school districts have already okayed the petitions of the two landowners, but both Hansford and Sherman Commissioners must approve if the switch is to be made.

The Hansford commissioners Monday did not vote on the petition, holding their opinion until the commissioners get the correct "paperwork."

Lynx 'Infirmary' hopes cure arrives before River Road

Head Coach Athletic Director Larry Lanier must feel it would be appropriate to hang a new sign up over the Spearman Lynx dressing room door. The infirmary.

Certainly the Lynx have had their share of injuries-and then some, this year. Early in the season it was the Lynx big, strong linemen who were out of action with injuries. As the big line was supposed to be Spearman's strongest point this year, the Lynx "hurt" until they were able to return to action.

Now the Lynx are hurting again, this time from injuries to key backs. Julio Vasquez, the team's leading rusher, missed the entire Dalhart game with a knee injury and it is still questionable whether he will be able to play Friday against River Road in Amarillo, Coach Lanier said.

Another offensive ace, quarterback Ross Donahue suffered a

dislocated knee against Canadian the week before, and was severely hobbled in the Dalhart contest. The first string fullback quit the team before the Dalhart game, and early in the contest last Friday, Vasquez' back up at running back, and a good defensive back, Jeff Laird suffered a jammed neck and was knocked out

Coach Lanier expects another typically tough 1-3A game with River Road, and is hoping to have his walking wounded backs back in action for the tilt.

"We're playing River Road there, and they have alot better ballteam than their record indicates." Lanier

Lanier said that he expects a "real tough game any way you look at it," that River Road would play the Lynx a tough game-regardless of whether the Lynx have their top backs back in

action, and that the River Road'ers will find the Lynx plenty tough, even if the injured backs see little action

But it will definitly help if Vasquez, Donahue and Laird are back in the lineup at "full speed" for the contest, he added.

River Road is a hard team to defense, he said, because they use a multiple spread offense, run the option out a lot, use different formations and some motion. The offense is keyed around Aguilar Campos, a talented quarterback who can run or throw the ball very well. and likes to sprint out a lot.

The Lynx are 4-4 on the season and hope to break the .500 mark. They are 1-2 in district play and would like to improve on that, too, at River Road's expense.

River Road is 0-3 in district and 1-7 on the season.



Karen's Kogy Korner By Karen Harruff Hansford County Extension Agent

When families laugh together, it promotes a feeling of unity, according to recent research studies. In all the writing on parenting, humor is probably the least talked about parental resource and the most untaught parental skill.

Laughing together helps reduce stress in a family, as well as keep communication harmonious and open. This is not to imply that a good joke suffices for parents providing structure, feedback and limitsetting for child guidance. Humor helps diffuse emotionally charged situations and makes serious discussion, disciplinary measures and ground rules more likely to work.

Increasingly, psychologists are demonstrating the effectiveness of humor related to health promotion. Humor has a stimulating effect on the digestive and circulatory systems, but the real psychological value of laughter is its ability to lesson inner tension.

As children grow older, families seem to vary more in the extent to which they use humor. Growing children respond to verbal humor as well as to the earlier slapstick humor. Toward adolescence,

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children have an increasing reportoire of jokes from peers. The way parents respond to a child's humor depends on the value the family places on humor, the way they have learned to use it and the interaction they typically have with their children.

Psychological research can document what makes children laugh at different ages and in diverse situations. 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

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Area Republicans to honor Rep. Phil Gramm with reception

Phil Gramm, a unique national political figure, will be honored by a reception at Villa Inn in Amarillo, according to Roy Bulls, Hansford County Republican Party chairman.

Bulls said the reception honoring the former Democrat turned Republican will be held Saturday, Oct. 29, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in Villa Inn. Area G.O.P. leaders are hoping for a good turnout at the Gramm reception, and Bulls has issued a special invitation to all Hansford County Republicans to attend.

Gramm is now a Republican Congressman from the Sixth Texas Congressional District, which is something of a shocker in itself. The central Texas Sixth district is a Democratic hotbed.

He was a long time Democrat and was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives as such. As a Democrat he was named to the influential Budget Committee. But in the past two years in Washington, Gramm increasingly antagonized the liberal Democratic hieracy with his outspoken support of President Reagan's key economic policies and his conservative and often pro-Republican voting record.

The ire of his fellow Democrats was particularly kindled when he co-sponsored with a Republican, budget bills to curb federal spending by \$130 billion in fiscal year 1983-84, more than \$6.1 billion.

Enough's enough, the party's Capitol Hill leaders decided. In January, the first working day of the 98th Congress, the Democratic leadership chose to not reassign Gramm to the Budget committee, a re-appointment that ordinarily would have been automatic.

Gramm was just as abrupt. Within hours he reassigned from Congress, bolted from the Democratic Party to the Republican Party, and announced he would "go back home" to Texas and run for his old seat in a special election--as a Republican.

Gramm could have simply switched parties and stayed in Congress instead of going back to the staunch Democratic 10th District. But he said that he did not feel switching parties and remaining in office without letting the voters decide if he should or not would not be ethical and a betrayal of the voters who supported him.

The Republicans have praised his action calling him a man of integrity and conscience; the Democrats have denounced him as a political opportunist out just to further his own

But the people of 10th district gave a resounding "yes" to his actions, the new Republican received 94 percent of the vote in the special election, easily defeating nine Democrats and a Libertarian.

Dear Ms. Lynch:

Texas taxpayers have a lot to gain and nothing to lose in voting FOR Proposition 5, the school bond amendment, in the November 8 constitutional amendments election.

The amendment could save our schools and local taxpayers \$435 million in interest payments alone in just the next 17

It comes as a surprise to many people that the awesome resources the State of Texas dedicates to education are not taken into account by national bond markets when setting local school district bond ratings and interest rates. Local bonds are judged solely by the local district's situation.

Proposition 5 would cure that by permitting qualified local school bond issues to be backed by the state's \$3 billion Permanent School Fund. The result would be better bond ratings and lower interest rates for our local districts.

The state's Permanent Fund would simply be lending its good name; it would not be paying off the bonds. Texas schools have a fine bond record. In the unlikely event of a default, the state would simply pick up the payments by withholding the local district's state allotments.

Lynx lose

failed and the Wolves led 6-0 early

in the first quarter.

One play after the ensuing kickoff the Lynx evened the score. On first down and 10 from the Lynx 43, Donahue dropped back and pitched a pass to McLain. The fast split end caught the ball some 30 yards down field and outraced the Wolves' secondary--a 57-yard touchdown

Mark Guthrie booted the PAT and the Lynx led, 7-6.

It was a short-lived advantage for the Lynx. Shortly before the end of the first quarter, Michael Thompson broke loose and raced 70 yards for a Dalhart touchdown. Jerry Williamson then tossed a pass to Tinker Morin for the two point conversion and Dalhart forged back in front,

The remainder of the half settled into the expected duel between too solid defensive clubs, and when the horn sounded for the half, the Lynx were trailing only 14-7 despite their patched up lineup.

In fact, the Lynx defense shutout Dalhart the rest of the game. The Golden Wolves scored a safety and a touchdown in the second half to cinch their 1-2A victory, but both of Dalhart's second half scores came as a result of Lynx offensive errors.

The Lynx, conscious of their offensive leader's gave Donahue good protection generally when he went back to pass. But the Wolves got to the Lynx quarterback at the very worst time for Spearman, probably because of the blocking

backs' inexperience in playing with each other. On a first down and 10 at the Spearman eight, Donahue dropped back into the Lynx end zone to pass. Kurtis Abla broke through the blocking screen and tackeled the quarterback in the end zone for a two point safety, upping the Dalhart lead to 16-7, with 5:42 left in the third quarter.

Near the end of the third quarter. the Wolves got the game's final TD. On a fourth and eight from the Spearman 28, the snap to punter Goodheart sailed over his head and bounced into the end zone where it was covered by the Wolves' Fidel Olivarez for six Dalhart points. A

passing try for a two point conversion was batted away by McLain, and the score was 22-7, Dalhart.

That's the way it remained, as both teams continued rugged defensive play in the fourth quarter.

The Wolves rolled up a 247 to 90 yard advantage in rushing, but the Lynx held the edge in the air, gaining 147 yards passing to only 32 for Dalhart, leaving the total offensive stats at 279 yards gained by Dalhart, 237 gained by Spearman.

The Lynx covered two Dalhart fumbles and the Golden Wolves pounced on three Spearman bobbles. The Lynx drew five penalties for 25 yards, and the Wolves six for

Varsity proved to the Dalhart Wolves JV that they, too, could be excellent "mudders''--and in the process gained sweet revenge for an earlier loss in Dalhart by topping the visitors 20-0 in the rain, cold and mud last Thurs-

The situation did not look promising for the Lynx JV'ers going into the game. They had lost to their opponents earlier in the rain on a similarly wet field, as Dalhart had sloshed to a 6-0 victory. Such a wet field Thursday was expected to be a detriment to the Lynx JV passing and wide run attack.

Making matters worse, injuries to key players on the Lynx varsity had forced the call-up to two of the Lynx JV's top offensive players, speedy running back Monty Morris and passing ace Allan Mires, who had been alternating with Bob Cook between quarterback and offensive end.

With the loss of Morris and Mires, and Dalhart's proven ability as "mudders," things looked a trifle dark for the Lynx JV at kickoff time.

The darkness brightened for the Spearman JV in a hurry-figureatively speaking for the weather remained cold and rainy throughout the contest.

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

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
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
