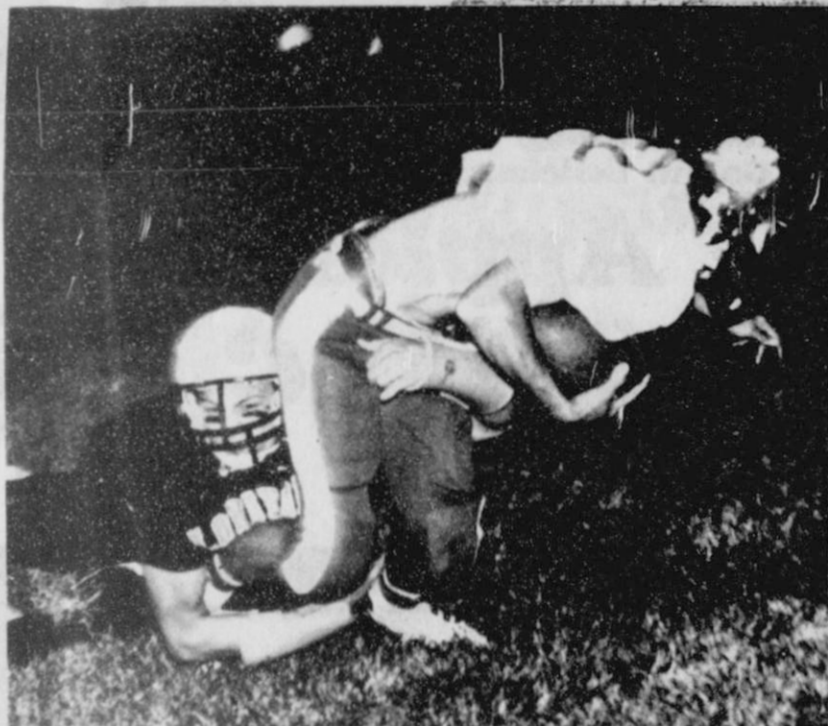

#### Our Heritage of Faith...

The distinction between "Law" and "Gospel", that is, the language derives from Martin Luther, who thought all theology was to be measured by it. He saw one God in one Word speaking two kinds of languages to two situations. In Lutheran interpretation, the Law is constituted to effect human relations but never to make humans right with God. It is the power of God for establishing the state and human society, for care of the neighbor. But in that matter of one's being saved or justified, the law always and only serves to accuse and to condemn the sinner. Then the Gospel comes in to play its part, not as a system of new rules and regulation but to issue in spontaneous loving discipleship after reception of the gift of unmerited grace or favor from God. Confusion of these two languages and intentions mislead people from the message of the Bible and God's revealed will. And it seems that this confusion appears within peoples' lives in that there seems not to be a healthy balance between the two. There seems to be extremes in the lives of people; either Law or Gospel. And again, people so often get both terms mixed up.

4-H members in Hansford County are joining the nearly five million young people nationwide in observing National 4-H Week, October 7-13 according to Karen Harruff and Burt Williams, County Extension Agents.

Using the theme, "4-H Building on Experience," members are challenged to use their own, as well as others' experiences and expertise in acquiring practical skills. They also are learning good

health habits, developing respect for themselves and others, exploring career and leisure time opportunities, sharing responsibilities for preserving the environment, and developing leadership and citizenship skills.

Harruff said that during the special week members of America's largest out-of-school youth education organization will celebrate with activities aimed at promoting individual growth and

accomplishment, creativity, social responsibility, and family involvement.

In Hansford County, there are thirty-five volunteer leaders, working with 151 4-H members. These volunteers are among the more than 620,000 leaders nationwide, who each contributed about 220 hours of service last year.

4-H, conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service at Texas A&M University, is available to

boys and girls, 9 to 19, wherever they live. Programs are conducted in the 3,150 counties of the United States, plus the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, The Virgin Islands, and Guam. Since its inception, about 45 million Americans from all walks of life have been involved in 4-H. In addition, some 82 countries around the world have youth programs similar to 4-H.

4-H thrives because of a unique partnership with the public and private sectors who contribute at the local, state, and national level. Not only does this partnership include financial support, but many business men and women volunteer their time and talents to young people, as well, Williams said. He added that support at the local level is received through Hansford County 4-H Council.

At the national level, support is channeled through National 4-H Council, a not-for-profit educational organization that uses private resources to strengthen and expand the 4-H program.

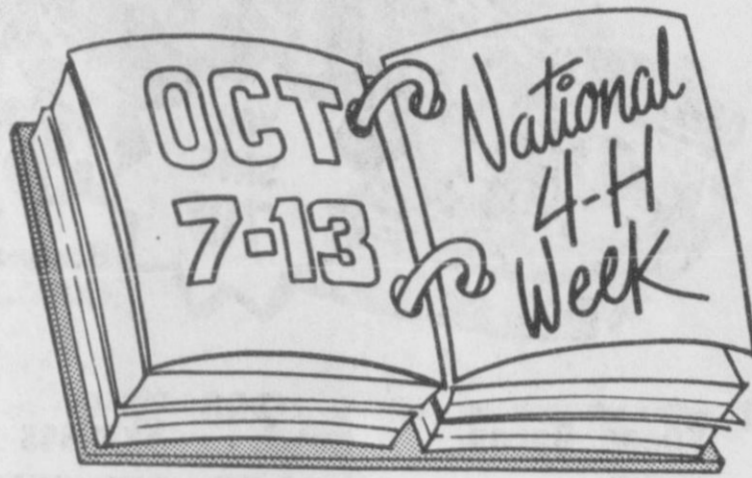

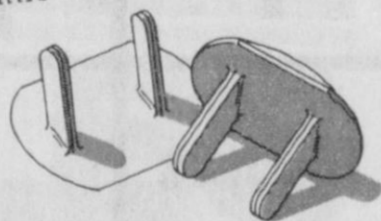

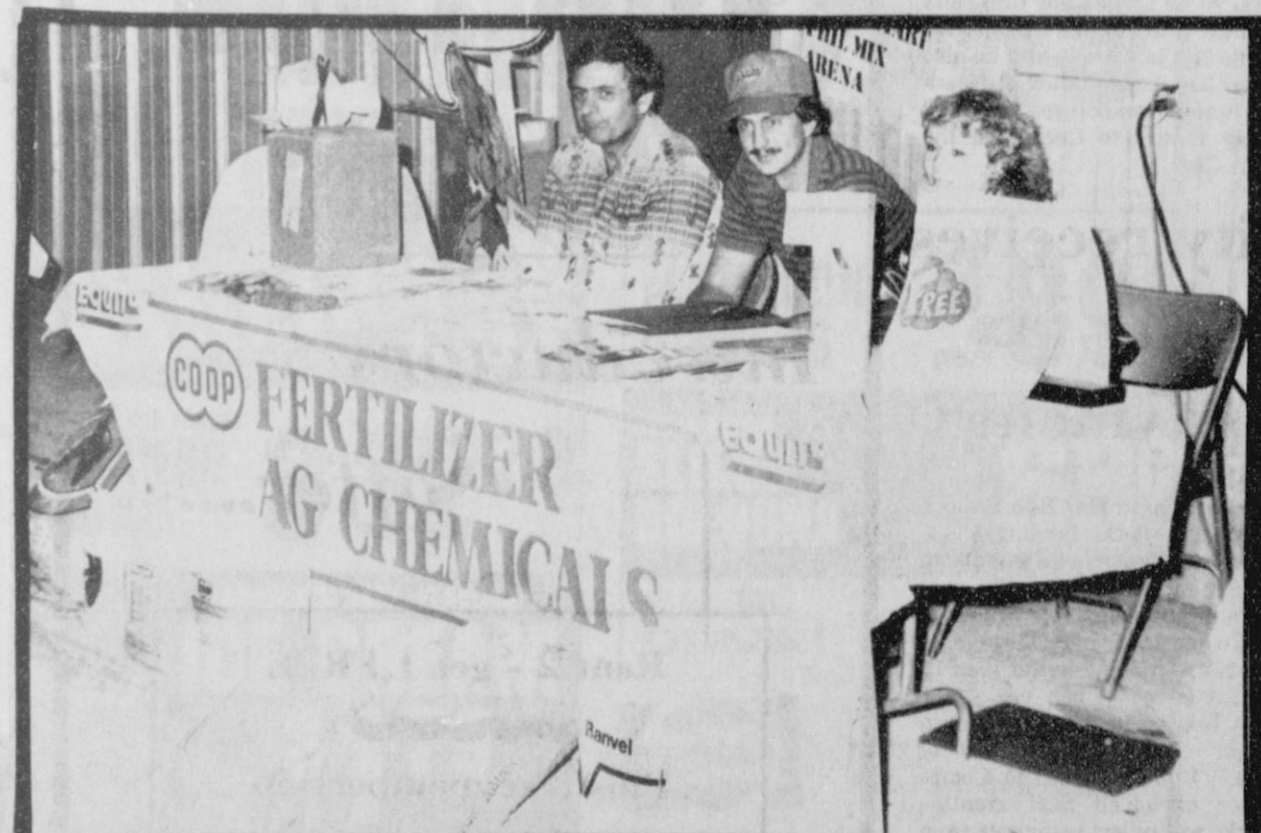

The sight and sounds of children dressed in Halloween costumes for trick or treating through the neighborhood is something we look forward to each year. And for the children, going door-to-door for treats is the high point of Halloween festivities.

But the traditional "trick or treat" celebration also raises concern about pranks, safe food treats, and street safety.

Parents wishing to preserve Halloween's traditions but insure their children's safety, have become more involved with the supervision of door-to-door trick or treating.

But other parents and communities are working to change the trick or treat tradition itself. The original idea of trick or treating is simple: either you give a "treat" or endure a practical joke on you or your property.

Today we see that this sort of activity can be destructive and could also be viewed as a mild form of blackmail. To emphasize the positive aspects of Halloween, some communities are emphasizing the constructive meaning of "trick" as a brief entertainment. So for the favor of being entertained by the child, the adult gives a treat.

Parents can call this activity "trick and treating" or as many children already say, "trick n' treating." For young children, disguises are tricks enough to merit a treat. The child visiting neighbors to ask "Guess who I am?" can both surprise and

delight.

For older children simple magic tricks such as palming a coin, are fun and entertaining. Children can learn easy tricks from friends, games or books on magic from the library.

Active tricks like singing a short song, reciting a limerick, juggling or doing an imitation of the character their costume represents, can also be fun for older children.

The traditional treat of candy is also changing in some communities. Neighbors are giving homemade cakes, cookies or doughnuts, fruits, nuts, popcorn and other harvest time foods. Often they'll place an address label on the wrapped treats so parents will know who they came from.

Other people are giving inexpensive nonedible items for treats such as coloring books, crayons, pencils, fast food coupons, baseball cards and novelty items.

Along with changes in trick and treats, some communities and neighborhoods have publicized guidelines and hours for the activity. These can serve to help all members of the community have a fun, safe, positive trick 'n treat celebration.

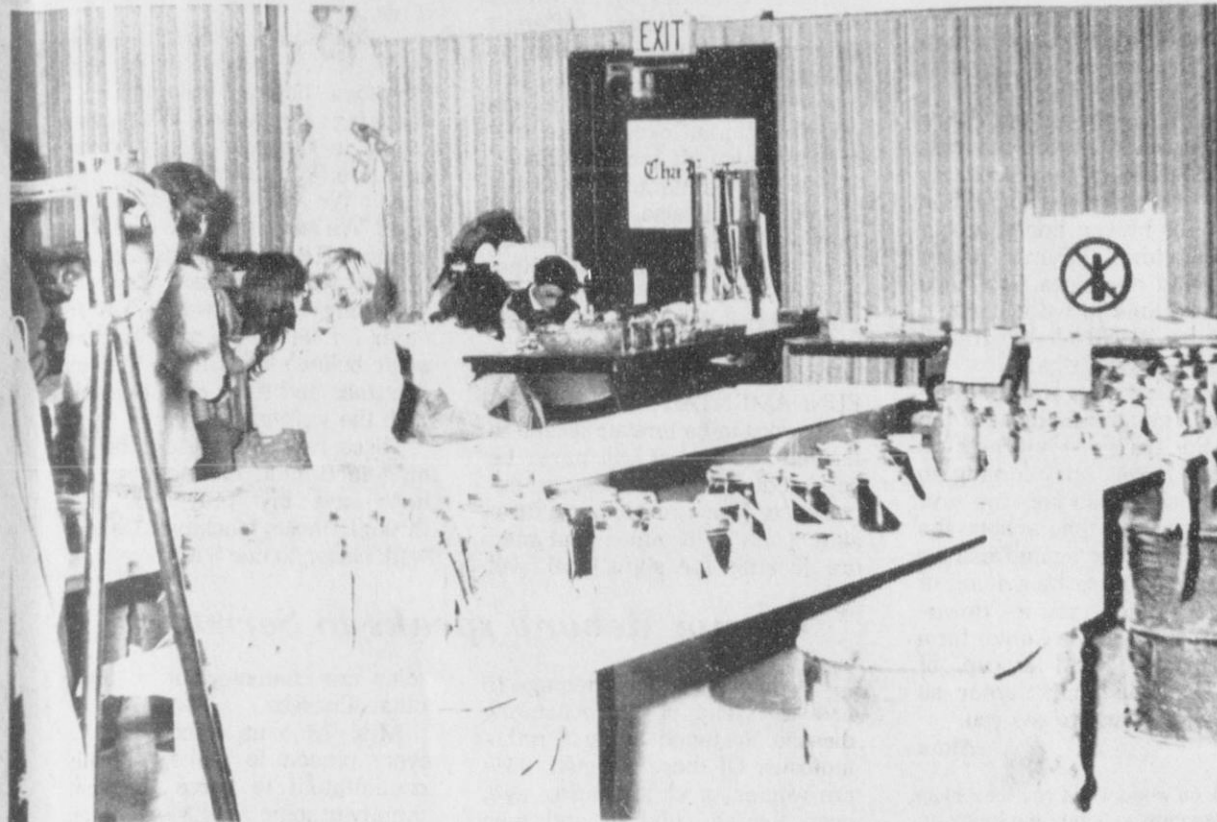
Attending from Hansford County was Karen Harruff, Extension Home Economist.

**City receives sales tax payment**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$58.2 million in local tax payments to the 990 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

"So far this year, these payments are running better than 16 percent ahead of last year, and most Texas cities can expect even bigger checks for the rest of 1984," Bullock said. The Comptroller explained next month's checks will reflect payments from sales tax permit holders who report quarterly and the December checks will reflect the first increases from new goods and services taxed for the first time beginning October 2.

Spearman received a net payment of \$8,426.93 and Gruver received \$2,949.97, compared to last years payment of \$817.52 for Gruver and \$9,282.99 for Spearman.

Spearman has payments to date of \$96,766.08 and Gruver has \$30,359.15.

1983 payments for Gruver were \$29,312.00 and Spearman \$153,669.65.

The percentage up to date for Spearman is -37.03% and Gruver is 3.57%.

**Local citizens on unclaimed money list**

The Texas Treasury publishes its second Unclaimed Money Fund list Sunday (October 7) to reunite 27,000 "lost" account holders with \$9.5 million.

The publication, appearing in 14 newspapers statewide, will contain names of all persons and organizations with \$50 or more in dormant accounts.

The initial "lost" accounts list was published a year ago and State Treasurer Ann Richards said it was a "smashing success."

"The Treasury returned more than \$2.3 million to some 4,000 individuals and businesses. Many of those would not have been found if we had not published such a massive listing of account owners," she said.

Before publishing the list, Richards said only about \$1 million was returned to rightful owners. "And the number of owners located is even more dramatic -- 4,257 this year compared to 1,200 a year ago," Richards said.

The total amount of money

collected by the state since the law was enacted in 1961 is \$65.8 million. Of that total, 33.2 per cent has been collected since Richards took office two years ago and 52 per cent of all claims paid to citizens have occurred during her administration.

Richards said in addition to the annual list, she has created the Treasury's first Locator Unit with investigators looking for owners of large dormant accounts.

The Treasury is also working with the Texas Department of Aging, using senior volunteers to help find dormant account owners.

Under State law, any account inactive for seven or more years is declared dormant. At that time, all financial institutions, corporations and insurance firms doing business in Texas must turn dormant accounts or information about such accounts over to the Treasury.

While checking and savings accounts are the most common dormant accounts, dormancy oc-

curs in such instruments as certificates of deposit, cashier's checks, safety deposit boxes, stock dividends, insurance dividends and matured endowments.

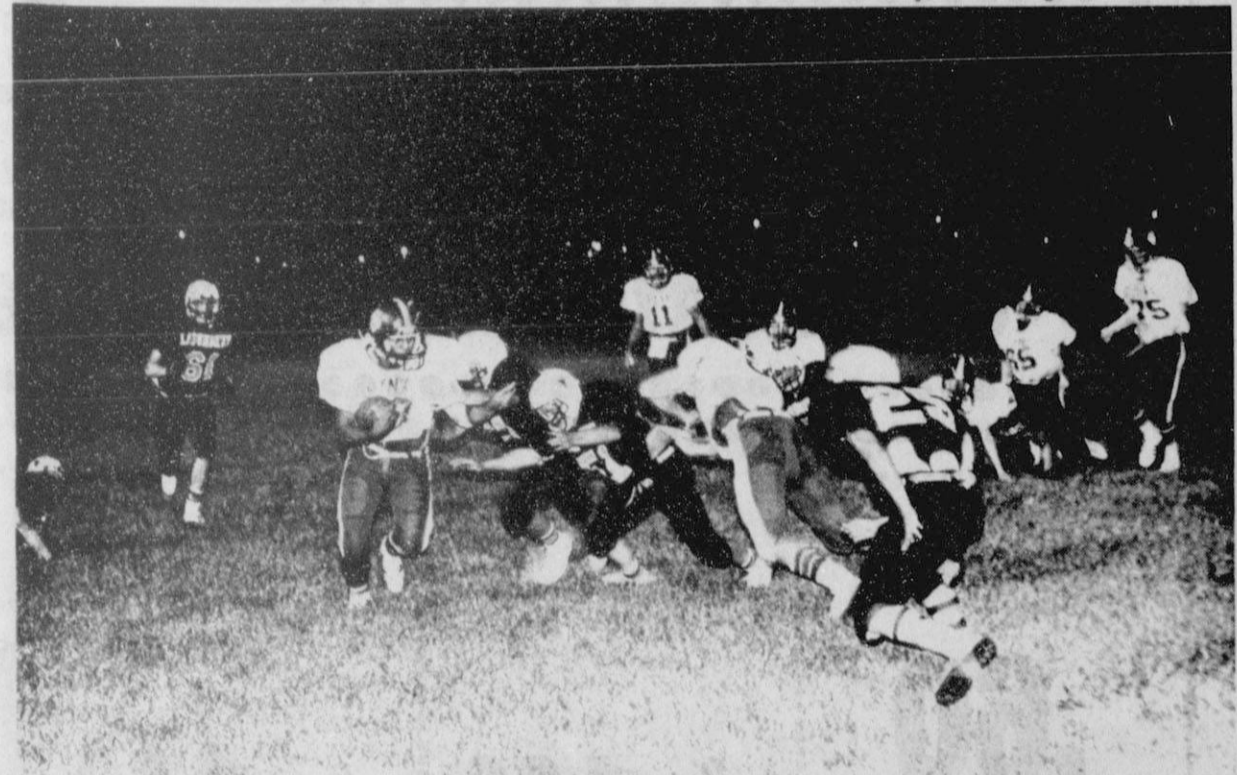
The 27,000 names appearing in this year's tabloid were taken from the 1984 advertising reports of financial institutions, corporations and insurance firms.

This means that the Treasury does not yet have any of the funds to match names in the tabloid, but the Treasury will be able to match names with firms holding the unclaimed property. Those firms will actually pay the claimants.

Funds that have not been claimed by March 1985 are sent to the Treasury for handling.

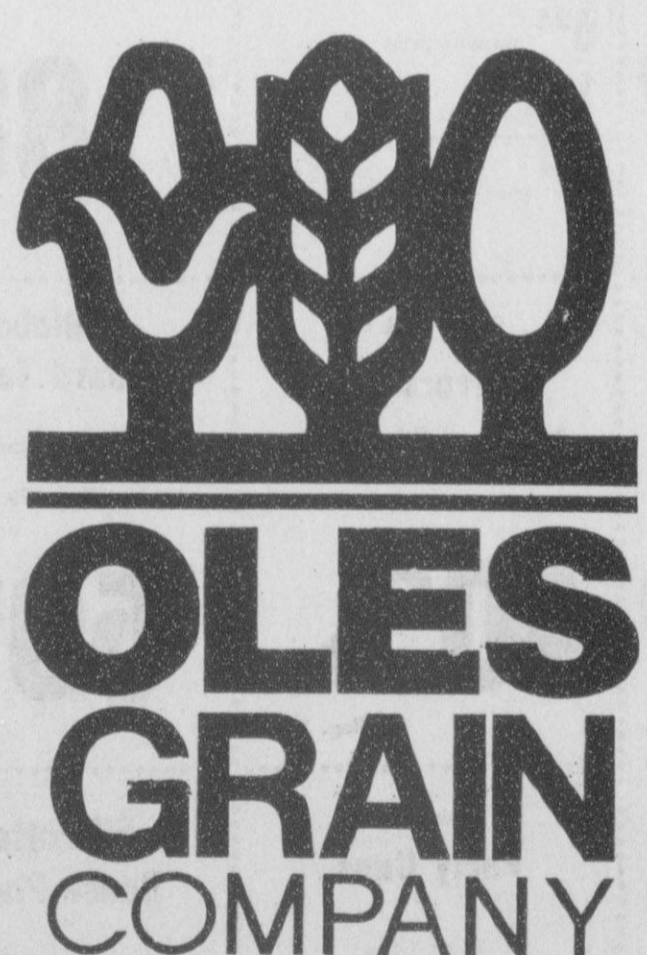
