#### Some things to think about before buying a telephone

Telephone customers in towns served by General Telephone have not been affected much by the long and loudly touted break-up of AT&T. These customers do, however, have the option to buy their own phones or continue to lease the ones they now have from the telephone company.

The revolution in the phone industry has been going on more quietly for almost six years. In 1978 customers were for the first time given the option of buying their own telephone for single line use. Last year that option was broadened when the phone industry was deregulated by Congress. Now

customers could purchase their own terminal equipment-phone company lingo for the multi-line telephones usually seen in business offices.

Although General Telephone, which provides local service for Spearman and its vicinity, has not been directly affected by the AT&T breakup, it has moved strongly into the new phone market. GTE customers do not have to buy their telephones now. They have the new option of buying, either from GTE or one of its competitors, or they can continue to lease. Both options have their merits.

Most local customers continue to lease their phones from GTE and

pay a monthly fee. This ranges from \$1.55 per month for the standard dial phone and rises to \$4.50 per month for the princess model phone. Push button models are slightly higher.

Customers who would like to buy a phone but prefer the GTE brand name can shop at the local Phone Mart in the Chamber of Commerce. There is a large variety of telephones to choose from including the cordless telephone, GTE's business office supervisor Dwight Hopson said.

Given the wide selection of phones and phone dealers, the customer may wonder how to sort the many options. One important consideration in deciding to buy or lease a telephone is the warranty, and here the dealers and models differ quite sharply.

The GTE warranty is one of the best reasons to stay with that company's products. Those who choose to continue leasing their units from the phone company are assured of free maintenance for the life of the instrument.

GTE will make a charge if a repairman must come to the residence, but if the phone is brought to the GTE service center, repairs are free.

the Phone Mart the warranty is more limited. Some styles are sold by GTE but not made by them. These phones have warranties which vary from 30 to 90 days. If the phone is a GTE phone, the company will exchange or replace it free within 30 days of purchase. If the phone is found to be defective within 90 days, the company will fix it. After that, you're on your own.

These hassles must of course be wieghed against the potential savings. Customers who lease their phones at the minimum rate will pay \$18.60 a year simply for the privilege of having a phone. A phone can be bought with a 90 day

warranty for \$24.88. If the phone lasts for five years the customer will have paid \$24.88; if he has rented it he will have paid \$93.

The arguments, of course, have two persuasive sides and local phone customers will be weighing the merits of buying a telephone.

The increased competition unleashed by deregulation is supposed to improve quality and speed advances in technology. In that case, the telephones on the market today may be obsolete in just a few years. If the quality of the instrument does change, though, the arguments over what to do with it may not.



## **Gruver EMS sets** EMT course Jan. 23

The Gruver Emergency Medical Service will be presenting an Emergency Medical course at the Gruver Elementary School located at 405 Garrett. The course is scheduled to begin at 6:00 P.M. on Monday, January 23, 1984. This course is being presented through Frank Phillips College in Borger, Texas as an adult continuing education course.

Cleaning Crayon Marks From Child's Clothing

The hidden crayon in your child's pocket can cause havoc in the laundry. If crayons go through the laundry, try these remedies:

If there are a few spots on a washable garment, remove the surface crayon wax with a dull knife. Place stained area face down between paper towels and press with a warm iron.

Then place the garment with stain face down on the paper towels and sponge back of any remaining stain with a prewash spray or a dry cleaning solvent spot remover. Solvent spot removers can be purchased at drug, grocery or some clothing and department

After sponging with solvent, let dry. Then launder with detergent or soap. If traces of color remain wash again. Then soak in an enzyme pre-soak product or oxygen bleach (one that says safe for colors) with hottest water safe for fabric. After that, launder the item as usual. If the stain persists, try washing with chlorine bleach if it is safe for the fabric.

When crayon stains have spread throughout a load of clothes, try this: First, wash the items with the hottest water safe for fabric, (preferably hot) using a laundry soap and I cup baking soda. If the color remains, soak in an enzyme pre-soak product or an oxygen bleach using the hottest water safe for fabric, then launder. If the stain persists, wash with chlorine bleach if safe for fabric.

For valuable non-washable items it is advisable to have them professionally cleaned as soon as possible after the stain is discovered. Be sure to point out the stain to the dry

If your child has applied his creative talents with crayon to your upholstery fabrics (other than leather, suede or vinyl) or other dry clean-only items, use a dry cleaning solvent.

Test the solvent on an inconspicuous area to determine its effect on the fabric before applying to the stained area. If the fabric doesn't seem to be affected adversely, sponge the solvent onto the stained area

In the case of piled fabrics, rub in the direction of the pile. Sponge again if the stain remains.


Some vinyls are damaged by dry cleaning solvents. For stains on vinyl, try wiping the stained area with a heavy-duty liquid laundry detergent or with a paste made from dry laundry detergent and warm water. If the stains remain, sponge with rubbing or denatured alcohol. Again test solutions on an inconspicuous spot before applying alcohol to the stained area.

It is safest not to attempt any major stain removal at home on suede and leather garments. These items should be taken to professional


