## Pride of Panhandle 4-H Horse Show Held Here Sat.

Youngsters from throughout the area converged on Oscar Archer Arena here for the Pride of the Panhandle 4-H Horse Show Saturday and by the time the dust had cleared that evening, Hansford County boys and girls had done very well indeed in the competition.

Hansford County 4-H'ers were especially strong in their showing of halter class mares, and in Western Pleasure, Western Riding and Showmanship competition.

Shelly Dunnihoo's Alabama Lady De won Grand Champion Mare honors. Earlier Shelly and her mare won first place in the registered mares over five years old division, which also saw Kristin Dunnihoo place fifth with I'm A Girl Bars, and Bonnie Jarvis sixth with Cowgirl Dell.

Gruver's Jason Haefner showed the first place entry, Prissy April, in the Graded Mares division. Deana Turner's Nips Good Bar took fourth place and Mark Eakin's Lea's Stone Deck eighth in registered Geldings.

In Showmanship, ages 12-14, Deanna Turner took first place, Kristin Dunnihoo third, Shelly Dunnihoo fourth, and Clay Hobbs of Gruver eighth. Misty Savage took third place Showmanship honors in the 9-11 year old division, Bonnie Jarvis was eighth and Mark Eakin ninth.

Deana Turner won the Western Horsemanship, ages 12-14, competition astride Nip's Good Bar, Shelly Dunnihoo placed second on Alabama Lady De, Kristin Dunnihoo was fifth on I'm A Girl Bars, and Clay Hobbs was ninth on Justa Jetrail.

In Western Riding, ages 9-11, Bonnie Jarvis placed fourth on Cowgirl Dell, Mark Eakin was fifth on Lea's Stone Deck and Michael Whitefield ninth atop Wild Cambler.

Deanna Turner repeated her success in Western Horsemanship by capturing top honors in Western Riding. It was another strong event for Hansford County 4-H'ers as Kristin Dunnihoo took second and Shelly Dunnihoo third, for a clean Hansford Sweep of the top three spots.

In Western Pleasure, 12-14, Deanna placed second, Shelly fourth and Kristin sixth, with Hobbs placing ninth. Miss Turner was second again in Bridle Path Hack, Miss Jarvis placed sixth and Eakin seventh.

Eakin won second place in 9-11 Western Horsemanship, Amy.Smith on Wild Gambler was fifth, Haefner was eighth, Miss Jarvis ninth and Misty Savage on Sierra Red Chief placed 12th.

In Western Pleasure, 9-11, Misty Savage and Sierra Red Chief finished fifth, Eakin came in seventh, Bonnie Jarvis 10th and Michael Whitefield 11th.

In the racing events, Hobbs, Eakin and Haefner led a strong Hansford showing. Eakin and Lea's Stone Deck won the 9-11 Barrel Racing, and also took first place in 9-11 Stake Race, plus a sixth in 9-11 Pole Bending.

# Angry Purple will scrimmage here Friday nite

Spearman Lynx fans will get their first chance to see the 1983 version of the Angry Purple in game-type action when the Lynx host Guymon's Tigers here Firday in a scrimmage.

Head Football Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier said the action will get underway at 6 p.m. when the Lynx junior varsity takes on the Guymon J V. The Lynx-Tiger varsity tussle will get started at 7:30 p.m.

Lanier said the contest will be a controlled scrimmage with no kick-offs as it is intended as "strictly a learning experince." ## Three 'standing tall' youths' describe Rotary Camp

Three young men stood tall at the noon Meeting of the Spearman Rotary Club Monday and told "it like it was!"

The three -- Mark Guthrie, Byron Sutterfield and Bob Cook -- were guest speakers for the Rotary Youth Leadership session and described their feelings about the Rotary Youth Leaderships Awards Camp they attended, under sponsorship of the local Rotarians.

All three thanked the Rotarians for the opportunity of attending the camp, and each said he benefited greatly from the experience. But they also had some good natured gibes for the Rotarians.

Guthrie said the camp helped him understand Rotary goals and the club's service to its community. He said that before the trip, he had thought of the Rotarians as just a bunch of old men who met together to eat, and "sold brooms and things like that," prompting laughter from the gathering and a rejoinder from one of the members--"Wrong club, son." (It is Lions Club members not the Rotarians, who are noted for their broom sales).

Guthrie said the camp was informative and featured a variety of speakers — athletes, oil related industry men and business persons.

He said one message at the Rotary camp, often repeated in one form or another, came through loud and clear, "Go straight forward in life" and "have enthusiasm" for what you're trying to do.

However, Guthrie said that while he generally enjoyed the speakers, sometimes their talks "got a little long."

And with a little grin, he added, "And I didn't especially like getting up at 6:45 a.m. for calesintics, either."

Guthrie said that his community, so "the part I enjoyed most was meeting people from all over the Panhandle." He said this exposure to others would "help a lot when I go to college."

When his turn came to address the gathering, Sutterfield said he found the Rotary camp to be a "real experience," that helped him to "get to know more about myself, and to learn about the Lord."

He made a mock grimace and spoke of the early wake up and long speeches, but also said the big thing to him was the learning experience he enjoyed and added that he "learned a lot from camp leaders like Mr. Collard (John R. Collard, Jr. who went along as a counselor.)

Cook, who turns 16 today, was introduced by Collard as the youngest of the trio from Spearman who attended the camp. Cook said he "like the others," found the camp to be "pretty interesting."

Cook said he was very interested in athletics so he was pleasantly surprised — I guess I expected a bunch of wierdoes" — by the athletes who were there. He said he enjoyed very much the presentation by Craig Bradshaw, "little brother" of Pittsburgh Steeler ace quarter-back Terry Bradshaw.

He also enjoyed the competition in sports such as volleyball and softball, he said, "but he thought the 6:45 wake up "was a little out of hand."

He mentioned Craig Timerlakem a man who had gradually gone blind but was nevertheless studying to be an attorney and spoke out on developing a positive mental attitude--"keep on Keeping on."

Cook closed by saying, "I hope whoever goes up next year has a good a time as I had."

Collard also described the adventures in camp and enroute, including a humorous account of bus troubles.

He mentioned Warren Adams, education-business liaison officer for Region 4 of the Education Service Center, who told quite "a promoter of the free enterprise system," one who told the young camp attendees "there is nothing wrong with making an honest profit."

He also told of Dan Hemphill, one of the owners of Camp Summerlife, who treated the camp attendees to popcorn and soft drinks.

And Collard said author and Borger Rotary Club member Mel Marshall, also a camp counselor, gave the boys attending some tips on fly tying. Collard said he would try to line Marshall as a guest speaker for the Spearman Rotarians "just before June vacations."

He said the "boys caught enough fish to feed the entire group two meals while we were there." Some of the boys also got an opportunity to sightsee in Taos, N.M., some 19 miles northeast of the camp.

After the boys and Collard spoke, a member mentioned Coy Palmer who had recently suffered an apparent heart attack and had been transferred to an Amarillo hospital. The club decided to send flowers and a get well card to Palmer.





## Increased spending in public schools

AUSTIN-Texans increased spending on local public schools by \$900 million last year, as trustees in 1,071 school districts adopted school budgets totaling \$8.5 billion. That provided more than \$300 in additional funds for each of the 2,678,000 students in the state, according to the Texas Research League.

State foundation school aid was upped by \$345 million, but local property taxpayers were tagged for an additional \$425 million to pay for the increase. The remainder was funded by increases in special state and federal aid programs and by higher local fees and other

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks for 1983-84 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the League. The

Texas Research League is a private, nonprofit, Austinbased, educational corporation engaged in governmental re-

School budgets adopted for 1982-83 called for spending \$2,610.23 per student for current operations. Spearman ISD's budget provided for \$3314.73. per student based on the 804 students in average daily attendance in 1981-82.

Locally, the Spearman ISD's tax levy was increased by 7.5 percent for 1982-83 as compared to a 14.8 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Spearman ISD in 1981-82 was \$19,338 which was 28.2 percent above the minimum salary prescribed by the state. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$17,537 per classroom teacher, or 20.6 percent over the minimum. The legislature further increased the state minimum schedule by \$88-\$196 a month for 1982-83

There was an average of one teacher for 13.9 students in Spearman ISD compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio of 1 to 16.4. The pupil-teacher ratio is not the same thing as the average class size because teachers and students are not necessarily in class the same number of hours each day.

The report noted that the share of the total school payroll paid to classroom teachers has dropped from 73.4 percent of the total in 1969-70 to 60.4

cents of each payroll dollar last year as many more non-teaching personnel have been hired. Locally, classroom teachers were paid 69.2 percent of the school payroll in

The average school property tax rate in 1981-82 was \$0.531 per \$11 of market value (selling price) so that the school tax on a property selling for \$10,000 was \$531 in the average school district. Locally, the rate on market value in Spearman ISD was .478 or \$478.00 on a property selling for \$100,000.

If the property were a homestead or owned by a senior citizen, the school tax would be less because of various exemptions. Openspace land if qualifying would be valued on productivity value rather than market value and would be taxed less.

The report noted that the 68th Legislature increased appropriations for public schools by almost a billion dollars (\$962 million) for the next biennium. However, only an additional \$192 million increase (5.4 percent) in foundation aid to local school districts will be available for 1983-84 school budgets that school trustees are now working on

Gruver ISD's budget provided for 3839.44 per student based on the 460 students in average daily attendance.

The Gruver ISD's tax levy

The Gruver ISD's tax levy was increased by 13.0 percent for 1982-83 as compared to a 14.9 percent increase for the

average school district in Texas.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Gruver ISD was \$19,548 which was 24.4 percent above the state minimum salary.

Gruver had an average of one teacher for 11.6 students. Gruver classroom teachers were paid 66.8 percent of the

school payroll.

Average school property tax rate in Spearman ISD was .317 or \$317.00 on a property selling for \$100,000.

The Pringle-Morse School with an average daily attendance of 70 students budget provided for \$7490.44 per student. The Pringle-Morse ISD's tax levy was increased by 14.5 percent for 1982-83.

Average salary for classroom teachers paid by Pringle-Morse in 1981-82 was \$17,912 which was 21.9 percent above the state minimum salary.

There was an average of one teacher for 7.7 students in Pringle-Morse.

Pringle-Morse teachers were paid 57.8 percent of the school payroll.

Average school property tax rate in Pringle-Morse was .310 or \$310.00 for property selling for \$100.000.



## Felony cases will jump to \$750.00 Sept. 1

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin leaned back in his chair, shook his head, and tried to describe the tremendous impact newly passed theft punishment legislation will have on law enforcement at all levels in the state.

"Effective Sept. 1, through new legislation just passed by the state legislature, the felony theft law has been changed," McFarlin said.

McFarlin explained the current law sets \$200 as the dividing line between misdemeanor and felony theft--a theft of any amount over \$200, or of anything valued at more than \$200, is a felony and may be punished by a term in the state penitentiary.

But, the sheriff said, after the first of next month, the "magic" figure will be hiked all the way from \$200 to \$750.

That means the theft of less than \$750, or of anything valued at less than \$750, will be classified as a misdemeanor, and will be tried as such before the county judge rather than as a felony tried in district court, he said.

And persons found guilty of theft less than \$750 and sentenced to incarceration, will be placed in county jails instead of being "sent up" to the state pen.

"This will throw a lot of responsibilities handled before by the state back on the counties," McFarlin commented.

As a result, McFarlin foresees a much heavier workload in county courts, with a docket backlog in many counties such as is common in some district courts today:

He also sees a strain on the capacities of county jails because of the new legislation. Relating the problem to Hansford County, he remarked, "I expect it will throw us in a bind all right," and he added that sheriffs in many small county seat towns throughout the state will feel similar effects from the new

But the biggest impact of the shift from state to county resulting from upping the misdemeanor limit, will be felt in the bigger county seat cities, McFarlin said.

Despite the bind the new felony theft law may put the counties in, the Hansford County sheriff does not fault the state legislators for passing it.

'It's all in the way you look at it,' McFarlin said. He said his first reaction was "What have they done?" but that "if you just sit down and think about it for awhile, you can realise their standpoint."

McFarlin explained the Texas State Penitentiary in Huntsville is filled to capacity, or at least to the capacity specified by the federal government. In fact, he said, the federal government "closed" the Texas pen to the admission of new inmates for awhile.

"That was the reason that 'tent city' was constructed down there," he remarked, and it caused an even greater than usual crowding prob-

lem in bigger city jails, because prisoners could not be sent on to the state prison during that time," he



Because from top to bottom in the state, prisons and jails are over flowing--or filled to the capacity permitted by astringent federal regulations--he expects there will be more and more probated sentences and out-of-jail work and rehabilitation programs.

Meanwhile, as citizens become more aware of the effects of the new law, "I think most taxpayers will be willing to come up with a little bit more money," to expand the capacity of the state penal facilities," McFarlin said.

McFarlin knows that in just a little over two weeks, Hansford County will start feeling the brunt of the new law. With the jail full this past week under the old law, he knows there will be problems. Yet he remains optimistic.

"I have visited with the county judge and the county commissioners. They all realise we're facing a problem. But they're also ready to work together to meet this problem.

"It'll be a problem all right-there won't be easy solution--but I feel real good about our ability to work together and handle it."



#### Bank withholding law repealed

AMARILLO -- Local and area banks will not withhold 10 percent of their customers' interest and dividend payments now that the withholding tax law has been repealed. President Ronald Reagan signed into law legislation repealing incoming tax withholding on interest and divid-

ends late last week. Reagan had opposed the legislation and at one time threatened to veto it. That probably would have been futile, though, as the measure passed both the House and Senate by margins wide enough to override a veto, after a massive lobbying cam-

paign by the banking industry. About six weeks ago, Jack Hightower's office reported he had received 13,500 letters from his constituents in the 13th Congressional District

Previously, USDA could require that some farmers either pledge their 1983 production as collateral for a price support loan and then immediately redeem the loan collat-

According to CCC Executive Vice President Everett Rank, many farmers normally do not repay CCC loans in the same year the loans were obtained nor would some farmers normally repay a 1982 or earlier crop year loan this year. Rank said for these reasons, CCC will allow producers who would have been required to obtain or liquidate a loan for PIK purposes this year to extend both the date for doing so and their PIK availability date to Jan. 16.

> Rank said this action covers only farmers who have PIK availability dates that begin Aug. 1 or earlier and who request the extension. CCC storage payments on PIK commodities will end about five months after the PIK availability date for farmers who request the extension, he said.

Producers should request extensions at their county offices of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service before the end of the PIK availability period, Rank said.

Crop insurtion to withstand a crop loss,' ance is one means available to reduce that risk, note economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It offers the farmer protection when risks of weather and nature bring production declines.

One way of thinking through the crop insurance decision is to look at the expected cash flows per planted acre of wheat for the 1984 crop, explained Dr. James Ahrenholz, Extension management economist at Texas A&M University, College Station.

"Suppose the producer expects a yield of 20 bushels and a harvest price of \$3.50 a bushel. This would bring expected cash receipts of \$70 an acre," he said.

The expected cash operating expenses for this producer might be \$40 an acre, the economist noted. These are the preharvest expenses, including seed, fertilizer and fuel, and the harvest expenses.

Other cash obligations against this wheat crop might be debt service on land or machinery and possibly some portion of the family living expenses, he said. "Most often, these aren't thought of in a per acre manner, but they are cash outlays that cannot be

ignored," Ahrenholz said. 'For example, let's say they amount to \$20 an acre. This leaves a \$10 net cash flow per acre. This isn't calculated as a profit, but as a \$10 expected

positive net cash flow." This doesn't include a premium cost of crop insurance. Therefore, if the crop production and price expectations were met, and this wheat producer had carried crop insurance, his net cash flow would be less than \$10 by cost of insurance, the economist

"One of the primary considerations of the wheat produ-

Reducing production risk is cer's choice to insure is the Ahrenholz said. What, the producer must ask, are the financial consequences to his business of a lower than expected crop yield?

This producer might ask what would happen if his yield across the entire farm unit was lowered to 10 bushels. Keeping the expecting price the same, this would provide \$35 an acre cash receipts, less abaout \$60 an acre for expenses and obligations, or a negative \$25 cash flow an acre, without crop insurance.

"A question this producer must face is whether his' business is in a financial position to withstand this situation," the Extension economist stressed.

The Federal or Multiple Peril Crop Insurance program offers three levels of coverage and three price election options to the wheat producer. Coverage levels are 50, 65, or 75 percent of the area yield or the individual yield coverage established for the insurance unit. Price selections for the 1984 wheat crop are \$2.50 or \$4 a bushel.

"Using the yield established for his insurance unit and the premiums established for the level of coverage and price election combination, the wheat producer can now examine the net cash flow results of various harvested yields with insurance. This requires some calculating, but a part of risk management is understanding the consequences to business of crop losses with or without crop insurance,"

Ahrenholz said. "The crop insurance decision is unique for each wheat producer, depending to a great extent upon the financial ability of that producer to with-

stand a crop loss." Ahrenholz noted that Aug. 31 is the sales closing date for the Federal or Multi-Peril wheat insurance in Texas.

## 1984 Wheat Program Announced

In the Middle Ages, peo-ple thought your intelligence was in your heart.

WASHINGTON-Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng today announced provisions of the 1984 wheat program and set the signup period from Jan. 16 through Feb. 24.

Lyng said because Congress took no legislative action on a proposed freeze in the wheat target price before its summer adjournment, he is now putting into effect provisional measures previously announced on July 29. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is required by law to announce the wheat program for the following year no later than Aug. 15.

The 1984 wheat program includes: -- A \$4.45 per bushel target price. -- A \$3.30 per bushel national

average loan rate. -- An acreage reduction requirement of 30 percent.

-- No advance deficiency payments.

-- To be eligible for program benefits, producers must limit 1984 wheat planted acreage to no more than 70 percent of the farm's wheat base and devote to conservation use an acreage of eligible cropland equal

to 42.86 percent of the 1984 planted and payment-in-kind (PIK) acreage.

-- The 1984 acreage base will be the average of the acreage planted and considered planted to wheat in 1982 and 1983.

--Farmers participating in the acreage reduction program may divert an additional 10 to 20 percent of their wheat base and receive payment-in-kind equal to 75 percent of the established yield times the acres diverted.

-PIK program participants will not receive wheat from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks. Producers signing up in the PIK program will agree first to use their outstanding reserve or regular CCC price support loans. Producers with no outstanding loans agree to harvest for PIK. Those producers with no outstanding loans and who are unable to harvest for PIK will not receive a PIK payment.

-- Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm. Under summer fallow rules the land must be acreage that would have been planted to small grains or row crops in 1984 in the absence of the 1984 wheat program.

-- Having will not be permitted on the conservation use acreage. However, the acreage may be grazed except during the six principal growing months.

--Offsetting and cross compliance will not apply to the 1984

-There will be no immediate entry into the farmer owned reserve for the 1984 crop of wheat. Further, USDA intends to review the size of the reserve before regular price support loans for the 1984 crop reach maturity. A ceiling may be placed on the size of the wheat reserve at that time which will effectively preclude entry of the 1984 crop into the

### August 31 deadline for crop insurance

AMARILLO, TX--August 31 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for BARLEY AND WHEAT in HANSFORD County, TEXAS, according to GENE HAMILTON, Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production from damage caused by adverse weather conditions, insects, plant diseases, wildlife, earthquake or fire. "Insurance begins when the crop is planted," HAMILTON says.

Producers may choose from three coverage levels: 50-, 65-, or 75-percent of the established farm yield for

insurance protection. "Three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged also are available," HAMILTON says.

Producers of wheat, barley, and oats who can qualify for a new Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) plan are offered higher yield guarantees at no additional cost. For information about eligibility under the IYC plan, producers should contact an authorized crop insurance agent well in advance of the AUGUST 31 deadline.

To select an agent, producers should check the list of agents available at their county county ASCS office.

### Laws effect motor vehicles

OF INTEREST TO THE PUBLIC Several new bills were made "law" in the last regular session of

the Texas Legislature. Helen Dry, County Tax Assessor-Collector, says many of these laws affect the registration and titling of motor

Effective August 29, 1983, the temporary 72-Hour Permit will increase from \$10.00 to \$25.00. A 144-Hour Permit will be available at a fee of \$50.00.

Effective September 1, 1983, the following laws will be in effect:

1. A 5% penalty will be assessed if the Motor Vehicle Sales and Use Tax is not paid within 20 working days of purchase. Another 5% penalty, making a total of 10%, will be assessed if the tax has not been paid within 30 calendar days after its due date. The penalty is based on the amount of tax due.

2. A "moped" or "motorassisted hicycle" must be licensed and titled. An individual owning a moped on September 1, 1983 must have a title in his name before selling the vehicle.

3. A five (5) day grace period is allowed, without the 20% penalty. on vehicles with expired regis-

4. The registration fee for motorcycles (and mopeds) will be increased from \$5.30 to \$6.05.

5. Duplicate License Receipts will increase from \$1.00 to \$2.00.

6. A Certified Copy of a "lost" title will be \$2.00 instead of 25 cents.

7. The title fee on a motor vehicle will increase from \$3.00 to \$10.00. 8. Transfer License Receipts will

increase from 50 cents to \$2.50. 9. Delinquent Transfer Penalty will increase from \$5.00 to \$10.00.




