The proposed Palo Duro dam will be 2 miles long, 950 feet wide at the base, and 150 feet high. The dam will be a 2500 acre surface impounding 60,900 acre feet of water.



The sound of irrigation motors will start being heard less now that irrigation of grain sorghum is nearly completed and the watering of wheat is well under-

This is an excellent time for irrigation farmers to evalueate the need for work to be done to irrigation engines, gearheads,

Soil Conservation Service personnell at Spearman are available to assist farmers in the

evaluation of the efficiency of pumping plants.

SCS personnel have equipment to measure pumping depth and the amount of water being pumped. These two factors when combined with the amount of gas being used can be used to compute a pumping plant's overall efficiency.

When the cost of gas and the number of hours the well is pumped is combined with the efficiency factor, the irrigation farmer can better determine if repairs to the pumping plant is economically feasible.





So you've decided to sign up for an exercise class, and the question is, which one to take?

Selecting among exercise classes is sometimes just a matter of picking the one that meets closest to your home or at a convenient time. However, there are other important points to consider as well.

For example, you can't always judge the quality of an exercise program by the size of the fee charged. Sometimes higher fees simply mean that you're helping to pay for fancy equipment that the class will not use, or a business location in the high-rent district.

If fact, some of the best exercise programs may be available to you through public agencies and service organizations at very low cost.

The key rule for selecting an exercise program is finding one that acutally leads to increased fitness through appropriate aerobic exercise.

So before signing up for any exercise class, ask the following questions. the more "yes" answers you can give, the more likely that the program will help you become more fit.

Are personal health history forms or medical release forms required?

Will you get an individual fitness assessment and evaluation?

Do the warm-up and cool-down phases include slow stretching (not bouncing)?

Does the class emphasize cardio-respiratory endurance (aerobics) rather than dance technique?

Are five to 15 minutes allowed for warm-up: 20-30 minutes for aerobic conditioning; and five to 15 minutes for cool-down?

Does the instructor explain and follow the aerobic training principles for frequency, intensity, time or duration and type of





#### IRA deadline changed

The deadline for IRA (Individual Retirement Account) contributions has been shortened to the April 15 tax filing date. Regarding IRAs, pensions and annuities, heirs have been greater flexibility as to when to take taxable distributions. Also, part of the tax on long-term gains in variable and such annuities will now be able to completely defer longterm capital gains until they are paid out to the annuitant.

Some changes also have been made regarding tax credits and depreciaton write-offs for business related use of a personal computer or a car bought after June 18 of this year, notes Stegelin. Henceforth, the IRS will want proof that a computer is required for work and that it is used for business use more than 50 percent of the time. Regarding personal cars for business use, the 6 percent tax credit on cars costing more than \$16,666 has been reduced, and annual depreciation ceilings have been changed so that the write-off period has been nearly doubled.
