Spearman won the county championship Friday night, behind the running of Ricky Lopez who dashed 169 yards and 2 touchdowns. The 1-2 passing combination from quarterback Donahue to Mack McLain netted 102 yds. to give the Lynx the county championship 26-7.

Lopez started the Lynx scoring machine in the first period with a 53 yd. run. Gruver bounced back to take a 7-6 half-time lead on a 5 yd. touchdown run from Rod Been and Trevor Williams PAT.

McLain put the Lynx back in the lead in the third period with a 30 yd. pass play from Donahue to make the score 12-7. Steve Burke caught the PAT to give the Lynx a 14-7 lead at the end of the third quarter.

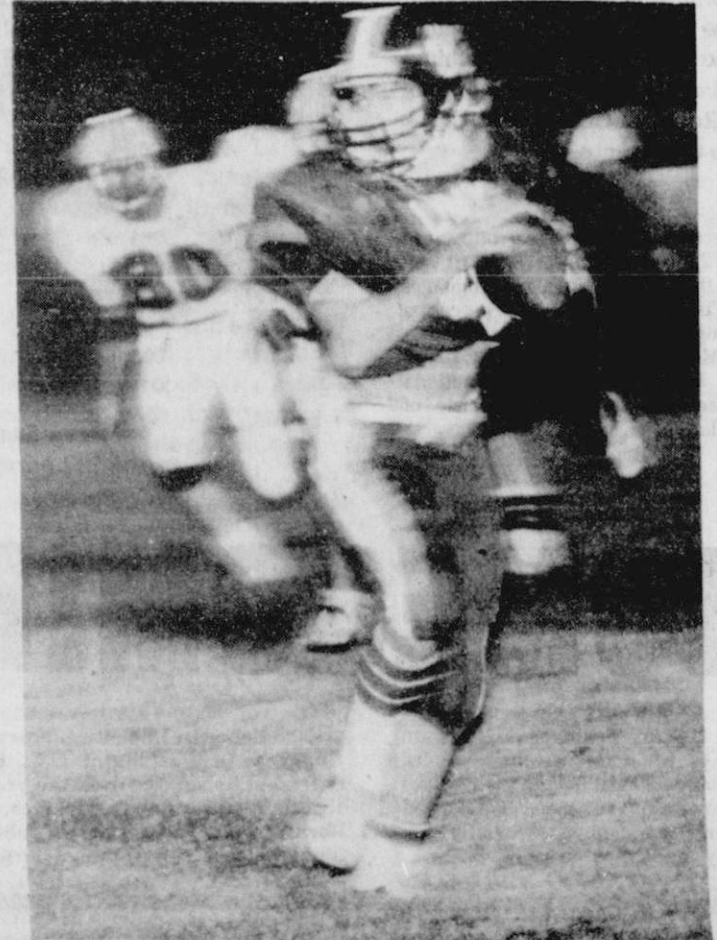
McLain, who grabbed three passes for the night, hauled in an 86 yd. pass with 7:31 left in the game to give the Lynx a 20-7 lead. Ricky Lopez who scored first for the Lynx also scored last for the Lynx on a 12 yd. run. He took a pitch out from quarter back Donahue and dashed into the end zone behind excellent blocking to end the scoring, final 26-7.

Spearman's PAT kicking game was their only problem Friday night. Their passing, running, blocking, and tackling was very much improved. The turning point in the game definitely changed when the Lynx stopped the Greyhounds on four plays inside the three yard line.

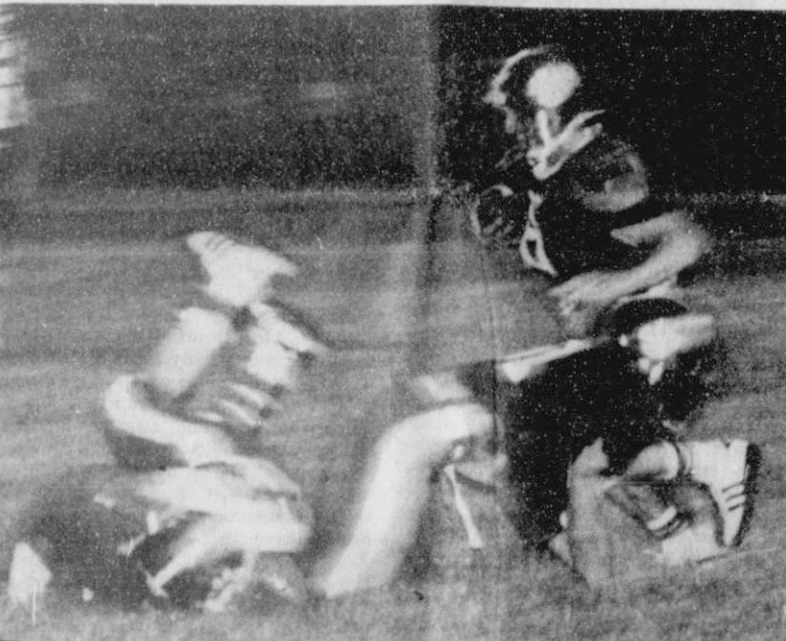

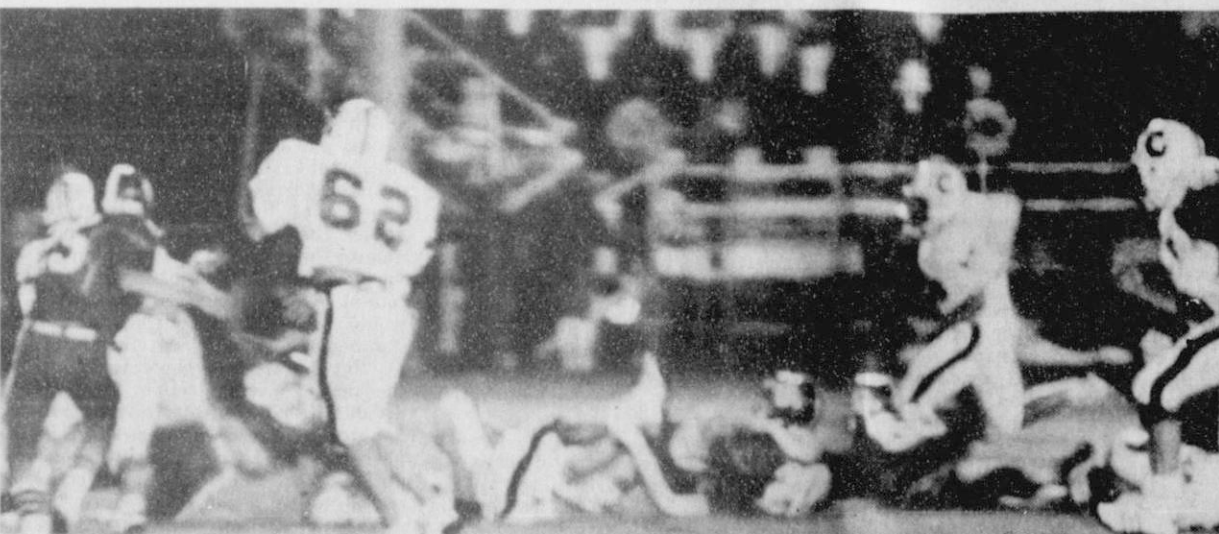

Regional C-C Conference to be held Saturday

Spearman IS Somplace Special! This motto, should ring true as the Spearman Women's Division hosts the Regional Chamber of Commerce Conference this Saturday, September 22, at the First United Methodist Church. Area Chamber women from Amarillo, Borger, Canyon, Dalhart, Dumas, Hereford, Plainview, Stratford and Tulia have been invited to attend this conference.

A lot of hard work and careful planning has been done for the organization of this meeting. The day will begin with the Executive Committee Meeting at 8:00 a.m. with Nancy Graves presiding. Nancy is the President of the Spearman Women's Division, as well as the General Chairperson for this conference. After

registration, there will be coffee and doughnuts served.

Then, the General Assembly is scheduled to begin at 9:00 a.m. Mary Lou Wysong, Spearman Chamber Manager, will make introductions. Followed by Rev. Lane Boyd, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, giving the Invocation. The City Manager, Jim Murray, will welcome everyone to Spearman and to the Conference, followed by a "get acquainted" time.

The City of Spearman's 1984-85 budget was set by the City Council at \$2,304,337.00. The net increase over last year's budget was 5%. Out of the \$2,304,337.00, 10% will go towards debt service and 30% towards gas purchases. The other 60% of the budget is comprised of salaries and wages, operating expenses, and capital outlay for this coming year.

The Municipal Sales Tax has dropped off severely this past year by 34%. In the City's 1982-83 fiscal year the City collected \$206,893.00 in sales tax revenue. It is projected for the 1984-85 year to be approximately \$150,000.00. In order to alleviate the problem with the sales tax, the City Council raised Ad Valorem taxes from the City's present tax rate of 72¢ per \$100 valuation to 72.59¢ per \$100 valuation.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Cable Television Services are taxable due to changes in the Texas Sales Tax Act effective October 2, 1984.

As a result sales taxes must be collected on Cable T.V. Services. Spearman Cable T.V. System will begin collecting State and Local Sales Taxes of 5.125% on Services provided after October 1, 1984. This is not a rate increase.

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The U.S. flag should be displayed on all days when the weather permits, especially on legal holidays, on official buildings, at polling places on election day and near schools. A citizen may display the flag on any day.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS
OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (¾ for The University of Texas System and ¼ for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a ½ vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of those counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

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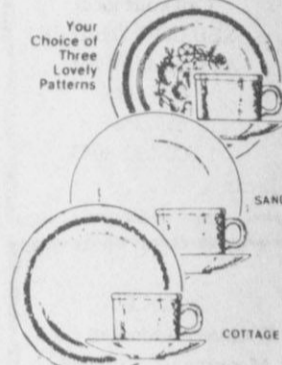
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Two Bit Sermons

Law or Grace

In the book of Galatians Paul compares the works of man to the grace of God. One of the most easily understood of these is found in Galatians 4:19-31. In this passage the two Sons of Abraham are compared. Their value to us lies in their ability to represent the two Laws. Man always has tried in some form or another to justify himself. Yet try though he may, he never will.

The first son was of a bond-woman. This woman and her son represent the covenant of bondage. This bondage of the law for man was a great condemnation. Man could not live up to the expectations of the law. The Law demanded much that man was not able to give. He was required to offer sacrifice for his own sin. Man never has been able to sacrifice sufficient to take away sin. Yet man has always tried and always will. This Law brought death. Death because they died under the Law not Grace.

"The state sales tax rate is going up and a number of new items and services will be taxable for the first time beginning October 2," Bullock said. "We are holding seminars across Texas so that these changes won't come as a surprise to anybody."

Tax Workshop to be held

Amarillo, College, in cooperation with Internal Revenue Service, is conducting a Small Business Tax Workshop on Monday nights beginning September 24, 1984, and concluding October 8, 1984. The workshop will be held on the Amarillo College campus from 7:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m. each Monday night.

The workshop explains business taxes, highlights tax benefits and obligations connected with a small business, and emphasizes employer tax responsibilities.

The first section of the workshop introduces participants to the basic types of business organization, business tax returns, record-keeping, and IRS functions. Participants also determine proper income and expense items of Schedule C business income tax returns.

The second section is a practical application session focusing on employment taxes. It is designed for those who plan to prepare their own business tax returns. Participants are first introduced to employment taxes. Practical exercises provide opportunities for participants to prepare the Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return, Form 941; the Employer's Unemployment Tax Return, Form 940; and, if necessary, the Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees, Form 943.

The workshop fee of \$16 will cover the tuition and course material. Registration may be made at the Administration Building for Course Number 2087.97.

What does a burglar look for when he's looking for an easy target? Homes that present the least risk of detection and the greatest opportunity for easy entry, according to the information presented at a recent Green Thumb training seminar.

About twenty Green Thumb workers from four counties learned to look at their homes through a burglar's eyes when they met at Borger, Texas on September 14.

Homes that appear unoccupied and unprotected; homes without adequate locks and lighting; open or unlocked doors and windows; and home sites which provide easy concealment from neighbors and passing motorists wear "Welcome Burglar" signs. Mike Smith, Chief of Police in Borger, gave participants tips on how to be home safe.

Also on the program was C.P.A. Ed Huntley, who discuss-

ed new income tax rules and helped participants know who should file an income tax return form.

Diane Parrish, State Director for Texas Green Thumb, conducted a question and answer portion of the program on administrative matters.

Green Thumb is an employment program for seniors that is sponsored by Farmers Union and funded by the Department of Labor. Rural residents who are over 55 years of age and income

eligible are hired and placed with non-profit organizations where they provide services to their home communities. Green Thumb is an equal employment/affirmative action employer.

Employer's deadline near

October 31 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 social security and withheld federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1984 and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service says.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until November 12 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can order one through the Forms/Tax Information number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government. IRS Publication 15, Circular E--Employer's Tax Guide, is also available through this number.

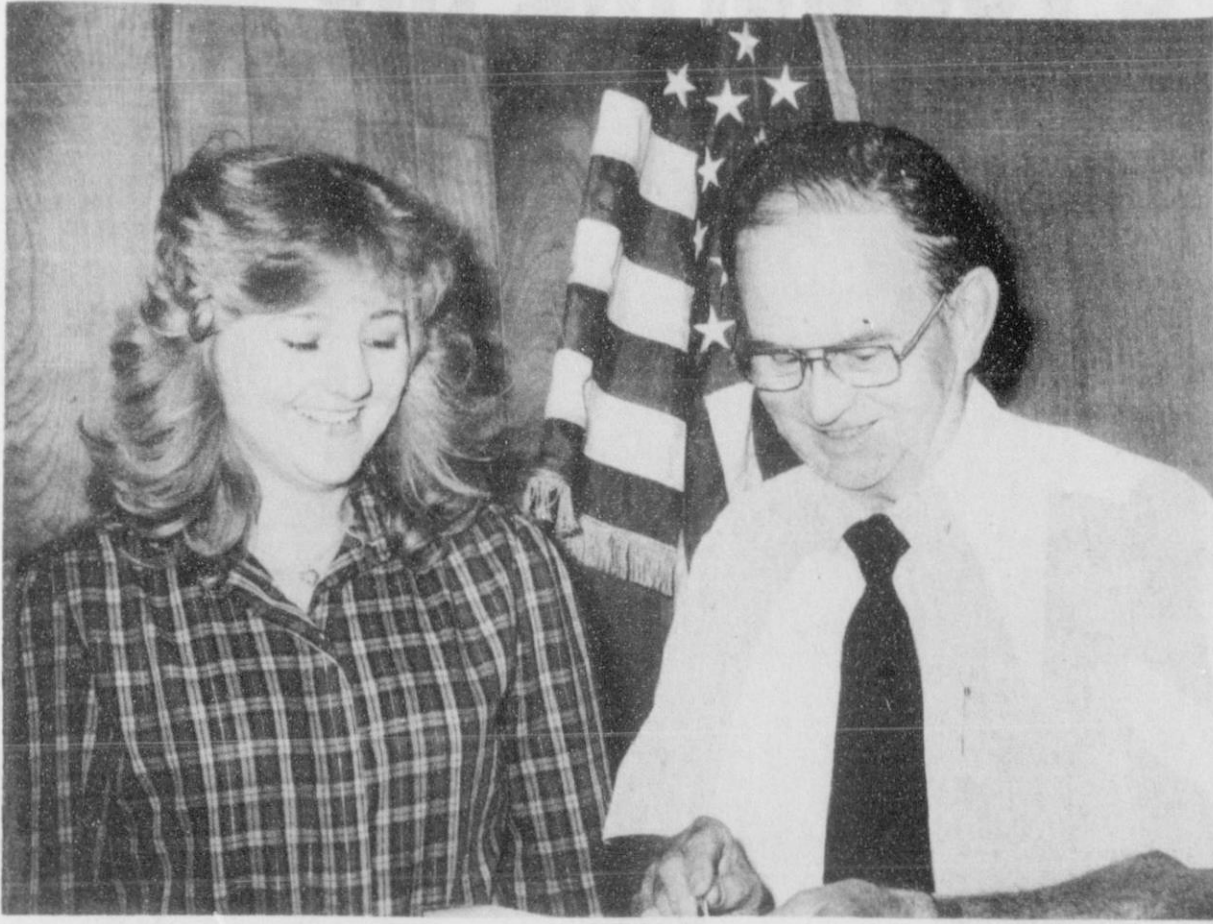
