Lynxettes blast Shamrock in opener for 1987

The Spearman Varsity Lynxettes started the new year off playing Shamrock in their first game of the Canadian Invitational Tournament January 1, 1987.

The Lynxettes scored nineteen points the first quarter, with nine field goals and one of two free throws, while Shamrock scored four field goals and one of two free throws, for a total of nine points.

The Lynxettes scored five field goals and three of seven free throws the

second quarter, while Shamrock scored four field goals and two of seven free throws. Half time score was Spearman 32, Shamrock 19.

The Lynxettes again outscored Shamrock the third quarter, putting in seven field goals, while Shamrock scored four field goals and three of four free throws. Third quarter score was Spearman 46, Shamrock 30.

The final quarter, the Lynxettes caught fire, scoring eleven field goals and four of ten free throws to

Shamrock's three field goals and two of six free throws. Final score was Spearman 72, Shamrock 38.

The Varsity Lynxettes played Valley Friday, January 2 for their second game of the Canadian Tournament.

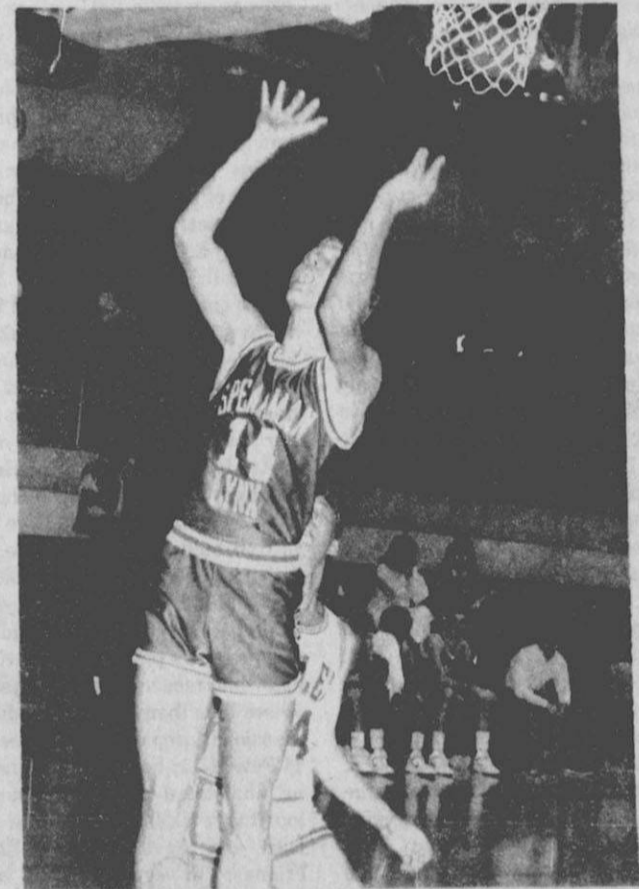
The Lynxettes led 17 to 13 the first quarter, scoring five field goals and seven of eight free throws to Valley's five field goals and three of four free throws.

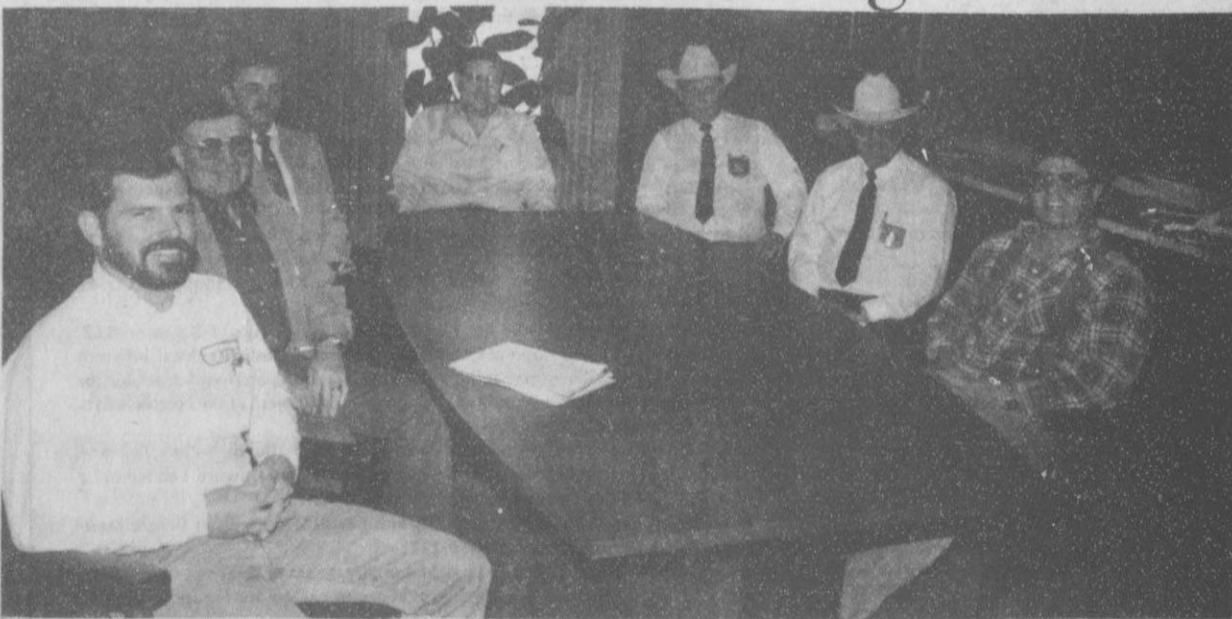
The third quarter, the Lynx scored five field goals and two of three free

Crime Prevention Program

The Texas New Mexico Power Company along with the Law Enforcement

Texas - New Mexico Power Company, in cooperation with local law enforcement officials, will launch a crime prevention program across the company's Panhandle Division beginning in January.

The Panhandle Division includes the towns of Perryton, Spearman, Follett, Higgins, Booker and Darrouzet, and rural areas of Hansford, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties.

Joe Cook, TNP's Panhandle division manager, said that the crime prevention program will function as an extra set of eyes for local police and sheriff's departments. TNP meter readers, linemen and electric servicemen will watch for possible criminal activity in the neighborhoods where they are working and will use the company's radio dispatching equipment to report anything suspicious to the proper authorities.

"We represented the idea at a meeting of our key personnel. The response from them was very enthusiastic. As each manager told his people about it, the enthusiasm continued to grow," Cook said.

One employee, Craig Vinson, an electric serviceman from the company's Spearman District Office, went so far as to develop some slogans that will be incorporated in advertising about the program.

TNP employees began training sessions with law enforcement officials earlier this month. Cook stressed that employees will not attempt to apprehend criminals but will provide information that will help authorities do the job.

"We wanted to meet with the authorities and let them inform our servicemen, meter readers and linemen what to look for and how to

submit the information. We will keep our eyes open and report any criminal activity, but we will not act like law enforcement officials," he said.

Employees observing suspicious activities will contact TNP offices by radio. The office will then relay the information to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

Information on suspicious activity within Perryton and Spearman will be relayed to the police department in those towns. Reports of criminal activity in rural areas and those towns without police departments will be relayed to the sheriff's departments in Hansford, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties.

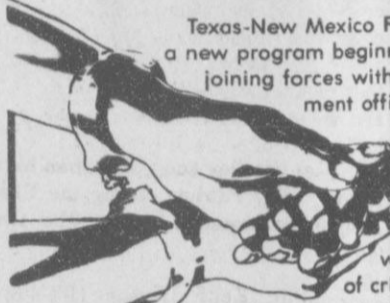

Weight Watchers

Weight Watchers will get its more than 800,000 members on the move in 1987 when it introduces its Quick Start Plus Exercise Plan and Self-Discovery Plan. According to the Department of Health and Human Services, staying overweight and not exercising regularly are among the top "unhealthy habits" in the U. S. The 1987 Weight Watchers Program elements are a direct response to that fact.

Along with the Quick Start Plus Food Plan and a group support system, the Quick Start Plus Exercise and Self-Discovery Plans complete the Weight Watchers four-pronged approach to weight control.

"Americans now eat five to ten percent fewer calories than they did 75 years ago, yet they weigh an average of five pounds more," says Dr. William McArdle, professor of physical education at Queens College and exercise physiology consultant to Weight Watchers International, Inc. "Research now indicates that exercise is a significant adjunct to a weight reduction program."

Under the guidance of Dr. McArdle, Weight Watchers has created an exercise plan which incorporates activities easily into any life-style. Members will choose among five popular low-intensity, long-duration aerobic activities: walking, out-dour bicycling, stationary bicycling, swimming and jogging. Accompanying each activity are instructions for stretching, warming up, cooling down, and taking one's heart rate.

"Controlling weight is much easier when the food plan is combined with these kinds of exercise," McArdle says. "Exercise helps the body maintain a high metabolic rate, even when at rest."

Due to the wide variety of experience with exercise among Weight

Watchers members, the Quick Start Plus Exercise Plan is divided into four activity levels:

- *For beginners with a fairly inactive life-style;
- *For those who participate in some physical activity from time to time;
- *For those who engage in physical activity on a regular basis;
- *For those who exercise as a regular part of their lifestyle.

Members will determine their activity level through use of a personal activity profile questionnaire.

In addition to exercising, members must learn to understand why they eat- and why they want to lose weight. According to Dr. Barbara Sternberg, psychological consultant to Weight Watchers International, research has revealed the importance of cognitive behavioral influences on weight control.

"Independent studies conducted over the last 15 years have pinpointed moods and emotions as major causes of weight gain," she says. "Our own experience with Weight Watchers members over the past 24 years led us to the same conclusion. We developed the Self-Discovery Plan in response to those findings."

With the Self-Discovery Plan, Members will learn to recognize their trouble spots, or "eating triggers," through a series of self-help quizzes. Identifying obstacles such as supermarket temptations and leftover nibblings is the first step in coping with them.

"A sense of self-efficacy has also proven to be extremely important in the area of weight control," Sternberg says. "Along with the other components of the Weight Watchers Program, the Self-Discovery Plan teaches members that they have the resources to look good and feel good."

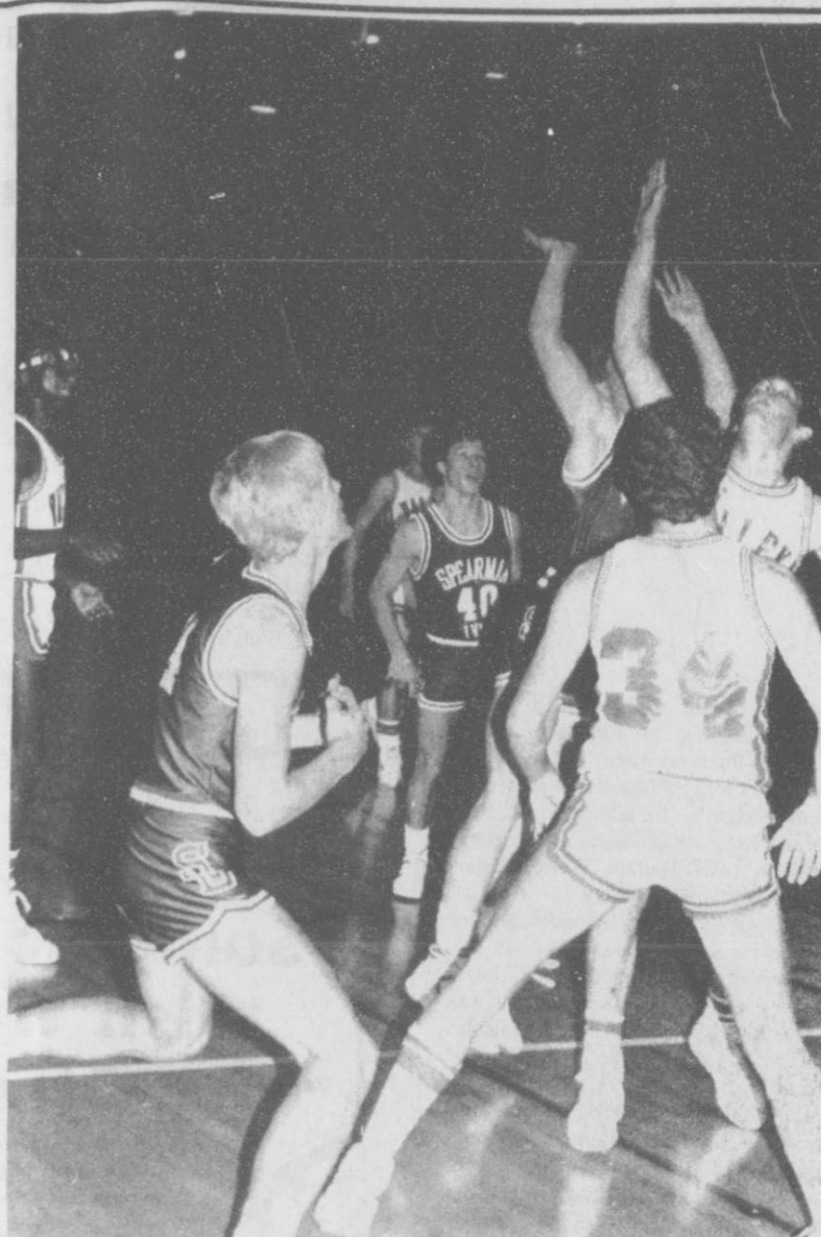

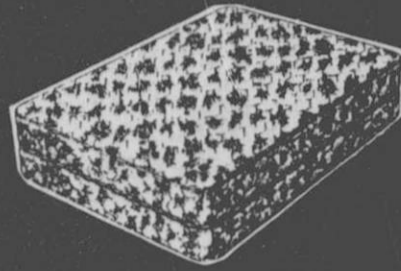
