Officials honor Green Thumb'ers

Thirty persons, including the state president and the state secretary of Texas Farmers Union, and the state director and area supervisor of the Green Thumb program attended a Green Thumb Training Seminar and awards ceremony Tuesday at the Golden Spread Senior Citizens Center in Spearman.

The seminar got underway at 1 p.m. with the welcome, given by Derrell Hale, area Green Thumb supervisor from Plainview.

Eldon Symons, Perryton Postmaster, presented "Mail Fraud and the Elderly, and two films, CPR-"For the Sake of Life," and "Health and Lifestyle" were shown. The films were provided courtesy of Texas Dept. of Health.

Diane Parrish of Waco, state director of the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb program, presented two safety awards to out-of-town Green Thumb members.

Describing the Green Thumb program, Mrs. Parrish said, "For the hundreds of older workers in the Green Thumb senior employment program, responsibility has been a way of life, an essential part

of the traditional work ethic that most older persons accept.

"But as the Green Thumb workers meeting here have learned, responsibility goes beyond caring for jobs and families; it also means being responsible for your own health."

"Working hard is the most important thing in many people's lives," she said. "Yet what most of us don't think about is that we can't work if we aren't healthy, and to be healthy, we have to take care of ourselves."

Green Thumb provides part time work in public service agencies for low-income persons 55 and over. Texas Farmers Union sponsors the program, which operates in 108 counties across the state, she explained.

Mrs. Parrish emphasized that it is far better to prevent a disease than to deal with it after it has attacked the body, and in a film produced by the American Occupational Medical Association, the Green Thumbers learned how diet, exercise, and good

Lynx-Dalhart to clash

Now comes Dalhart-mighty Dalhart-only maybe not so mighty this year...

Last Friday, the Spearman Lynx served notice they were very much alive in the District 1-3A championship race, as they convincingly upset Canadian, 19-0.

But from now on out every game is showdown time in the tight 1-3A scramble, and once again the Lynx must prove their mettle in Dalhart against the Golden Wolves.

The powerful Perryton Rangers, 4-1 on the season and 2-0 in district play, are the overwhelming favorites to win the District title, but just about every team except last place

River Road (0-2) still has a shot at the title, and the race is wide open for second place and the second playoff berth.

For the Lynx, the Golden Wolves, and every team except Perryton, this

Bam! Bam! Lynx flatten Canadian Wildcats, 19-0

Wading right back into the middle of the "brawl" for the District 1-3A title, the Spearman Lynx "flattened" the Canadian Wildcats, 19-0 here Friday night.

A week earlier, the Lynx battered and banged away at underdog Boys Ranch, but the Roughriders got in one good kick—a field goal—and made it stand up for a 10-6 upset victory in the Lynx' district opener.

But before a large, howling turnout of Spearman fans in Lynx stadium, the Lynx did some upsetting of their own against the slightly

avored Wildcats Friday night. And in convincing fashion—it was not one "punch" or one kick that did it, the Lynx simply backed the 'Cats up against the ropes and battered away.

Three times in the first half, the Lynx "knocked down" the Wildcats with touchdowns, while all Canadian offensive blows were successfully fended. In the second half the Lynx switched from knockdown offense, and gave the Wildcats a boxing lesson with rugged defensive play.

Against Boys Ranch, the Lynx had

been big winners in game statistics, but not on the scoreboard where it counted. Against the Wildcats, the Lynx won that fight of statistics by a wide margin, and also outpointed their opponents 19 to 0 on the scoreboard.

Not that the Lynx escaped the bout without feeling some damaging blows. In the third quarter, Julio Vasquez—the Lynx' season long rushing leader—was sidelined with a knee injury after a brilliant 134-yard performance against the 'Cats.

Then in the opening seconds of

the fourth quarter, the Lynx and their fans got a reel jolt.

With their ace rusher already out of action on the sidelines with an icepack on his knee, the Lynx somberly watched as their offensive field general and premier passer, Ross Donahue, was carried of the field on a stretcher.

Just how much their decisive victory over Canadian cost the Lynx was not immediately known, but as Donahue was being loaded onto the ambulance for a run to the hospital, it was reported he had suffered a

dislocated knee, an injury that ordinarily would knock the Lynx quarterback out of action for at least the season.

The game quickly settled into the type of "fight" expected, a slugfest between two heavyweight lines, a duel of two highly regarded defense-minded teams. At the end of the first quarter, the score was, not unexpectedly, 0-0.

But just four seconds deep in the second quarter, the Lynx caught the

Gridders injuries not 'too serious'

Two Lynx offensive stars, injured in the Spearman victory over Canadian Friday night are apparently not as badly hurt as feared.

The two, leading Lynx rusher Julio Vasquez and ace quarterback-passer Ross Donahue, were injured in the second half action against the Wildcats. Donahue was taken from the field by stretcher and rushed to Hansford County Hospital, apparently suffering a dislocated knee, an injury that might have ended his athletic participation for the year.

But Head Lynx Coach Athletic Director Larry Lanier said Monday that doctors were able to pop Donahue's knee right back into place, and that it is responding well to treatment with little swelling.

Vasquez was forced to sit out half the third quarter and all the fourth with a knee injury. Lanier said there is still some swelling in Julio's knee.

He said both Vasquez and Donahue are questionable as starters against the Golden Wolves.

Sheriff's office holding aliens

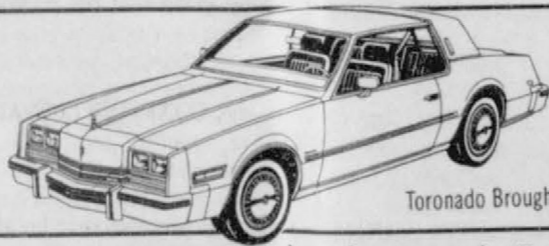
The Hansford County Sheriff's Department is holding three alleged illegal aliens for the Border Patrol to pick up according to Deputy Sheriff R.A. Massingill.

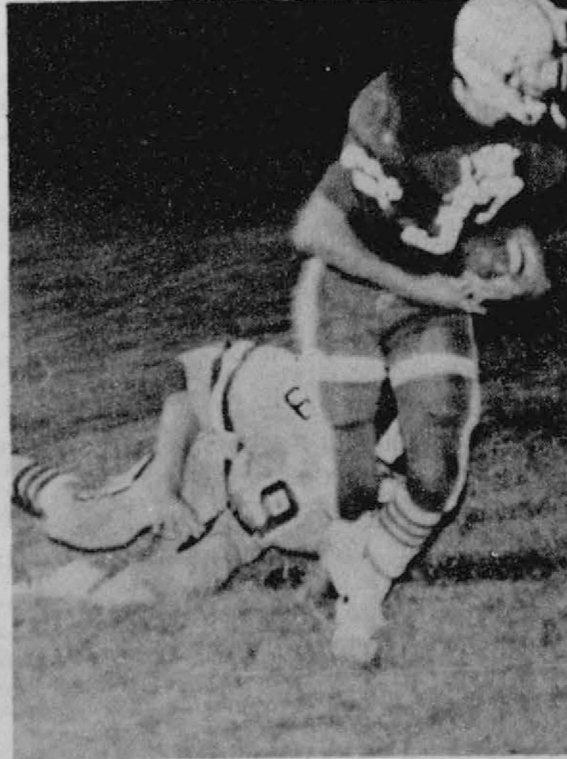

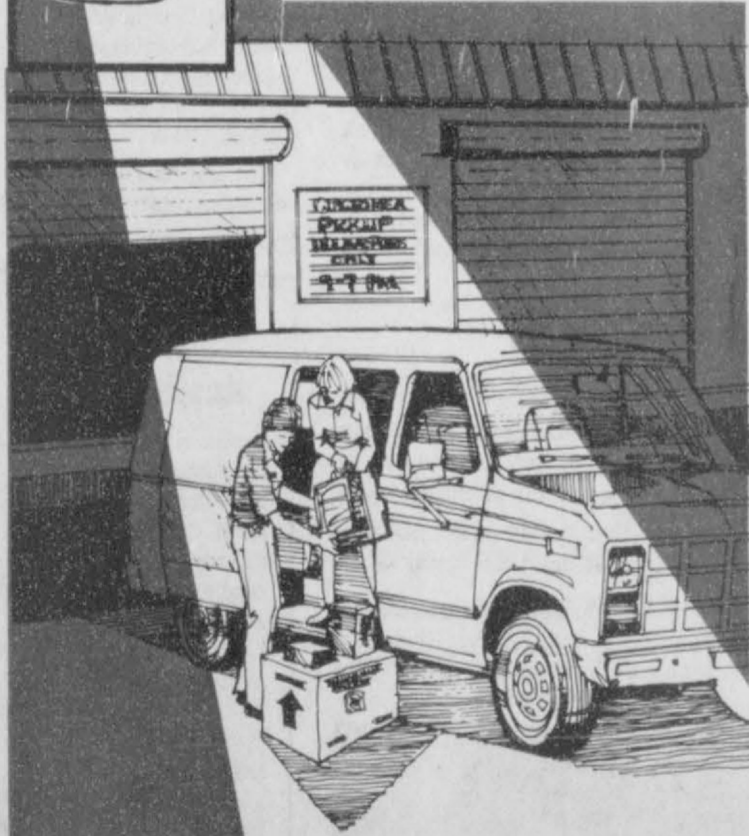

Advertisements by margarine, cooking oil and shortening manufacturers often claim their product is better than a competitor's because of the type of fat-saturated versus polyunsaturated--it contains. Since all of these food makers present rather convincing arguments why their product is better for you than the other, it's easy for consumers to become confused. But you can sort out the advertising claims with a few facts about fat.

Fats are complex structures with many different parts of elements linked together. These links are actually chemical bonds.

A saturated fat is one in which all of the links are filled. Saturated fats are usually solid or hard at room temperature and are mostly found in animal fats and in a few plants. The fats in lard, beef, pork, lamb, butter fat, egg yolk and poultry skin are mainly the saturated type.

Palm and coconut oils are also highly saturated, although they come from plants. Coconut oil is more saturated than butter fat and is used in many "nondairy products" such as coffee creamers, dessert fillings and toppings.

Chocolate also contains saturated fat from cocoa butter. Polyunsaturated fats are those in which the links are not all filled, or saturated. These are liquid at room temperature and come from plant sources, such as corn, safflower, soybean, sunflower, cotton seed and sesame oils. Peanut and olive oil are more saturated than these, and are classified as monounsaturated fats.

Hydrogenated fats are vegetable shortenings and margarines which are solid at room temperature even though they originate from plants. The vegetable oil has undergone a process in which hydrogen was added to fill some of the chemical links. This hardening process causes the oil to become more saturated and increases the storage life of the products.

Is any one type of fat better for you than another? Food and nutrition specialists with Texas A&M's Agricultural Extension Service say that research gives conflicting answers to this question. High consumption of saturated fats tends to raise cholesterol levels which are associated with heart disease. High consumption of polyunsaturated fats lowers cholesterol, but has been associated with increased incidence of cancer in laboratory animals. Over consumption of any type of fat is probably not good for you.

In the meantime, consumers should recognize that certain amounts of fats--saturated,

Wildcats "guard down" and tossed a haymaker—a 17-yard touchdown pass from Donahue to Mac McLain. The battering had begun.

The touchdown drive was set up when a Lynx punt was fumbled and a Lynx pounced on it for a first and 10 at the Spearman 35. From there it took the Lynx just eight plays to march the 65 yards, with a 36-yard burst by Vasquez on a sweep being the big gainer.

After Donahue's touchdown strike to McLain in the end zone, big Mark Guthrie booted the point after to make it 7-0, Lynx, with 11:56 to play in the half.

Roughly six minutes later, the Lynx had the 'Cats "on the ropes" again, as they drove from the Spearman 47 for a second TD in seven plays.

The big blow was another of the Donahue-to-McLain specials, the pass play covering 40 yards for a first down on the Wildcat five. From there Donahue surged over for the touchdown behind a blocking wedge

formed by the middle of the Lynx line. This time the PAT try failed and with 5:24 left in the half, it was 13-0, Lynx.

With about three minutes to play in the half, the Wildcats tried to snatch away the Lynx momentum with a big gamble. Faced with a fourth and five at their own 19, the Wildcats "went for" a first down with a running play.

The gamble backfired as the Lynx stopped the ballcarrier one yard short of a first and took over at the Canadian 23.

Bam!—Bam!—Bam! The Lynx rocked the Wildcats with three running plays, the Byron Sutterfield connected for "knockdown" number 3, as he slammed across from three yards out for the TD with 2:09 left in the half. A running for points—after was stopped short, and that was the scoring for the night although there was plenty of fight left in both teams.

Each team had a close call in the second half. Early in the third

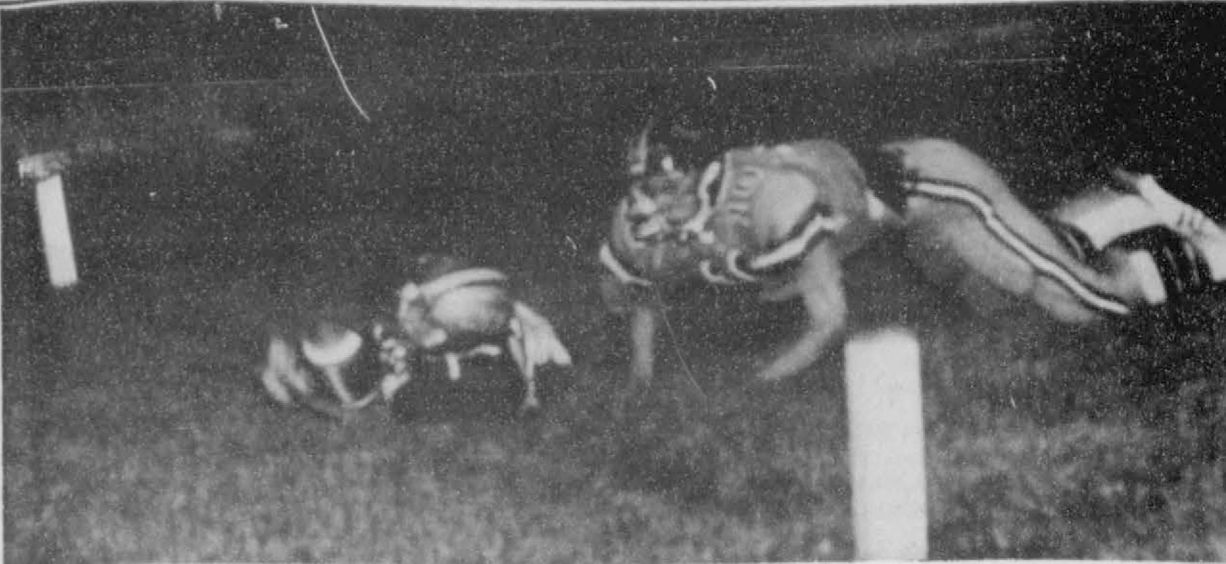
quarter, the Wildcats launched a determined drive from deep in their own territory, a drive that was stopped just short of a touchdown "knockdown" by a spirited Spearman goalline defense.

Pat Tucker, a 126-pound senior, replaced Donahue in the Lynx lineup after the first string junior quarterback was "knocked out" with the injury early in the fourth quarter.

Tucker, faking masterfully on handoffs, guided the Lynx on still another drive, in the closing minutes of play.

Spotting McLain sprinting in the Canadian end zone, Tucker rifled a pass toward the left corner. McLain may have made his most fantastic catch of the year on the play, as he dived headlong arms extended to the utmost, and snared the ball while in the air parallel to, and about a foot off, the ground.

But he landed across the end zone sideline, and a nearby official ruled he had caught the ball out of bounds—that it was an incomplete



pass instead of a touchdown.

After Donahue was hurt, the Lynx defense appeared to be particularly fired up, and turned in a number of fine plays. Two of the more spectacular were contributed by defensive lineman Steve Burke. The 203-pound 6-3 Burke, who doubles as an offensive strongside end, played a big role in stopping a Canadian drive.

Faced with a fourth and four at their own 17 late in the game, the

Wildcats again gambled, and temporarily made it pay off as Canadian punter Rodney Boyd faked a punt and ran with the ball for a first at the Canadian 33.

On the next play the Wildcats tried to pass, but Burke leaped forward, arms high, and viciously batted the ball to the earth behind the Canadian line.

Boyd completed a pass for a Canadian first at the Wildcat 48, but on the next play he could not scramble away fast enough under a big Lynx rush as he faded to pass and Burke caught him by the shirttail and slung him down for an eight yard loss.

The Lynx held and forced a punt.

Another defensive gem—with less than three minutes left, a Boyd pass to end Malcolm Paris was batted away on a one-handed stab by Ricky Lopez, and sprawling on the ground, defensive back Jeff Laird almost came up with an interception but could not quite hold the deflected ball. Seconds later, a leaping Isreal De LaRosa almost intercepted another 'Cat pass, and still later Laird narrowly missed an interception. That's the way it was all night, a number of close calls but neither team could come up with an interception.

In the final seconds, guard Darl Farris broke through and sacked

Boyd as he was trying desperately to get off a pass.

Despite sitting out a quarter and a half, Vasquez led all rushers with his 134 yards in 22 carries.

Sutterfield carried 11 times for 66 yards and Lopez three times for 49 yards.

Donahue completed three of four passes for 66 yards, and McLain hauled in two of those aerials for 57 yards, one of them for a touchdown and the other setting up a TD.

Despite the lopsided shutout, the Lynx out "firstdowned" the Wildcats only 11 to 10. Spearman amassed 229 yards on the ground and 66 in the air for a total of 295 yards, compared to 116-44-160 for Canadian.

Lynx JV to host Wolves, 7th, 8th graders 'on road'

Tonight (Thursday night), the Spearman JV will try to get back into the win column as they host the Dalhart Golden Wolves JV, after three straight "road games."

Fans who do not get to attend out-of-town JV games will get their first chance to see the Lynx JV'ers in action since Sept. 15. They have

played "road games" in their last four starts. Game time is 6 p.m.

And also on Thursday, the Spearman seventh and eighth grade teams journey to Dalhart for games with their respective foes. The seventh graders kick off their game at 5 p.m. and the eighth graders at 6:30.

LYNX-DALHART TO CLASH....

week's games are crucial to their chances for first and probably second place berths.

There is a logjam in the running for second place, and both the Lynx and Golden Wolves will be battling for survival at the game in Dalhart. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

The Lynx are 1-1 in the conference chase, while Dalhart is in the unaccustomed position of being next to last, but just a hair behind Spearman at 0-1-1, thanks to a 7-7 tie with Boys Ranch, the team which beat Spearman to open district play, 10-6.

Should Dalhart and Boys Ranch end the season tied for first or second place, then Dalhart would advance because the Golden Wolves had the edge in penetrations, so the Wolves will be battling to get back into the thick of the race.

Certainly the Lynx will not be taking Dalhart lightly. The Golden Wolves came within a hair of upsetting Perryton, finally losing 12-6, two weeks ago.

Head Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier looks for a typically tough Lynx-Dalhart tussle. He said, that

even in an off year, the Golden Wolves have some highly capable players.

He said Dalhart runs out of the I Formation and the Lynx will have to stop a pair of running backs.

"Michael Thompson is the tailback. He's quick and he's good. And in Hobart Brown, they have a real good fullback. He's not too big, about 6 foot and 165 pounds, but he runs hard."

"They use a 5-2 defense. It can be very good. They worked it really well against Perryton."

He said the Golden Wolves also have some quality linemen including Jim Bob Green, a 195-pound, 6-2 senior tackle-linebacker, Curtis Ablo, a 5-9, 170-pound senior end and Jeff Hutton, a 5-10, 180-pound guard.

The Canadian game almost turned into a disaster for the Lynx, as quarterback Ross Donahue and running back Julio Vasquez were injured. Donahue was carried from the field on a stretcher and on to the hospital in an ambulance. He suffered a dislocated knee and it was feared he would be lost for the year,

but Lanier said Monday the doctor's were able to pop the knee right back into socket, that there was little swelling--as of Monday--and that possibly Donahue can play against Dalhart.

"He (Donahue) says he is going to play (against Dalhart), but we'll have to wait and see. Right now it's questionable."

Lanier said it did not appear that Donahue would be able to play in the final games, if not against Dalhart, but that the coaching staff and the doctor are keeping a close eye on the injured knee.

After a brilliant rushing performance, Vasquez sat out the last quarter and a half of the Canadian game, with an icepack on his knee. Although he was able to walk with a slight limp after the game, the knee has actually shown more swelling than Donahue's and Lanier has him also classified as a "questionable" starter.

Senior Pat Tucker came off the bench to quarterback the Spearman attack Friday night after Donahue was injured in the opening seconds of the fourth quarter.

"Tucker did a super job for us," Lanier said. "Did you see that pass he threw? It was right where it should be to McLain in the end zone, and it looked like it was out of

go with Tucker. We feel like he did a real good job for us against Canadian, and that he can do it against Dalhart."

Even if Donahue is not able to be in there, we think we can win against Dalhart with Tucker in there."

"We feel like all the players are behind him--they have confidence in him, and there won't be any letdown at all."

As for the rest of the Lynx, the team is in better physical condition than it has been most of the year.

"Damon Goodheart (at defensive end) will be back in the line up. He has been out with a slight shoulder injury. We'll be ready to play ball." set 255 italics

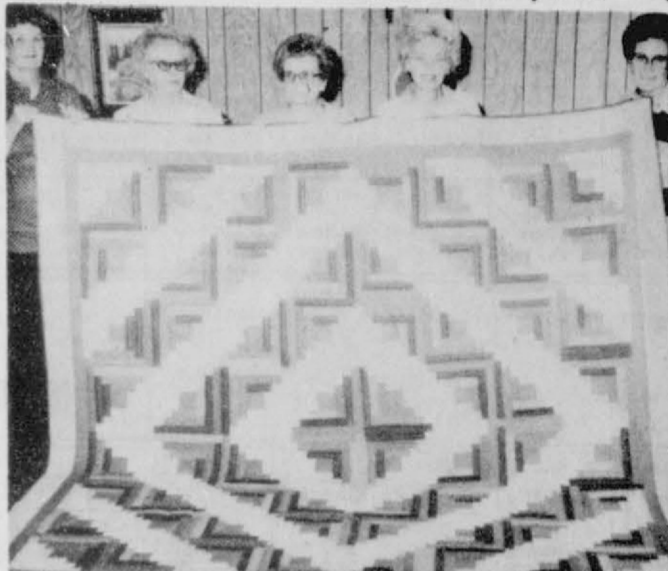
