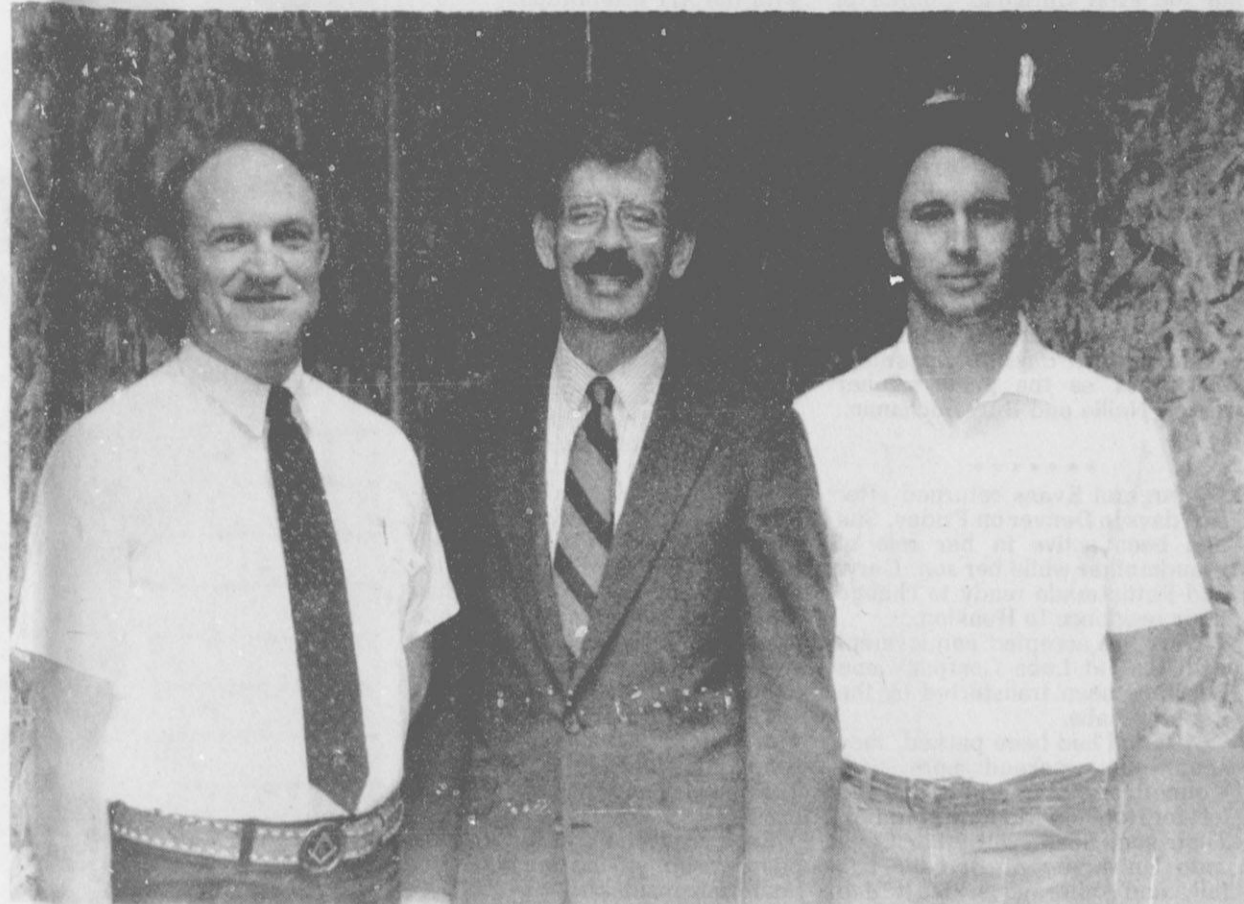

City Seeks Public View

City Officials are seeking the public's view before making a decision on adopting a regional 911 system. The system is being proposed by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. It will create a 911 network in 22 public safety answering points (PSAP) in the region.

Funding for the PSAPs will come from a fifty cent service fee which will be added to each monthly phone bill. The money will be collected by the phone company and turned over to PRPC, which will design and implement the system. No city or county general revenue funds will be used in establishing or operating the region-wide system.

The public safety answering points will be located at police and sheriff's department dispatching centers. In most cases, there will be only one answering point per county.

In nearly every case, the six dollars collected annually from each phone bill will not be enough to operate the system. The difference will be made up from a surcharge placed on intrastate long distance phone calls. That will be controlled by the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications. The commission will supply equalization funds to the 24 councils of government to make up operational and administrative expenses which can't be

raised by the monthly service fee.

After local officials have approved the PSAP plans, they will be submitted to the state advisory commission. After the commission signs off on the plans, the PRPC and other Texas councils of government will begin development of the systems. The law calls for all systems to be in operation by Jan. 1, 1992.

The systems will allow callers to get emergency help almost immediately anywhere in the region by dialing 9-1-1. The call will be routed to the PSAPs by phone company equipment. A police department or sheriff's dispatcher will answer the call and relay the information to the nearest police, fire or ambulance unit.

Existing seven-digit numbers in the Panhandle will not be affected by the new service. The 9-1-1 system will be faster because a person will only have to dial the three digits.

Each PSAP will be quipped with a monitor which will list the calling number. The automatic number identification (ANI) unit will also allow the dispatcher to hold the number on the screen even if the caller has hung up. The dispatcher can either call back and get further information or send a law enforcement officer to investigate.

Anne and Pat had just returned from a six weeks tour of Europe - a most fascinating tour and one which any group would enjoy seeing the slides and hearing the details. Unfortunately, it would be much too lengthy for this little column, but some of the highlights will whet one's appetite for more details.

They flew to Brussels, Belgium; took a train to Luxembourg; picked up a rental car and drove across West Germany, through a portion of Czechoslovakia, through Hungary and Yugoslavia, across Austria, (twice) and through parts of Italy, France and Liechtenstein.

Having traveled in Europe before, they avoided the usual "tourist traps" and big cities. However, Pat handled the car like a European, even in the urban areas and on autobahns. Anne (qualified back-seat driver that she is) read the maps and directed for the entire 5,400 miles!

They had no set agenda or reservations or deadlines, and spent the nights in small hotels, guesthouses and inns, as often as possible.

Each day brought interesting people, sights, and many, many humorous incidents.

Anne, a fancier of exquisite china and crystal, was enthralled by the factory at Innesbruch, Austria, where Svoraski crystal is made - a name known to all crystal collectors, and at Baccarat, France, was another crystal factory. The factory at Luxembourg where the famous Villery and Bock china originated was also a place of interest.

In addition to the artistic, there was history and drama as they relived WW II throughout Europe, especially in Bastogne, Belgium, and the Ardennes. Budapest held particular interest also. U.S. military cemeteries are scattered throughout; also, the most impressive being near Luxembourg City.

The Northcutts were captivated by Hungary and Yugoslavia, but found Czechoslovakia very depressed and so poverty stricken. They spent very little time there; security was quite tight at the border. Their car was searched, but not their bags. They sensed that the border guards were on the alert for persons hiding in cars.

Pat stated that every American should spend some time in that poor, sad Communist country - a deep appreciation of this nation would be the universal result.

This account of their travels has to include one incident - the only one in which Anne's dad, Earl Riley, might have wished to share. Briefly -

Near Debrovnik on the Adriatic Sea, they spotted a beautiful white hotel, perched high in the mountains, all 160 rooms with huge balconies facing the sea. By a devious route, always hoping space would be available for them, they reached it and were shown a room.

They enjoyed an evening, with dinner, in the posh dining room music and patio dancing. The next morning, after a breakfast overlooking the sea, they were enroute to the lobby. They met a middle-aged couple - absolutely, completely, stark nude. Anne and Pat, trying to regain their composure in the elegant lobby, met two other couples - one pair in their seventies and the other in their forties - also - S'fact-not even wearing a wristwatch!

Each couple graciously greeted them in Deutsch-Anne and Pat returned the greeting - by this time being proficient in greetings in that language.

Feeling overdressed, the Northcutts checked out - finally realizing what the hotel signs "dress optional" referred to.

1989 Property Tax Rates In City Of Spearman

This notice concerns 1989 property tax rates for City of Spearman. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

CHECK CANNER GAUGE

With canning season at hand, it's time to see that your pressure canner gauges have been tested and are accurate. This could prevent vegetable spoilage due to inadequate processing temperatures.

JUNK MAIL

Do most people throw out commercial solicitations received in the mail after a hasty glance? That assumption is questioned in a recent survey of 5300 households conducted by the U.S. Postal Service.

According to survey findings, more than 27 percent of the respondents wanted to receive more junk mail. Survey procedures involved keeping a weekly diary of mail received and a final 45-minute interview.

The survey also found that richer households get more mail than poorer ones. Furthermore, in households with incomes exceed-

ing \$65,000 per year, 17 percent of the mail was tossed out unread, while only 9 percent was discarded in households earning less than \$15,000 per year.

What is today's junk mail? Most likely the junk mail of the '80s '90s is the catalog. An estimated 12 billion were distributed in 1988, up from 4.7 billion in 1980. Many households received as many as 80 catalogs during the past Christmas season. However, there has been a declining use rate, which seems to indicate that more people are just throwing them out rather than reading and using them.

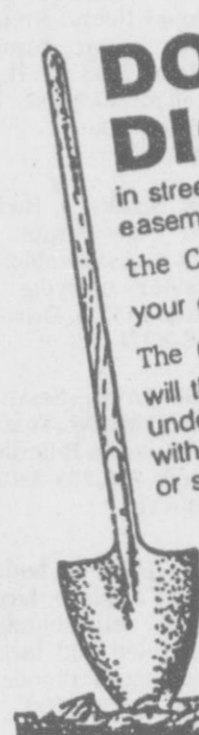

Library Sprouting "Weeds"

A table at the Hansford County Library is currently sprouting "weeds." The "weeds," in this case, are library books which have been removed, withdrawn, eliminated, discarded, or "weeded" from the library collection. These books are for sale at 50 cents each or 3 for \$1.00.

Hansford County Library is much more than a storehouse for books. Over the years the library's collection has evolved through a continuous process of consistent selection, evaluating, and discarding. Books may be weeded from the collection if they fall into one or more of the following categories: unused; outdated; misleading information; ugly, worn, or unsightly; duplicate copies.

Prior to being withdrawn from the library's collection, a book is checked in FICTION CATALOG, PUBLIC LIBRARY CATALOG, or CHILDREN'S CATALOG. These catalogs list books that are recommended for inclusion in public libraries. If a title is listed in any of the three catalogs, it is returned to the library shelf and is not withdrawn.

Some books deserve a place on the library's shelves even though they are infrequently used. Literary classics often fall into this group. However, the First Law of Library Science states that "Books are for Use."

The current crop of withdrawn books falls predominantly into the unused category. The books are from the adult and junior fiction sections of the library. They are in good to excellent condition, but they had not been checked out for several years (which probably accounts for their good condition!)

MOST VA MONEY GOES DIRECTLY TO VETERANS

Texas veterans directly received more than half of the \$2,047,430,102 U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) expenditures in Texas during fiscal year 1988, according to Waco Va Regional Office Director Dr. Stephen L. Lemons.

"Texas veterans received \$1,091,366,207 as compensation for disabling injuries or diseases incurred while in the armed forces, or as pensions for wartime veterans with limited incomes," Lemons said. "They also received \$90,064,083 for education and vocational rehabilitation benefits."

He added that \$101,214,233 for insurance and indemnity payments, \$96,367,576 for facility construction, and \$668,417,903 for medical services and administrative costs were expended in Texas.

"Veterans of Texas have earned these benefits through their military service to our country, and my first priority is to serve them," said Lemons, whose office administers benefit programs for 233,833 veterans in northern Texas.

Estimated VA expenditures for Hansford County veterans totalled \$210,270. This includes \$171,519 for compensation and pension, \$2,517 for education and vocational rehabilitation, and \$36,234 for insurance and indemnities.

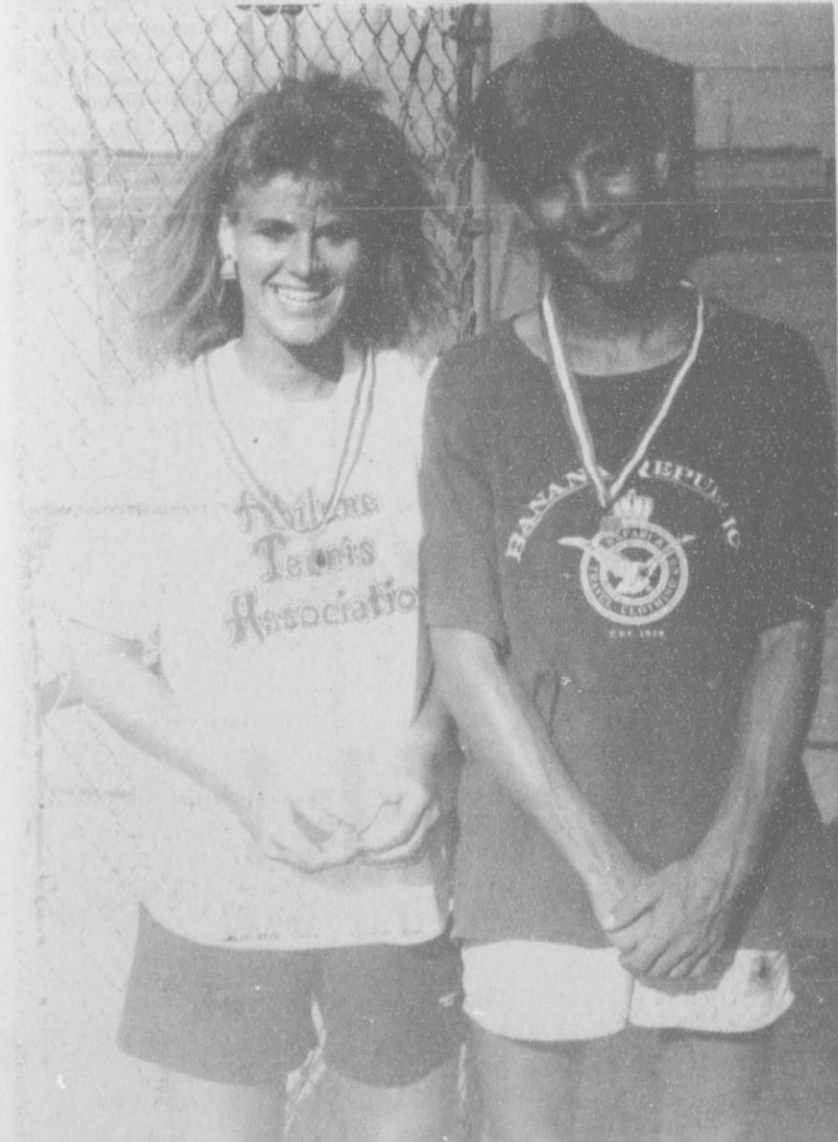

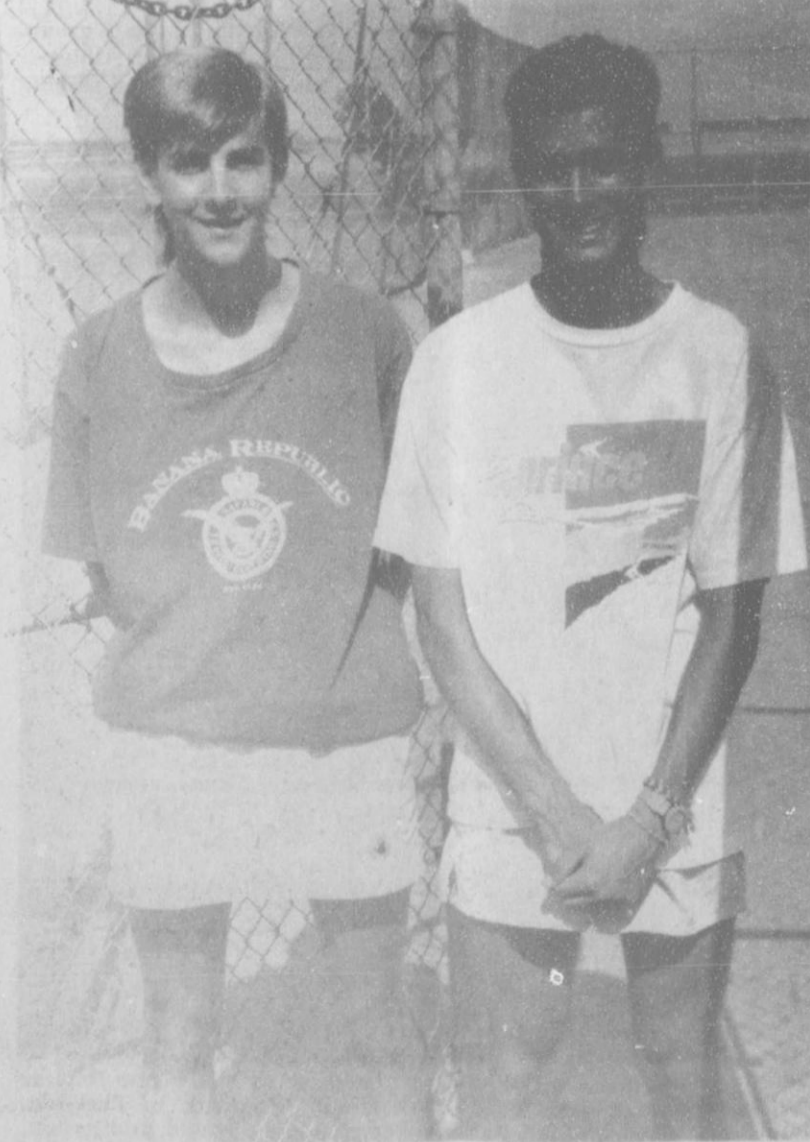

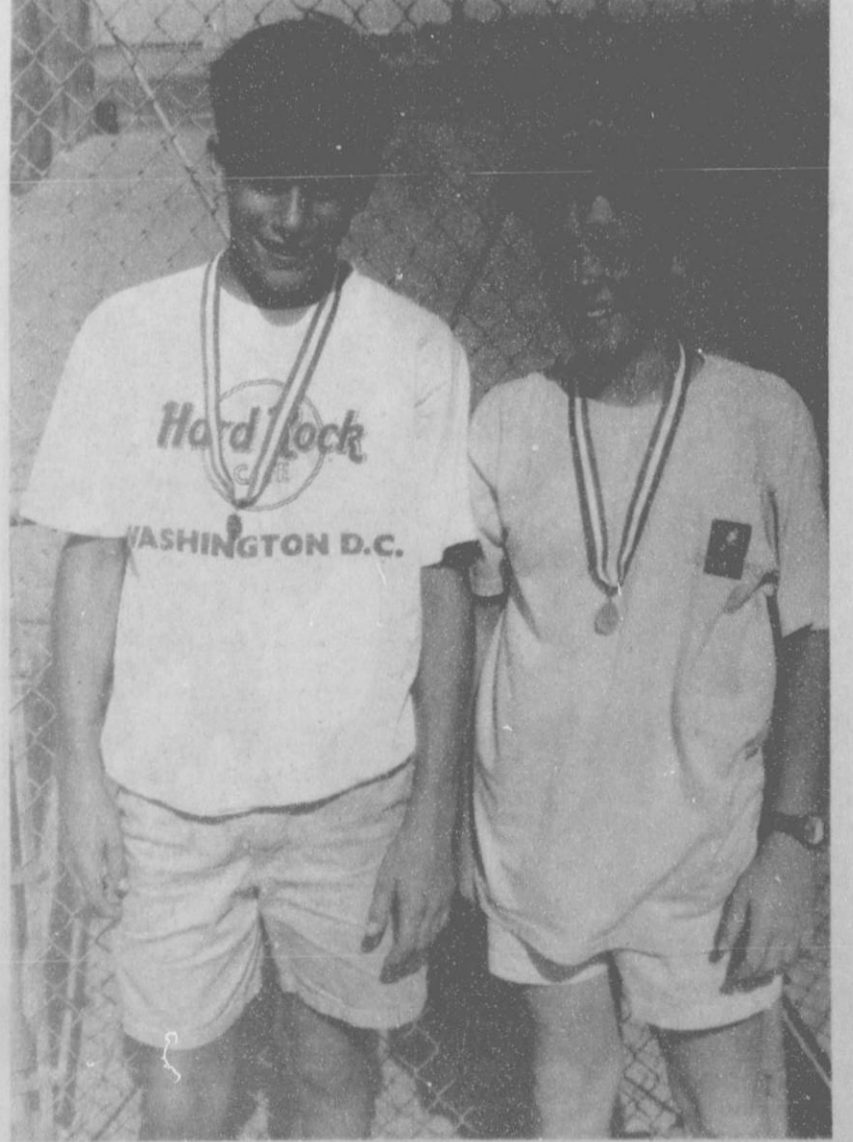
Will Etheredge [left] and Jace Dawson prepare for their first of the two matches. They played to win the Spearman Junior Tournament.

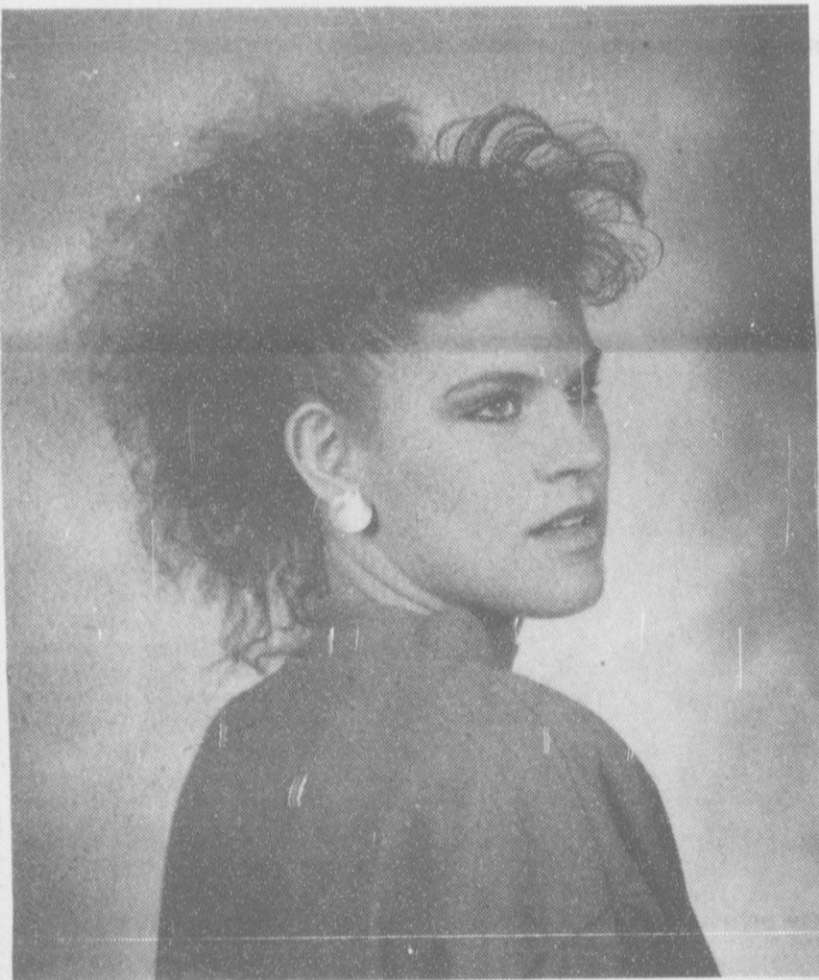
