City Council met Tuesday

The City of Spearman met in Regular session in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 30 S.W. Court, on July 11, with Mayor Bob Pearson Presiding. Aldermen present were Wilson McClellan, Burl Buchanan, Mike Cudd, and Don Reed. Aldermen absent were Bob Boxwell. Staff present were Jim Murray City Manager, Cheryl Gibson, City Secretary; Joe Raper, Director of Public Safety; and Bill Porter, Fire Chief. Visitors present were Dwight L. Brandt and Jim Carpenter, Brandt Engineers Inc. of Amarillo, Roy Lee Uptergrove, Ronnie Antalek and Johnny Ring.

At 8:04 p.m. Mayor Pearson declared a Quorum present and called the meeting to order. The pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was led by Mayor Pearson and followed by the Invocation given by Buchanan.

The first order of business was at 2:00 p.m. on June 29, sealed bids for the water, wastewater, and gas supervisory control and data Acquisition system; Chlorination facilities; and a building for well #7 were publicly opened and read. The bids were as follows:

Dwight L. Brandt, City's Engineer on these projects, and Jim Carpenter, consultant, were present to make their recommendations to the council and answer questions. Mr. Brandt recommended Garico, Inc. for the SCADA system based upon their bid being in accordance with the specifications and the demonstration being satisfactorily completed. Mr. Uptergrove, a concerned citizen contested Mr. Brandt's recommendation and ask the council to give Autocon a chance to demonstrate their equipment. Jim Murray, stated that the city presently owns some of Autocon's equipment and has not been pleased with the performance of same. After discussion was held, motion was made by Cudd to award a purchase contract for the water, wastewater, and gas supervisory control and data acquisition system to Garico, Inc. in the amount of \$128,200, which includes the RTU. Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried.

Dwight L. brandt recommended the low bidder, Triple F Controls, to the council based upon their qualifications and experience to perform this project. After discussion was held, motion was made by Cudd to award a purchase contract for the chlorination facilities to the low bidder, Triple F Controls, in the amount of \$7,285. Second by Reed. Motion unanimously carried.

Jim Murray, made the recommendation for the well building. He recommended the low bidder of T.E.C. construction Co., Inc. and stated that T.E.C. Construction is the same contractor for the fire and emergency medical service station expansion project. Motion was made by Reed to award a purchase contract for the construction of a building for well #7 to th low bidder, T.E.C. constructi Co., Inc., in the amount of \$6,800. Second by Buchanan. Motion unanimously carried.

Mayor Pearson stated that all of the awarded bids were under the estimated cost and the equipment will be purchased on a

4-H Junior Rodeo held Saturday

"Lets rodeo, Spearman Style," was exclaimed by Frank Hobson as he got the Hansford County 4-H Junior Rodeo under way on Saturday. The rodeo took place at the arena in Spearman. This was the fourth annual Hansford County Junior Rodeo and it had 115 kids participating in 380 events.

The kids came from the 4 state area of Texas, New Mexico, Kansas, and Oklahoma.

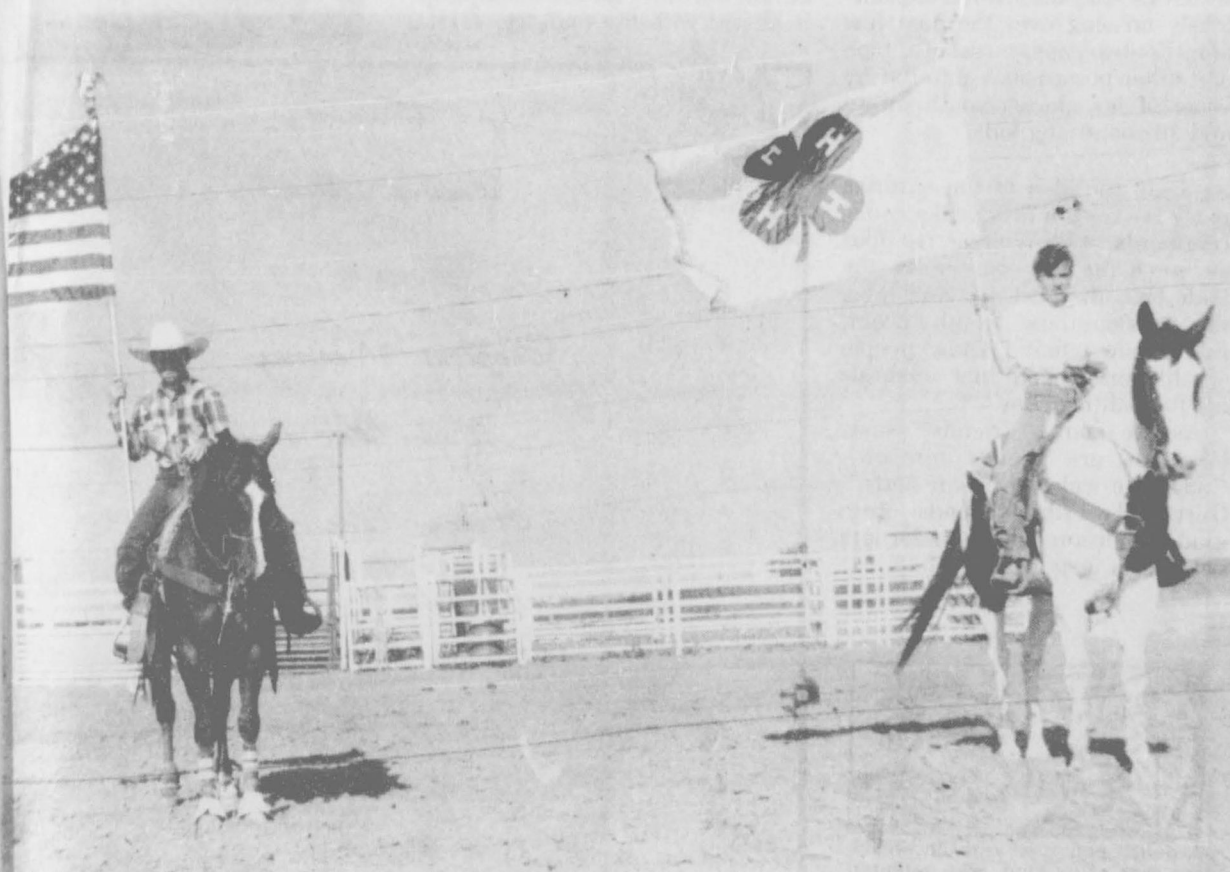
The prizes, the kids were competing for, were two saddles for all around cowboy and cowgirl. Belt buckles for all around event winners, who do not win a saddle, and tack for best finishers in each event. The 2nd and 3rd place finishers participated in a 60% "jack pot" refund of their entry fees for each event.

The events range from the standard cattle working skills of break away steer roping to the fun events of goat tying. The participants in each event are divided into age groups and by sex. The girls do not compete with the boys but they do have several events in common.

The Hansford County Rodeo started with a Grand Entry. In the Grand Entry, the rodeo participants, mounted on horses line up behind two riders, one of which carries the American Flag and the other carries the 4-H Flag. On Saturday Matt Eakin carried the American Flag and Haley Lamb carried the 4-H Flag. Eakin and Lamb led the other riders in a circle of the arena. The other riders exited the arena, leaving Eakin and Lamb in the middle of the arena.

The 4-H Pledge was then recited by the participants and the audience. After the 4-H Pledge, the announcer read a tribute to the American Flag and led the people gathered for the rodeo, in the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner". At the end of the song the horsemen, carrying the flags paraded out of the arena and the rodeo began.

The top prizes of the rodeo were not claimed by local participants. The All Around Girl's saddle was given to Jamie Meais of Miami

This was the dilemma facing several dozen local folks who attended Gary Ellsworth's surprise birthday party Sunday, July 2, at the Lyric Theatre. Gary being the original person he is, finding "just the right gift" took some creative thinking!

Planned by First Christian Church Pastor Mike Wolfe and several other friends, Gary's surprise party featured a large sheet cake (outlined in black) with the words "lordy, lordy look who's 40" under a curve designating the Hill of Life, along with 40 trick candles marched, was the Gary-esque motto "Ready to rock and roll" and the observation "You know you're 40 when your back goes out more than you do!" Peggy Varon designed and made the birthday cake. Matching black cups and napkins with the "Over the Hill" motif were donated by Kay Vernon of Sack's Third Avenue, and ice cream was supplied by the First Christian Church, where Gary is youth director.

Forty-eight friends and family members, including Gary's uncle, Robert Gabel of Amarillo, secretly gathered in the darkened theatre to await the Birthday Boy's arrival. Alton Ellsworth got Gary there using the old ploy of emergency technical difficulties with the theatre's sound system. Gary's response when the crowd sprang up shouting "Happy Birthday!" was a succinct "Wow!"

So what does one get such a youth-oriented, talented new 40-year-old for his birthday? Gary was first treated to a slide show set to music depicting his life, from chubby babyhood to post-graduation days. Scott Taylor put this program together, using the song "Friends," by Michael W. Smith, as the theme.

Next, Gary opened his gifts on the theatre stage. These ranged from Disneyland "light-up" space sunglasses special-delivered from California for the occasion to a t-shirt emblazoned with the words "this is what 40 looks like!" The most unusual gift, however, was a Nintendo box which contained a half-dozen items of Gary's own which he had discovered mysteriously missing over the past few months—two caps, a cassette tape and other possessions pilfered by some of his church youth group and 30-something kids.

Palo Duro River Authority Eaton wins FW golf tournament discusses Dam completion

Financial matters headed the agenda, according to Mr. Johnny Lee, at the Palo Duro River Authority Meeting on Tuesday. The meeting opened with a hearing on the budget, then moved on to the purchase of some heavy equipment and action to purchase a land tract around the Palo Duro Dam site. The last action taken by the Authority was to discuss the schedule of completion of the Palo Duro Dam project.

The Authority accepted bids on a used one ton truck with a dump and hoist. The truck was purchased from Mrs. Garland Hopper.

Bids on a tractor and mower were also accepted. The tractor will be purchased from Case Equipment in Amarillo and the mower will be bought from Five Star Equipment in Spearman.

A resolution was passed pertaining to Eminent Domain Proceedings on the Lasiter Ranch around Horse Creek. This is one of several tracts of land the Authority needs to purchase in

order to finish the Palo Duro River Dam. According to Mr. Lee, the Authority and owners of the Lasiter Ranch could not agree on a purchase price. The matter now goes before the District Court Judge.

The Judge will appoint a three member Commission to arbitrate a purchase price for the land. If either party does not accept the price set by the Commission, they may appeal it to the District Court.

If either party appeals the Commissioners decision to District Court, the matter then goes before a jury. If the matter goes this far, the jury can impose damages on either party for loss of revenues by either party.

The final business the Authority considered was a discussion on the progress in Palo Duro Dam construction. It was reported that construction was proceeding on schedule. The dam is expected to be closed by July 1990 and completed by January 1991.

Eaton wins FW golf tournament

Chuck Eaton, of Fort Worth, won the Fort Worth Inner City Golf Championship in a two day tournament July 8 and 9. He represented the Pecan Valley Club in the tournament.

To qualify for the tournament, Eaton had to play in two different weekend tournaments and place in the top five at the Pecan Valley Golf Course. He qualified second at Pecan Valley. There were about 140 golfers in these two tournaments. He was then eligible to participate in the Fort Worth Inner City Golf Championship which consisted of the best players from five other Fort Worth and Arlington golf courses.

Eaton, an Engineer at General Dynamics in Fort Worth, is the son of Charles and Joanne Eaton of Spearman.

News home from college

Anne Renea Reese, a junior at West Texas State University has been selected to receive a Mesa Scholarship for Academic Excellence for the 1989-90 school year.

Established from funds provided by Mesa Limited Partnership, the scholarships are intended to reward and recognize freshmen and continuing undergraduate students who promote and exemplify high academic standards. The awards are made in increments of either \$500 or \$1,000.

To be eligible, entering freshmen must have a composite score of 23 or higher on the ACT or a combined verbal and math score of 950 or higher on the SAT and must also rank in the top quarter of their graduating class. Continuing students must have a 3.40 or better grade point average on all college work attempted.

Applicants were required to submit two letters of reference with their applications as well as a brief essay outlining their educational plans, career objectives and personal goals.

Lindbergh marker approved by commission

The Hansford County Historical Commission received word this week from the State Historical Commission, that the State Historical Marker Committee has reviewed and approved their application for an official State Marker commemorating the landing of Col. Lindbergh near Spearman in 1934.

Previous stories in local papers have asked for donations, as the local Historical Commission has no allocations for funds from any entity for purchase and placement of Historical Markers. The citizenry has been generous, but the total cost for the marker will be \$650. Donations in the amount of \$575.00 have been received. Upon approval of the State Historical inscription by our local Commission, the funds must be sent to the State Commission before the order for the inscription is placed with the foundry. Additional funds are needed.

lease-purchase agreement with the First National Bank.

Dwight L. Brandt spoke with the Council about this problem. Mayor Pearson stated that he would visit with Mr. Jimmy Shieldknight concerning the possibility of several water gutters being installed through the neighborhood. The city would pay for the survey staking if the property owners would install the concrete drainage gutters. No action was taken.

The 3rd item to be considered was a drainage study report for the corner of 7th avenue and Barkley street as prepared by Brandt Engineers Inc.

It was the consensus of the Council that the cost was too extreme to correct the drainage problem at 7th and Barkley when there are other locations throughout the city that have the same type of problem.

A status report on the airport improvement project given by Mr. Dwight L. Brandt came next.

Dwight L. Brandt stated that the hot mix design would finally be ready by July 14 or 17 from the testing laboratory and then he would make his review and send it to the Federal Aviation Administration for their approval. If the FAA approves same, then the paving should begin around the first of August and take a couple of weeks to complete. After the curing of the asphalt, the striping, lighting and seeding would take place.

The fifth order of business was the consideration of a report and recommendation from the city council's committee, reviewing the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department's organization.

Mayor Pro-Tem Buchanan reported that the committee, director of Public Safety and the Fire Department had met twice and the meetings seemed to have been beneficial in providing several ideas to better organize the Fire Department and to gain Membership.

Consideration of a contract with Hansford County for detention services was the sixth item to be considered. Seventh was a consideration of a grass lease with Ron Clark for 86.3 acres of land owned by the City located adjacent to the Hansford Golf Course.

A motion was made by Cudd to enter into a contract with Hansford County for detention services for city prisoners. The motion was seconded by Buchanan and the motion carried unanimously.

Murray stated that Mr. Clark has leased this property from the City for many years. Motion was made by Cudd to enter into a Grass Lease agreement with Mr. Ron Clark for 86.3 acres of land for \$10 per acre. It was seconded by Reed.

Eighth on the agenda was a consideration of the monthly fire ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports.

A motion was made by Buchanan to approve the monthly ambulance, police, municipal court and animal control reports for the month of June as presented. It was seconded by McClellan.

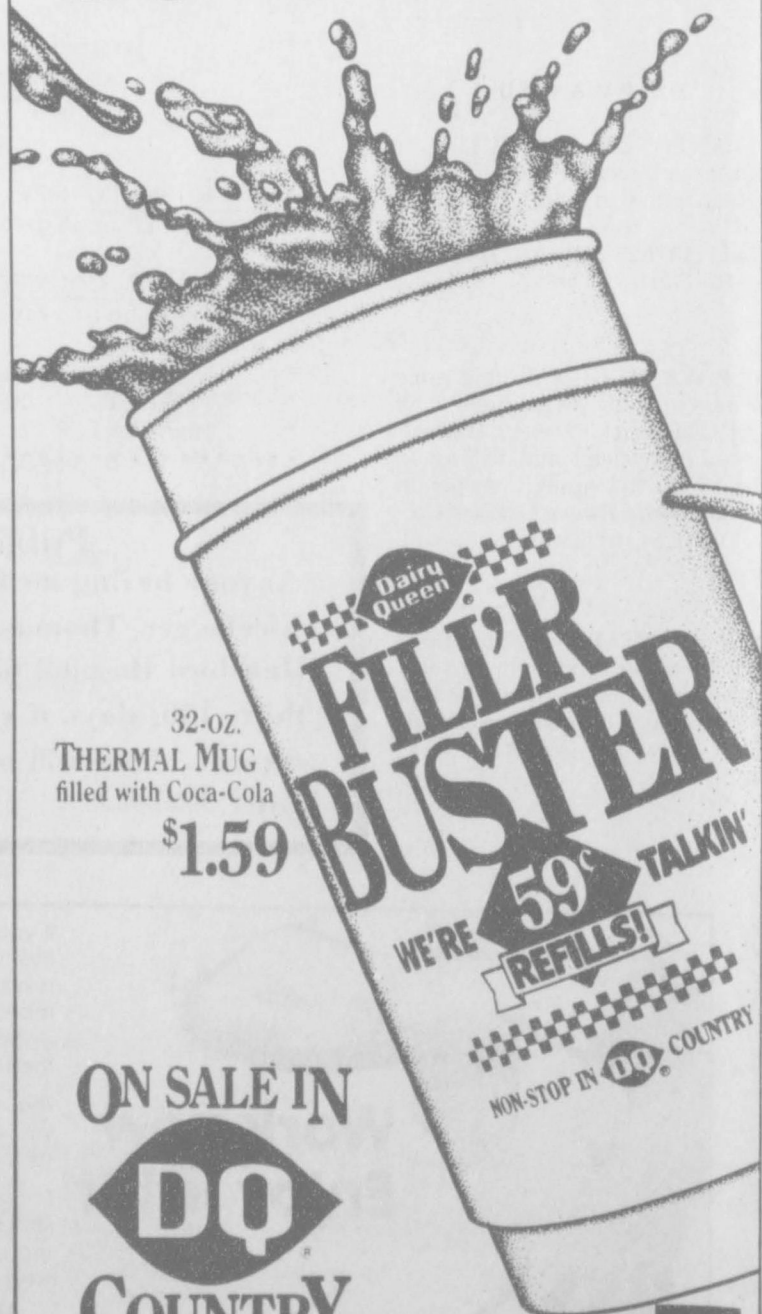
