### Three Arrested For Burglary

'The apprehension of these burglary suspects was brought about by the watchfulness of two Hansford County residents," said Sheriff R.L. McFarlin.

Three men were arraigned Dec. 27 at the Hansford County courthouse on two counts of burglary. Bond for each count was set at \$10,000. The three men are Carl Horn, Johnny Lucas and Van Barker, all of Amarillo.

They were arrested and charged with burglarizing the Brady Spivey farm and the home of Minister Nate Hanson of the Oslo community. If not for the actions of Hanson's neighbors J.P. TeBeest and Lynn Stedje, the suspects might have evaded capture.

The story began on Saturday night, Dec. 23. Minister Hanson returned to his home, to find it had been broken into and vandalized. At approximately 10:30 p.m. he called the Sheriff's office to report this. Sheriff McFarlin and Deputy Jim Brown were enroute to the Hanson home when a second call, from TeBeest and Stedje, came in.

TeBeest and Stedje said they were calling from a mobile phone and were following a suspicious green pickup that had been seen leaving the area of the Hanson home. Sheriff McFarlin and Deputy Brown intercepted the pickup

and detained a Mr. Horn, a Mr. the sprayer was found to belong Lucas and a juvenile for question-

the Hanson home to further investigate the break-in. He found that the Hanson belongings were stacked up near the front door, the back door was open, and two sets of footprints led away from that door. The sheriff felt the suspects were in the process of burglarizing the home and were scared away by the returning owners.

Upon comparing the footprints in the snow with those of the suspects in the pickup, one set matched but the other did not. This led the sheriff to believe there was another suspect not apprehended. This was later confirmed in a statement by one of the suspects caught in the pickup.

In an effort to catch the fourth suspect, Sheriff McFarlin called in assistance from the Sherman and Hutchinson County and Texas County, Okla. Sheriff's offices; two units of the Texas Department of Public Safety; and the municipal police forces of Gruver and Spearman. These units were deployed to set up road blocks to seal off the Hanson home vicinity.

While on patrol in Gruver, Officer Rick Phillips observed a man abandoning a sprayer truck and running. Upon investigation,

At the airport, a grain truck The sheriff then proceeded to belonging to TeBeest was found disabled with the engine still warm. Later, a pickup was reported stolen by Gruver resident Jerry Hart. This pickup. as of press time, has not been recovered.

Sheriff McFarlin believes that the fourth suspect, later identified by one of the suspects apprehended in the pickup as Van Barker. was left in the vicinity of the Hanson home by the other three suspects. He apparently stole the grain truck and drove it to the Gruver airport where he apparently had trouble keeping it running. It is suspected that he then appropriated the sprayer and drove it into Gruver.

The sight of Officer Phillips apparently caused Barker to abandon the sprayer and to run on foot. Later, he may have stolen the pickup belonging to Jerry Hart.

A warrant was issued for Barker. In trying to contact him at his listed address in Amarillo, the Sheriff's department left a message with Barker's wife, to the effect that her husband was a burglary suspect and that a warrant had been issued for his arrest. Shortly after that Barker

#### 1970 SHS Grad Lives Down Under

Don't be surprised if you cross paths with former Spearman resident Lynn Hohertz Foltin and are greeted with a cheery "G'day!"

Lynn, visiting in the home of her parents, Bob and Marva Hohertz, has made her home in Geelong, Australia for the past two and a half years. She returns to visit her hometown with her Australian husband, Ondreej Foltin, and their new son, Dane.

This Australian adventure began when Lynn won a Rotary Club Foundation scholarship to pursue a master's degree in journalism in 1987. This scholarship is designed for working professionals who serve in an ambassador-like position as they study in a foreign country, and 1,000 of them are

awarded annually.

"A friend had been after me to apply for one of these scholar-'says this slim, elegant woman. "I was working at the Lubbock Avalanche at the time writing a society column and acting as a department editor " she recalls. When she applied for the scholarship, Lynn listed both Scotland and Australia as countries where she wanted to study.

"I don't know why I chose Australia exactly," she muses in retrospect. "I had no image of it before I started researching the possibility of doing graduate work there. It was really kind of a 'Great Unknown'!"

Lynn already had a reputation for fearlessly plunging into the "unknown," however, because she left Texas Tech after her freshman year to go live in

Honolulu, Hawaii, with three girlfriends. She smiles now at the trepidations that adventure caused her parents. "I was at a point where I didn't know what I wanted to study at Tech and I didn't feel like wasting money just direction," she confesses, her dark eyes very direct. "But I had no doubt that the Honolulu thing was temporary!

As a matter of fact, she claims her experiences working as a restaurant waitress in Hawaii were what prompted her to return to Texas Tech in 1972. "Just going to that job every day. I came to realize that my job potential was very limited without more schooling." says Lynn.

After earning her B.A. in journalism in 1975 at Tech. Lynn went to work for the Lubbock Avalanche as a feature writer. She took off one year to live and work in Amarillo. "I wanted some public relations experience. she explains. "so I spent a year at Southwestern Public Service, but there is something about journalism that gets in your blood and that 'something' makes everything else seem very nine-to-five and boring in comparison.

After winning the Rotary Foundation scholarship in May of 1987. Lynn planned to spend nine months in Geelong. Australia at Deacon University and then to

#### December Sales Tax Rebates Up Sales tax rebates to Spearman

and Gruver for December were up from last year's totals, according to information from the State Comptroller's Office.

Returned city sales taxes to Spearman totaled \$10,528.78 in December, an increase of 6.13 percent from December 1988's total of \$9,920.75. Gruver's check amounted to \$3,439.14, representing an increase of 3.12 percent from last year's December total of \$3,335.21

Payments to date for Spearman have totaled \$179,721.58, an increase of 5.96 percent from the total of \$169,606.36 received during the same period in 1988. Gruver's year-to-date total stands at \$45,240.60, a decrease of .92 percent from the total of \$45,660.29 received through December 1988.

Statewide. State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that sales tax rebates to Texas cities in 1989 topped \$1 billion for the first time in the state's history.

\$7.1 million, compared to \$6.4 August, September and October.

In the 2nd chapter of Matthew we find a wonderful story of the visit of the wise men from the east who followed a special star to find baby Jesus, so they could worship Him and give Him gifts from their treasures. Their gifts were of gold, frankincense and myrrh, which were considered very precious indeed.

I have wondered what kind of men these men were. Matthew says they were wise and were from the east. How far east of Behtlehem they lived I don't know, but it might mean something as to their desire to see the new king. They were called wise men so they must have been versed in study of writings of the prophets such as Isaiah, for he told of the coming of the new leader of Israel.

They must have been men who studied the stars or they would have not realized the importance of the new star that must have caught their attention when it appeared. 





Back To Small Town Traditions

#### THE SPIT AND WHITTLE CLUB

Have you ever heard of the 'Spit and Whittle Club?'' Every small town has one. It may be alled by another name - coffee shop, domino hall, etc. When I was a boy I would ask my dad, 'Where are you going?'' He would reply, "Down to the Spit and Whittle Club." I would wonder where that was

In the town of my boyhood, the Spit and Whittle Club was located in the John Deere store. It was a tore with a fairly large room. Products of various sizes were placed on the floor for display. The local gentry would, during the day, come in and sit on the displays, take out a pocket knife, and begin to whittle. Chewing obacco or snuff was also part of he club member's equipment.

Here would be several men sitting around talking, whittling, and spitting. The membership would change during the day since the meeting lasted all day. The topic discussed would remain the same - at least for that day.

My dad was a school superintendent and felt it important to be a member of the Spit and Whittle Club. He believed that opinions expressed were a good parometer for measuring the poliical climate in the community. (nowing the political climate is ital to a superintendent.

Spit and Whittle Clubs can be dangerous because information given may be inaccurate and just plain gossip. Important public projects could be lost because of poor information. It is for this reason that public officials, such as school superintendents, attend the meetings. They look for opporfunities to present their side of the

Spitting and whittling is an art. 'hat's because spitting and whitiling enhances the participant's method of communication. A man's personality can often be determined by the kind of knife he carries and the technique he uses to whittle. Spitting is used as punctuation to statements that need emphasis. Like - "I think your bond issue stinks 'SPLAT' (exclamation point).'

"Rednecks" usually carry big arlow or Buck knives. These are men who work with their hands. heir line of thinking is simple

and straight to the point. They have simple solutions because to them, problems are simple. When they spit, they spit a long stream of tobacco juice. This communicates, "I'm a man to be reckoned with. Don't mess me around.'

They whittle large slivers from

two-by-fours to indicate their

"Slicks" are men who wear suits and ties. They make their living by thinking, negotiating, and shuffling papers. They like to examine problems from all angles. Their answers are complicated and sometimes have several implied meanings. Slicks carry small pen knives or long, slim three-bladed knives that fit neatly in a suit pocket. They whittle on small sticks of wood. They cut long thin shavings and take long slow strokes. This means, "I'm thinking about your statement and giving careful consideration to my

Slicks normally don't chew tobacco (unless they are trying to impress the rednecks). When they spit they stick the tip of their tongue between their front teeth then quickly pull it back, causing the spit to flip off the tip of the tongue and through tight lips. This communicates, "That may be

There are all kinds of personalities at the Spit and Whittle Club. They all have unique ways of spitting and whittling to communicate. Next time you're in a small town seek out the Spit and Whittle Club. I think you'll find it fun.

return to the Lubbock newspaper. To hear Lynn describe it, her first reaction to Australia was dubious at best. "I had this feeling of 'What in the world am I doing here?' because my life had been so ... so settled at the Lubbock Avalanche!" she says today. Two initial culture shocks in Australia were being without a car for the first time in her adult life ("at the mercy of public transportation!") and having to live in a student dormitory with much younger students until better housing arrangements could

Public transportation turned out to be blessedly reliable in Geelong and nearby Melbourne, much to Lynn's relief, and she soon met an Australian school teacher who offered to share lodgings with her off-campus. More immediately appealing were Australia's scenic beauty and friendly people, and the accented English was not difficult to follow after Lynn's initial submersion in this country. When she was pregnant with Dane and out shopping for the layette, she learned that diapers were "nappies," receiving blankets were "bunny rugs" and that T-shirts were "singlets.

While studying and working on her master's thesis in journalism (on the topic of how Americans are stereotyped in the Australian press). Lynn also made numerous appearances at rotary clubs and other organizations as a guest speaker. Through the editor of the women's department at Geelong's newspaper. the Geelong Advertiser. Lynn soon met sports journalist Ondreej Foltin, a native Aussie whose father had immigrated to the area from Czechoslavakia in 1950 and later married a native Australian.

The pretext for Lynn and Ondreej's initial meeting was an appropriate one: Lynn's editor friend realized how homesick Lynn was for Texas and remembered that Ondreej had once visited the Lone Star State. With THE HANSFORD PLAINSMAN reasoned the couple was bound to

hit it off!

Today, the Foltins continue to make their home in Geelong. where Ondreej is now sports editor of the sports department of the local paper and Lynn is a weekly columnist. Lynn also works part-time for a local politician. "I write his press releases and come in as I am needed." she says. A big part of her decision to pursue both writing positions was

warm climate. Although the Foltins are happy in Australia. they have not ruled out the possibility of working in the United States at some point in the future. Lynn would particularly enjoy living in the Denver or Dallas areas so she could be lear family members

"For now. I am still very much A Texan in Australia'." Lynn admits laughingly. She devoted one of her first columns to some of

the language peculiarities she has encountered in the land of kangaroos and koala bears, but to Spearman ears, her Aussie talk is as completely delightful as Lynn

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
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
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
