The Spearman Lynx journeyed to Gruver Friday night to play the Gruver Greyhounds for the county championship. The Lynx lost the game 26-6 but all 2800 fans who attended the game will have to agree that the first 3 quarters were much better than the score indicated.

The Greyhounds scored in the first quarter on a 10 yard pass from Stedje to Duncan. Trevor (the toe) Williams kicked the extra point to give the Greyhounds a 7-0 first quarter lead.

In the second quarter the Lynx drove to the Gruver 3 yard line with a good chance to tie the score but ran out of time.

In the third quarter Kip Pittman scored on a 8 yard pass from Stedje. The kick failed.

Spearman roared back in the third and scored on a Bret Davis 5 yard run. The try for extra point failed.

The fourth quarter belonged to the Greyhounds when Loyd Cator scored on a 20 yard run and the try for extra point failed. Steven Fry caught a 10 yard pass from Stedje and Trevor (the toe) kicked an extra point to give the Greyhounds a 26-6 county championship win.

This newspaper would like to thank all of the people from Spearman and Gruver who attended this homecoming game. This was probably the largest crowd ever to attend a county championship game. A special thanks to the bands, flag girls, student body and school officials from both towns.

Checks received

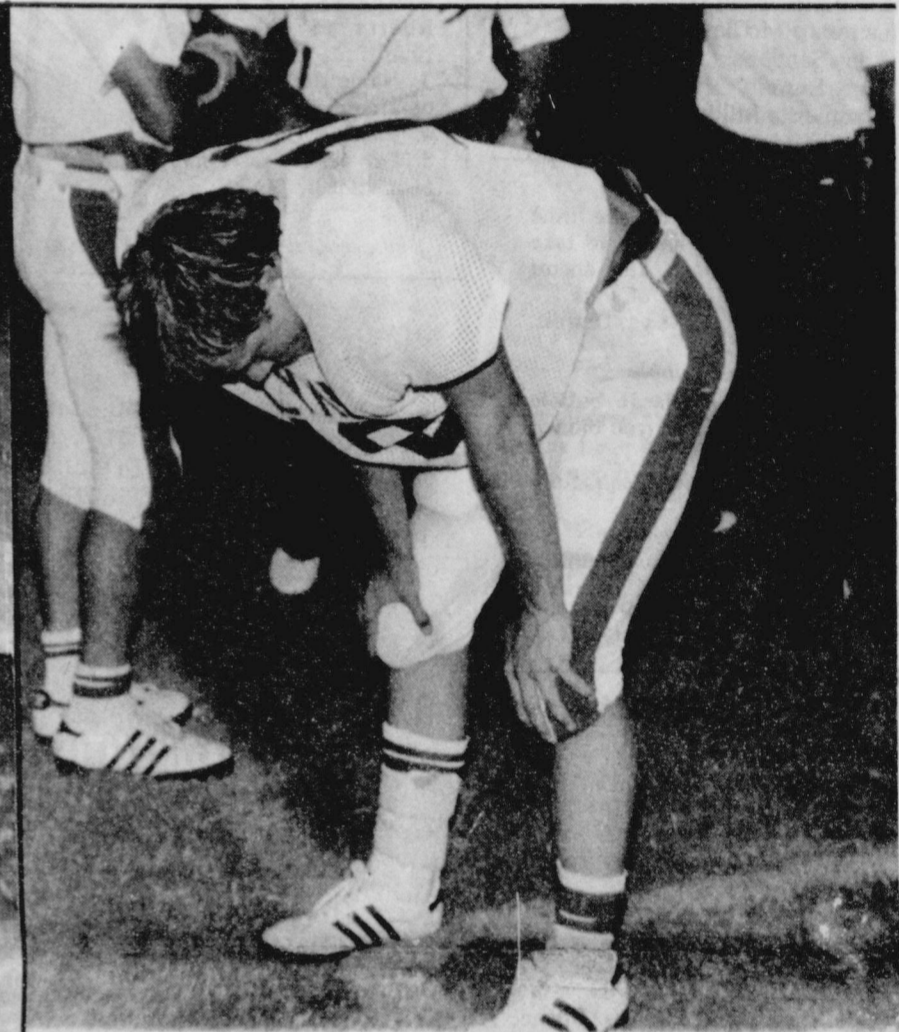
State Treasurer Ann Richards has sent checks totaling \$7.3 million to Texas' 254 counties for road construction and maintenance.

The Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage, Richards said.

Sale tax up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$57.3 million in local sales tax to the 1,005 cities that levy the one-percent city tax last week.

The city of Spearman received a check for \$14,725.33 for taxes collected in July and reported to the Comptroller's Office by August 20. This check is up 61.68% compared to last year's \$3,949.40.

Total sales tax payments to the city to date are \$142,825.80 compared to 1984 payments for the same period of \$88,339.15.

The city of Gruver received a check for \$3,132.86 for the same period, up 10.30% from the \$2,678.30 last year.

Total payments in 1985 to date to Gruver are \$30,342.98, compared to \$27,509.18 for 1984 for the same period.

Citrus Exchange to help locate missing children

(MISSION)--The Texas Citrus Exchange, a cooperative representing 1,600 producers headquartered in the Rio Grande Valley, has joined the national campaign to help find missing children. Citrus Exchange Vice President Walt Brightman said the 46-ounce cans of Big Tex grapefruit, orange and apple juice now arriving in supermarkets will include case histories of missing children.

"After convening a meeting of key people from the chairman of the Board of Directors to customers, and from professors to politicians, we decided that our number one objective would be to try to reunite families," Brightman said.

"The very least we can do," Brightman added, "is to help create more public awareness about missing children so we can help prevent it from happening."

Big Tex Juices got the idea for the campaign from a similar effort by milk producers, according to Brightman. He said his company is the first canned product in the country to participate in the program.

"We market our products currently in 22 states, the labels will be seen by countless millions of people," Brightman said.

He calculated that this initial campaign with the 46-ounce cans which will feature the faces and histories of missing children will reach more than 25 million people. The Big Tex cans also will include safety information for parents on how to deter the tragedy of losing a child.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 5, 1985

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control, or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

propriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

propositions Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for:

- (1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County;
- (2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."

It's hard to beat a sack lunch

An economy and convenience, it's hard to beat the humble sack lunch. But unless the sack lunch provides at least one-third of your daily food needs, it may not do much for you nutritionally.

A sack lunch should contain two to three ounces of meat or other protein food; a cup of milk or plain yogurt or two thin slices of cheese; one or two slices of bread or a serving of cereal and a serving of fruit or vegetables to meet this nutritional requirement.

Including vitamin C rich and deep green or yellow vegetables in lunches helps to round out these frequently neglected nutrients, although these foods can also be

provided in morning or evening meals.

Many children -- and adults -- think that a sack lunch has to have sweets and fats to be satisfying, but if you pack these foods, remember that they're a concentrated source of calories that should be consumed in small amounts.

Potato chips, lots of dressing on sandwiches or salads, soft drinks and candy bars can quickly add many calories with few minerals and vitamins.

For both economy and good nutrition, the best food buy for school children is probably the lunch served at school. But if parents carry sack lunches too, it

may be just as convenient to pack them for the whole family at once.

A variety of lunch meats, prepared spreads, snack foods and even sandwiches are available for instant lunch packing. But because pre-packaged individual servings of foods are more expensive, it can sometimes cost more to pack a sack lunch than to eat in a restaurant.

Freezing sandwiches ahead can save total preparation time. All breads keep good quality in a freezer, but some usual sandwich ingredients should not be used in frozen sandwiches. Raw vegetables, whites of hard-cooked eggs and mayonnaise do not keep good quality when frozen.

Vegetables lose their crispness, cooked eggs whites become tough, and mayonnaise and jellies have a tendency to soak into bread and make it soggy. Instead, use butter or margarine as a spread on sandwiches for freezing.

SNACK WITHOUT CHEATING

When you start exercising and watching what you eat, you're on your way to fitness. And, if you have a few pounds to shed, remember that lots of little snacks can add up to big trouble at the scale. (Even if nobody sees you eat them!) But snacking doesn't have to mean cheating. In fact, it may be easier to stick to your diet when you divide your food into several meals and snacks. So don't avoid snacks altogether—here's a better idea! Plan snacks as part of your total calories for the day. This way you won't feel cheated when you see others nibbling. Just make wise choices that are modest in calories and add up to good nutrition. Here are some great snack ideas that can help you lose.

Grease and flour 9" cake pan. Preheat oven to 325 degree F. Combine dry ingredients in a small bowl. Beat eggs on medium speed until frothy. Slowly add sugar and vanilla. On low speed slowly add pineapple and nuts. Fold in dry ingredients. Bake 30 to 35 minutes. This cake is very moist so check for doneness. Remove and ice with:

5 Tbsp. oleo, melted 1/2 cup coconut 9 Tbsp. brown sugar 4 Tbsp. cream
Mix all together. Spread on top of hot cake. Place under broiler for 2 minutes.

BUTTERMILK NUT BREAD

1 1/4 cups sifted all purpose flour
3/4 tsp. baking soda 3/4 tsp. salt
1 cup whole wheat flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 cup chopped walnut meats
2 eggs, well beaten 1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup molasses
1/4 cup melted butter
1 cup buttermilk

Sift together flour, salt, soda and baking powder. Add whole wheat flour and walnuts; mix well. Combine eggs, sugar, melted butter, molasses and buttermilk. Blend

well. Add to dry ingredients; beat until smooth. Pour into a buttered 4x4x3 inch loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degree F.) 50 to 50 minutes.

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54 contracts awarded

Governor Mark White today announced the awarding of 54 contracts totaling \$2,254,706 to weatherize homes of low-income people, with priority given to the elderly and the disabled.

Under program guidelines, as much as \$1,600 can be spent to weatherize a single dwelling by applying caulking, weatherstripping, and insulation and by replacing windows or doors.

In the past 11 months, 8,560 dwellings have been weatherized under this program.

The weatherization contracts, which are administered by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, use funds from the U.S. Department of Energy and U.S. Health and Human Services. The Texas Legislature also designated a portion of the accrued interest on oil overcharge funds awarded to Texas for weatherization programs.

Also knitting, sewing, embroidery, quilts, rugs and novelty items. All of the above events are judged prior to the opening of the fair and will be on display throughout the week for viewing by fair-goers. Don't miss the opportunity to see all of the above items at the Tri State Fair next month.

Radio Free!

Many Americans have been suddenly assaulted by loud radio music when relaxing or sleeping at a park or beach. The intruder is usually carrying a portable radio.

Some carry radios or cassette players on bikes. However carried, one individual with a noise

box can dominate the atmosphere and quickly end the serenity and relaxation of many.

To prevent this, the Parks and Recreation Department in New York City recently banned the playing of cassettes and radios, unless used with earphones, at four public beaches and in a section of Central Park.

The response has been strongly positive; veteran park and beach visitors say the new rule makes a tremendous difference. There have been few complaints. The vast majority, it seems, dislikes loud music and prefers peace and quiet at public parks and beaches.

The new silence at New York's beaches is likely to be duplicated at other public parks

and beaches across the country in the months and years to come, and should be.

Adolescent Care Unit to open

St Anthony's Adolescent Care Unit, a medical treatment program

for teenage substance abuse, will open in mid-October to meet the special needs of adolescents in the Texas Panhandle.

The Adolescent Care Unit will operate through a cooperative venture between St. Anthony's Hospital and Comprehensive Care Corporation (CompCare). Affiliated with the Palo Duro (adult) Care Unit

in Canyon, the Adolescent Care Unit is designed to incorporate a number of successful treatment modalities into a comprehensive, flexible and individualized treatment plan.

The treatment program is highly individualized and wholistic in approach; every area of the patient's life is included in the therapeutic focus, a wide range of treatment services are offered in order to deal with varied needs of

individual patients and the Care Unit staff function as a multi-disciplinary team. The adolescent Care Unit treatment team includes the medical director, program coordinator, psychologist, social

worker, occupational therapist, adolescent therapist and nursing staff.

"St. Anthony's is proud to be a part of this worthwhile program," stated William Myers, President, St. Anthony's Hospital. Substance abuse is a major health problem

which can be successfully treated. Together with CompCare, we will have the capabilities and expertise to provide quality care to many adolescents in need."

CompCare has hired Dianne Bosch, formerly of the Amarillo Police Department, as program manager for the Adolescent Care Unit. Bosch will oversee the opera-

tions of the 20-bed unit which will be located at St. Anthony's Hospital and will coordinate St. Anthony's adolescent program with the adult

program currently housed at Palo Duro Hospital. "I am very excited to be working with St. Anthony's and CompCare," stated Bosch. "Through this joint effort, we can begin to effectively treat many teen abusers who are calling for help but have no where to go."

Legal Drugs?

Bill Buckley, the columnist, created a furor recently when he suggested legalizing drugs, and federal taxing of sales. He thinks this would empty a lot of prisons and produce enormous revenue.

He also believes it would stop much stealing and violent crime and huge under-world profits. The price of drugs would come down and the cost to the nation, in operating prisons, courts, enforcement of laws, etc., would be reduced.

This lessening of crime would lessen the loss of life among both criminals and law enforcement officers.

The question is

whether this saving in money and life would offset the increased loss of life through an increased use of drugs. On that point, Buckley has been taken to task by many.

If, as one drug user wrote, our prisons would be mostly emptied, the criminal drug traffic would end and crime fall drastically, legal sale of drugs might be preferable to what seems to lie ahead on the horizon.

But any such step would have to be coupled with massive efforts to cure addicts, get users on record, and provide suitable treatment for those who need it—with some of the revenue derived from the new taxes.

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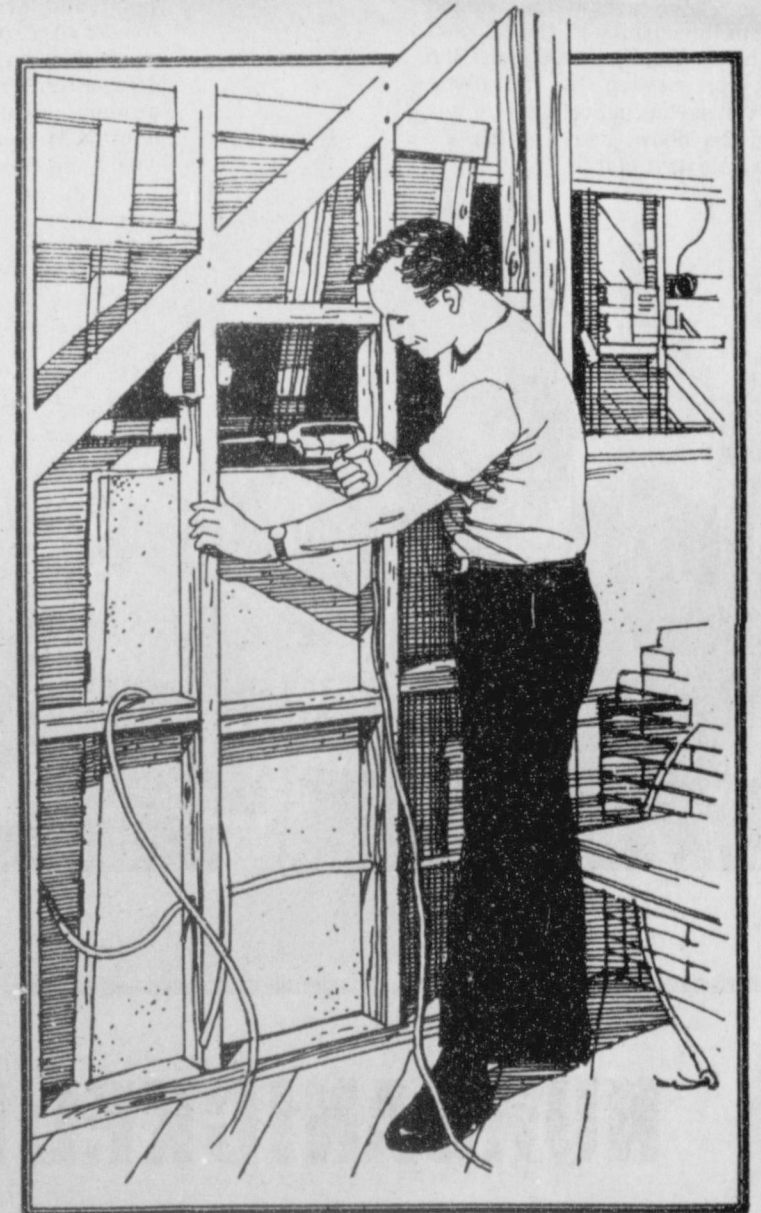

The meeting was concluded with a film being shown by Betty Musick. People Helping People was the title.

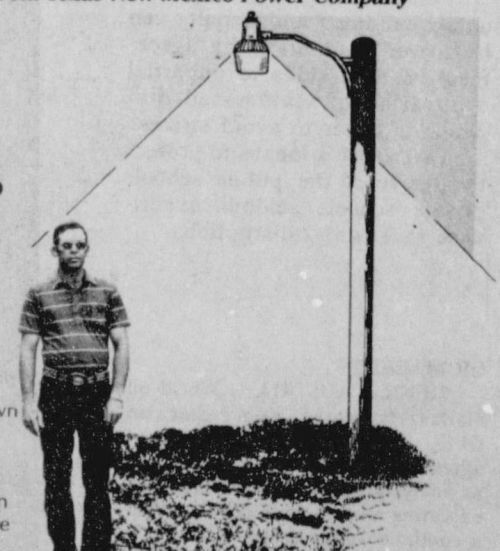

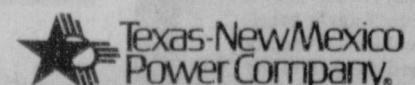
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Crop insurance still available

Texas farmers have until the last day of September to buy crop insurance for small grains.

"Crop insurance is basically a risk management strategy in which a farmer pays a premium to protect against large, unpredictable yield losses," says Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Crop insurance can assure a farmer of a minimal cash flow in case of a major crop loss so that he will have a chance to farm the next

year," adds the economist.

Producers who insured their small grain crops last year will have their contracts renewed automatically unless they cancel the, Lovell points out. However, any changes in the level of coverage or price election must be made by Sept. 30.

This year multiple peril crop insurance (mpci) for 1985-86 wheat, oats and barley will be available only under the Actual Production History (APH) program, Lovell explains. Under APH, yield guarantees are based on

actual production records of the insured or grower rather than on county average yields as was the case under the area coverage plan. This means that a farmer must provide evidence of previous years' production and acreages. The premium cost per acre also may be higher than with the area coverage plan.

Selecting crop insurance requires choosing a price election and a yield guarantee of either 50, 65 or 75 percent of past production history, explains the economist. Price elections are \$1.30, \$1.50 or

\$1.80 a bushel for barley; 80 cents, \$1 or \$1.25 a bushel for oats; and \$2, \$2.80 or \$3.30 a bushel for wheat. The combination of yield guarantee and price election determines the level of insurance coverage and cost of the premium.

Lovell reminds farmers that the premium cost for mpci reflects the federal subsidy of the premium.

Interested producers can obtain additional information by contacting a local firm that offers multiple peril crop insurance.

Federal Tax Board?

A University of Wisconsin professor has proposed that Congress enact legislation creating a Federal Tax Board. The idea is that Congress hasn't exhibited the intestinal fortitude to enact revenue-raising measures which will balance the budget.

A Federal Tax Board would be composed of members appointed by the president and members would not have to face election. They would act somewhat like the mostly autonomous Tariff Commission, which sets tariffs, and is able to resist pressure from domestic industries better than Congress.

If the nation continues to spend \$200 billion a year more than it collects in revenue, almost any reform would be desirable. A Federal Tax Board is one such method of reform.

On the other hand, the more preferable solution is for Congress to face its responsibility and enact legislation to balance the budget. Elected representatives of the people are the proper and safest sources of tax levying.

The trouble is that Congress is not meeting its responsibility, and hasn't for some years. In effect, Congress has abdicated. Unless members exhibit responsible behavior soon, something like a Federal Tax Board might become necessary, regretfully.

Schools & Arbitration

Recent teacher strikes in various parts of the nation demonstrate quite clearly, again, that a better system of settling disputes between school authorities and teachers is badly needed.

The goal should be to avoid shutdowns of our schools.

The solution lies in some form of compulsory arbitration. That, of course, would have to be accepted as part of teacher contracts. And decisions by impartial arbitration panels would have to be accepted by both sides. Perhaps a federal mediator could contribute.

Young people not yet involved in the economic system shouldn't be denied their best chance in life as the price of disputes among their elders now operating the system.

Probably the only way that unfair handicap and penalty can be spared students is by agreement on both sides to impartial arbitration of stalemated disputes, in order to avoid strikes.

That's also a means to protect the future of the public school; private schools seldom experience strikes and disruptions.

OIL MARKET

VIENNA, AUSTRIA -- World oil markets appeared calm after an OPEC meeting broke up without agreement on a defense of prices and as analysts said there was little the exporting nations could do to prevent a continued price drop.

SHULTZ & REBELS

BANGKOK, THAILAND -- Secretary of State George Shultz met recently with Cambodian rebels fighting the Vietnamese occupation of their homeland and signed a \$3 million aid package to help border villagers caught in the cross-fire.

NAVY STUNT PILOT DIES

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. -- Two jets in the Navy Blue Angels precision flying team collided recently during an air show and crashed to the ground in flames. One pilot was killed, but the other parachuted to safety, officials said.

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
