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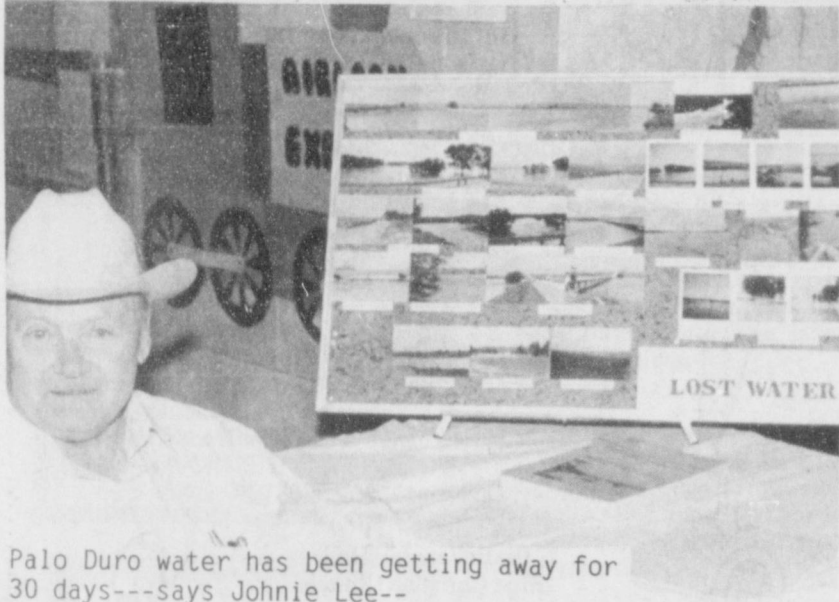

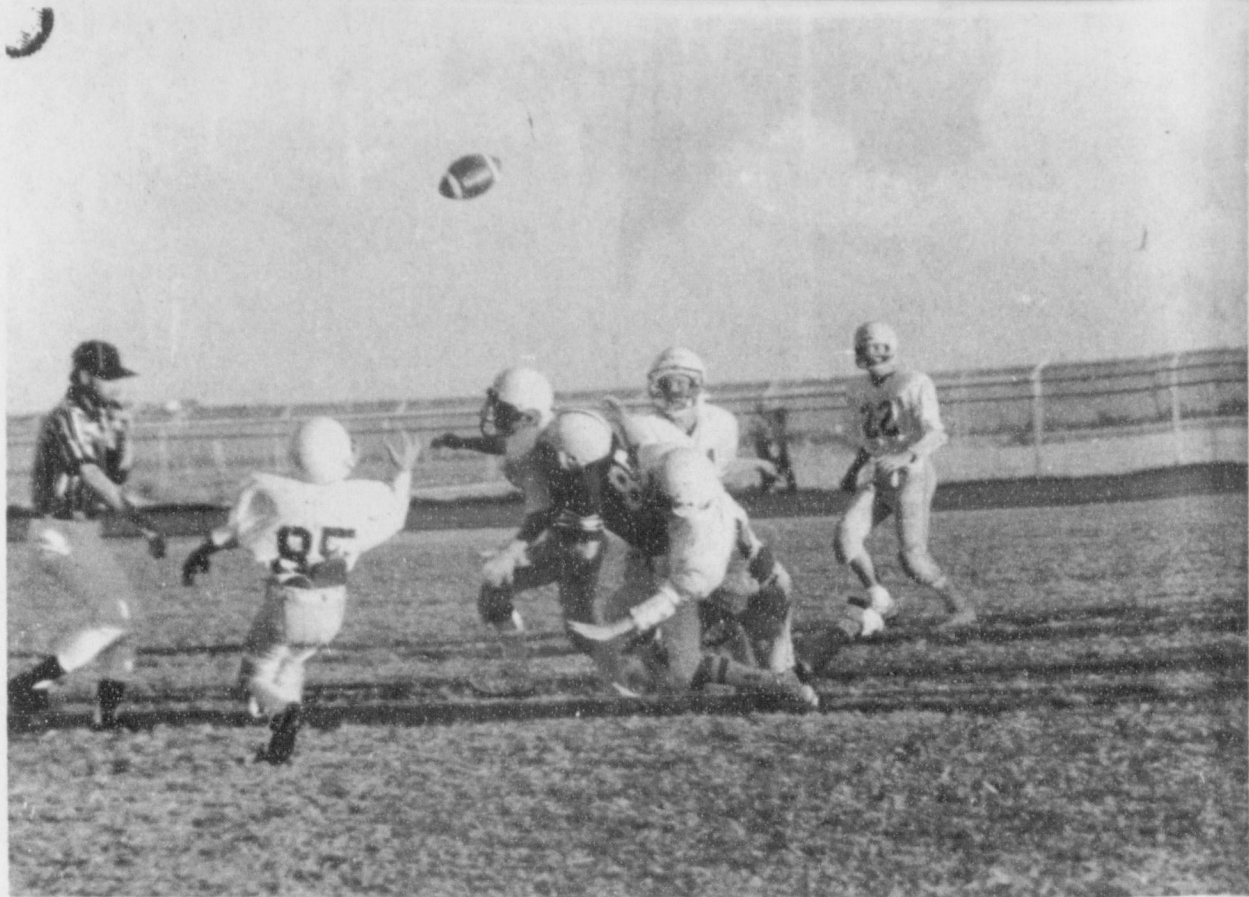

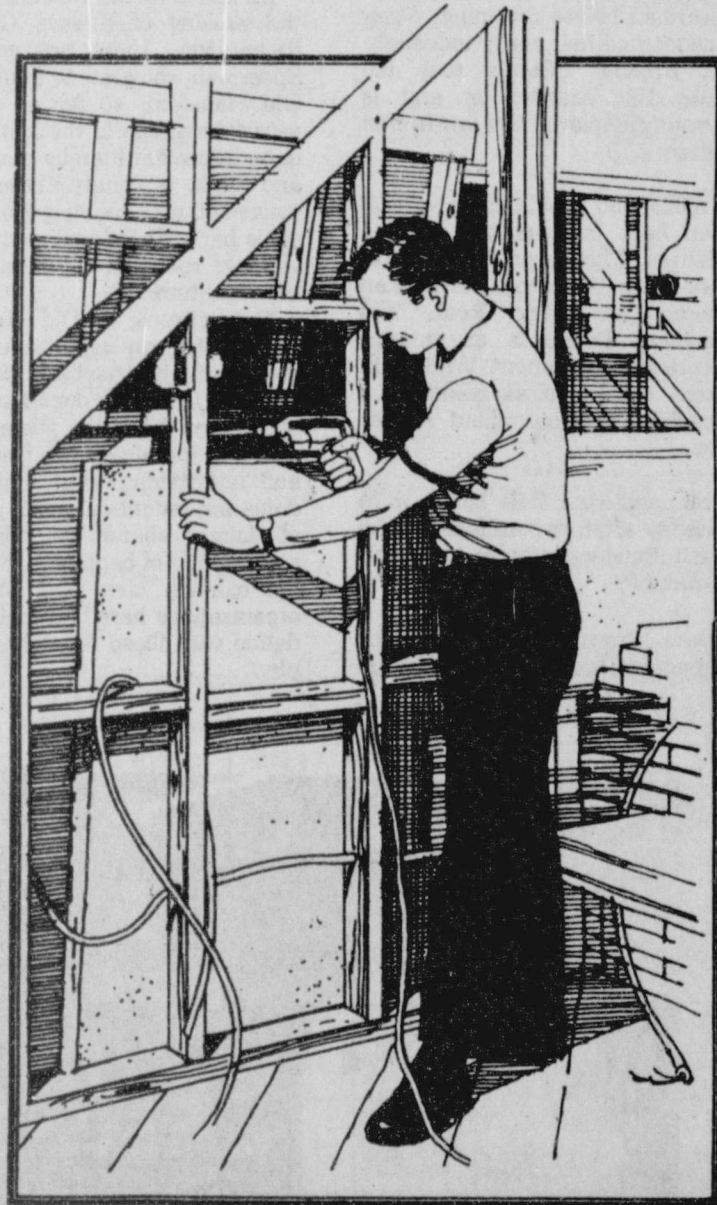

His other grandmother, Mrs. Mary Carter, lives in Houston.

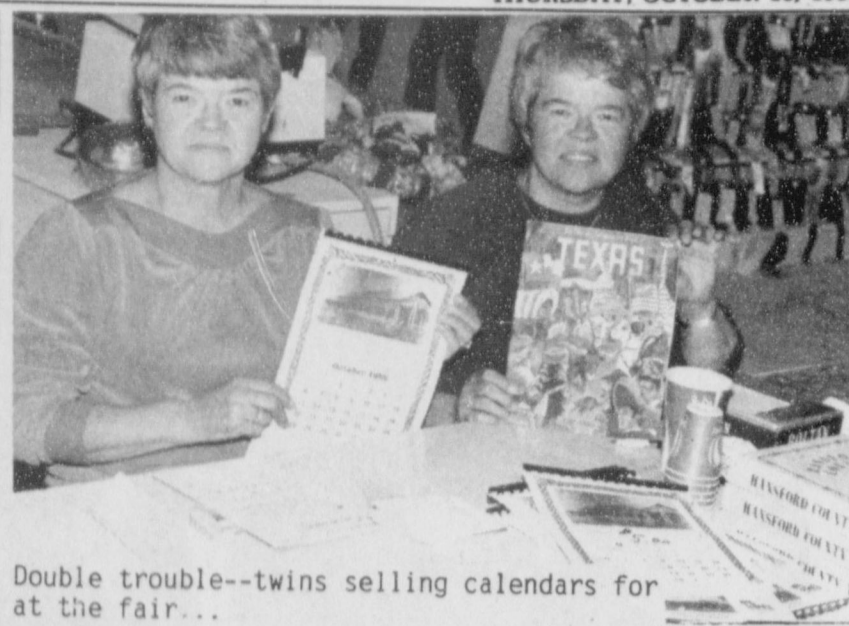

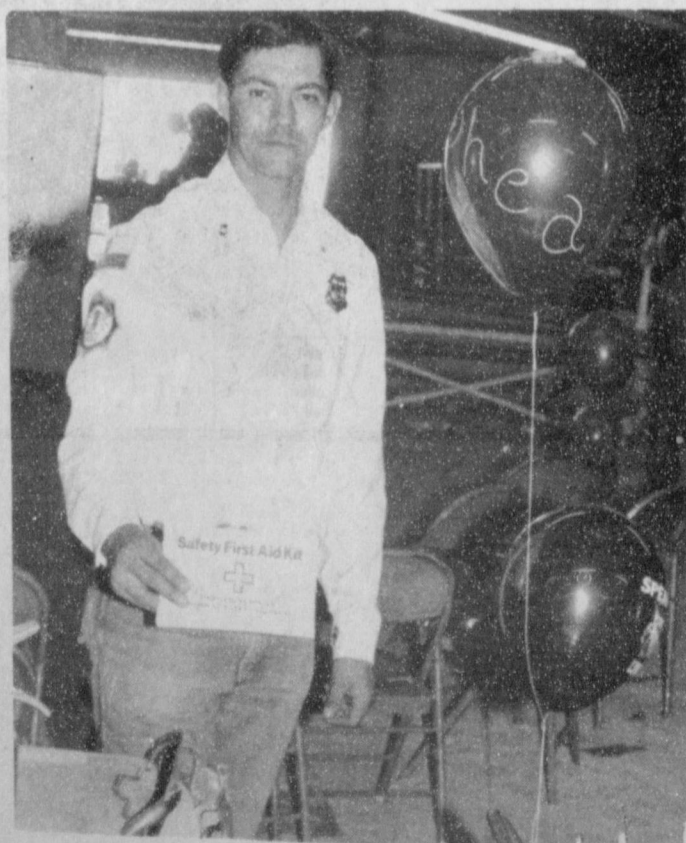

Texans to save on water bills

Passage of Constitutional Amendment No. 1 in the general election on November 5, 1985, has the potential to save consumers throughout the state of Texas a considerable amount of money as they look at their future water needs and at ways of financing needed water projects.

One of the provisions of Constitutional Amendment No. 1 creates a new \$250 million loan guarantee program to be administered through the Texas Water Development Fund. Through this program, the larger cities and towns throughout the state could utilize the triple-A bond rating of the state to help secure the sale of their

bonds. In effect, the state would become a cosigner in the bond sale under this loan guarantee program.

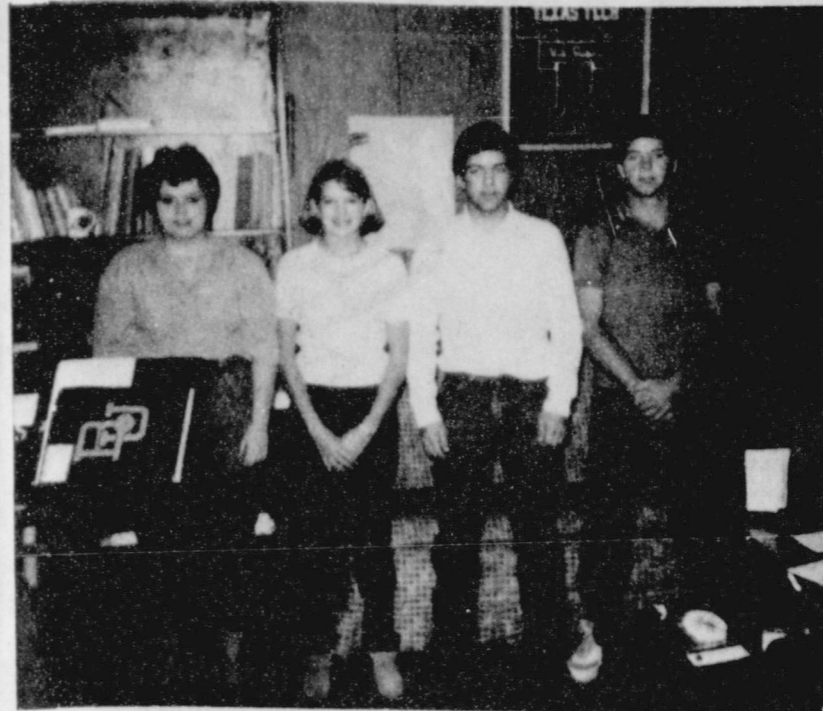
The program would primarily benefit medium-sized cities whose credit rating is not as good as the credit rating of the state. By utilizing the credit rating of the

state to secure the sale of bonds, cities and towns could borrow money at lower interest rates. This then lowers the cost of the water project, which in turn is passed through to the consumer, lowering his water bill.

There is a \$250 million limit as to how much the state would be authorized to pay out. With the very conservative two to one leveraging authorized in the program, the Texas Water Development Board could enter into a total of loan guarantees of up to \$500 million.

Costs to state taxpayers in this loan guarantee program would be minimal even in a "worst case scenario." The only cost involved would be in the case of a city or town defaulting on its loan, and odds against that happening are high. The Texas Water Development Fund was created in 1957, and there has not been a case of a default of a loan under this program to date.

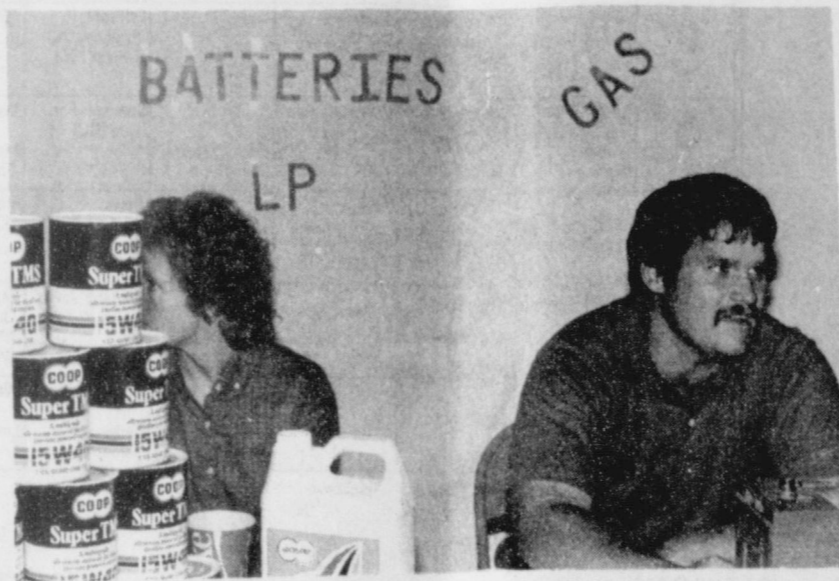

Amendment 1 to aid local communities

Approval of Constitutional Amendment No. 1 by state voters in the general election on November 5, 1985, could provide a boost for many towns and cities throughout the state of Texas that are experiencing water problems.

Constitutional Amendment No. 1 provides for a total of 980 million dollars in additional state bonds to be administered through the Texas Water Development Fund. Proceeds from the sale of these bonds could be used by the smaller cities and towns throughout the state for water development, water quality, flood control and/or water supply projects.

Basically, Constitutional Amendment No. 1 provides for the following: \$400 million in state bonds to allow for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for the storage, transmission, transportation and treatment of water and wastewater; \$190 million for water quality projects; \$200 million for flood

control projects; and \$190 million for water supply projects.

Cities and towns throughout the state that have demonstrated that they cannot sell bonds on the open market at reasonable interest rates could, through these bonding programs, take advantage of the state's triple-A bond rating. Developers working to bring several small projects together into one regional system could also benefit from these bonding proposals.

By taking advantage of these bonding proposals the cost of the facilities developed would be reduced, which would in turn reduce the cost to local residents who will be taking advantage of the facilities created.

All loans made by the state from these bond funds are to be repaid in full, including interest, by the direct beneficiaries of the projects involved. Therefore, there would be no long-term cost to state taxpayers.

The GTE employee who answers the repair call has immediate access to each customer's record through an on-line computer network. Any request of an emergency nature is immediately referred to a GTE supervisor for handling.

The new repair number is listed in the 1985 directory on page 2. Meyers urges all telephone customers to use this new number because the old number has been disconnected.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISPOSAL PERMIT AMENDMENT

WILSON MCCLOY; NAN MCCLOY; ALLEN MCCLOY; BILL MCCLOY; AND MARK MCCLOY DBA MCCLOY FEEDLOT, Box 29, Morse, Texas 79062 have applied to the Texas Water Commission for an amendment to Permit No. 01559 to authorize additional feedlot pens and wastewater retention facilities in order to accommodate an increase from 6000 cattle on 54 acres to a maximum capacity of 8000 cattle on approximately 74 acres. Wastewater is to be routed into four settling basins/collection ponds with a total capacity of approximately 23.3 acre-feet and is to be used to irrigate approximately 35 acres of pastureland. Manure generated at this site is to be used as a fertilizer and soil amendment for farmland. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit.

The feedlot and retention facilities are immediately south of FM 281 at a point approximately 3 miles west of the intersection of FM 281 with State Highway 136 and approximately 15 miles north-northwest of the City of Stinnett in Hutchinson County, Texas. The feedlot, retention facilities and land used for disposal are within the watershed of South Palo Duro Creek which flows into the Palo Duro Creek, which flows into the State of Oklahoma in Segment No. 0101 of the Canadian River Basin.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and 31 TAC 338 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
