within Hartley County, Texas:

County, with Tennessee Avenue in
the City of Dalhart, Texas;
THENCE South along the centerline
of Tennessee Avenue to the
intersection of said avenue with
Texas Boulevard;

THENCE West along the
centerline of Texas Boulevard to
the point of intersection of the
alley located to the west of the
parallel to Ash Avenue, which
alley constitutes a part of the west
city limits boundary of the City of
Dalhart;

THENCE North along said alley
and city limits boundary to the
point where said alley and city
limits boundary intersects with
the southern boundary of Dallam
County, Texas, also being the
northern boundary of Hartley
County, Texas;

THENCE East along the common

North Plains Groundwater Con-
servation District No. 2 was
created in 1954 pursuant to the pro-
visions of Chapter 52 of the Texas
Water Code, consistent with the
provisions of Article XVI, Section
59, of the Texas Constitution. The
purpose of the District include con-
servation, preservation, protec-
tion, recharging and prevention of
waste of the underground water of
underground water reservoirs, or
their subdivisions, within the State
of Texas. The District has statutory
ad valorem taxing authority not to
exceed \$.50 (50 cents) per \$100.00
assessed valuation subject to the
approval of its electors. Its electors
have previously approved a tax
levy of \$0.05 (five cents) per \$100.00
assessed valuation. Its present tax
levy is slightly less than 1¢ per
\$100.00 assessed valuation: .85 of 1¢
per \$100.00. It has no indebtedness.

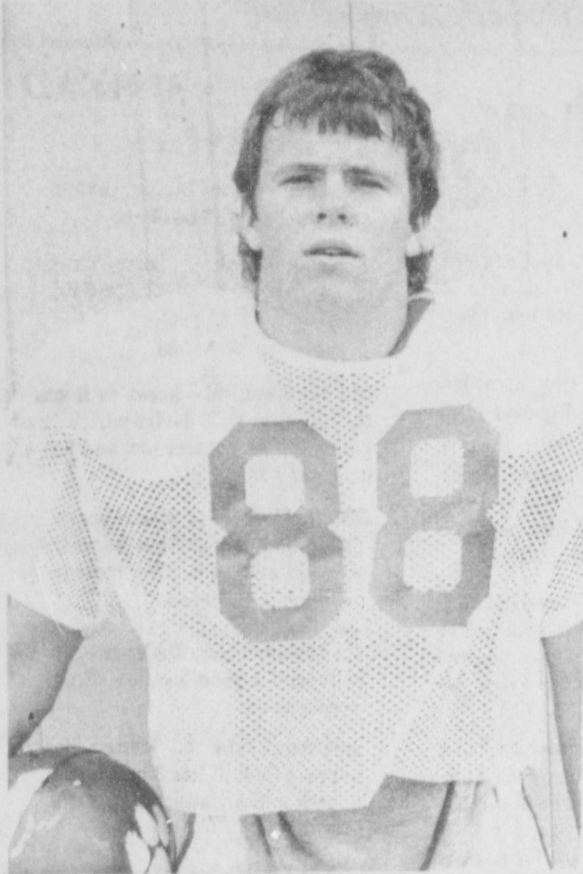

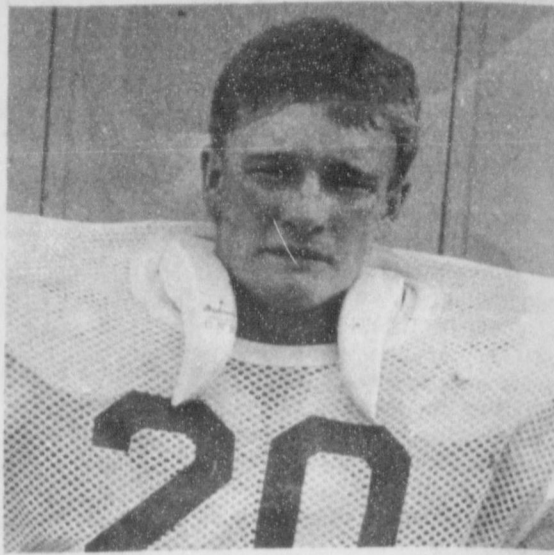

Euphoria

All America was relieved at the release of 72 hostages from an Italian cruise ship. Media types described the atmosphere at the White House and Pentagon as euphoric.

Comments flooded the airwaves that this had been a great triumph for our military forces, for the Reagan Administration, etc.

Too much already. Four Navy fighters intercepted a slow transport and ordered it to land in Sicily. The pilot meekly complied. Certainly this is gratifying, especially so since the hijackers

are called to account.

But euphoria? An elderly American cripple had been murdered.

The media also regularly depicts all hostages as heroes and heroines. This isn't really a justified assessment either, though they have been inconvenienced and in some danger.

This overly dramatic portrayal is partly a result of keen competition among media reps, many of whom seek more color, drama or sensationalism for their reports. Understandable--and human. Take it into account.

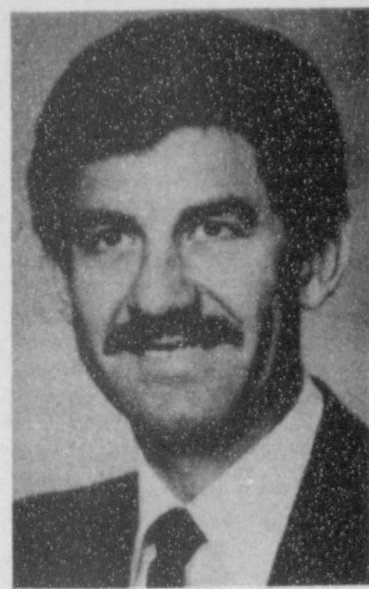

Gonzalez announces candidacy



Raul A. Gonzalez, Justice of the Texas Supreme Court, announced his candidacy on Thursday, October 10, for election to continue on the Texas Supreme Court. The announcement ceremony was held in the historic Old Supreme Court Room of the Capitol Building, Austin.

Justice Gonzalez is the first Mexican-American to serve on the Texas Supreme Court. He was appointed to that position by Governor Mark White in October, 1984. His position was previously held by Justice Charles Barrow prior to Barrow becoming Dean of Baylor Law School. Gonzalez is the only candidate to have announced for this seat of the Supreme Court.

Campaign Co-Chairman for Justice Gonzalez election are San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros and Texas Democratic Party Vice-Chairman Perry Bradley. Texas Supreme Court Justice John Hill attended Justice Gonzalez campaign announcement ceremony.

Prior to joining the Supreme Court, Gonzalez was Associate Justice of the 13th Court of Appeals (Corpus Christi). Previously, he was judge of the 103rd District Court in Brownsville. He has also been a lawyer in private practice and is a former Assistant United States Attorney.

A native of Weslaco, Justice Gonzalez parents were migrant workers. "Until we were old enough to go to school, we worked on the circuit of Washington,

California, and Arkansas, picking whatever was ripe for harvest—cabbage, lettuce, cotton. After we reached school age, our parents made us stay at home to obtain an education."

Justice Gonzalez has a bachelor's degree from the University of Texas and a doctor of jurisprudence degree from the University of Houston. Additionally, he has successfully completed the course work for an LL.M. degree in Judicial Process at the University of Virginia. He is also a graduate of the National Judicial College, Nevada.

Gonzalez has four brothers and sisters, all of whom worked their way through college. His brother Rene graduated from Texas A&I University and from Southern Methodist University School of Law. He is a Superior Court Judge in Anchorage, Alaska. His brother Herman has a master's degree in social work from the University of Texas, and is a Weslaco City Commissioner. Ana, his sister, is a graduate of James Dougherty School of Nursing, Corpus Christi, and is a nurse in that city. Gonzalez' sister Magdalena has a bachelor's degree in law enforce-

ment from Pan American University, and is a U.S. Customs Agent in Roma, Texas.

Judge Gonzalez said of his parents, "They always had the dream to break away from the migratory cycle. They felt that education was the only way, and that, with God's help, there was nothing we couldn't achieve as long as we worked it."

"Over and over, Mom used to say, when you don't succeed, you don't think of it as failure; you think of it as an unfilled goal." That kept us going." The Judge's mother, Paula, was one of the first Mexican-Americans to graduate from her local high school.

When Governor White appointed him to the Supreme Court, Justice Gonzalez said, "I hope that my appointment will serve to encourage not only Hispanic youth, but all youths that come from poor families."

Justice Gonzalez is married to the former Dora Champion of Progresso, Texas. The Gonzalez have four children: Celest, Jaime, Marco, and Sonia.

Voter turnout key to water amendment

These days, many election are decided by a small minority of eligible voters. This may be the case on November 5 when 14 Constitutional Amendments are voted on by Texans statewide, and water issues extremely important to the state are addressed.

that particular election, West Texans voted in favor of the issue by a large majority, but the voter turnout was only about 15 percent of the registered voters.

The 5,000 majority votes cast against the constitutional amendment in that 1968 election could have easily been offset if even one additional voter per precinct in West Texas had gone to the polls.

Constitutional Amendment No. 1 would provide for the issuance of \$980 million in bonds for water development, transportation, wastewater treatment, water quality, flood control

and water supply projects. Amendment No. 2 authorizes the sale of \$200 million in state bonds to provide low interest loans for farmers in upgrading their irrigation efficiency.

The provisions of Constitutional Amendments 1 and 2 are for all Texans. However, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce urges West

Texans to lead the way in supporting these two extremely important water issues by going to the polls in record numbers to vote for Constitutional Amendments 1 and 2.

In a similar election in 1968, when a constitutional amendment concerning state water issues appeared on the ballot, the measure was defeated statewide by a small margin of approximately 5,000 votes. During

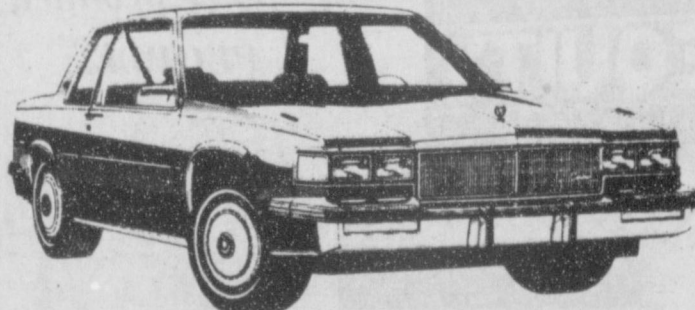

Restocking the cattle herd is a decision that requires close analysis, particularly since the market outlook remains bleak, say economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. The economists recently looked at a number of restocking alternatives as to their potential for profit and found that none offer the rate of return that a cattleman could get by liquidating his herd and putting the cash in a certificate of deposit at 10 percent interest. Alternatives considered were fall restocking in the spring with these three options. The economists found that only three options—fall cow-calf, fall bred heifers and spring cow-calf had positive annual rates of return. The fall bred heifer option was the best overall with an average annual rate of return of almost 7 percent.

Wilbur Fullbright wins 4,000 with recipe

Wilbur Fullbright was born and raised in Spearman. He is now professor of music at Boston University. Our readers should be interested in the following story:

A Recipe for Travel



Music Professor and part-time gourmet chef Wilbur Fullbright won \$4000 for travel anywhere in the continental United States in a recipe contest sponsored by Thomas' English Muffins. His "Creamed Chicken with Water Chestnuts and Green Peppercorns on Thomas' English Muffins" placed first among 1600 entries to the "Can You Top a Thomas?" contest.

"I've always been intrigued by interesting food," explained Professor Fullbright. He didn't really get cooking, however, until his three sons were grown and his wife went to graduate school. "Then I started cooking on the weekends to help out," he said. "Now we always do the cooking together."

Savoring the rewards of his efforts, the Fullbrights went on a month-long tour of historical sites in the south, with stops in Virginia, Tennessee, and Texas. The Texas trip, to visit family, had already been in their plans, so the summer trip took only a small bite out of the prize. "We want to do something special with the money, but we're not certain what that will be yet," said the seasoned traveler, who's already been to every state in the union.

One thing they might cook up this fall is a trip to explore the nooks and crannies of "fascinating old country inns" in New England. Sounds delectable. MAP

- salt, pepper, and flour
- 3 T butter
- 2 T Wesson oil
- 2 scallions, chopped
- 1 medium green pepper, cut in julienne strips
- 1 T green peppercorns
- 1/4 c water chestnuts, chopped
- 2 c heavy cream
- 2 T mustard
- 1/4 t crushed red pepper
- 2-4 drops Tabasco sauce
- 3 Thomas' English muffins, split
- 3 T chopped parsley

Debone chicken breasts and flatten. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, and rosemary leaves. Dredge in flour. Melt butter in frying pan and add oil. Over low heat, saute chicken breasts gently until cooked through. Remove from pan and set aside.

Saute onions and green peppers. Add water chestnuts, green peppercorns, mustard, and red pepper. Add cream and boil until reduced by about one third. Add Tabasco sauce.

Cut chicken in julienne strips and add to cream sauce. Toast muffins. Spoon a generous amount of the creamed chicken over each half. Top with chopped parsley.

Nasal spray

Houston -- (October 15, 1985) -- Nasal spray abuse can lead to serious health problems and a habit harder to break than cigarette smoking, a Baylor College of Medicine otolaryngologist warns.

Nasal decongestant sprays shrink swollen blood vessels in the nose making it easier to breathe. But the more a nasal spray is used, the more it is needed and the less effective it becomes, said Gayle Woodson, M.D., assistant professor of otolaryngology at Baylor College of Medicine.

An alternative is to take an oral decongestant. Salt-water spray will also provide minor, short-term relief of congestion, Woodson said. There is no evidence of permanent damage caused by the abuse of nasal spray but temporary problems may occur.

"Nasal spray enters the bloodstream and can cause blood pressure to rise and increase the heart rate," she said. "For an individual with diabetes, it can make that condition worse."

Prolonged use of nasal spray can wear out the blood vessels in the nose, making a person more susceptible to nose bleeds and sinus infections. The nose may become

chronically congested and require nose spray more often.

Addiction occurs when a nasal spray is used several times a day for long periods of time, and when it is easier to breathe only after using the spray.

"It is a very subtle addiction," Woodson said. "People do not realize that they are actually making the condition worse. All they know is that they can breathe easier after using the spray."

Once addicted, the habit can be harder to break than cigarette smoking, she said.

To break the addiction, a person will have to stop using the nasal spray completely. It may take six months to one year for the nose to return to normal.

"The first two weeks are the hardest because a person will be unable to breathe normally. After the initial few days, the discomfort should begin to lessen," Woodson said.

She recommends following package directions and using nasal spray no longer than three consecutive days. Using a long-acting, 12-hour spray that contains one decongestant is better than a spray that also contains menthol, which can irritate the nose.

Water to be conserved

Approval of Constitutional Amendment No. 2 by state voters in the general election on November 5, 1985, would conserve the water supplies of the state of Texas, thereby making water available for future use by municipalities, industries and agriculture.

Voter acceptance of this constitutional amendment, which provides for the issuance and sale of \$200 million in bonds to create the Agricultural Water Conservation Program, will set the wheels in motion for irrigators

throughout the state to obtain low interest loans for upgrading their irrigation application efficiency.

Seventy-two percent of the water currently used in the state of Texas is used by agriculture. At the onset of

this bonding program, a pilot program, funded with \$5 million will be established to test the success of a low interest loan program, as well as test the interest of irrigators in this type of program.

Funds available through this bonding will be administered by underground water conservation districts and soil and water conservation districts throughout the state.

Irrigation application efficiency improvements that could be considered under this loan program include the modification of existing center pivot sprinkler systems. This type of modification has been documented to improve water-use efficiency up to 20

percent. Additionally, the installation of the underground pipeline, which



Texas Safety Association

As the October onslaught of ghastly ghosts, terrible trolls and startling skeletons approaches, Texas Safety Association suggests sensible precautions to keep Halloween happy and safe for your children and home.

"When in doubt, throw it out," advises George Gustafson, Executive Vice President of TSA, when discussing Halloween treats. "If a food or candy item has no wrapping, or the covering is loose or torn, discard it. Wash and slice

fruit before allowing your child to eat it. Concerned and considerate treatgivers might help by providing non-food items, such as pennies or nickels, snack food coupons or bright decals for the children's school binders," he adds.

Common sense and prior planning play a big part in assuring your youngster's safety and enjoyment, while still allowing them the thrills of this fall celebration. A few suggestions include:

--Pre-planning the route, staying in familiar neighborhoods and only visiting homes that show the trick-or-treat signal of a lighted porch or yard.

--An older teenager or adult should accompany young children on their journeys. Older children walking their route with friends need to thoroughly discuss safety rules with parents beforehand.

--Set time limits for their travels. Some communities designate Halloween treating hours. Also, take into account that Halloween falls on a week night this year, which means that the costumed imps and aliens turn back into students early the next morning.

--Costumes and masks should not restrict movement or eyesight, or trail on the ground. Face paint or normal make-up products can provide frightening effects while allowing freedom of sight. Use lots

of light colors in costumes, or reflective tape, and pass out plenty of flashlights. Dark of night adds to the thrill of the celebration, but hides the dangers of curbs, stones and cracked sidewalks.

--Make certain your yard, driveway, porch and sidewalks are free of obstructions if you are handing out treats to the tiny revelers. If you're driving, take extra care to watch for small, ghostly pedestrians.

"Remember to check you local newspaper for holiday activities," Gustafson adds. "Group activities at organization-sponsored haunted houses, recreation center parties or neighborhood celebrations often offer a fun-filled alternative to the traditional Halloween trek."



eliminates evaporation and deep percolation water losses in transporting irrigation water, could be funded, eliminating water losses from 10 to 20 percent per 1,000 feet. Also, the

purchase of a surge irrigation system that improves irrigators' efficiency from 10 to 40 percent could qualify for a loan under this program.

Under the provisions of Constitutional Amendment No. 2, the only

cost to state taxpayers would be in the case of a default on a loan made under the Agricultural Water Conservation Program. Even then, the cost would be minimal, as the equipment

purchased under the loan would be sold at public auction. The proceeds of this sale would be used to repay the loan. Any balance remaining on the loan would then be shared on a 50-50 basis by the soil and water conservation district or the underground water conservation district issuing the loan, and the state.
