Article 480, Revised Criminal Statutes of Texas, 1925, pro-

Statutes of Texas, 1925, provides:

"Shooting in public place Any persan who discharges any, gun, pistol or firearm of any kind, or discharges any cannon cracker or torpedo on or across any, public square, street or alley of any, town or city of within one hundred yards of any, business house in this State shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars. A "cannon cracker" is ANY COMBUSTIBLE PAOKAGE MORE THAN TWO INCHES LONG AND MORE THAN ONE INCH THROUGH."




