Infant mortality rate lowest ever

The infant mortality rate in Texas dropped to its lowest point in history during 1984 - 10.4 deaths per 1,000 births - according to figures from the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The Texas infant mortality rate is lower than the provisional national rate of 10.6.

The actual number of infant deaths decreased from 3,254 in 1983 to 3,118 in 1984, while the number of births for the same period increased by 1.2 percent. The infant mortality rate is a traditional index of the quality of health care.

There were 1,951 deaths of infants under 28 days of age last year for a neonatal death rate of 6.5 deaths per 1,000 births, another record low for Texas.

There were 298,756 births to Texas mothers last year for a birth rate of 18.7 per 1,000 population. This is a slight decrease from the state's birth rate of 18.8 births per 1,000 population in 1983, when 295,178 births were reported.

The U.S. Census Bureau estimated the state's population as of July 1, 1984, at 15,989,000. The excess of births over deaths added 182,000 to the Texas population last year.

Over-all the state's death rate remained at a low 7.3 deaths per 1,000 population last year for the third year in a row. The number of deaths in the state increased slightly to 116,755 last year, up from 114,714 the previous year.

The leading causes of death for the state were: Heart Disease (39,782); Cancer (23,794); Cerebrovascular Disease (8,974); Accidents (7,240); Bronchitis, Emphysema, Asthma and Allied Conditions (3,655); Pneumonia and Influenza (3,339); Homicide (2,187); Suicide (2,153); Diabetes Mellitus (1,972); and the Certain Conditions Originating in the Perinatal period (1,461).

All together, the four leading causes of death in Texas were responsible for seven out of 10 deaths in 1984.

The leading causes of death nationwide in 1984, based on provisional national data, were the same in the six highest categories (heart disease; cancer; cerebrovascular disease; accidents, bronchitis, emphysema, asthma and allied conditions; and pneumonia and influenza). The national death leaders in the top 10 included: (7) diabetes mellitus, (8) suicide, (9) chronic liver disease and cirrhosis, and (10) atherosclerosis.

W.D. Carroll, chief of the Bureau of Vital Statistics, said that the bureau now maintains nearly 26 million records for the state, including 15.6 million birth records, 5.6 million death certificates, 3.2 million marriage records, and 1.4 million divorce records.

No magic formula exists for creating the "perfect family". But after years of studying families broken by divorce, drug and alcohol abuse, troubled children and family crises, researchers have begun to focus their attention on what makes a family successful.

Since November 24-30, is National Family Week. Let's look at what the experts say are characteristics of strong families.

It starts with family members who are close. They value their family bond, and want to spend time working and playing together. Members of strong families respect individual differences.

They don't expect each other to have the same interests or appearance. Individuals are encouraged in their separate pursuits knowing that the family stands behind them.

Strong families share a basic set of values that provides direction for day-to-day decisions. They are clear about their values, yet tolerant of individual differences and respect the values of others. Most recent research studies indicate that families with strong values also tend to have a high degree of religious orientation.

Parents in strong families take their leadership responsibilities seriously. Mothers and fathers share leadership and both actively teach, lead, guide and discipline, but do not attempt to be peers or friends with their children.

These families tend to face

problems openly and realistically. They are flexible in seeking solutions to problems and willing to try something else when a first-try does not work. As a result, strong families are the most capable of adapting to crisis situations.

Strong families have bonds of love that reach out to less effective families, and contribute to many community activities. They help others.

Strong families laugh together. They create and nurture family jokes and patterns of play. They use laughter and teasing for transitions at difficult moments, but do not indulge in hostile or painful kidding.

Evidently, strong bonds of love, lots of caring and sharing, mixed with fun and laughter adds up to strong families. During National Family Week resolve to recognize and build on the strengths of your family.

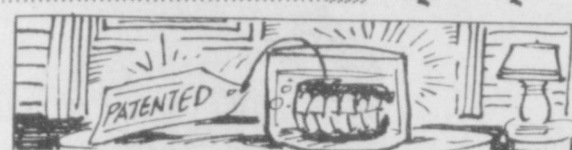

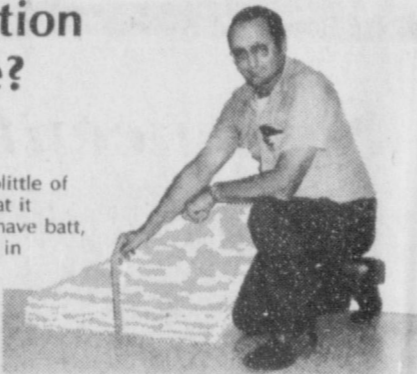

Bingo operators a may lose licenses

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said preliminary computer analysis of charity contributions from Texas bingo games shows as many as 200 operators may lose their licenses. Bullock said requirements that charity bingo games contribute at least 35 percent of adjusted gross receipts to authorized charities will be strictly enforced in early 1986. "We've given them warning after warning that bingo money is to go to charity. And, we've given them time to adjust their operations to meet that requirement," he said. Stopped up enforcement efforts in January will coincide with a requirement that at least 35 percent of the adjusted gross income from a game's third quarter operation this year be distributed to charity during the final three months of 1985.

Adjusted gross income is the amount left over from gross receipts of bingo games after prizes have been deducted. Bullock said more than 1,500 groups hold licenses to operated charity bingo in Texas. He said operators have been warned repeatedly of the 35 percent requirement by letters and informational brochures. "We've given everyone enough time to get their house in order and our next step will be to suspend the licenses of those who refuse to comply with the charity rules," Bullock said. Bullock said agents from his office would raid bingo halls and revoke licenses as a last resort for games which continue to violate state bingo.

Water plan approval good news for Palo Duro authority

Texas voters' approval of a water plan last week could move Palo Duro River Authority one step closer to building a dam and lake where Horse Creek meets Palo Duro Creek.

Orval Allen, manager of North Plains Conservation District in Dumas, discounted effects of the water plan's Amendment 2, which provides low-cost loans for efficient irrigation equipment, because many farmers have already in-

stalled low-energy precision application (LEPA) systems.

A greater effect, Allen said, is expected for Palo Duro River Authority, which is waiting at the top of the list of special projects that could receive funds due to passage of Amendment 1 of the water plan.

The amendment authorizes the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, sub-

sidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation.

The PDRA project involves construction of a 150-foot-high, 4,900-foot-long dam that would create a

lake about 9½ miles north of Spearman. The lake created by the dam would cover approximately 2,500 acres and impound about 60,900 acre feet of water.

A conveyance system that would

include a water treatment plant is expected to pump a daily average of 7.8 million gallons from the lake to participating municipalities at a rate of about 8,700 acre feet annually.

The project has been estimated to cost anywhere from \$47 million to \$56 million.

"The water plan, in itself, is something we certainly needed," Allen said. "I'm sure it will be modeled and worked with, but at least we've got a plan. We have something to work with."

Allen said if the dam and lake

are built and paid for, "it'll be the cheapest water there is, even cheaper than ground water."

Members include Moore County, Hansford County and Stinnett. Voters in Perryton and Ochiltree County voted not to join PDRA.

"There's a lot of water that goes down the Palo Duro," Allen said. "It has a lot of drainage. It's a shame we didn't have something built this year when we had those heavy rains. It would have made a big dent in getting that thing started."

With the arrival of another flu season, the Food and Drug Administration is again asking your help in protecting our nation's children and teenagers from the dangerous condition known as Reye syndrome.

The rare but potentially fatal condition is linked to the use of aspirin to treat flu or chicken pox. Many parents now realize that

Reye syndrome, which is fatal in about one out of four cases, may strike their young children. A recent FDA survey found that many of the people who use aspirin

are generally not aware that teenagers are also likely victims. For that reason, the accompanying public service ads are aimed directly at teenage readers. The ads urge against using aspirin or aspirin-containing products to treat flu or chicken pox.

Hearing to be held

The Texas Housing Agency will hold a hearing in Dallas on November 19 to receive public comment on proposed changes to its multi-family program that would increase the percentage of low-income families that occupy the apartment projects it finances.

Under the current rules, 20 percent of the apartments in a complex must be rented to persons or families earning less than 80 percent of median income. The remaining units must be rented to moderate-income families. Under the proposed rules:

-- At least 10 percent of the apartments would have to be rented to tenants earning less than 50 percent of median income for the area, adjusted for family size. In the Dallas area, for example, an individual's annual income could not exceed \$10,550, while the annual income for a family of four could not exceed \$15,100.

-- A ceiling on the rents charged individuals earning 50 percent or less of median income would be established. Using the incomes for the Dallas area, the maximum proposed rent for a person earning \$10,550 would be \$264 a month. The maximum proposed rent for a family of four earning \$15,100 would be \$377 a month.

-- At least another 10 percent of the apartments would have to be rented to people earning less than 80 percent of the area median income. Restrictions on the rents charged these individuals and families would also be imposed.

The public hearing is scheduled for 2 p.m. on November 19 at the Ramada Inn Love Field, 8900 E. Cedar Springs Road, Dallas, Texas.

HONE ECONOMICS BRIEFS

BEEF BELONGS IN A BALANCED DIET - "Beef is no higher in calories than other types of meat, and it belongs in any well-balanced diet," says Texas Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Mary K. Sweeten. Sweeten cites U.S. Department of Agriculture figures which show that three ounces of lean roast beef contain 169 calories and three ounces of top loin (strip) steak has 195 calories. Three ounces of baked chicken, without skin, has 174 calories and three ounces of fried chicken, with the skin has 209 calories. "It's a similar story with cholesterol," says the nutritionist. "People think beef is high in cholesterol, when it has only 73 milligrams per three ounce cooked serving." By comparison, the same amount of roast chicken contains 76 milligrams of cholesterol; fried chicken 74 milligrams; pork, 77 milligrams; and shrimp, 130 milligrams.

year to complete the project. At the completion, we feel that Hansford Manor will be an outstanding asset to our community and to the residents of Hansford County.

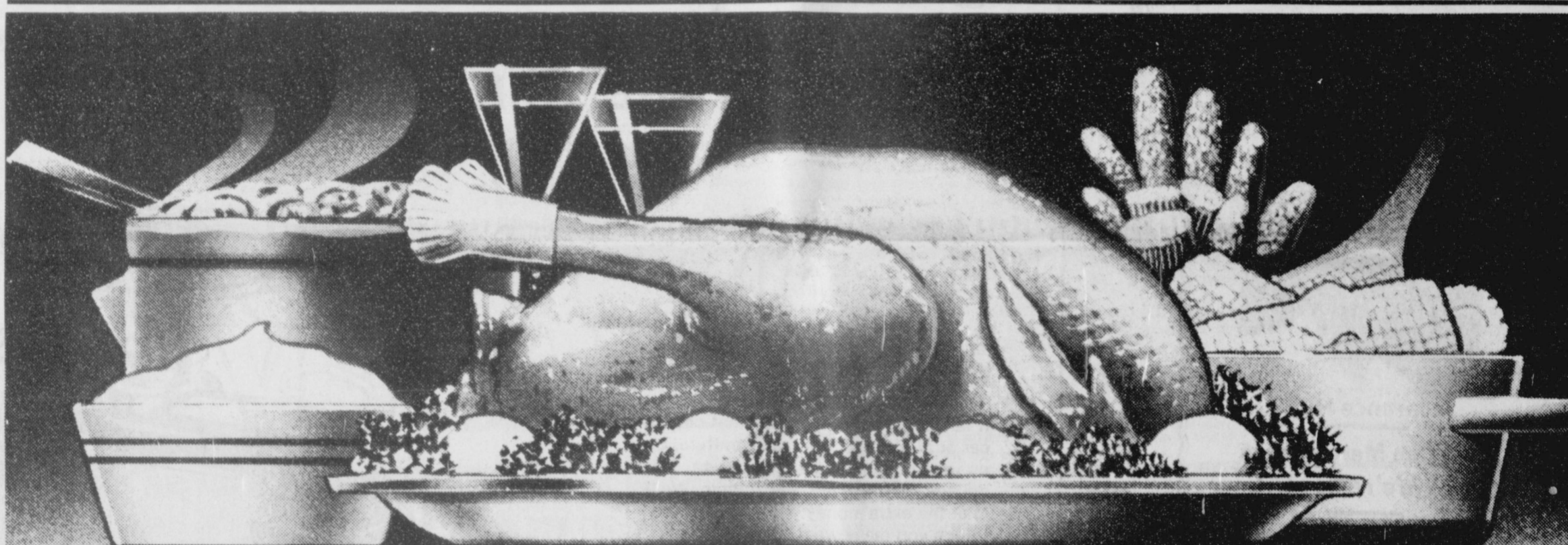

Turkey prices higher this year

You may have to spend a few cents more to put a Thanksgiving turkey on the table this year, but it shouldn't break your budget or your diet.

"Producers are raising more turkeys in 1985 than 1984," says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service poultry specialist Dr. David Mellor, "although increased supplies won't necessarily result in lower retail prices."

Last year's price for larger, unbasted store brand turkeys was about 80 cents per pound, while basted, national brand turkey sold for 90 cents to a dollar a pound.

Mellor says that prices could be as much as 10 cents per pound higher than last year.

But the specialist concedes that prices are hard to predict because many retailers offer specials on holiday birds to attract shoppers to their stores.

"To keep your costs down, select a plain turkey rather than a pre-basted bird," suggests Mellor.

National brand turkeys will also be more expensive than store brands, he says.

Extension nutritionist Marilyn Haggard also reminds consumers that turkey is a highly nutritious food and can be eaten on a low-calorie diet.

A three-ounce serving of turkey breast meat, without the skin contains 157 calories, while a similar serving of dark meat has 187 calories.

"For the dieter, it's most important to watch the dressing, gravy and trimmings that go along with the turkey, since they add the greatest share of the calories in a Thanksgiving meal," she says.

Unemployment Coverage of Farm and Ranch Labor

The 69th Texas Legislature amended the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act, increasing the number of farm or ranch workers who may be eligible for unemployment compensation by expanding the definition of an employer liable for State Unemployment Tax.

House Bill 32, Effective January 1, 1986, or the preceding year, if they employ four (4) or more workers for 20 weeks or pay cash wages of \$7500.00 or more in a calendar quarter. Beginning January 1, 1987, employers of farm or ranch workers, who during 1987, or

the preceding year, employ as many as three (3) or more employees for 20 weeks or pay cash wages of \$6250.00 or more in a calendar quarter are required to pay the tax.

2. Migrant workers (any individual required to be absent overnight from his or her permanent place of residence) regardless of the amount paid to that worker or

length of time employed.
3. Seasonal workers (any individual employed in farm or ranch labor of

a temporary nature and who is not required to be absent overnight from his or her permanent place of residence):

a. on a truck farm, orchard or vineyard; or b. who work at the same time, same location, and do the same work as migrants; regardless of the amount paid to that worker or the length of time employed.

Employers who meet any of the above conditions should contact their nearest Texas Employment Commission Tax Representative to establish an account. They may also write to the Texas Employ-

ment Commission Tax Department, TEC Bldg., Austin Texas 78778 for the forms to establish an account.

"No, I want to stay in here with you," Paul said. "I'm too busy now, Paul, please," his mother answered.

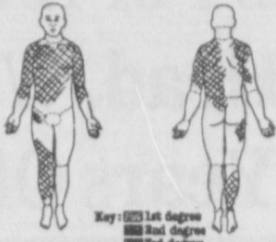
When the salad was ready, she put it on the counter and walked

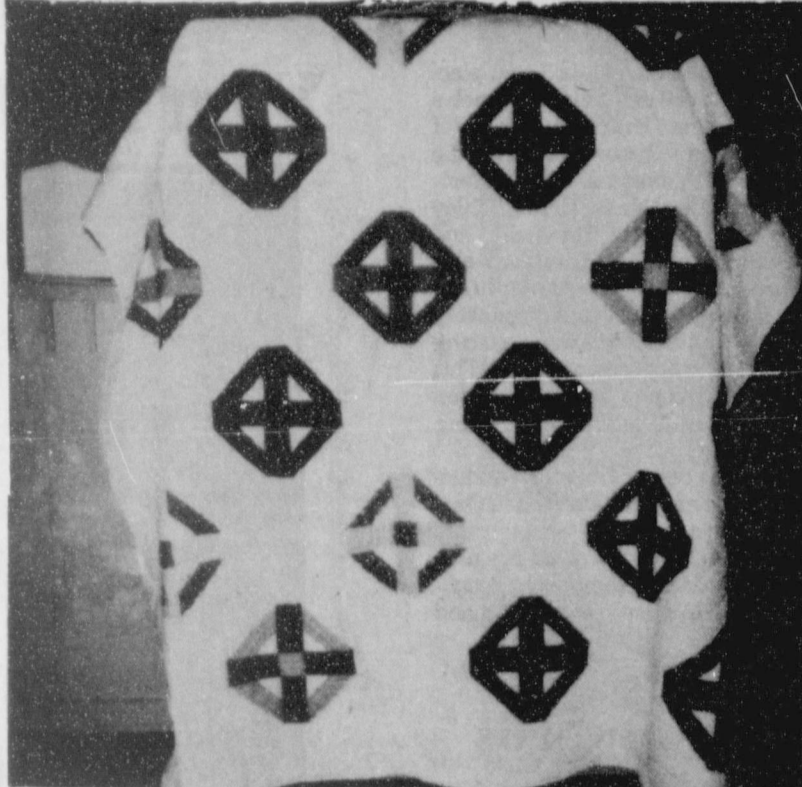

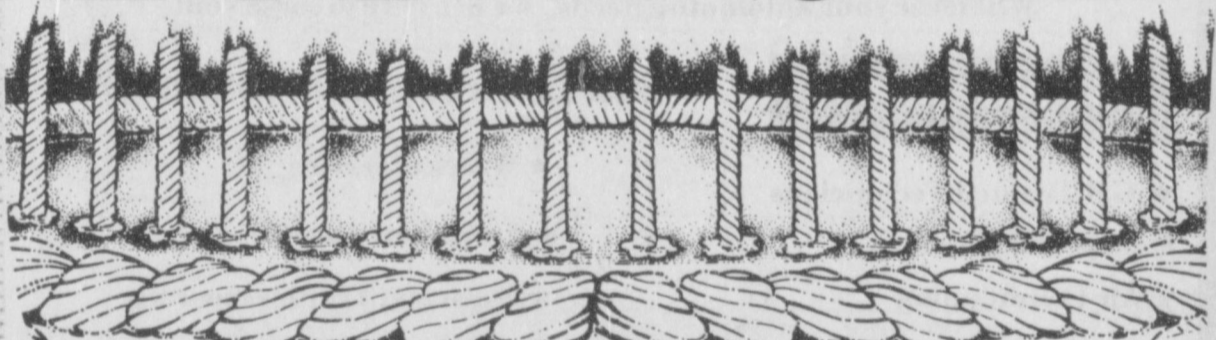

Recreation may be one area of future economic development for Artesia, according to city councilor Ron Head, serving in his second year of a four-year term from Ward 4.

"Our greatest challenge and No. 1 priority in the immediate future and even as a long-term goal is economic development," Head said. "Artesia is dependent upon the agriculture industries and oil and gas, and when those two decline, Artesia as a whole is in decline."

"We must look for other avenues for economic growth," he said. "It may be something related to those industries. We might diversify those industries to some extent. It may be something as simple as recreation. We have Brantley Dam under construction, plans to expand the golf course, the horse arena, plans for a softball complex. We're a very sports-minded town. That could be an avenue for economic development."

Born in 1954 in Dumas, Texas, he was raised on a small family farm in Spearman, Texas, where he attended high school. He received a BBA degree in accounting from Texas Tech University. After college, he moved to Roswell to work for a CPA firm, Fox and Company, and moved to Artesia in December 1978 while still employed for that firm.

In 1981, he went to work for Broom Transportation Co. and in 1984 moved to Marbob Energy Corp., where he is employed now.

A past member of the Artesia Recreation Commission, Head is chairman of the Water/Sewer committee and personnel committee. He is a member and past president of the Artesia Downtown Lions Club, chairman of the Artesia Good Samaritan Center advisory board, a member of the audit committee of the United Way and treasurer of the First United Methodist Church.

When he's not devoting his time to city or community affairs, Head will probably be seen in his softball uniform, as he describes himself as a "softball fanatic."

He and his wife Connie, a native of Perryton, Texas, have two daughters, Jennifer, 11, a student at Zia; and Kaci, 2.

Funding for governmental services is the second challenge for city government, he said.

"At some point, we must decide whether or not we want to do with less services or more taxes or some kind of increase in revenues of some kind," he said. "I think that's something that people should start becoming aware of, and it relates to economic development, too."

Head decided to run for city council through the encouragement of friends and because "I wanted to try to help the city of Artesia in any way possible. It has given my family and me a lot."

"Artesia is a diverse town. It's a town with pride and togetherness. I just try to do as much as I can," he said. "I'm proud to say that I try to serve because Artesia does so much. Everyone tries to help each other, such as raising the funds for the Good Samaritan apartment complex and the United Fund, 25 years of reaching their goal."

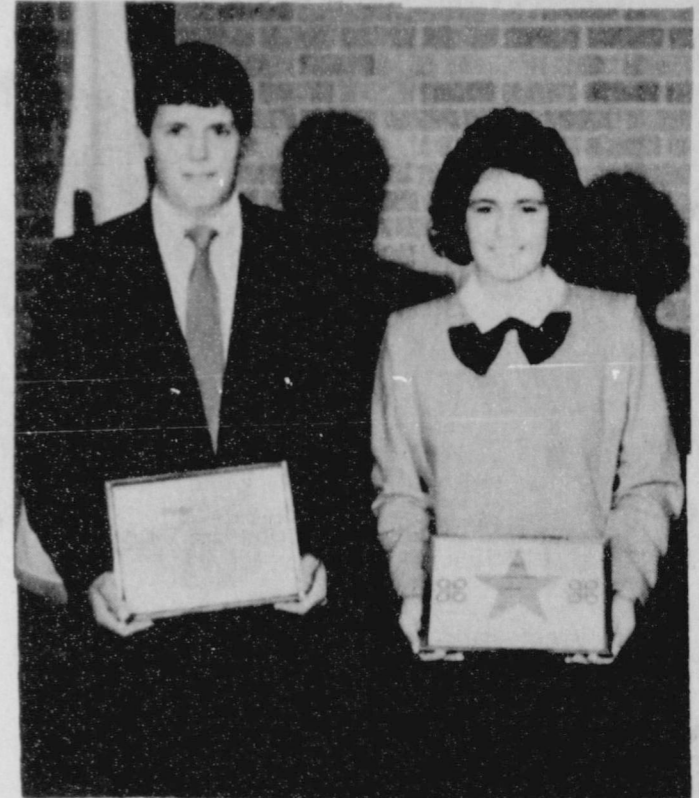

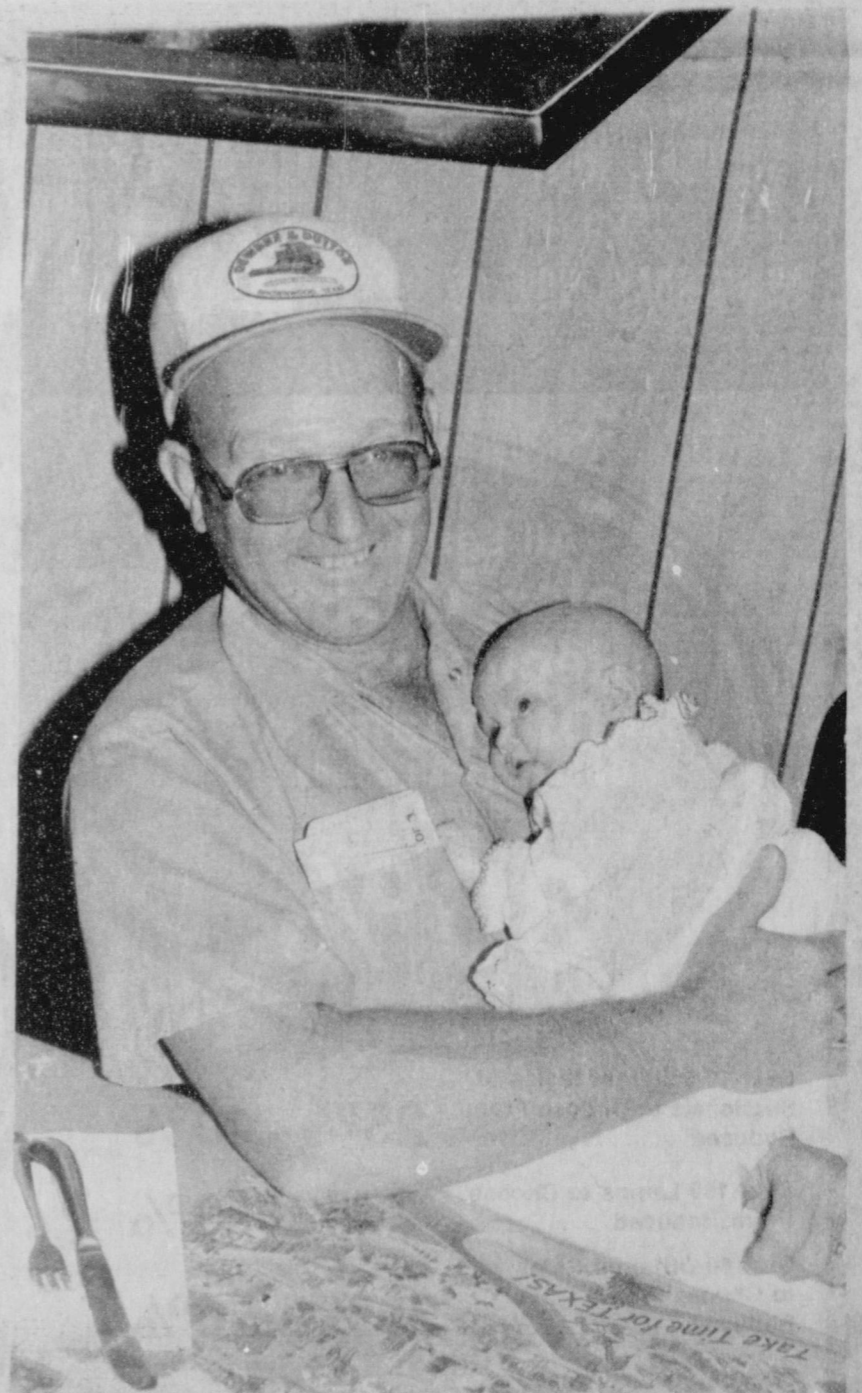
Trevor Williams of Gruver and Deana Turner of Spearman were honored at the District I Gold Star Banquet.

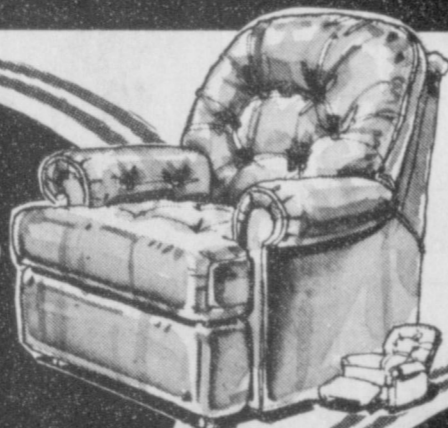

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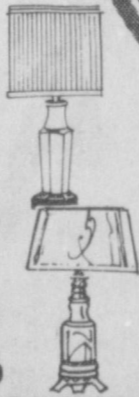
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
