Spearman Moose Lodge



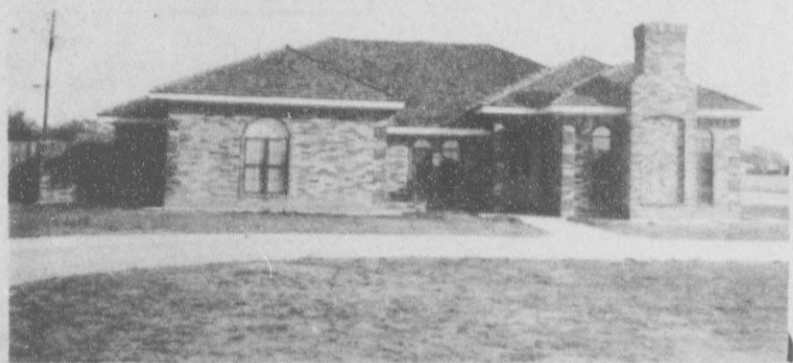

pheasant hunters breakfast

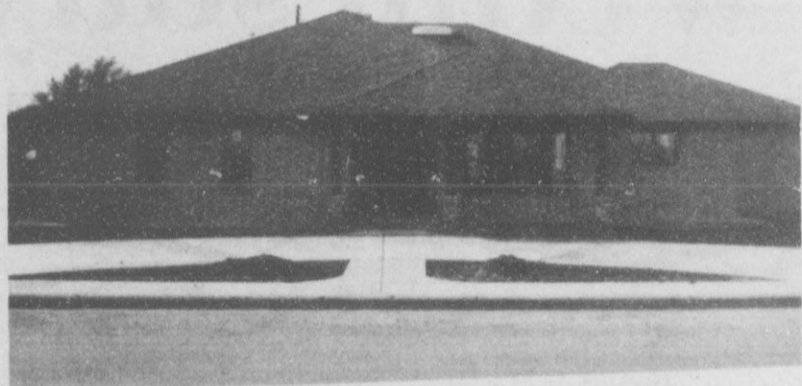

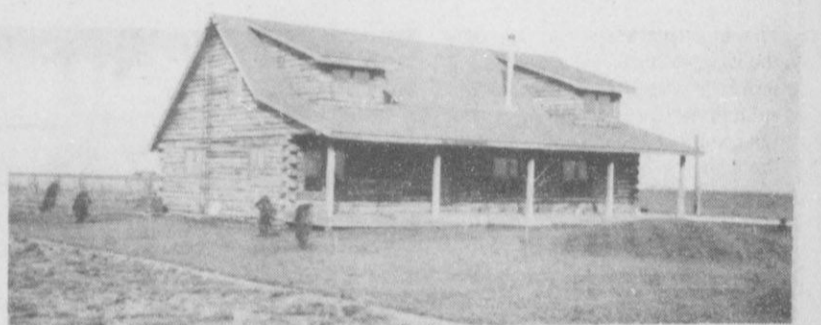

Cancer Center

A NEWS CONFERENCE FOR WESLEY WALLACE, M.D., WILL BE HELD AT THE DON AND SYBIL HARRINGTON CANCER CENTER THURSDAY, DECEMBER 4, AT 2:00. WHY YOU SHOULD BE THERE.....

Where radiation is concerned, there is a fine line between help and harm. In controlled situations, such as radiation therapy, regulated radioactive exposure can destroy cancer cells and relieve pain. It is the loss of control, exemplified by the Chernobyl crisis, which concerns us all.

The impacts of the nuclear mishap will be the key issue of a benefit presentation by Dr. Wesley Wallace, Thursday, December 4, at 7 p.m. Dr. Wallace and a panel of other physicians traveled to the Soviet Union following the Chernobyl incident, at the invitation of the Soviet Physicians Committee for the Prevention of Nuclear War.

The delegation leader, Dr. Armand Hammer, described the experience as very moving, when he spoke of the visit recently at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute. "I think U.S. involvement in the medical emergency played an important role in improving relations between our two countries," Hammer said.

Wallace, Hammer and the other physicians were able to observe and interact with the Chernobyl victims and the primary physicians providing their treatment. The American physicians also lectured on medical and peace issues at national medical institutes throughout the Soviet Union.

Wallace, a native of West Texas, is a board-certified specialist in emergency medicine. He has served as director of emergency medical services for the city of Austin, and since 1984 has directed emergency medicine at Round Rock Community Hospital in Round Rock, Texas. On state and national levels, Wallace is actively involved with Physicians for Social Responsibility. The educational organization boasts a membership of more than 30,000 American physicians.

Wallace' presentation begins at 7 p.m., Thursday, December 4, in the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center auditorium. Admission is

\$10 per person and is a tax-deductible contribution to benefit patients of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center. Participants may speak with Dr. Wallace following his presentation, at an 8 p.m. reception at the Harrington Cancer Center.

Health habits doctors prescribe most

If you are confused about which road to take to better health, here are several guideposts doctors recommend. A recent survey of more than 1,000 U.S. physicians by the University of Maryland School of Medicine, revealed tips for staying in top shape in this order:

1. Don't smoke cigarettes.
2. Wear protective equipment when working with harmful substances.
3. Eat a balanced diet.
4. Wear seat belts.
5. Be knowledgeable about any medication you're taking.
6. Avoid unnecessary X-rays.
7. Drink only moderate amounts of alcohol at most.
8. Avoid undue stress.
9. Pass up high-cholesterol foods, eat less salt.
10. Exercise aerobically for 30 minutes, three times a week.

How important is the annual physical? Not very, according to 94% of the physicians surveyed-and of far less value than a stop-smoking program.

Texas Water

Development Board

The Texas Water Development Board yesterday directed its staff to publish for public comment a proposed rule change that would require Board approval of an applicant's water conservation plan before the release of Board funds to build a water-related project, but not as part of the Board's initial commitment to provide financial assistance to build the project.

The state water plan legislation approved last year by Texas voters requires a local government applying for financial assistance from the Board to develop and implement a water conservation program.

Under provisions of the proposed rule change, an applicant would have the option of submitting its water conservation plan to the Board for approval when the application is first considered, or at a subsequent meeting of the Board after the Board has made the initial commitment but before funds are actually released.

The Board also directed that the rule amendment should allow the Board the opportunity to change the amount of its initial financial commitment to a project if the conservation plan shows that a smaller commitment is adequate.

The Board also directed its staff to include in the rules a requirement that a member of the Board's water conservation staff meet with a potential applicant in the pre-application process.

The changes in the water conservation requirements were suggested by the Board's staff in an attempt to help streamline the application process. The staff attempts to provide loan commitments to local governments as soon as possible to avoid delaying the construction of needed water supply and wastewater treatment projects.

At yesterday's meeting, Board Chairman Thomas Dunning stressed the Board's continued belief that water conservation will play a vital role in helping Texas meet its increasing demand for water.

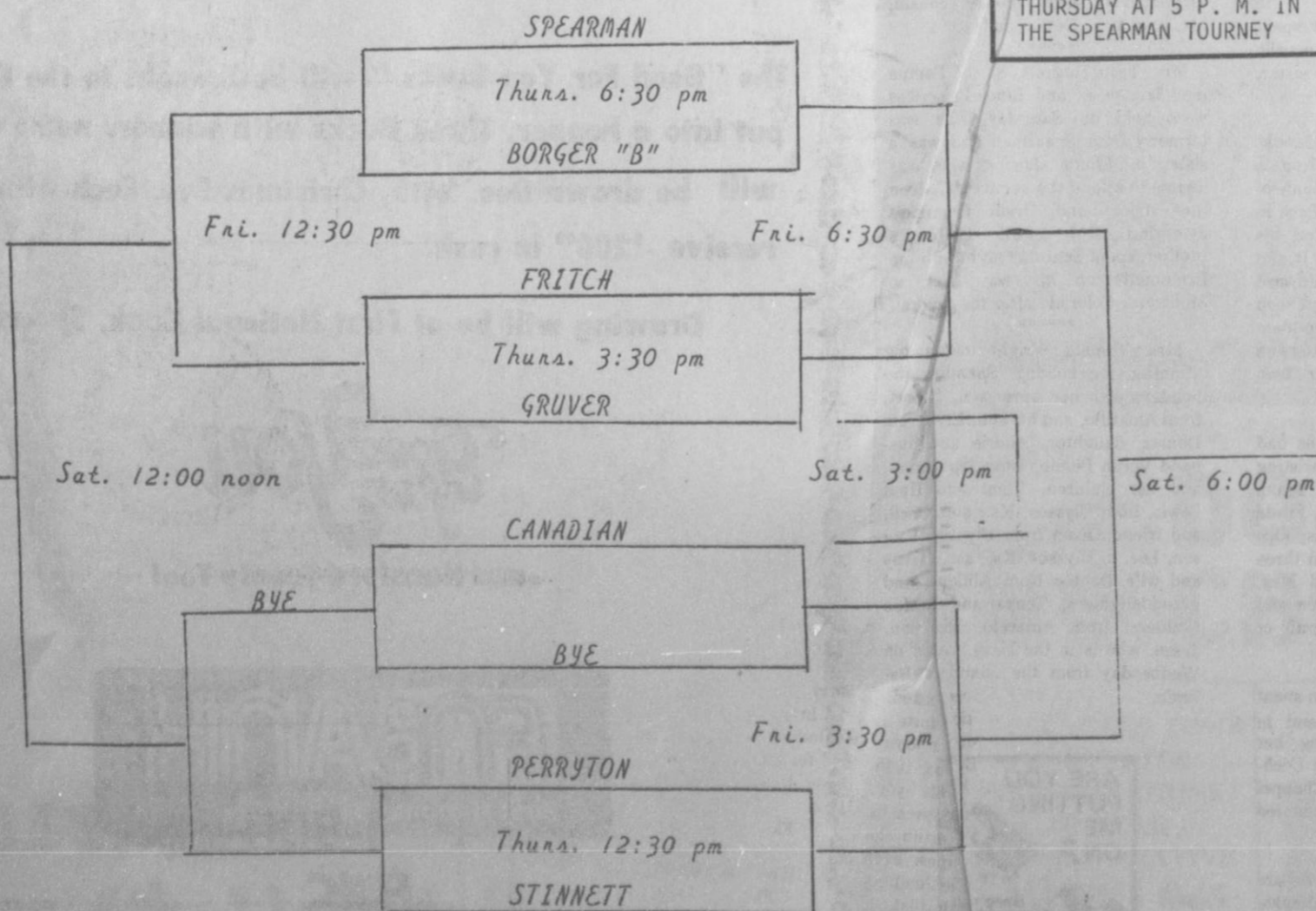

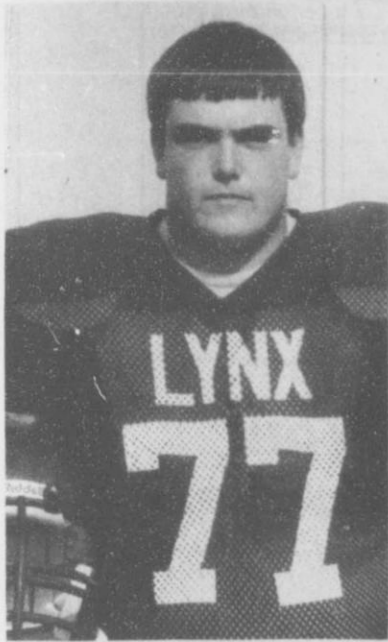

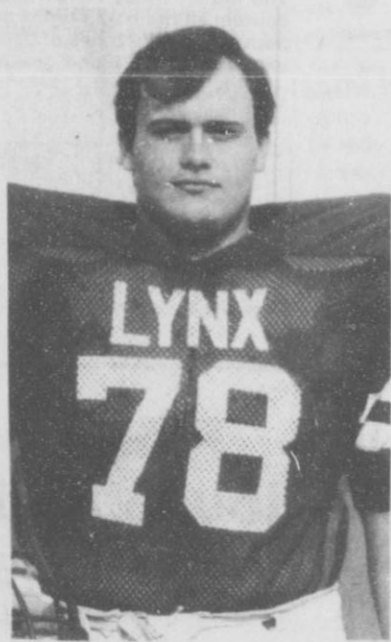

KEEP POUNDS OFF DURING THE HOLIDAYS

Some advance planning and a good deal of will power may help you keep off extra pounds and still enjoy the holidays. The key is moderation. Think about the temptation to overeat before and after eating. Decide when you can eat less. Knowing ahead of time what and how much you will eat can make it possible for you to enjoy sweets and desserts without guilt.

Try these ideas for staying in control of your holiday eating:

- Allow yourself to enjoy holiday

foods, but make it a rule to turn down second helpings.

- If you have the will-power, avoid rich desserts and eat fresh fruits.
- When you can't avoid rich desserts, ask for half a serving instead of whole one or eat only the filling of the pie and not the crust.
- At parties, carry on your conversation away from the snack table.
- Look for fresh fruits and vegetables rather than nuts and chips.
- Plan ahead to limit what you eat at

Make A Safety List And Check It Twice...

Decorating is a focal point of the holiday season. But the season also is characterized by a lot of fires, many of which are traced back to seasonal decorations. Most fires can be prevented by taking the following simple safety precautions:

- Keep light strings and other electrical decorations out of children's reach. Children are attracted to pretty lights and decorations.
- Use light strings that have been tested for safety. Look for the UL Mark.
- Check each light set for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections. Replace worn or broken light sets.
- Overloading circuits with too many decorative lights and/or light strings can cause fire. Check marking on product for maximum number of lampholders and/or light strings which can be connected together.
- Check marking on light string. Never use decorative light strings marked "For Indoor Use" outdoors.
- Unplug light string or decorative light before making repairs, replacing lamps or replacing integral fuse.
- Always turn off tree lights before leaving home or going to bed. A short circuit can cause a fire.
- To prevent overheating or damage, use only decorative lamp features packaged with each string or follow manufacturer's instructions.
- Make sure your tree is fresh when you buy it. If the needles are brown and break off easily, the tree is a greater fire risk.
- Keep your tree base holder filled with water at all times. Heated rooms dry out trees; a dry tree is a greater fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by UL.
- To avoid electric shock, do not use electrical decorations on trees with metallic needles, leaves or branches. Use color spotlights above or beside a metallic tree, never attached to it.
- Place your tree in a location away from fireplace, radiator and other heat sources. Be sure it is out of your home traffic pattern and does not block a doorway.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens or draperies.
- Use only manufacturer's specified fuses to replace burned-out fuses



on decorative light strings. Never use aluminum foil or different rated fuses to replace burned out fuses.

- Don't pull plugs from electrical outlets. Use the gripper provided on the plug.
- Don't cut or damage wire insulation when installing decorative light strings.
- Replace burned-out lamps on electrical decorations only with lamps specified on the package or instruction sheet to reduce the risk of overheating.
- Buy toys appropriate for a child's age and development. Most toys list the recommended age group on the package.
- Buy toys for infants and toddlers that are too large to fit in the mouth. Be sure eyes of dolls and bu-

tons on stuffed animals are securely fastened.

- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL Mark.
- Be careful with "fire salts" that produce colored flames on wood fires. They cause severe stomach disorders if swallowed. Keep them away from children.
- Throw away gift wrappings immediately. Don't burn them in the fireplace. They can ignite suddenly and cause a flash fire.
- Burning evergreens in a fireplace is also dangerous. The flames can flare out of control and send sparks flying about the room.
- Equip your home with a UL Listed ABC type fire extinguisher and smoke or heat detectors. They make good stocking stuffers.

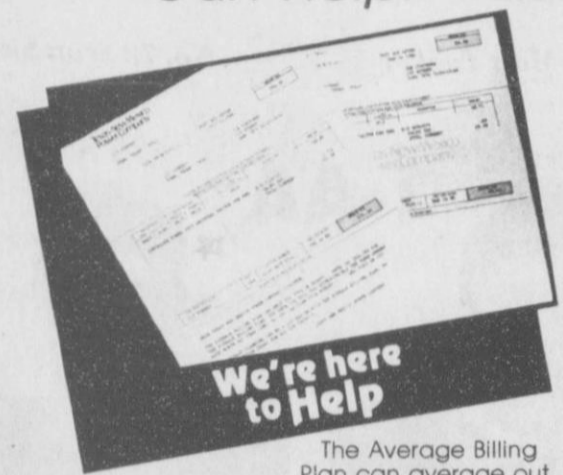

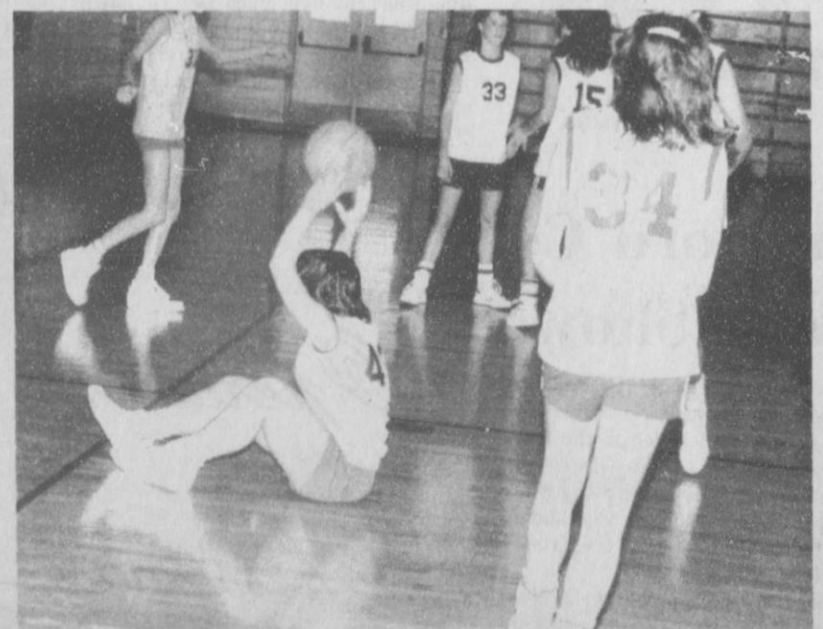
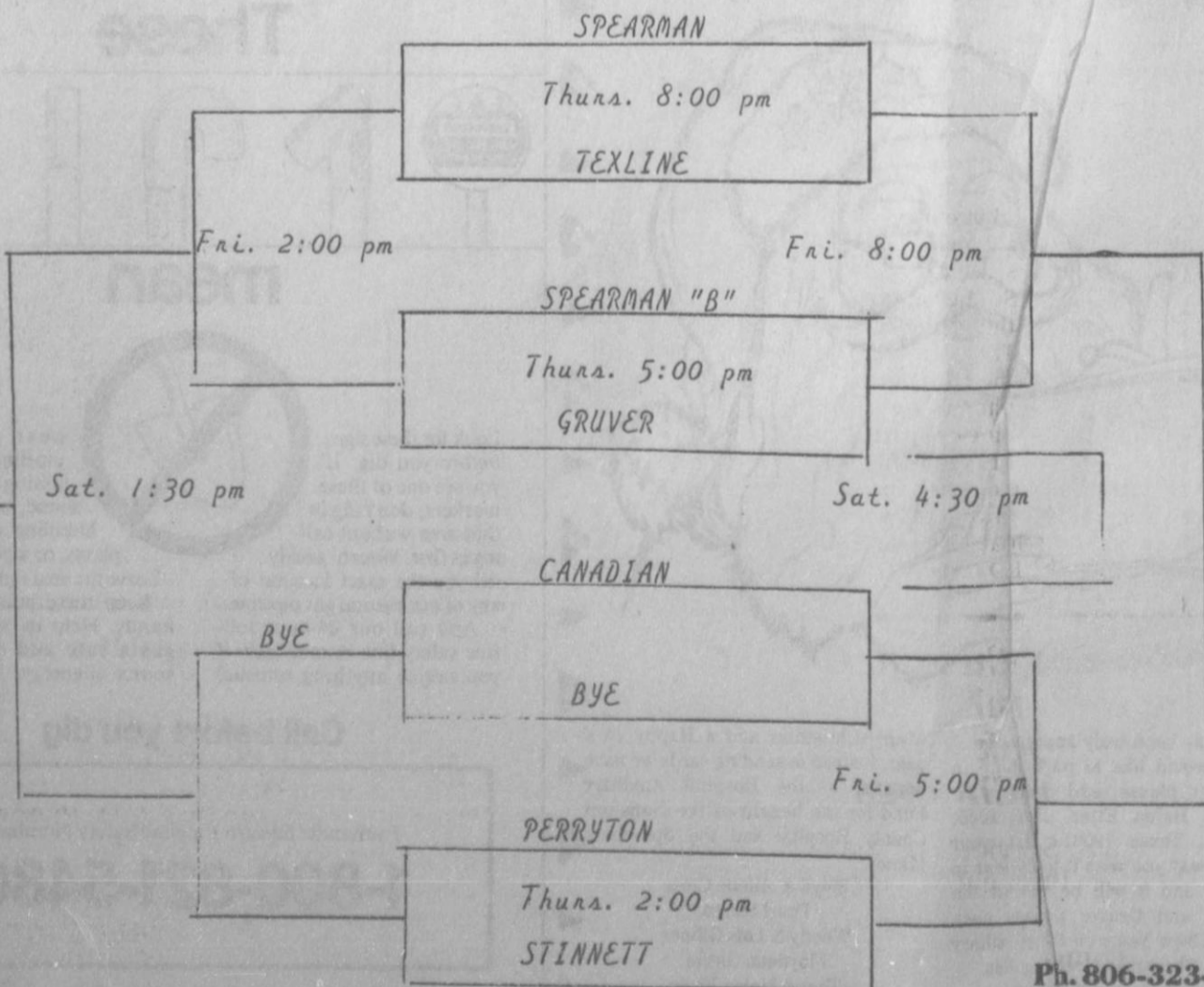

To God a note of Thanks

Friends may we all have ears to hear the words of Hosea, chapter 10; verse 12. Sow to yourselves in righteousness reap in mercy break up your fallow ground for it is time to seek the Lord till He come and rain righteousness upon you. In Micah 6:8; we read He hath shewed thee a man what is good and what doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with thy God. In Deut. 10:12; the reading almost the same and the last of that verse reads thus to love Him and to serve the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul. Rom.8: verses 1 through 10 tells us how this is done. The answer is Jesus being made sin for us to cleanse from carnality for to be carnally minded is death but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Now we go to Hosea chapter 6 verse 3; His going forth is prepared as the morning and He shall come unto us as the rain as the latter and former rain unto the earth. Now what does Joel say about this chapter 2, verse 23; He shall cause to come down for you the rain the former rain and the latter rain in the first month in reading Gods word we at times find in one chapter different thoughts of doings and sayings fulfilling the scripture. Isa. chapter 28; For precept must be upon precept line upon line, here a little and there a little.

Acts, the second chapter tells us of the former rain at the beginning of the Church age falling upon a consecrated group who had forsaken all to follow Jesus and my heart is made to rejoice when reading about it. At the beginning of the 19th century in Topeka Kansas the latter rain fell on a group of people who also had forsaken all to follow trusting God to supply every need, no collections of any kind. The following is found in the Book of the life of Chas. F. Parham, The founder of the original Apostolic Pentecostal movements.

In Oct. 1900, a school was held in a building they called Bethel, under the direction of Chas. F. Parham. In Dec. they had their examination on these subjects. Repentance, conversion, consecration, sanctification, healing and the soon coming of the Lord. In their study they had reached a problem. The second chapter of Acts experience. Brother Parham felt if God had equipped His ministers at that time for the power to preach the gospel at home or in a foreign field He would still do it for them. He was

going to another city for three days of service and asked all of the students to study that subject for the evidence it gave for the infilling of the Holy Ghost, and on his return the report from every one. "They spake with other tongues". This was at 10:00 am before the Watch Night service. That

night for this service besides the 40 students were 75 others at this service a lady asked Bro. Parham to lay his hands on her and pray that she receive the Holy Ghost as she hoped to go to a foreign field. This writing said he had not prayed more than three dozen sentences until a glory fell upon her and halo seemed to surround her head and face and she began speaking in the Chinese language and was unable to speak English for three days and in trying to tell her experience could only write it in Chinese. In Topeka Kans. they had copies of this published in the newspapers after this, the upper room in building they had to use as a dormitory was made ready for a 2 night and 3 day tarry room waiting on the Lord for the promise of the Holy Ghost. On the night of Jan. 3rd. in this room that was lighted by coal oil lamps was a sheen of white light above the brightness of the lamps. Among this group were twelve ministers who were of different denominations that were filled with the Holy Ghost and spake with tongues. No violent or physical demonstrations some were sitting some kneeling while others with hands upraised and some trembled under the power of the glory that filled the. An elderly lady testified of tongues of fire sitting above their heads. In Matt. 3rd chapter; we read where John said He (Jesus) shall baptise you with the Holy Ghost and with fire. (a burning zeal to tell the story). This we also read in Luke 3:16. This is only a very brief story of the latter rain as recorded in the book of the life of Chas F. Parham. Remember in Joel we are told the latter rain would fall in the first month. The latter day reformers was Martin Luther who brought back the light of salvation or justification by faith born in 1483 and died in 1548. John Wesley bringing back the light of sanctification born in 1703 and died 1790. A brief story I have in a note book during a three month Bible study or school here in Spearman in 1959 by Gail W. Shultz the first lesson Dec. 1st. These three men greatly persecuted by restoring these Bible truths so needed by all humanity.

Panhandle Area Agency

The Panhandle Area Agency on Aging has received \$910,237 in federal funds to support nutrition, transportation and other essential programs for the elderly in 1987.

These funds, which are part of \$33.7 million that Congress recently authorized for Texas through the Older Americans Act, were allocated by the Texas Department on Aging.

Charles T. Hubbard, who was named earlier this month as the Department on Aging's new Finance Director, said the Older Americans Act fared somewhat better than expected in Congress.

"Nationally, the increase over 1986 was \$68 million, which raised the total OAA allocation to slightly over \$1 billion," Hubbard said. "That's more than we had anticipated, given the current economic situation, and we're committed to seeing that Texas' share of these funds is used responsibly and effectively." Texas received about \$2 million of the total increase.

Hubbard noted the \$68 million increase restores an earlier cut of 4.3 percent under the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings law and adds \$16 million for Title III OAA programs like senior centers, home-delivered and group meals, transportation and supportive services.
