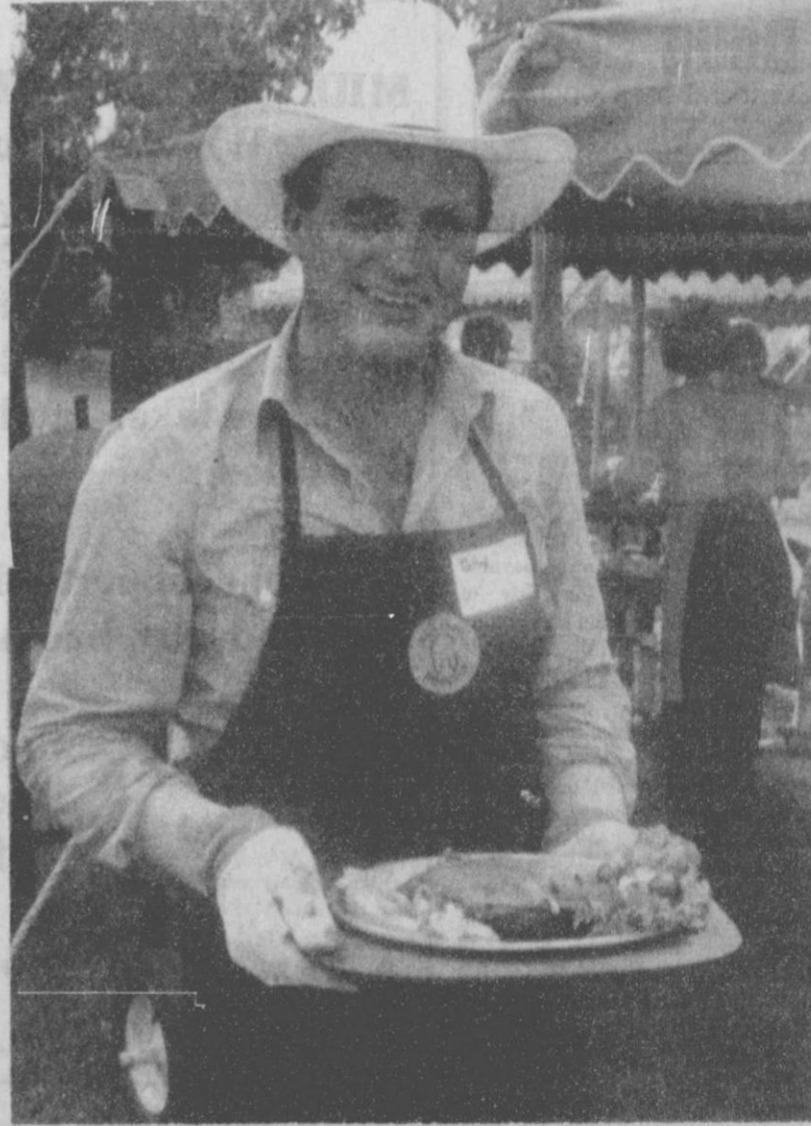
We are playing good football but its hard to win with our mistakes.

Venneman wins Beef Cook-off

Joe T. Venneman recently won first place in the beef division at the Texas Championship Cook-off held at the Texas State Fair in Dallas on Oct. 4th. He competed with his recipe of Mesquite Grilled Steaks with Green Chillies. With the help of Dean and Monte Cluck, the excellent cut of meat was obtained from National Beef Packers in Liberal who buys a large per cent of the Cluck cattle. The rib-eye slab was a USDA Prime Certified Angus Cut furnished by National Beef. National is known throughout the feeding industry for the quality of cattle that they buy. The following is the prize-winning recipe:
6 (1 1/2 inch thick) rib-eye steaks
1/2 tsp. salt-free herb & spice seasoning (Ms. Dash)
1 1/4 cup teriyaki sauce
2 Tbs. browning & seasoning (Kitchen Bouquet)

2 (4 oz.) cans whole green chillies, sliced in strips

If possible, use mesquite coals from wood fire; otherwise soak mesquite wood chips 1-2 hours. Place steak in shallow dish; sprinkle one side of each steak with herb & spice seasoning. Combine next 3 ingredients and pour over meat. Marinate 1 hour. Prepare charcoal fire in grill; let burn 15 to 20 minutes. Cover coals with soaked mesquite chips. Remove steaks from marinade and grill over medium-hot coals 6-8 minutes; turn, placing 3 strips of green chillies on each steak. Grill an additional 6-8 minutes or until desired degree of doneness.

ONE of the irritating things about the commercial networks is how they force sports fans to wait until nine p.m. to see a pro football game, or a program attracting school children. THE recent George Washington series should have begun at 7:30, not nine p.m. The network scheduling moguls know millions of school children must be asleep by 10 or 11--yet this series ran from 9 to 11 p.m. GENERAL MOTORS, the spon-

sor, might have thought of this also. ABC which does Monday Night Football, begins games at 9, and they last until midnight. The reason? So they can run the regular, daily prime-time hour until nine.

C-SPAN, which this year televised the Senate's business for the first time, is here to stay. Much of interest occurred in the upper legislative chamber this year, the highlight being the Senate Judiciary Committee's hearings on two Supreme Court nominees.

LAURENCE Tish, biggest CBS stockholder, now involved with William S. Paley in directing the network's operations, says that in the future CBS news will not have profit as its first motivation, but good news presentation. Many will wait and see--it's a fine principle and one the commercial networks once accepted, then abandoned.

THE World Series is late this year, beginning on the 14th; the series could encounter cold weather if played in Boston or New York.

March of Dimes launch National Campaign to prevent Substance Abuse during pregnancy

The March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation is launching a national campaign to prevent birth defects caused by substance abuse during pregnancy.

"The physical and mental damage done to babies in the womb by mothers who use illicit drugs is devastating," said Charles L. Massey, March of Dimes President. "No less tragic are the birth defects caused by alcohol, tobacco and even over-the-counter drugs taken by pregnant women with the knowledge of their physicians."

The prenatal care campaign's title, "Mommy...Don't," reflects the preventive actions--don't take unprescribed drugs, don't drink, don't smoke--that the March of Dimes wants all pregnant women to take for their own health and their babies' health.

The yearlong campaign will begin November 12th with a national day of awareness in Houston, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, Washington, D.C., and other major cities.

In its first phase, the campaign will focus on the use of drugs during pregnancy. Later phases will concentrate on the harmful effects of alcohol and tobacco used by pregnant women and the need for early and regular prenatal care.

"People are greatly concerned today with the damage drugs do to our communities in general," Massey said. "But what many people don't realize is how serious the consequences can be for the baby in the womb of a mother who uses drugs."

Massey continued, "Our messages are simple. If you're pregnant, don't take unprescribed drugs. In addition, get early and regular prenatal care. There are many causes of birth defects that are beyond an individual's control. Birth defects caused by substance abuse can, to a great degree, be controlled by a pregnant woman."

Broadcast and print public service announcements, video news releases,

and celebrity public service announcements will carry the campaign's message, in an effort to reach all prospective parents.

"As a voluntary health organization dedicated to preventing birth defects, we are making a special effort to reach the men and women who are, or will be, parents," Massey said. "Our aim is to make them fully aware of how they can prevent damage to their babies simply by avoiding tobacco, alcohol and medications not recommended for use during pregnancy."

The March of Dimes conducts programs of research, medical services and education to prevent birth defects, the nation's number one child health problem.

From 1 to 5 that afternoon, October

18, a City Park Concert, free to the public, will feature the music of Frankie McWhorter and Ridgeway. There will be food and game booths sponsored by local organizations. Lawn chairs or blankets to spread on the ground are recommended for those attending.

On Sunday, October 19, the annual Tour of Homes, featuring three of Canadian's homes will be held. The homes which are included in this year's tour are the Citadel, home of Dr. and Mrs. Malouf Abraham, Jr., at 520 Nelson; the home of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Waterfield at 406 North 6th (both of which are period homes); and the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Haygood, at 923 Hillside. 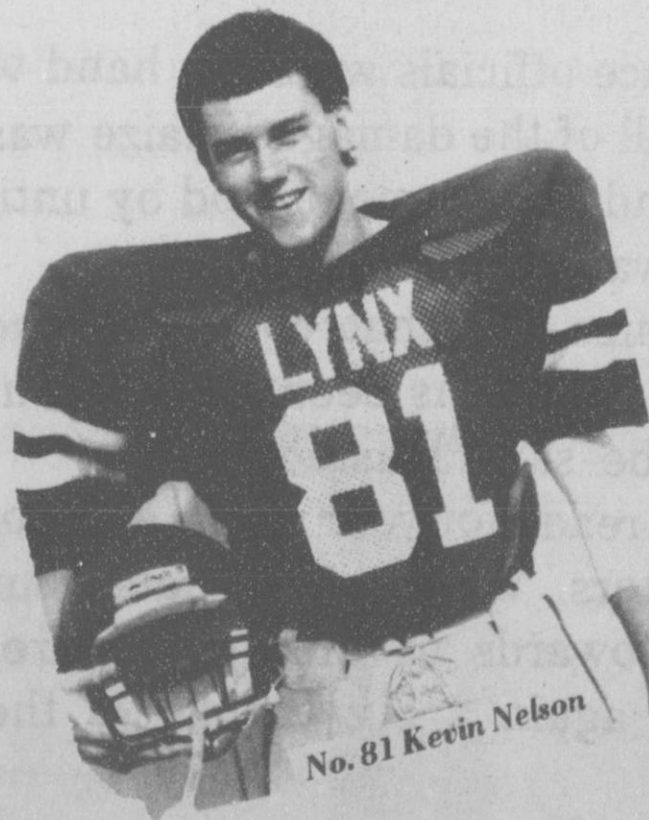

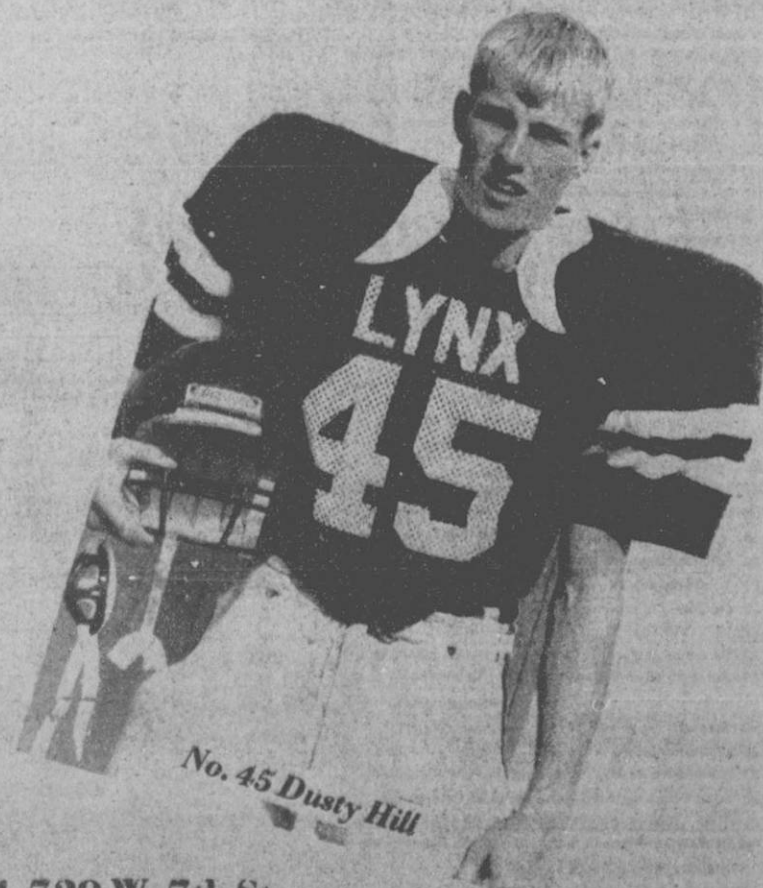

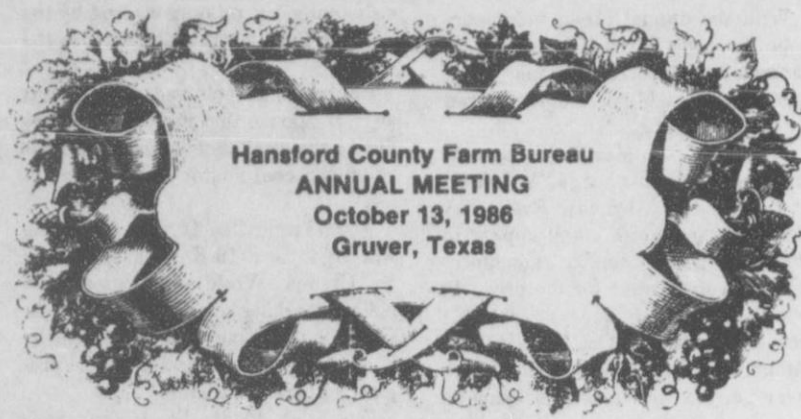

Texas Air Control Board

October 10, 1986 - The Texas Air Control Board has received applications for permits for four major construction projects with a total estimated capital cost of nearly \$1.4 billion.

Each of the applicants paid the maximum permit fee of \$50,000, which is required for projects with a capital cost of over \$50 million. The Texas Clean Air Act authorizes permit fees as part of the TACB's cost-recovery requirement.

The applications are for an electronics assembly plant at Corinth, Denton County; a waste-to-energy plant at Austin; and two electric power generating plants, one at Calvert, Robertson County, and one at Gruver, Hansford County.

Boeing Electronics Co. of Seattle plans to build a plant at Corinth primarily for the assembly of aircraft electronic circuits. It will occupy approximately 200,000 square feet of production and office space. In terms of emissions of air contaminants and pollution control equipment required, the plant will be similar to other electronics plants in the Dallas and Austin areas, according to Lawrence Pewitt, TACB permits division director.

The emissions primarily will be volatile organic compounds such as xylene, styrene, and paint and lacquer thinners. Boeing has indicated it probably will use carbon adsorption (cq) technology to capture these emissions in the form of particulates. This permits the recovery of the chemicals from the carbonaceous material to which they become attached, according to James Caraway, TACB permits engineer.

The City of Austin plans to build a waste-to-energy plant southeast of Austin. The two 450-ton-per-day solid waste-fired mass burning incinerators will produce steam for the generation of 21 megawatts of electricity. This would be the largest municipally owned and operated plant of this type in the state. The TACB at its August 22 meeting granted a permit to American Ref-Fuel of Texas for the construction of a 1500-ton-per-day solid waste resource recovery facility at Pasadena which will burn municipal waste from Houston.

The emissions from the Austin facility are proposed to be controlled by an acid gas scrubber and a baghouse, which is a large filter similar in operation to a vacuum cleaner. An acid gas scrubber sprays a slurry of an absorbant calcium hydroxide to neutralize such gases as hydrochloric acid, sulfuric acid, and hydrofluoric acid, commonly emitted in the combustion of solid waste. Particulate matter is removed in the baghouse.

The electric power-generating plants for which permits are being sought will use circulating fluidized bed boilers, a relatively new technology in the United States but in use in Europe for a number of years, according to James Crocker, TACB engineer.

The Texas-New Mexico Power Co., Dallas, plans to build a 600-megawatt power plant, the largest in the United States using a circulating fluidized bed boiler. It will be fueled with lignite. The combustion method is as follows: Sand or some other noncombustible material forms a "bed" in the boiler. This is placed in suspension by means of blown-in air and is heated, using natural gas. After it reaches the desired temperature, lignite is blown into the boiler and heated to the combustion state by the sand. The gas flame is then extinguished and the burning lignite maintains the sand's high temperature, which in turn ignites additional fuel as it is blown into the boiler.

Limestone may be mixed with the sand to trap sulfur dioxide, one of the most troublesome pollutants emitted by burning lignite. The limestone and sulfur dioxide form calcium sulfate, a solid, which falls to the bottom of the boiler. The is removed as necessary.

The Valley View Energy Corp., Dallas, has applied for a permit to construct a smaller (49 megawatt) electric power generating plant at Gruver which also will use a circulating fluidized bed boiler, but will be fueled with cow manure. The TACB granted the company a permit last year for a plant near Hereford, Deaf Smith County, which will burn cow manure as fuel.

The Texas-New Mexico plant, in addition to using limestone in the boiler, proposes to install a baghouse and other equipment to minimize emissions of sulfur dioxide, particulate matter, carbon monoxide, oxides of nitrogen, and volatile organic compounds. The Valley View plant proposes to install an acid gas scrubber to remove hydrogen chloride gas, and by adjusting the air-to-fuel ratio in the combustion unit design

will control emissions of carbon monoxide and oxides of nitrogen. Sulfur dioxide fumes, which are not as significant in the burning of cow manure as in coal-fired units, will be controlled by the reaction of the sulfur dioxide gas with the calcium in the fuel, as well as by the acid gas scrubber.

The TACB requires the installation of the best available air pollution controls at all facilities regulated by permits. Before permits are issued, TACB permit engineers determine the level of public exposure to emissions, and TACB scientists determine whether this level poses a risk to public health and welfare. If it is found that there is a risk, the TACB requires the installation of additional pollution control equipment.

The state's primary control of air pollution is through the issuance of TACB permits which set maximum emission levels and require the best available pollution controls. Violation of permit requirements is cause for enforcement action.

Any time a person plans to build or modify a facility which may emit contaminants, a permit application must be submitted. Some facilities, because of insignificant emissions, qualify for a standard exemption from the permit requirements, Pewitt said. Persons who have constructed or modified facilities which emit pollutants into the air without having applied for permits should contact the TACB to determine their status in terms of compliance with state regulations, Pewitt said.

The central office of the TACB is in Austin. Regional offices are located in Abilene, Lubbock, Waco, Harlingen, Corpus Christi, Odessa, Houston, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Beaumont, El Paso, and Tyler.

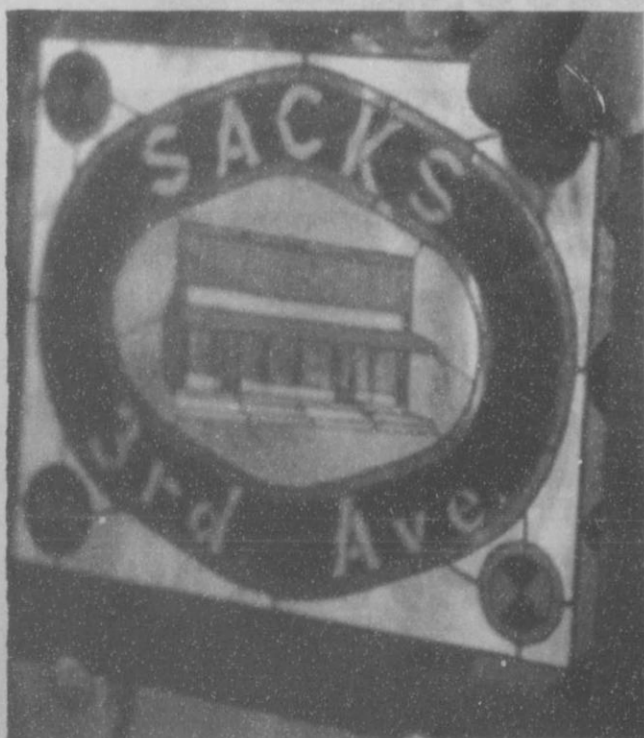
