Spearman Rotary Club Weighs in at 3120 lbs.

The Rotary Club in Spearman often visits local places of business as a feature of their noon meeting. This week, the club program, sponsored by Troy Morris made a special visit to the Speartex Grain Company in Spearman as their noon program. Needless to say, the program was an excellent one!

Edgar Wamble discussed the marketing of commodities with the club, and Pete Stafford the local Speartex grain elevator manager explained to the club how the trucks were weighed and how the grain was stored in Spearman.

The Spearman facility handles and

stores 8,000,000 bushels of wheat and is the 65th largest storage facility on the North American Continent.

The Spearman facility is so big, it has changed the entire skyline of the city, and is visible for miles as you approach the town from any direction. Each of the round bins at Speartex holds 440,000 bushels of grain!

As a highlight of the visit to Speartex all of the club "got on the scales" and were weighed. The scales stated that at 1:05 p.m. on August 4, 1986 the Spearman Rotary Club weighed in at 3120 lbs., gross, no shrink!

Panhandle Crisis Center Report

Remember the Thursday, Friday, and Saturday that Moore's Supermarket sold four ham sandwiches for \$11. The Panhandle Crisis Center, which received all the profits, will never forget them! Heartfelt thanks go to the community for supporting us, keeping us so busy making sandwiches that we could scarcely sit down for the first two days!

Wouldn't you know that the ham slicer would break down? The Big 4 and A.J.'s let us use their slicers, so Zita, on two occasions, and M.F. on another, cut up more hams than we had seen in a year. Talk about developing an arm! Plus plenty of work and fun and fellowship.

Our share of the take amounted to \$514. But more than this, we talked with a number of persons who expressed an interest in becoming a volunteer, from counseling with victims to answering the telephone, to doing office work. We certainly need these volunteers. All you have to do is to telephone the office (435-5008) to express your interest, make out an application, state the hours you want to work, and presto! You've got it made. Of course, those who undertake counseling will undergo training, so they will have a little less presto!

We are grateful to the motel that, at our beginnings, gave us a safe place for housing the victims. But doing time in one room, probably with children, becomes unbearable after a couple of days. Since the opening of the Shelter in March, the rate of recovery of victims shows much improvement. One reason is that a period of separation from the batterer that extends up to thirty days, catches his attention more fully, helping him to realize that there actually is a problem. Even "going home to mamma" doesn't have the same healing effect, for the moving-in of a daughter

and her children creates pressures that aggravate the problem. In addition, at the Shelter, the victim has easy access to the aid of a support group to help her to figure out the best solution to her problems.

It is impossible to overestimate the value of the support groups. Perhaps for the first time, the victim comes to realize her own capabilities and worth, and can learn how to cope. The Panhandle Crisis Center is more than a safe place for temporary respite. It is a place of genuine and lasting recovery.

Who would have thought, at our inception, that we'd develop a support system for the men who want to learn to quit battering, or who sense in themselves a tendency to batter, and want to nip it in the bud before it comes to full flower? But here it is, a reality.

So here's another thank-you to the community for its support of our program. Without you, we could not receive the funding we get, could not afford the facilities we offer, could not contribute so vitally to the diminishing of crime in our area. Remember, crime all too often evolves out of violent family situations. This is in addition to the misery endured in the family by the children, whether or not they are themselves battered, as well as the misery endured by the victim.

Again, thanks to you ALL.

Continuing his series of district-wide meetings, Congressman Beau Boulter (R-13) has invited the "Veterans of the 13th Congressional District" to two meetings. The first one will be Friday, August 8, 1986, at 2:00 p.m. at the VFW Post 2147, 3305 Sheppard Access Road, Wichita Falls, Texas. The second one will be Saturday, August 9, 1986, in Amarillo, Texas at the VFW Post 1475, 1491 West 8th Street at 3:00 p.m.

"To date, I have held 42 Town Meetings, and since they are such a tremendous help to me in keeping in touch with the people in North Texas and the Panhandle, I look forward to applying this formula in order to meet with the veterans of the 13th District," Boulter said. "The personal contact with so many of the people I represent is vital to my work on their behalf in Washington. This session of Congress is drawing to a close, and in the coming weeks, many issues will be decided that are of direct concern to veterans in the 13th Congressional District." Boulter added, "One of these topics is the budget priorities for the coming year, and without a doubt, veterans' care and benefits are sure to be included in this discussion."

Boulter is the only Freshman Republican member of the House Budget Committee and also serves on the House Government Operations Committee. In addition he is the founder and Chairman of the Congressional Grace Caucus, designed to eliminate waste, fraud, and inefficiency throughout the federal government.

Boulter has sent cards inviting all district veterans to attend the two meetings and encourages participation.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in said Authority as provided in a RESOLUTION CALLING AN ELECTION duly passed by the Board of Directors of said Authority, which Resolution is substantially as follows:

RESOLUTION CALLING AN ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
PALO DURO RIVER AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of said Authority deems it advisable to call the election hereinafter ordered; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined: that a case of emergency or urgent public necessity exists which requires the holding of the meeting at which this Resolution is adopted, such emergency or urgent public necessity being that public permanent improvements are required as soon as possible and without delay for necessary and urgently needed public improvements; and that said meeting was open to the public, and public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given, all as required by Vernon's Ann. Civ. St. Article 6252-17.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF PALO DURO RIVER AUTHORITY:

1. That an election shall be held between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 7:00 P.M. on August 26, 1986, in said Authority, in all that territory constituting Hansford County, in the regular voting precincts, at the polling places, and with the election officers as follows:

- (a) Hansford County Courthouse, N.W. Court, Spearman, Texas:

2. That the Presiding Judges shall appoint not less than two qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting said election; providing that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

3. That absentee voting shall be conducted by personal appearance and by mail at the County Clerk's Office, County Courthouse, Spearman, Texas, and during the period absentee voting is required or permitted by law, being August 6, 1986 through August 22, 1986, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and legal state holidays; and the absentee voting clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting by personal appearance. The absentee voting clerk for said election shall be Muriel Boyd.

4. That an absentee ballot board is hereby created to process absentee voting results, and Muriel Boyd is hereby appointed the presiding judge of said board. The presiding judge shall appoint at least two other members of the board.

5. That all resident, qualified electors of said Authority shall be entitled to vote at said election.

6. That a substantial copy of this Resolution shall serve as proper Notice of said election, and the President of the Board of Directors shall cause said Notice to be published one time a week for two consecutive weeks with the first publication to be at least 21 days prior to the election, with such notice not being published earlier than the 30th day or later than the 10th day prior to the date set for the election, in a newspaper published in each City contained in said Authority or, if none is published in said City, the Notice must be posted in three public places in such City.

7. That at said election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Directors of Palo Duro River Authority be authorized to issue bonds of said Authority, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$22,300,000, with the bonds of each such series, respectively, to mature within not more than 40 years, be sold at such prices, and bear interest at such rates, as shall be determined within the discretion of said Board of Directors, in accordance with law, for the purpose of providing a source of water supply for cities and other users for agricultural, municipal, domestic, industrial, oilfield flooding and mining purposes, through acquiring or constructing a dam and all works, plants and other facilities necessary or useful for the purpose of impounding, processing, and transporting water to cities and others, for municipal, agricultural, domestic, industrial, oilfield flooding and mining purposes, and shall the Board of Directors be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds when due?

8. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings and language as required by law, and with such PROPOSITION to be expressed substantially as follows:

'Belt-tightening' . . . Trim spending, says lawmaker

With Texas legislators heading for Austin this week for a special session, State Rep. J. W. "Buck" Buchanan of Dumas believes state agencies can do some "belt-tightening" to relieve the Texas money problem.

The 30-day session will begin Wednesday to find a solution to the cash problem.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock is estimating the state will be \$3.5 billion short of its budget expectations because of the sharp decline in oil prices and the resulting loss of tax dollars.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby of Houston is stumping the state to drum up support for increase in the state sales tax. The increase proposed would raise the tax from 5.125 cents to an even six cents per \$1.

"I feel the lieutenant governor is trying to bring pressure on the Texas House because that is where a tax bill has to originate," says the 88th District representative. "House Speaker Gib Lewis of Fort Worth is bitterly opposed to a tax bill at this time."

Buchanan supports the approach advocated by Lewis to reduce state spending.

"The speaker's approach is logical," Buchanan says. "In good years, the state had a surplus of funds and employment grew. Now, we need to call those agencies in and cut their spending before passing a new tax bill."

Buchanan does not rule out

new taxes, but believes any increases should come out of a regular session since legislators can look at the proposals "in depth."

The Dumas legislator suggests that other avenues may be open to reduce spending, noting that some requirements of House Bill 72 - the education bill - could be postponed a year or two.

He also notes that state agencies have surplus or unexpended funds which could be used now to help alleviate the money shortage.

"It is better business to take care of the immediate problems now," declares the

88th district representative. "The best approach will be to cut expenses before we borrow money or raise taxes."

Buchanan and other Texas legislators are not sure what approach they will be required to take in the special session. Even though Gov. Mark White has called the session, he has not spelled out its limits.

Special legislative sessions are called at the discretion of the governor under the Texas Constitution. He is empowered to outline the measures the House and Sen-

ate may consider.

"I got the notice of the special session call Wednesday," Buchanan notes. "But I have not received any information on what we will consider."

The Dumas legislator anticipates a session that may run less than the 30-day limit set by Texas law.

"I believe we need to do everything possible to solve the problem before passing a new tax bill," he declares. "We - the legislature - will be negligent if we don't."

Host Families Water Development Needed Board Approves Loans

Families in the Panhandle area are invited to host visiting foreign exchange students. The American Institute for Foreign Study (AIFS) Scholarship Foundation sponsors international cultural exchanges by bringing English-speaking young people of high school age to the United States from Western Europe, Latin America, and Asia.

"These teenagers want to learn more about the American way of life while improving their English language skills," said Paul A. Cook, Executive Director of the Foundation. Judy Fletcher of Amarillo is the Local Coordinator for the Foundation.

"Many families here could provide an ideal home for a visiting student," said Mrs. Fletcher. "We can match the student's interests to yours, and you can screen applications to choose the teenager you like best."

The greatest benefit of hosting a student is the exhilaration of cross-cultural contact. The "taken-for-granted" routine of everyday life becomes more interesting and takes on new meaning. An active participation of student and family can lead to unexpected personal growth for all involved and lifelong friendships.

To encourage future international experience Host Families are eligible to receive up to \$800 in scholarship funds for family members to use for overseas study. In addition, a federal tax deduction may be allowable by the IRS.

AUSTIN, Texas, July 25, 1986--The Texas Water Development Board has approved loans totaling \$34.2 million for three water-related projects in the state.

The largest loan, \$22.3 million, was provided to the Palo Duro River Authority for the construction of a dam and reservoir on Palo Duro Creek in Hansford County. The reservoir, with a capacity of 60,900 acre-feet (one acre foot is 325,851 gallons) of water, would ultimately supply water for the cities of Spearman, Gruver, Dumas, Sunray, Cactus, and Stinnett. This new supply of surface water will allow the cities to decrease their dependence on ground water from the Ogallala aquifer, and will extend the life of the aquifer for both municipal and agricultural uses. However, the Board's loan commitment depends on the results of an upcoming local election to decide if the reservoir should be built.

In another action, the Board approved an \$8.25 million loan to the Cameron County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1 for improvements to its water system. It serves the cities of Port Isabel, South Padre Island, Laguna Vista, and the unincorporated areas of Laguna Heights and Long Island.

The project involves the construction of a new river pump station with a 30-million gallon-per-day capacity, 23,00 feet of 42-inch transmission pipeline, and a 200-million gallon reservoir. Costs for this part of the project will be shared with the Cameron County Irrigation District No. 17. Another part of this project involves the construction of 54,000

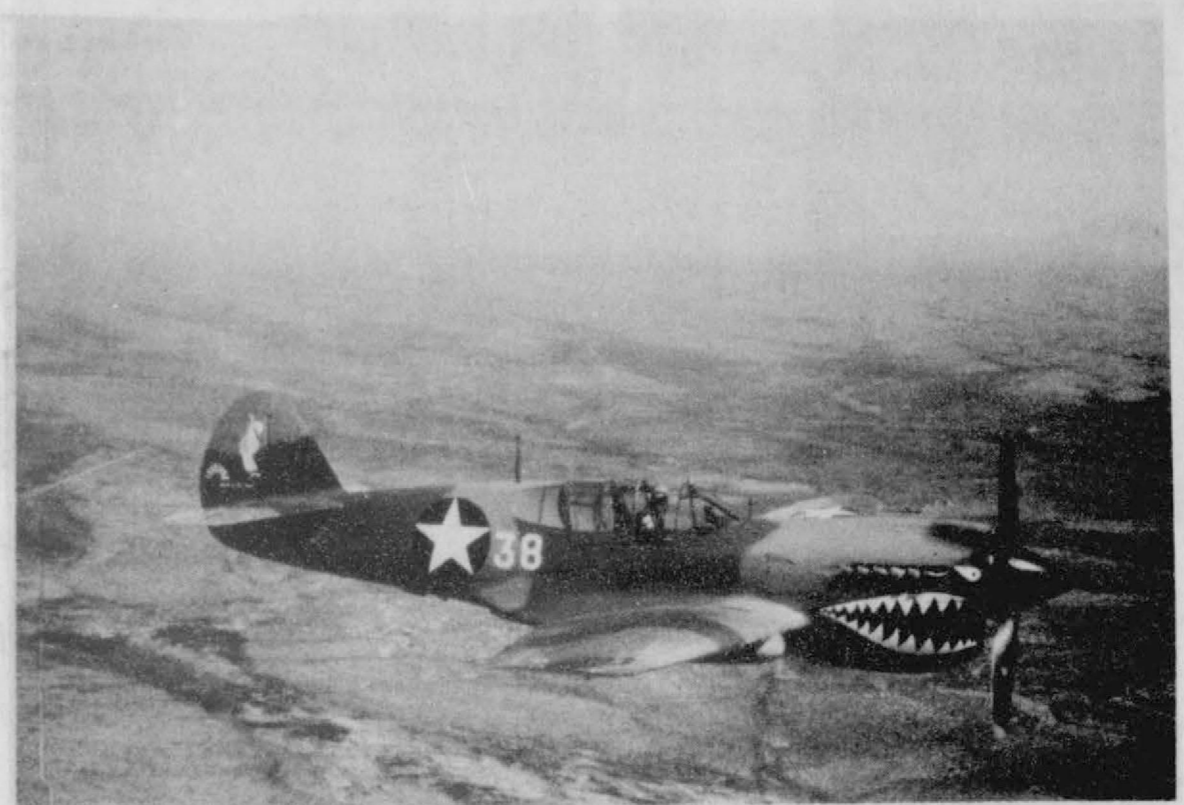
feet of 36-inch transmission line to carry up to 15 million gallons per day of water from a new reservoir pump to an existing raw water intake. The Cameron County District No. 1 will pay for this portion of the project.

The Board's staff has determined that the project will improve the efficiency of the water supply system for South Padre Island, and should improve the quality of drinking water for residents and tourists in one of the state's most important recreational areas.

In another action, the Board approved a \$3.67 million loan to the City of Leander to provide the matching funds required from the city to qualify for a federal grant to build new sewer facilities. The federal grant, available from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency through a program administered by the Board, provides funds for up to 55 percent of the cost of new sewage treatment facilities needed by cities.

All of the Board loans were provided through the state's Water Development Fund, which is financed through the sale of general obligation bonds issued by the Board. Last November, more than 70 percent of Texas voters approved a legislative Texas Water Plan that authorized the Board to issue an additional \$980 million in bonds, to implement a \$250 million program to guarantee bonds issued by local governments, and to expand programs to promote water conservation and more efficient use of water by cities and in agricultural activities. Implementation of all these programs is underway.

Air Show Will Be Held August 16th?

A major air show will be held at Pampa, Texas, Perry Lefors Airport, Saturday, August 16, 1986. The show is sponsored by the Pampa Army Air Field Reunion Association in celebration of the 44th anniversary of the Advanced Twin-Engine Pilot Training School opening in 1942.

There will be over forty WW II vintage and EAA aircraft flying in the show and many other WW II and EAA aircraft will be on display.

One of the rare planes featured will be the Curtis P-40 Warhawk. It was between December, 1941, and July, 1942, that the Flying Tigers, American volunteers in China, made the P-40 fighters famous. Large quantities of these planes were subsequently built during the aircraft's long career. A total of 13,733 planes in a dozen versions came off the assembly lines

between 1939 and 1944. They were used on all fronts in Europe, Africa, and the Pacific and on the Russian front.

The famous shark-jaw symbol painted on the fuselages of the P-40's flown by General Clair Chennault's Flying Tigers was based on that of the RAF's Desert Air Force Squadron 112's planes. The first 100 P-40s sent to China were part of an order for Great Britain. In little more than six months of operations, the Flying Tigers downed 286 Japanese planes. Only 23 Flying Tiger pilots were lost in this period.

The P-40 shown in the above photo was flown by Frank Tallman and used in several Hollywood movies. This plane was flown in the movie Tora, Tora and was used as a pattern to make wooden models for that movie.

There are only 25 P-40s in existence in the world today and only 7 of these are flying.

The P-40 that will participate in the Pampa show will be flown by Col. Skip Trammell. Skip is a member of the Confederate Air Force and lives in Dallas.

Gates will open at 9 a.m., parking will be free. Opening ceremonies will begin at noon with a flag raising ceremony accompanied by the Pampa High School Marching Band. Congressman Beau Boulter Guest Speaker.

Admission will be \$3.00 for 12 years and older, \$1.00 for ages 6 to 12 and under 6 free. There will be lots of food, drinks and PX booths.

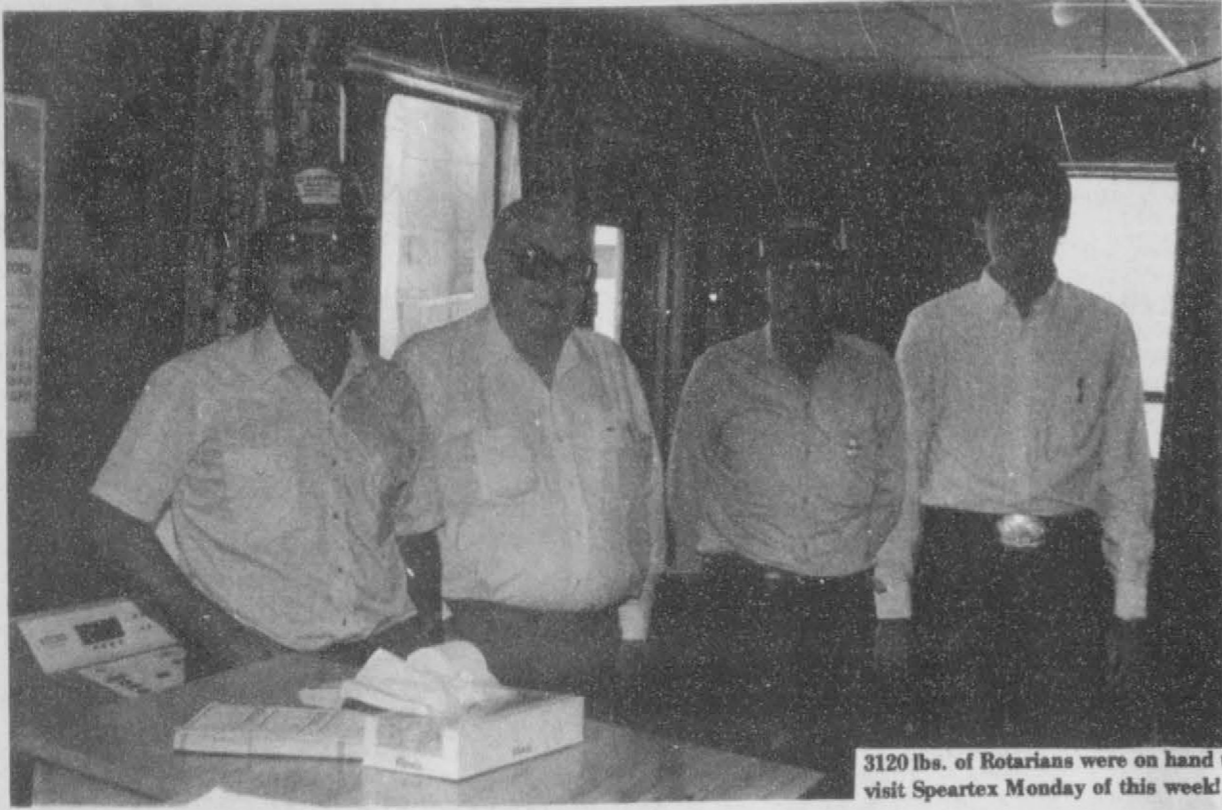

Reneau Sharpens Skills With Summer Job

Dealing with physical problems of the elderly instead of a teenager's athletic injuries has been a real challenge to John Reneau, Pampa High School's athletic trainer. Reneau, is also a former Spearman High School Football Star.

Reneau, who has both a bachelor's and a master's degree in sports medicine from Texas Tech, is working part-time in the physical therapy department at Coronado Community Hospital this summer.

"I want to learn more about use of certain equipment like ultrasound," Reneau said in explaining the part-time job. "I felt that I could expand my knowledge about different methods of treatment so I could do more to help the kids next year."

Reneau is working under the supervision of Steve Wilson PT, a licensed physical therapist who is in charge of the physical therapy department at the hospital.

The professions of the athletic trainer and physical therapist have a great deal in common, Wilson said. "The emphasis of John's training has been on the care, prevention, evaluation and treatment of school age athletic injuries, while my training concentrated on the assessment and treatment of patients in a hospital setting."

Reneau commented "the major

difference between this and what I do at the school is the age of the person I'm working with: Here at the hospital I work primarily with adults who have different types of problems."

The two men working together say that their goal is to try to develop an athletic screening program to enhance the athletic programs to enhance the athletic programs in Pampa and the surrounding areas. "By working with John, I'm trying to learn more about the needs of the athletes and coaches in the Panhandle," Wilson said.

Reneau said that in a typical day at the hospital he works with all kinds of

problems which require physical therapy treatment. "We help post-operative patients with exercise and movement," he said, "and of course we treat all kinds of musculo-skeletal problems such as injuries to the back, neck, shoulders, knees, or hips - anything related to the muscles or the bone."

Wilson, who moved to Pampa a few months ago from Portales, N.M., said that his department works with amputees and stroke victims, as well as patients with arthritis or neurological diseases such as muscular dystrophy or cerebral palsy.

Both men hope their work together this summer will prove beneficial to both the hospital program and the school program.

New law to raise age for drinking

Texas young persons, under 21 years of age, will not be able to buy beer and other alcoholic beverages, beginning Sept. 1.

The new Texas law raising the drinking age from 19 will become effective at 12:01 a.m. on the Monday holiday, which is Labor Day.

Passed during the regular session of the 69th Legislature in 1985, the law makes the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages illegal for anyone who has not reached his or her 21st birthday.

There is only one exception, according to W. S. McBeath, administrator for the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

The under-age person must be in the "immediate physical" presence of a parent or a spouse, who is 21 years old or older, to possess or consume an alcoholic drink.

The law changing the drinking age carries some stiff penalties for under-age consumers and for those who give or sell alcoholic beverages to a minor.

Possession is a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of \$25 to \$200 fine. If the under-age consumer has purchased the beverage by using a false identification or misrepresenting his or her age, he or she may face an additional misdemeanor charge.

Anyone who gives an alcoholic beverage to an under-age young person will face an even stiffer fine. Conviction of the misdemeanor offense carries a \$100 to \$500 fine.

The new Texas alcoholic

beverage law makes the sale to an under-age person a more serious offense. A first violation is punishable upon conviction of a \$100 to \$500 fine and-or a year in jail.

A second violation may result in the same 12-month jail term but the fine provision is raised to a \$500 minimum and a \$1,000 maximum.

McBeath notes that a misconception exists that drinking age violations may occur only in public places.

"It will be just as illegal for an under-age person to drink at a party barn, fraternity house or car parked on private property as it is in a public place," he warns.

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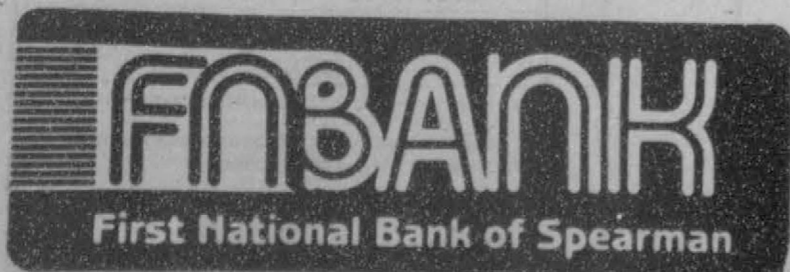
