As winner of the Miss Wheatheart of the Nation Scholarship Pageant, Miss McLain will represent the area in the Miss Texas Pageant at Fort Worth next July.

Jill is the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don McLain and will be in the 1987 graduating class of Spearman High School. She was sponsored in the competition by Spearman Chamber of Commerce and performed a tap dance during the talent segment of the pageant.

Meeting was called to order by Jack Oakes. Minutes of the Special meeting of July 17, 1986 was read.

A motion to enter into executive session by Dwight Hutchison seconded by Jerry Hunt and approved on a vote of 5-0 to enter.

A motion to come out of executive session was made by Leslie Barkley seconded by Jerry Hunt and approved by a vote of 5-0.

All present were notified that their was not any action taken while in executive session.

A motion was made by Jerry Hunt and seconded by Leslie Barkley to award the proposed contract to Reid & Gary Strickland for construction of their project.

Mr. Oakes noted that this was not a final award of the contract yet and in accordance with Section 5 of Article 2368 (a) (3) of the Texas Civil Statutes a final award cannot be made until any contractor furnishing a lower bid has had an opportunity to present evidence concerning their responsibility.

Mr. Oakes asked Mr. Robertson to present his projected figures for revenue and expense and how it reflected on the bids. Copy of projection attached.

Mr. Cox then addressed the group as to how they arrived at their decision and recommendation to the board of the general contractor. There was a great deal of discussion between Mr. Reynosa and Mr. Cox. Mr. Gumfory and Mr. Hutchison, attorney for the hospital, also discussed several points. At this point Mr. Oakes called for a vote on the motion on the floor, vote be taken with 5 for, 0 against and 1 absent.

After several more remarks by Mr. Gumfory, he and all the Reynosa group walked out of the meeting. Discussion was had among the Board with regard to whether or not Reynosa was aware that the next item on the agenda was their opportunity to appear. It was decided that they be afforded an additional opportunity to appear at the August 14 Board Meeting.

Mr. Hicks noted that construction days were as much a part of the bid as the amount of dollars, and that if any contractor was given an opportunity to adjust their number of days to complete their contract, that he would like an opportunity to adjust his dollar bid.

The signing of a contract with Strickland was discussed and a motion by Leslie Barkley and seconded by Dwight Hutchison to table this until our August 14 meeting. Motion approved by a vote of 6 to 0.

There being no further business a motion to adjourn was made by Leslie Barkley, seconded by John Trindle and approved on a vote of 6 to 0. Jack Oakes, President

You have a or will be receiving a "ballot" from your phone company to select a "primary carrier" so you will have "equal access." If these terms are confusing to you, don't be concerned. Most consumers are having to learn a new long-distance "lingo" just to understand the phone bill.

"Equal access" is the phrase describing the process by which long-distance companies are granted use of the same high quality, long-distance connection as AT&T, which used to be the only provider of this service. Competing companies are given equal access, but this doesn't mean they will deliver exactly the same services at the same rates as all other companies.

With equal access you don't lose any current AT&T services. The major benefit is convenience. With AT&T or any other long distance service you'll be able to make your call simply by dialing "1" plus an area code and the number. Before equal access, a consumer had to dial 13 to 22 digits to make a call using one of the other companies.

The "primary carrier" is the long-distance service you select. That's where the ballot comes in. Every consumer gets to select a primary carrier by marking a ballot, once equal access is introduced in the area.

Selecting a primary carrier tells the local phone company to make the appropriate adjustments in the switching equipment. When you dial a long-distance number you will automatically be put into the primary carrier's system.

After you have selected a primary carrier, you can still use other long-distance companies, but you will need to dial an additional code to access a specific carrier.

Selecting a primary carrier is not a binding decision either. The first selection is free, but you may be charged a service fee each time you switch. In addition, different carriers may require installation fees, deposits and other charges.

The best way to choose a primary carrier is to ask questions of all the companies offering service in your area. Then compare your findings and make a decision based on the services you need.

Ever Wonder What it's Like in a Fire?

Why all the fuss about fire prevention such as "Get Low and Go", Edith-Exit Drill In the Home, and Wake Up! Smoke Detectors Save Lives?

Come to 204 S. Snider, August 21, 1986 around 7:30 pm. and the Fire Department will allow first hand experiences as to why.

In a first time attempt, a public education program is underway allowing citizens to participate in a controlled setting, to better understand why it is imperative to plan for home fire safety. The program purpose is three fold: (1) create interest in recruitment, (2) educate the public as to what may happen in a home fire, and (3) to train fire personnel.

The exercise will allow any individual 15 years of age or older to be escorted by firefighters through a smoke filled house. All participants will be attired in protective clothing

and breathing apparatus. Precautions are being taken to alleviate dangerous conditions so that a controlled environment is assured. Spectators who do not wish to enter the structure, will witness the manner of smoke travel and how your home can become a "toxic gas chamber" in only a matter of moments.

Information as to proper precautions for home fire safety will be given and explained before and during the exercise.

All participants will be required to sign a waiver of liability and those under 18 years of age must have a parent or guardian present during the exercise.

There is no charge or obligation to either participate or watch the exercise. The fire department is encouraging all citizens to come out and witness this unusual exercise.

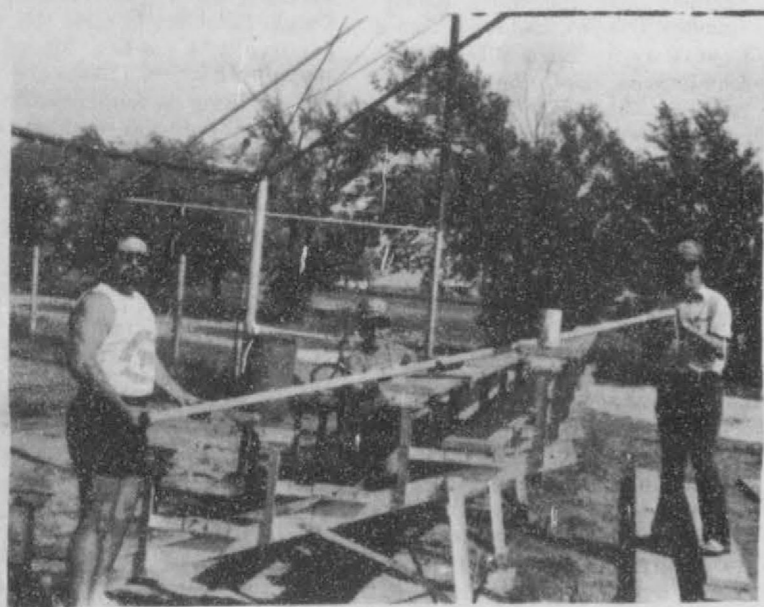


Limeade Parfait

Spearman Lynx Football

New Spearman head football coach Don Mullins turned programs at Rotan and Hale Center into state powerhouses during the early 1980's, and the Lynx will be Mullins' next reconstruction job.

The Lynx team won only two games during the 1985 season, due largely to a young, inexperienced squad. Now more experienced, and with Mullins' coaching wisdom as an added bonus, improvement is all but assured in this year's team.

Mullins inherits nine returning lettermen, including six starters on each side of the football.

Offensively, he has the nucleus of a potentially strong line and three top-notch skill players.

Junior Brett Davis (6'-0", 170) is the incumbent quarterback and is well suited for Mullins' veer attack. Davis' passing ability will benefit from the return of junior wingback Carl Urban (5'-6", 145) and junior tight end Kevin Nelson (6'-3", 175).

Senior Dusty Hill (6'-0", 145) returns as running back.

The line will be anchored by senior tackle Allen Gardiner (6'-1", 185) and senior guards Jesse Lozano (5'-8", 185) and David Cazarez (5'-8", 150)

-all returning starters. Other line prospects include junior Scott Swan (5'-10", 220) and senior Mike Parks (6'-0", 175) as tackles, junior Norman Seroggs (5'-10", 155) and Sophomore Mark Garcia (5'-8", 150) as guards and junior Monty Ross (6'-0", 185) as center.

Swan was an all-district honorable mention defensive choice a year ago at noseguard. He will be joined by Cazarez and Lozano at linebackers, Davis as safety, Urban as halfback and Hill at cornerback.

Senior Mike Pearson (5'-10", 165) is a quality player who will play either as running back or in the secondary - or both.

The remainder of the Spearman squad is made up of sophomores and juniors who will have to come through

if the Lynx are going to get back on the winning track this fall.

Juniors Allen Beeson and Chris Lopez will contend for playing time as wingback and conerback. Sophomores Lance Swan and Matt Tucker and both promising young athletes.

Other Lynx looking for playing time include junior tight end Jeff Gustin, junior tackle Lester Sullivan, and sophomore running backs Keith Slatten and Stan Brandt.

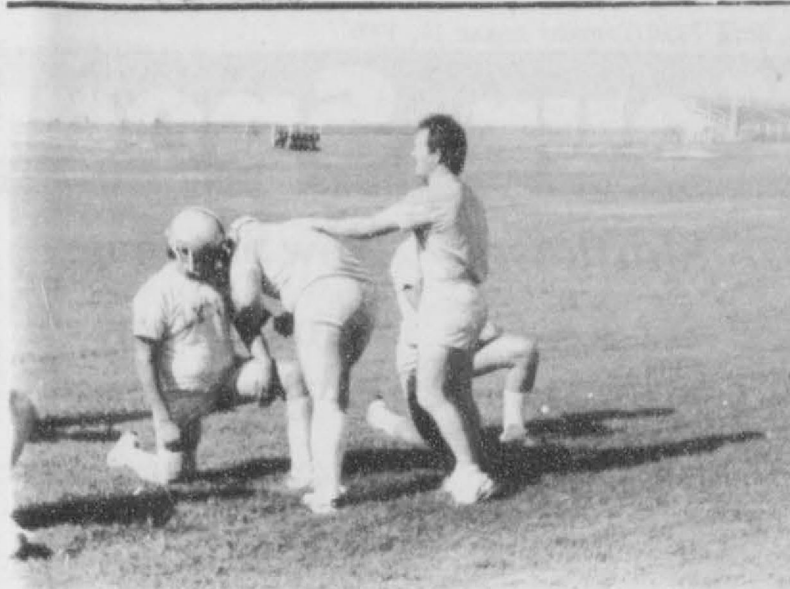

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Safety is something every individual must practice daily to avoid serious injury or death. Our vehicles have safety belts, our electrical systems have breakers or fuses, traffic is regulated by rules for safety and our homes should be equipped with proper security and early fire warning devices. Most of the devices which provide safety for our everyday protection has undergone extensive testing and labeling. The labeling is required to insure that products purchased may be considered as engineered sound by the consumer. This appears to provide all the assurance necessary for a safety device to provide protection, but this is not the case. Please consider the remainder of this article to see how you, the consumer, can possibly avoid costly misconceptions in regard to fire safety devices.

Recently, and in previous years, residents of Hansford County, particularly Spearman, have been approached by solicitors selling various fire protection items. In most cases the fire department appreciates efforts to increase the public's awareness and consciousness of fire. However, some of these solicitors allow their eagerness of profit to overcome their sense of civic duty and misrepresent information. It is this misrepresentation or purposeful deletion of information which creates serious fire safety concern to your fire departments.

Specifically speaking, the devices of heaviest concern is the "heat detector" devices. The devices are engineered sound and properly labeled and will function as they are designed to. The problem arises when the solicitors advise the consumers that "heat detectors" can solely protect your family in the event of fire. Heat detectors do have a place in your home, but will not provide complete protection alone. To reinforce this statement remember in practically all fatal residential fire people have died as a result of smoke inhalation and

rarely as a result of direct flame contact. In addition, most accidental residential fires will smolder, creating smoke in larger proportions compared to heat. This information has been documented consistently over years of research. As a result of this research "smoke detectors" provide a greater degree of early warning to residents.

The fire department may seem to be discouraging the total use of "heat detectors" but this is not the case. Rather we would prefer a combination of "heat detectors" and "smoke detectors" in a home, as this would provide the maximum in early warning. "Heat detectors" do have their place and should be installed in areas where rapid flame buildup can occur. Generally these areas include kitchens, garages, attics or heater closets. On the other hand, smoke detectors should be used in living areas or sleeping areas.

For the sake of clarification, let's see what the theory of operation of these devices are.

The smoke detector samples air in your home continuously and sounds when minute particles of toxic gases or carbon are present. This is why detectors may sound an alarm while cooking. It has not actually sounded as "false" alarm but has done exactly as it was designed to function. There are times when aerosol cans have been used near these detectors and again they sounded. This too, is as it should be because the detector has found the air to be improper for life support. If you have a smoke detector in your kitchen and it has become a nuisance, then here is a likely spot for a heat detector. Finally, smoke detectors are priced from approximately \$8.00 upward and you can provide adequate protection for well under \$100.00 in most homes.

Heat detectors sense an increase of heat above certain levels. Generally speaking, this level is regulated by a disc which deteriorates structurally allowing a pre-wound spring to release

operate a bell manually. These devices must be located in the room or area of fire in order to operate. They too may sound false alarms, especially if the thermal disc is of too low of value for the area or room installed. Heat detectors range in price from \$50.00 and upward for each.

The Spearman Fire department has attended fires where both type of devices have been installed. Where smoke detectors have been installed and properly maintained, we have never seen a smoke detector not function. In contrast, we have been to homes where heat detectors have been installed and properly maintained and this detector did not operate.

In conclusion, remember every safety device must be considered at length before purchase. Keep in mind that proper installation and maintenance as well as planning for emergency is vital. Remember, smoke detectors are capable of sensing fires remotely due to the rapid advance of smoke, where heat detectors are designed primarily for concentrated areas of rapid flame involvement. Heat does not travel as fast as smoke or as far. If you have questions regarding safety, fire or otherwise, call City Hall or the Police Department and the proper authorities will gladly find the answers. It may save you money or most importantly save you needless suffering. The fire department is not in business to make a profit, only to make a safer fire environment through the protection of your life and property. We live in this community as your neighbors and will be here when you need us. Can the solicitor make that claim?
