Changes give PDRA hope

The PDRA dam project may be able to be saved if cost overruns can be lowered to come closer to the original budget.

The PDRA had an emergency meeting May 20 to discuss just how to lower the cost overruns. They met with Freeze and Nichols, Fort Worth engineers, to seek advice on the matter.

The meeting was called after Dumas City commissioners last week rescinded a non-binding resolution of support for the project.

At that PDRA meeting, May 20, alternatives for reducing the cost of constructing the dam were discussed with Freeze and Nichols Inc., a

Ft. Worth engineering firm. Changes in the design of the project, which would not jeopardize the integrity or safety of the dam, were outlined.

The result of the changes is paring down the possible cost overrun of \$3.2 million to within approximately \$200,000 of the original \$15 million budget.

The construction changes proposed are the postponement of the construction of a raw water intake structure, rezoning the dam embankment to minimize the use of filtering material, eliminating a tower structure for the service outlet system, and lowering the top of the

dam by five feet.

According to Johnnie Lee, PDRA general manager, because of the proposed changes, the project will have to be rebid for the construction contract and the approval process will have to start all over by the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Water Board. "With these changes the actual construction will probably be delayed until October."

Because of the delay, the PDRA will have to ask for an extension from the state. The state permit on the dam project expires June 9. It was a consensus of opinion Friday that the permit extension

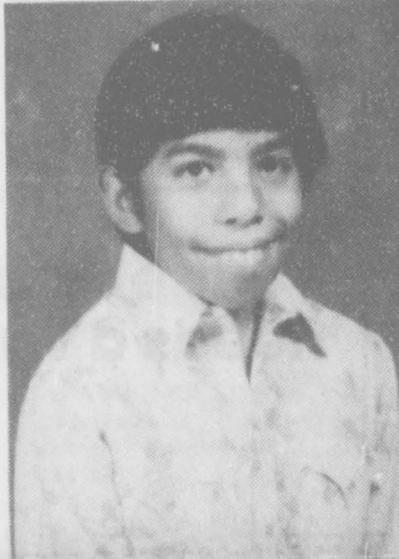
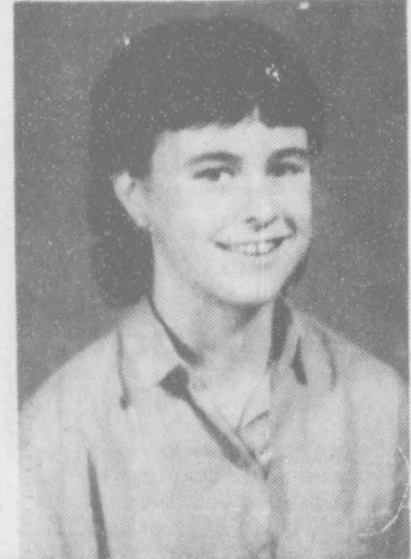
created no real problem and would be granted.

The project started early in 1987 and the reservoir was to eventually hold 60,900 acre feet of water for recreation. Eventually the water would be utilized for tap water for the surrounding towns showing support for the project.

This project has been talked about for many years. On August 5, 1935 an article in the "Spearman Reporter" reported the local Lions Club meeting with County Commissioners to discuss a similar project. Although that project never developed it did help establish the Palo Duro River Authority.

The Spearman Public Swimming Pool will open June 4. The pool is located at the Hansford County Activity Center at 501 S. Hazelwood.

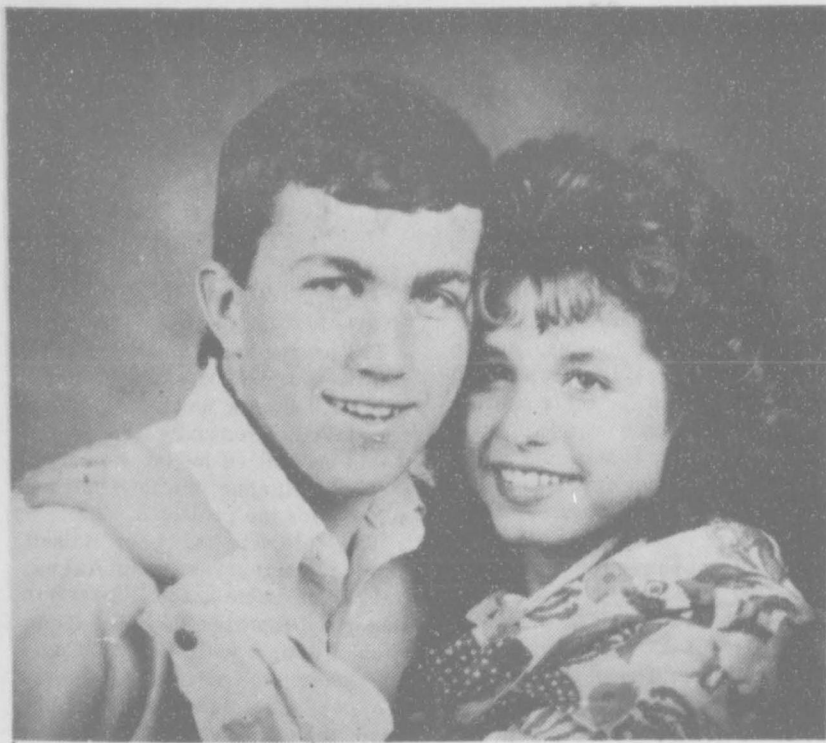
Pool hours are: Monday through Saturday 1-5 p.m., ladies only from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through
