We'll find that the Bible was true after all!

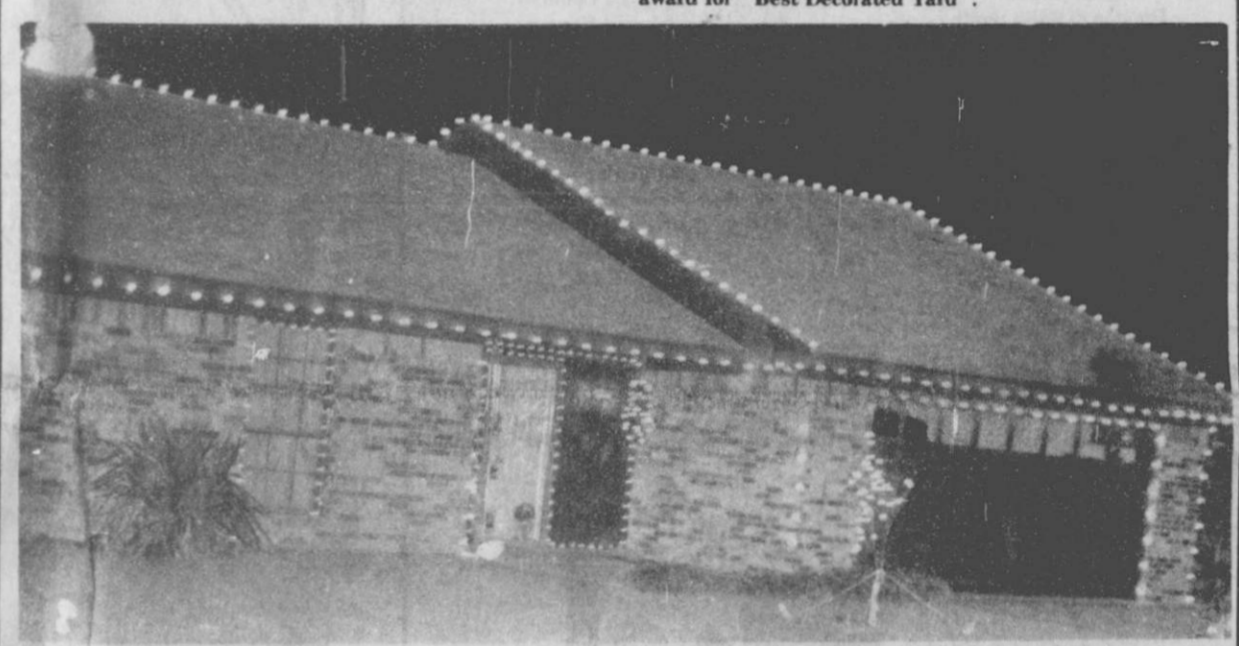

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS MET IN REGULAR SESSION IN COUNCIL CHAMBERS OF CITY HALL, 30 S. W. COURT, ON DECEMBER 16, 1986. MAYOR C. RALPH BLODGETT PRESIDING. ALBUQUERQUE PRESENT: WILSON MC CLELLAN, JIM RICHOLSON, ED GARNER, HUIE NICHOLSON, HUIE CUBO. STAFF PRESENT: JIM MURRAY - CITY MANAGER, CHRISTI GIBSON - CITY SECRETARY, JOE RAPER - POLICE CHIEF. VISITORS PRESENT: DIANE CARTER OF KRFD.

PLEDGE AND INVOCATION. AT 7:30 P.M. MAYOR BLODGETT DECLARED A QUORUM PRESENT AND CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER. THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG WAS LEAD BY MAYOR BLODGETT AND FOLLOWED BY THE INVOCATION ALSO GIVEN BY MAYOR BLODGETT.

CONSIDERATION OF THE MINUTES OF REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 23, 1986. MOTION WAS MADE BY GARNER TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON NOVEMBER 23, 1986, AS WRITTEN. SECOND BY CUBO. MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED.

CONSIDERATION OF AWARDED A CONTRACT TO INSTALL YARD LINES FOR WATER SERVICES IN ORDER TO ABANDON DETERIOATED AND SUBSTANDARD WATER MAINS. AT 2:00 P.M. ON DECEMBER 11, 1986, SEALED BIDS FOR A CONTRACT TO INSTALL YARD LINES FOR WATER SERVICES IN ORDER TO ABANDON DETERIOATED AND SUBSTANDARD WATER MAINS WERE PUBLICLY OPENED AND READ. THE BIDS WERE AS FOLLOWS:

CONSIDERATION OF THE CAPITAL CITY COUNCIL MEETING DECEMBER 17, 1986.

AFTER DISCUSSION WAS HELD, MOTION WAS MADE BY GARNER TO AWARD A PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION CONTRACT FOR ONE TWENTY-EIGHT (28) CUBIC YARD SIDE LOADING PACKER BODY WITH ONE (1) CUBIC YARD HUBBLE BEAR UNLOADING DOOR FOR THE HEALTH AND SANITATION DEPARTMENT TO ENJOY, PLAINVIEW, TEXAS, IN THE AMOUNT OF \$22,600.00, WHICH WILL BE PURCHASED THROUGH A LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT WITH THE FIRST STATE BANK OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS, AT AN ANNUAL PERCENTAGE RATE OF 5.80%. SECOND BY MC CLELLAN. MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED.

AFTER QUESTIONS FROM THE CITY COUNCIL WERE ANSWERED BY THE CITY MANAGER AND DISCUSSION WAS HELD, MOTION WAS MADE BY BUCHANAN TO AUTHORIZE THE CITY MANAGER TO TAKE BIDS FOR THE PURCHASE OF A LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT FOR AN IBM SYSTEM 36 COMPILER, PRINTER, ASSOCIATED SOFTWARE AND AN IBM P.C.. SECOND BY GARNER. MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED.

CITY MANAGER, JIM MURRAY, STATED TO THE COUNCIL THAT MAYOR TAYLOR'S LEGISLATION PACKAGE IS A COMPREHENSIVE REFORM PACKAGE THAT IS NEEDED TO PROTECT OUR CITIZENS GENERAL WELFARE IN TODAY'S TIME. THAT THIS PACKAGE WILL BE PRESENTED IN THE 70TH SESSION OF THE STATE LEGISLATURE. CHIEF RAPER HAS REVIEWED AND ALSO ENDORSED THIS PACKAGE. MOTION WAS MADE BY GARNER TO ADOPT RESOLUTION #15-86, A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING AN ANTI-CRIME LEGISLATION PACKAGE SPONSORED BY THE CITY OF DALLAS, TEXAS. SECOND BY BUCHANAN. MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED.

CITY MANAGER, JIM MURRAY, EXPLAINED TO THE COUNCIL THAT THIS ORDINANCE WILL ALLOW EMPLOYEES OF OUR CITY, THAT WERE EMPLOYED PREVIOUSLY BY OUR CITY OR BY OTHER CITIES, WHO WERE AND ARE MEMBERS OF THE TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM, TO DEPOSIT THE SUNS 50 WITHDRAWAL, PLUS ANNUAL WITHDRAWAL CHARGES, AND ALLOWING AN UNDERTAKING THE COST OF ALL SUCH EMPLOYER CREDIT IN SUCH SYSTEM FOR ALL SERVICE TO WHICH SUCH EMPLOYEE HAS BEEN ENTITLED BY DATE OF SUCH WITHDRAWAL, WITH LIKE EFFECT AS IF ALL SUCH SERVICE HAD BEEN PERFORMED AS AN EMPLOYEE OF THIS CITY, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AS OF DECEMBER 16, 1986. SECOND BY MC CLELLAN. MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED.

MOTION WAS MADE BY GARNER TO AUTHORIZE A PAYROLL DEDUCTION FOR ELIGIBLE CITY EMPLOYEES TO BUY-REAR THEIR DEPOSITS WITH INTEREST IN THE TEXAS MUNICIPAL RETIREMENT SYSTEM AS SPECIFIED IN ORDINANCE #544. SECOND BY BUCHANAN. MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED.

DISCUSSION WAS HELD IN SMALL BILL #4 AND SMALL BILL #5 WOULD HAVE ON THE CITY OF SPEARMAN'S GENERAL ELECTION HELD ON THE FIRST SATURDAY IN APRIL. THE CITY WOULD HAVE TO CHANGE THEIR ELECTION DATE THE THIRD SATURDAY IN MAY, BUT SUCH CHANGE WILL NOT TAKE EFFECT UNTIL 1988. NO ACTION WAS TAKEN.

FOUR REPRESENTATIVES FROM SPEARMAN ATTENDED THIS MEETING, WHICH IS A RESULT OF THE CITY RECENTLY ADOPTING AN AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY.

MAYOR PRO-TEM GARNER ALSO GAVE A REPORT ON THE FIRE FIGHTERS PENSION BOARD HELD LAST WEEK. AT THIS MEETING OFFICERS OF THE BOARD WERE CHOSEN AND MAYOR PRO-TEM GARNER IS THE CHAIRMAN OF THIS BOARD. IN EARLY JANUARY 1987 THE FULL BOARD WILL MEET AND PUT THE FIRE FIGHTERS PENSION FUND INTO EFFECT.

MEETING DATES FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY WERE SET FOR THE 13TH AND 27TH.

MOTION WAS MADE BY GARNER TO ADJOURN. MAYOR BLODGETT DECLARED THE MEETING ADJOURNED AT 8:53 P.M.

Some of the prints were in black and white; the colored prints were usually lithographed in just one color and later the other colors were added by hand. It is interesting to note that one Currier and Ives picture was often the work of not just one artist but several artists.

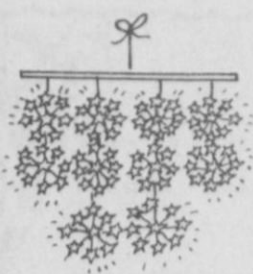

Christmas Tree History

It is said that the first English Christmas tree appeared at a court party for children in 1821. It was a number of years, however, before common people adopted the Christmas tree. A garland of greenery was still hung like a double-looped May garland. The garland was decorated with candles, a ring of red apples, and ornaments. Suspended from the center was a bunch of mistletoe with long ribbons attached from which sometimes small gifts were tied. This was called the Kissing Bough.

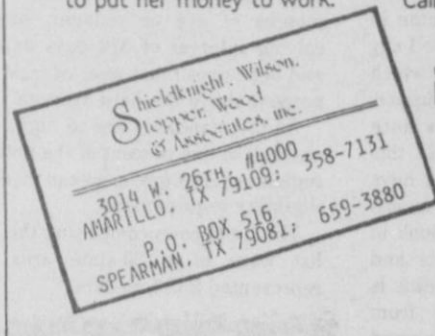

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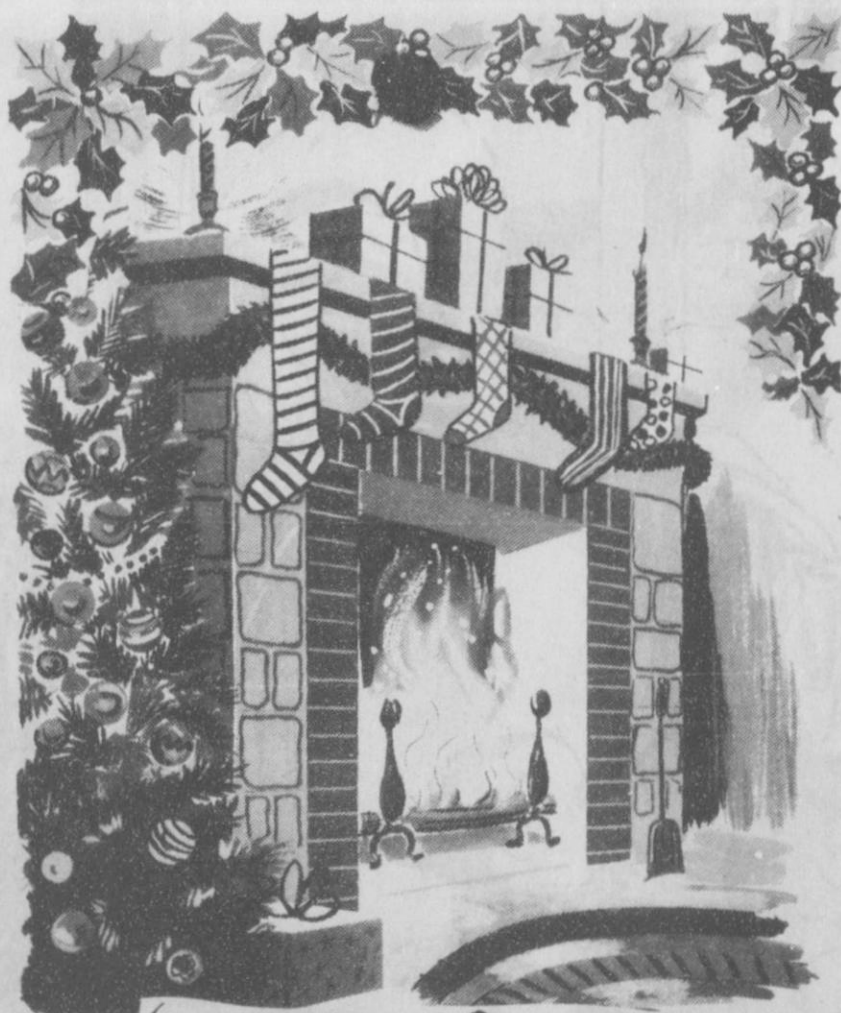

AHA News

Kansas, City, Missouri, December 17, 1986 -- A list of 1,495 cows have been afforded special recognition in the Total Performance Records Programs' Most Efficient Cow Report by the American Hereford Association in Kansas City. This latest report includes cows that have efficiently combined fertility and growth, the two traits of highest economic importance to the producer.

L.M. Patterson, Jr., Spearman, Tx., was represented by one cow on the elite list that requires each cow to meet a strict criterion. To be a member of this prestigious group, the cow must be four-years of age or older, must have had her first calf at 25 months of age or younger, have a calving interval of 370 days or less, and her calves must wear at least five percent above the herd average.

As the standards are so high, only one-half of one percent of the nation's registered Hereford cows can meet the eligibility requirements.

The 1,495 cows comprising the 1986 list were of a 30-state area and represented 332 breeders.

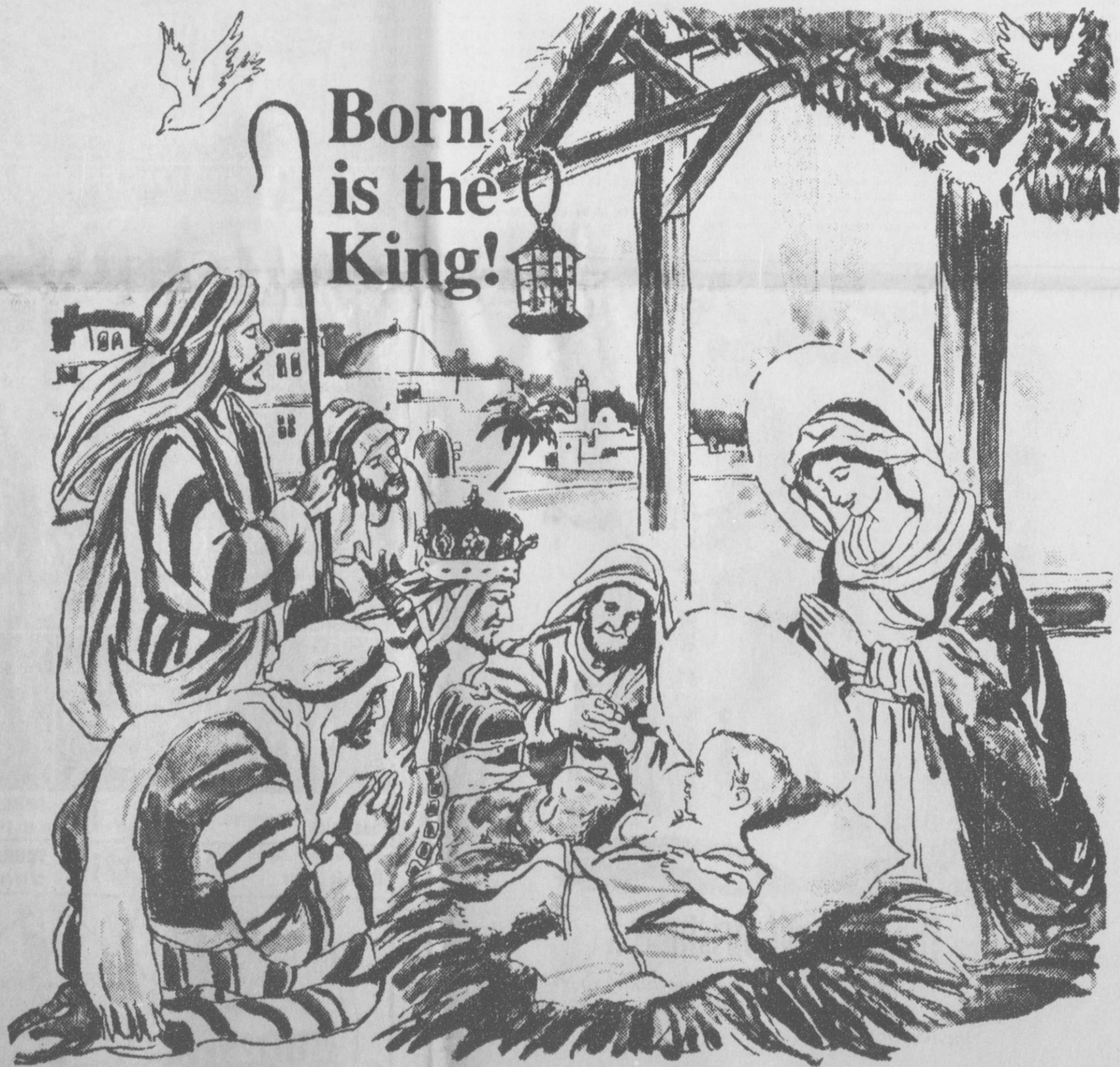

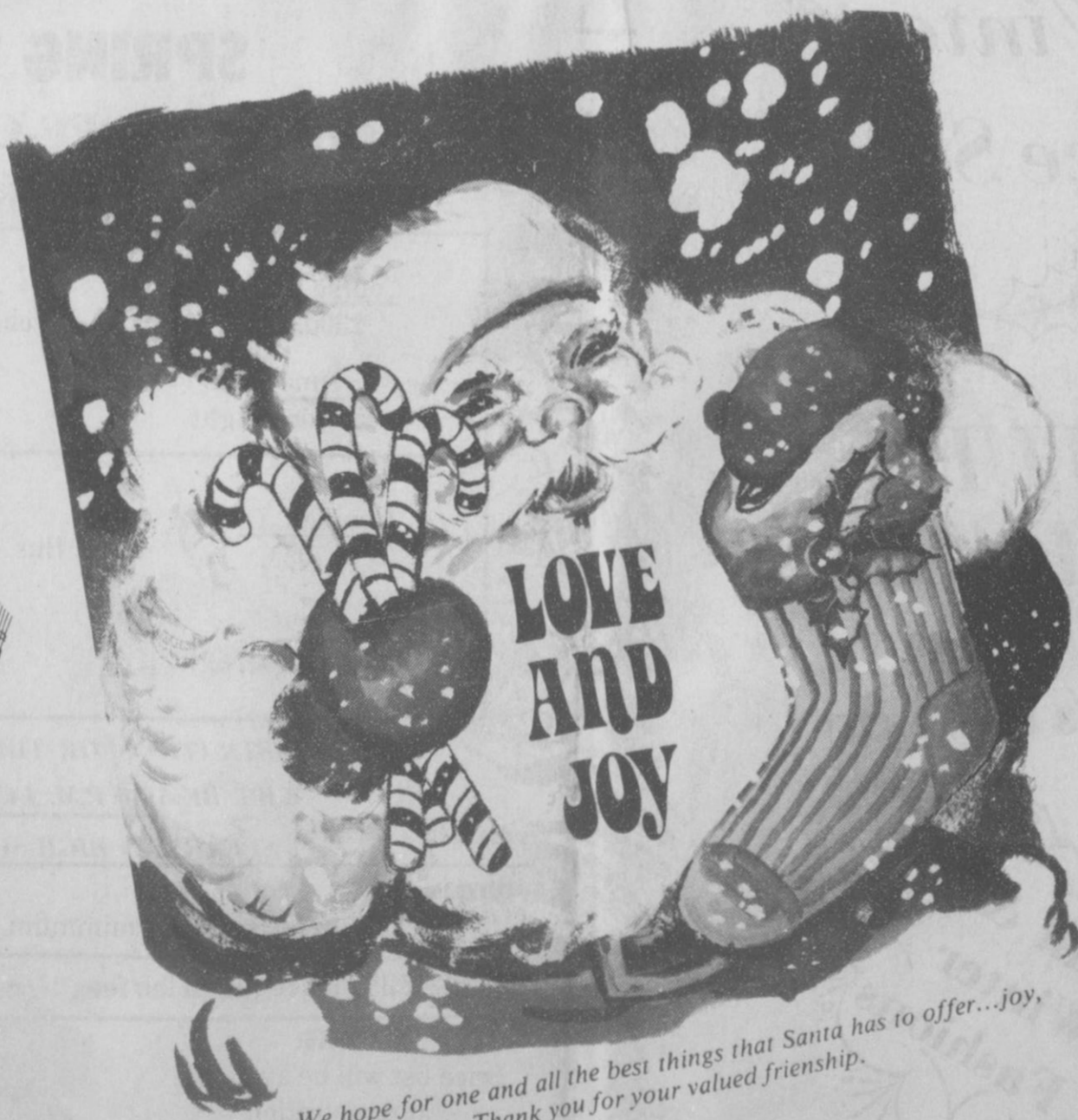

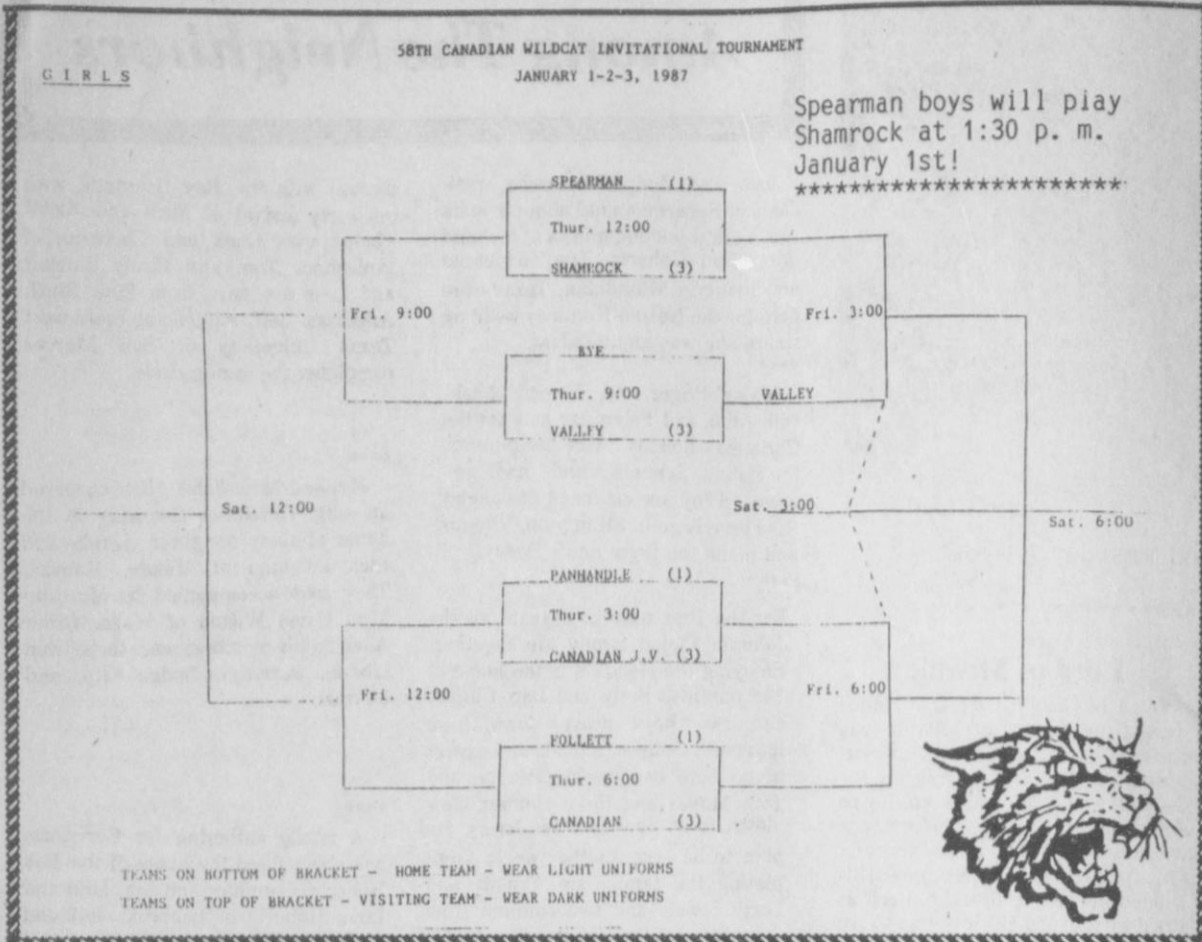

American Cancer Society

The Amarillo Unit of the American Cancer Society, in conjunction with Amarillo hotels and motels, has created a new service for cancer patients.

The Guestroom Program is a cooperative effort that provides complimentary housing for needy cancer patients and their family members who come to Amarillo from the outlying areas of the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas for treatment, reported Debrah Powell S.W., volunteer coordinator for the Guestroom Program.

"The program was designed to ease the physical, emotional, and financial hardships that occur when a patient has to travel great distances for treatment," said Ms. Powell.

The American Cancer Society is working with twelve hotels and motels who have agreed to participate in the program. Qualified patients stay in only one hotel which is selected on a rotating basis.

"Cancer patients undergoing radiation therapy may need up to six weeks of housing," added Ms. Powell. "The hotels have been very generous to donate the rooms for the needed time period."

Ms. Powell stated that a review committee evaluates each case to ensure proper placement and need. Two days advanced notice is needed to coordinate placement with the participating hotels.

Hotels and motels participating in the A.C.S. Guestroom program include the Sheraton Hotel of Amarillo, Quality Inn-Westgate, Quality Inn-East, Amerisuites, Amarillo Hilton, Hampton Inn, La Quinta Inn-Coulter, Texian Inn, Parks Inn International, Holiday Inn, Days Inn, and The Big Texan Motel.
