

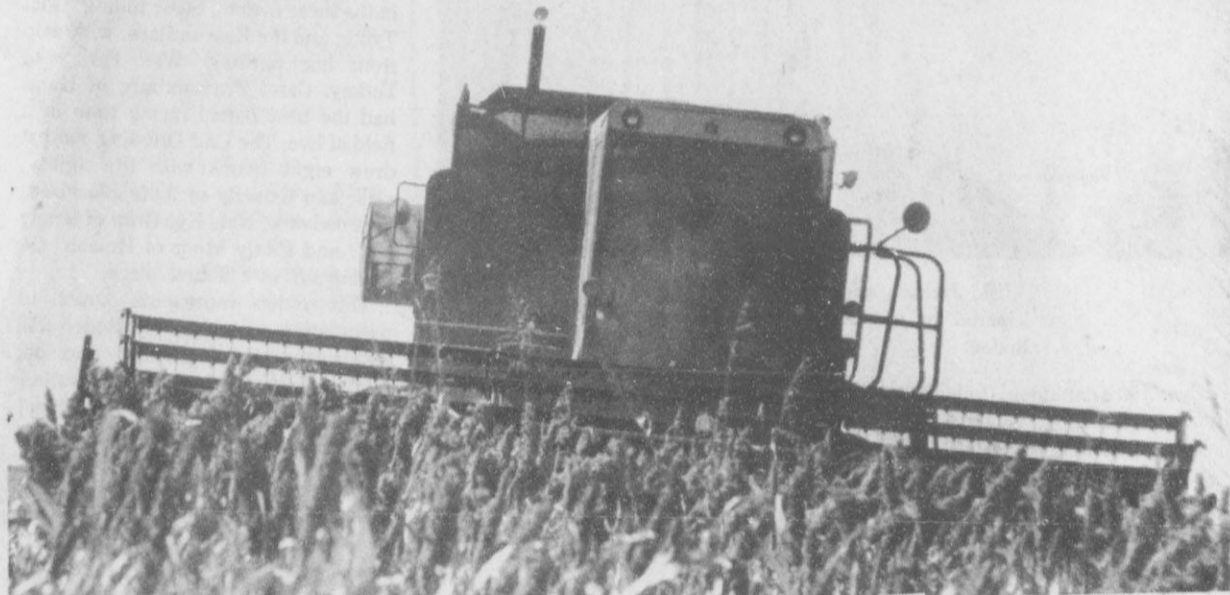

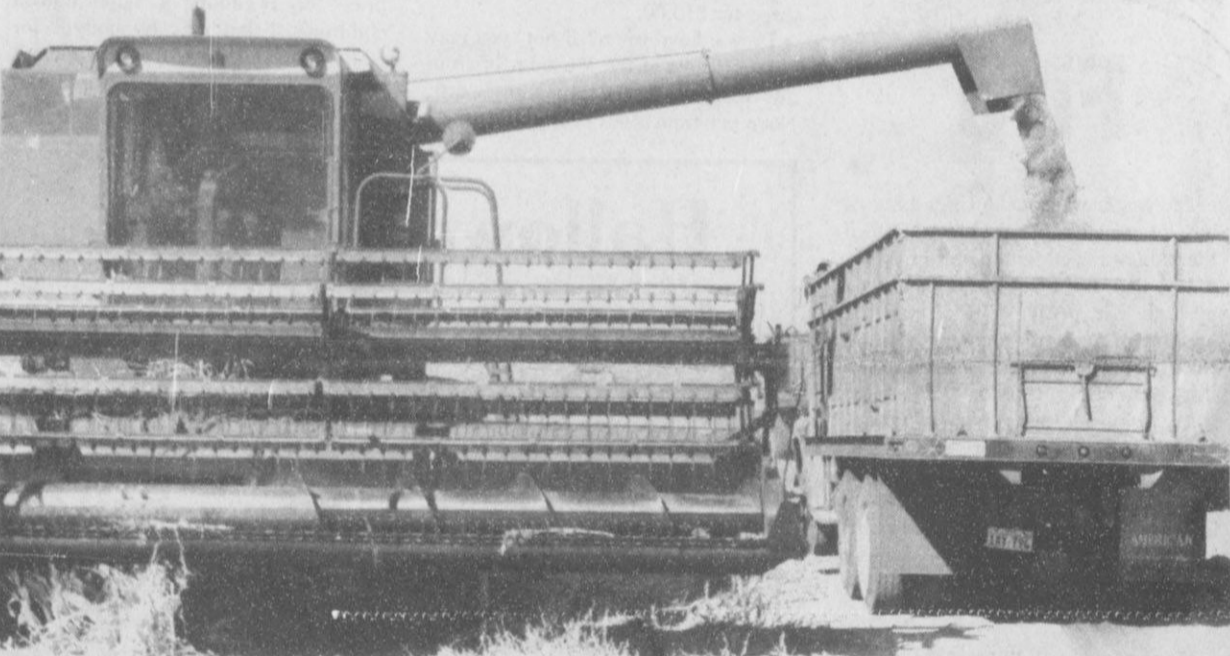

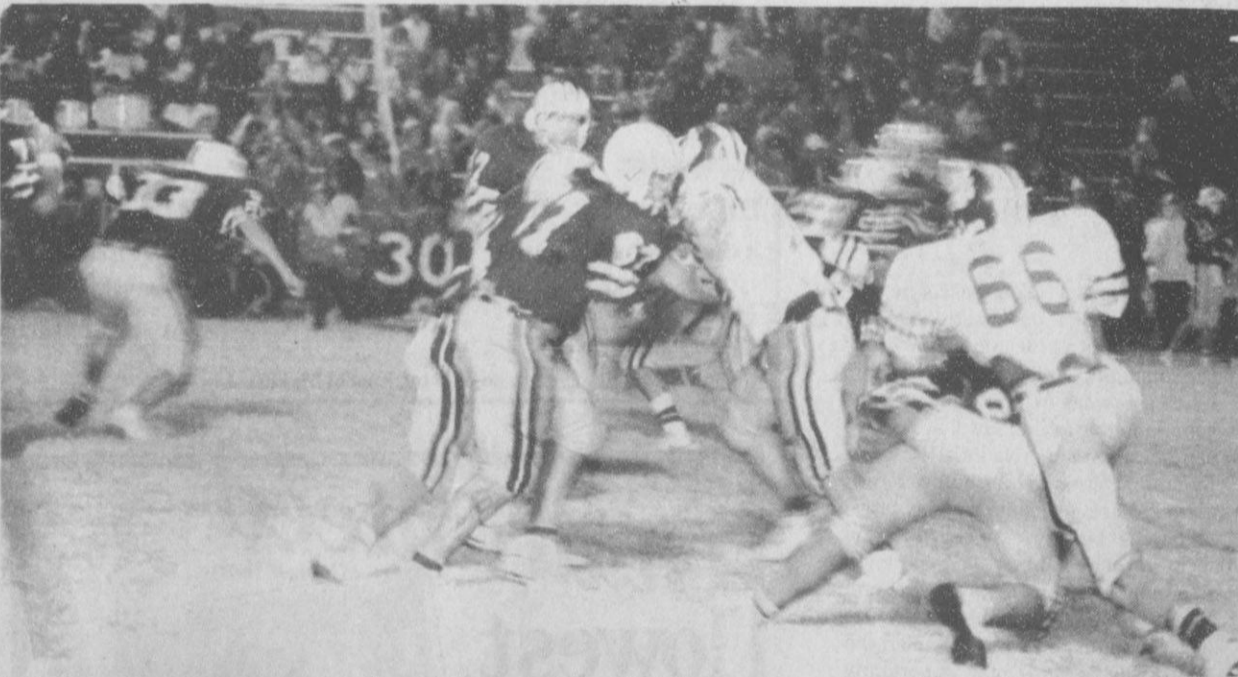

Lynx vs. Rattlers Friday night!

The Lynx lost a devastating game Friday night against the Stinnett Rattlers. Following the Lynx kick-off, Stinnett marched down field 56 yards for the TD. The score came on a 7 yard run by Thompson, point after was good on a Willimon kick. On Spearman's first possession they massed together a drive that ended in Rattler territory. Davis passed to Mark Garnett for 19 yards, and again to #81 Kevin Nelson for 18. Stinnett halted the drive at their own 43 yard line forcing the Lynx to punt. Stinnett managed to gain 14 yards in 4 tries, until Smith hit Tybo Thompson for a 65 yard TD pass, after which the extra point attempt failed.

The Lynx took over on their 23 yard line. #10 Brett Davis gained 2 yards on a play that injured his hand. #11 Will

Black going in to quarterback, handed the ball off to #45 Dusty Hill who raced 50 yards down field before being brought down at the Rattler 21 yard line. Hill gained 5 more yards before the Lynx were penalized 5 yards. #22 Mike Pearson gained 1 yard over the left side. With Davis back in as quarterback he passed short of the endzone that was incomplete. Stinnett's eagerness cost them due to a pass interference call that put the ball on the 5 yard line. Pearson ran for 1 yard, and for 4 yards ending up only inches from the goal line. #10 Brett Davis took the ball into the endzone for the score and kicked the extra point, cutting Stinnett's lead to 6.

2:54 into the 2nd half the Rattler's answered back with a 25 yard TD pass from Smith to Thompson. Smith passed to Willomon for the extra point.

Stinnett's kick went into the endzone for a touchback putting the ball on the 20 yard line. After a 1 yard gain Stinnett intercepted a Lynx pass. Stinnett scored on a 21 yard run by Winters. Willomon kicked the point

after.

After the kick-off Stinnett's defense held and forced Spearman to punt. On a 3rd down and 9 situation, #11 Will Black knocked down a Stinnett pass forcing the Rattlers to punt. Davis hit Benson for a 20 yard pass and #33 Stan Brandt ran for 8 yards. Mike Pearson gained 13 yards on a running play and then Brandt gained 3 more, putting Spearman on the Rattler 37 yard line. Stinnett's defense forced the Lynx to punt. Neither team was able to move the ball and time ran out on a 12 yard pass from Davis to Brandt.

After a scoreless third quarter, most of the fourth quarter was also scoreless. The Lynx forced Stinnett to punt with only 57 seconds left in the game. After an incomplete pass and a sack of ten yards Stan Brandt found a solid wall but managed to gain a few yards despite the Stinnett defense. On third and long the Lynx passed and Stinnett's Stanley Aylor got his third interception of the game, returning it 24 yards for the final score. Stinnett won their Homecoming by a 34 to 7 victory.

Ann Potts

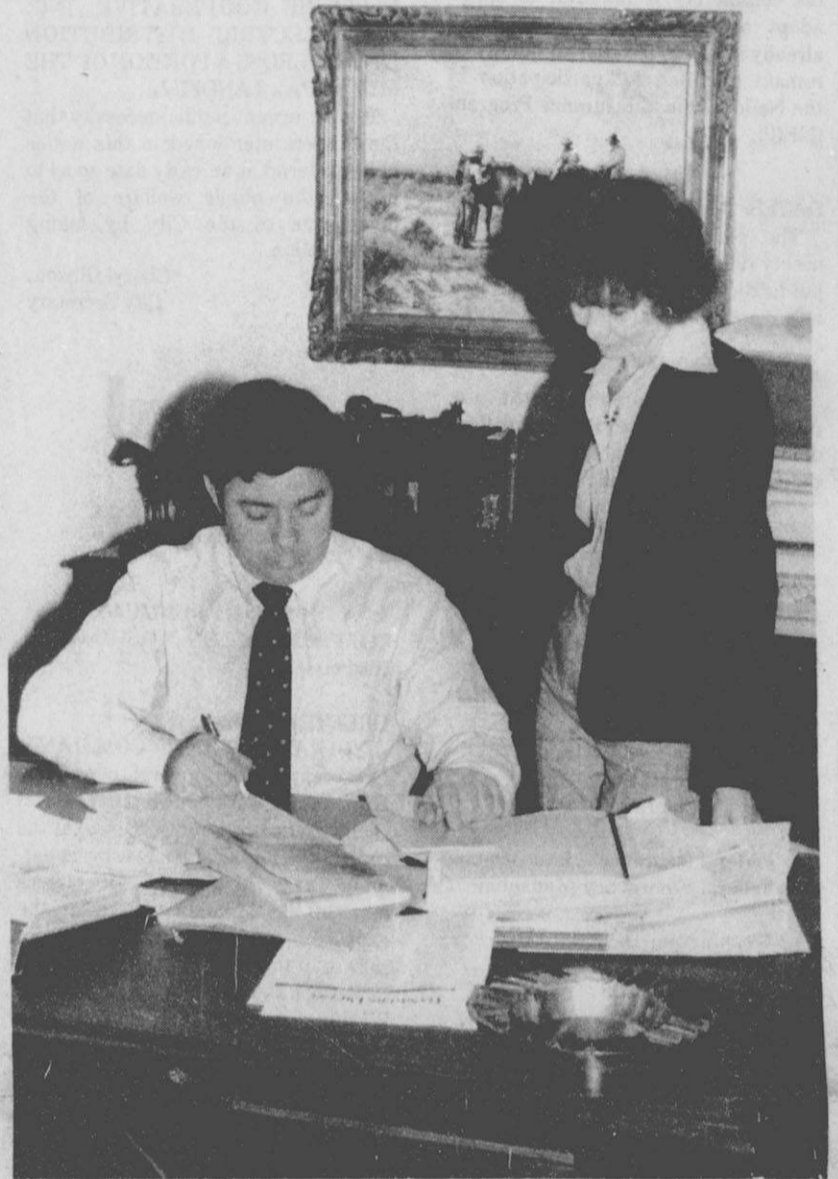

Mixed drink tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$11.3 million to the 220 counties and 425 cities as their share of the state's 12 percent mixed drink tax collected during the third quarter of 1986. Hansford County receives \$446,791.

The Texas Legislature raised the tax from 10 percent to 12 percent in 1984. Bullock said the state collected \$48.3 million in mixed drink taxes for the third quarter, compared to \$49.4 million collected during the same period in 1985.

Texas cities and counties now each receive a 12.5 percent share of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state. Cities and counties received 15 percent rebates until the rate was changed in 1984.

Of the total \$48.3 million in state collections, counties received \$6 million, down from the \$6.1 million received during the third quarter in 1985. Cities received \$5.3 million, down from the \$5.7 million rebated to cities last year during the third quarter. The state's general revenue fund received the balance.

Bullock said \$36.9 million was deposited in the state's general revenue fund from third quarter collections, compared to \$37.5 million collected in third quarter 1985.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by Bullock's office.

Beginning Monday, October 27, the Hansford County Sheriff's Office implemented a crime watch program. The program is a two fold operation. The first being crime watch and prevention, with part two being operation identification. The crime watch will consist of marking property with signs and stickers. Highways and rural roads will have signs posted stating that the county is a participant in the program. Operation identification consist of marking your valuable property with the letters TX, followed by your drivers license number. Should your property be taken it will be entered into the national crime computer. If your property is located the agency finding it will know who it

belongs to by your DL number, and that it is stolen by its entry in the computer. Through this operation a tighter case can be formed against the criminals involved.

The Sheriff's office will be conducting several meetings throughout the county. This program is in conjunction with the National Sheriff's Association and has been proven effective in other counties and states. This program not only helps in the recovery of stolen items, but prevents thief through knowledge and visibility of the signs and stickers.

AGENCY: FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY ACTION: PROPOSED RULE. SUMMARY:

Technical information or comments are solicited on the proposed base (100-year) flood elevations shown in your community's preliminary Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Map. These base (100-year) flood elevations are the basis for the floodplain management measures that the community is required to either adopt or show evidence of being already in effect in order to qualify or remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

DATES:

The period for comment will be ninety (90) days following the second publication of this proposed rule in a newspaper of local circulation in the community.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448)), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR 67.4 (a).

These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursuant to policies established by other Federal, State, or regional entities. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605(b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not proscribe development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.

Lessors and owners of real property in the City of Spearman, Hansford County, Texas, are encouraged to review the preliminary Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Map available at the address cited above. Proposed base flood elevations along flood sources studied in detail are shown on the flood profiles in the study. The flood sources studied in detail are:

Now that October is here, children may be thinking about whom they would like to be on Halloween this year. The Scott and White Department of Emergency Medicine would like to share these ideas to help insure a safe evening on October 31.

*Make each costume short enough so the child won't trip when going up and down steps.

*Use bright colors or big patches of white to give good visibility.

*Use fire-retardant fabric or treat material with a chemical fire-retardant.

*When making masks or hoods, allow large enough holes to assure easy breathing and good vision. Better yet, use makeup or face paints instead of a mask.

*If face paints are used, make sure they are designed for this purpose, are nonpoisonous, and wash off easily.

Other suggestions for a safe Halloween include:

*Prevent fires by using small flashlight -- not candles -- to light jack-O-lanterns.

*Do your trick-or-treating before dark, especially if you have young children, and go with them. Set a curfew for older children and enforce it.

*Instruct children to stay in their own neighborhoods and to call only on people they know and trust.

*Remind children to use sidewalks rather than cutting through yards and vacant lots to prevent tripping over objects.

*Give each child a flashlight and remind them not to shine them into anyone's eyes, especially a driver's.

*If your child get sick, try to find out exactly what he or she ate and where it came from. Call your doctor immediately or contact the Poison Control Center at Scott and White, (817)774-2005.

Winterization

With winter approaching, the Public Utility Commission reminds consumers that now is the time to "winterize" homes for energy savings.

Furnaces should be checked at the beginning of the heating season by a qualified service person to ensure efficient operation. Consumers should stress procedures for improving efficiency of the unit when requesting the service. Make sure the safety features are operating correctly and do not operate the equipment until any problems have been corrected.

Check for air leaks in your home by holding a lighted candle near windows and doorways. If the candle flutters even slightly, you probably need weather stripping or caulking. For a small investment, you can improve the comfort level of your home, and reduce your heating bills at the same time.

Heat loss through windows during the winter can be costly and uncomfortable. Movable insulation, such as thermal curtains and shades, and interior and exterior shutters, can help reduce this heat loss. It allows full benefit of the window during the day, when free solar heating and lighting are available. And at night when the insulation is in place heat loss will be reduced, which lowers heating bills and increases the comfort of the home.

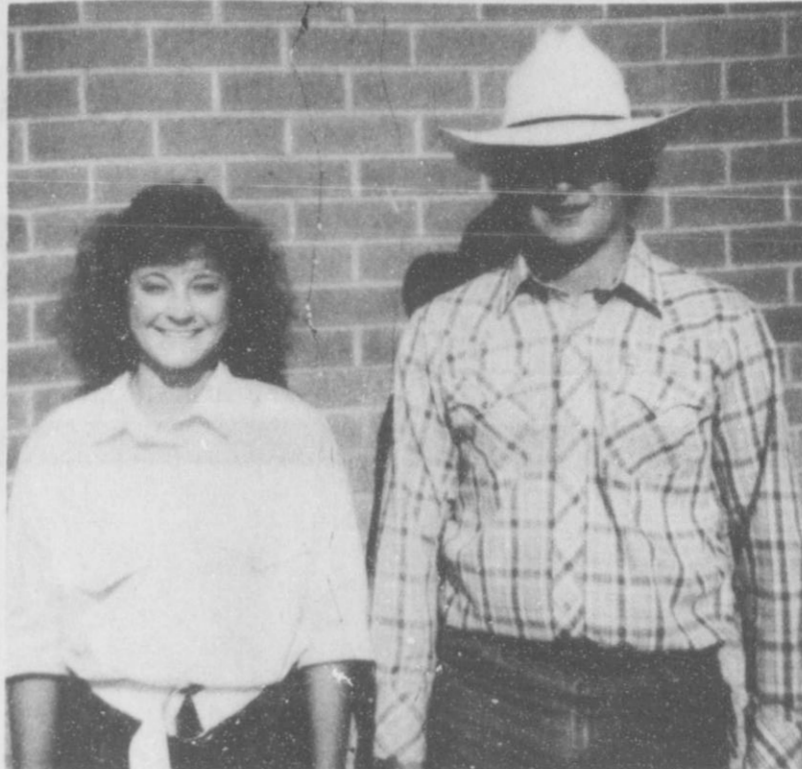

Halloween

Strange and fantastic creatures will soon invade quiet neighborhood streets. Recreation centers will welcome groups of oddly costumed youngsters. Once again, Halloween arrives with all of its enjoyable frights and scares, and Texas Safety Association offers some tips to keep it happy, safe, and "deliciously scary."

"Although our children will spend the night 'pretending,' we, as responsible adults, need to take extra, realistic care to keep them safe on Halloween," advises George Gustafson, president of the association. "The young Franksteins and vampires will be thinking of treats and fun. We must prepare them, our neighborhoods, and ourselves to eliminate as many real dangers as possible."

Dangers that can ruin your child's Halloween thrills:

-MASKS: If a mask inhibits vision, it could contribute to a bad fall or a pedestrian accident. Sharp points or edges can scratch the skin or catch on other materials. Make certain masks fit securely, with large enough eye, nose, and mouth openings for unrestricted breathing and sight. Consider using non-toxic face paints or makeup instead of masks.

-COSTUMES: If the costume material is easily flammable, too long or flowing, or too dark, a child's safety could be at stake. Look for fire-resistant costumes that fit comfortable, and use reflective tape as part of the costume design.

-NEIGHBORHOOD ROUTE: If a child is unfamiliar with a new neighborhood or visits another area, he or she could become easily disoriented in the dark and then lose the way home. Pre-plan your child's route a day or two ahead. Arrange for an older brother, sister, or family friend to accompany the young "monsters" if a

parent or other adult is unavailable. Be sure each ghost, goblin, or princess carries a flashlight or light stick.

-YARD AND DRIVEWAYS: Garden tools, hoses, trash cans, etc. can trip up even the most careful visitor in the dark. Clear the outside of your home so that your treats come without any threats to safety, and keep the area well lighted.

"We must actively accept the responsibility for our children's safety. This includes preparing their costumes, watching for them as we drive, using child safety seats and fastening their safety belts when they ride with us, and inspecting their filled bags of treats when the night's revelry ends," emphasizes Gustafson.

"Our children depend on us, expect us to keep them safe from harm, and learn from our continued caution."

"Don't Mess with Texas"

The state's tough-talking antilitter program has made litterbags and bumper strips touting "Don't Mess with Texas" so popular that the highway department has trouble keeping them in stock.

Texans who missed getting a litterbag or bumper strip will now find them available free at all State Department of Highways and Public Transportation offices and Texas Tourist Bureaus.

"We distributed one million litterbags and 500,000 bumper strips in a two-month period when they were first introduced last spring. Initially, we expected that quantity to last us six to eight months, but we just couldn't keep them in stock," said Don Clark, director of travel and information with the highway department.

"We are encouraged by their popularity. Research indicates that states with active litterbag distribution, combined with a strong public

awareness program, are making major progress in reducing litter," Clark said.

Last month, the highway department released figures showing that litter had declined 29 percent since the "Don't Mess with Texas" program was implemented.

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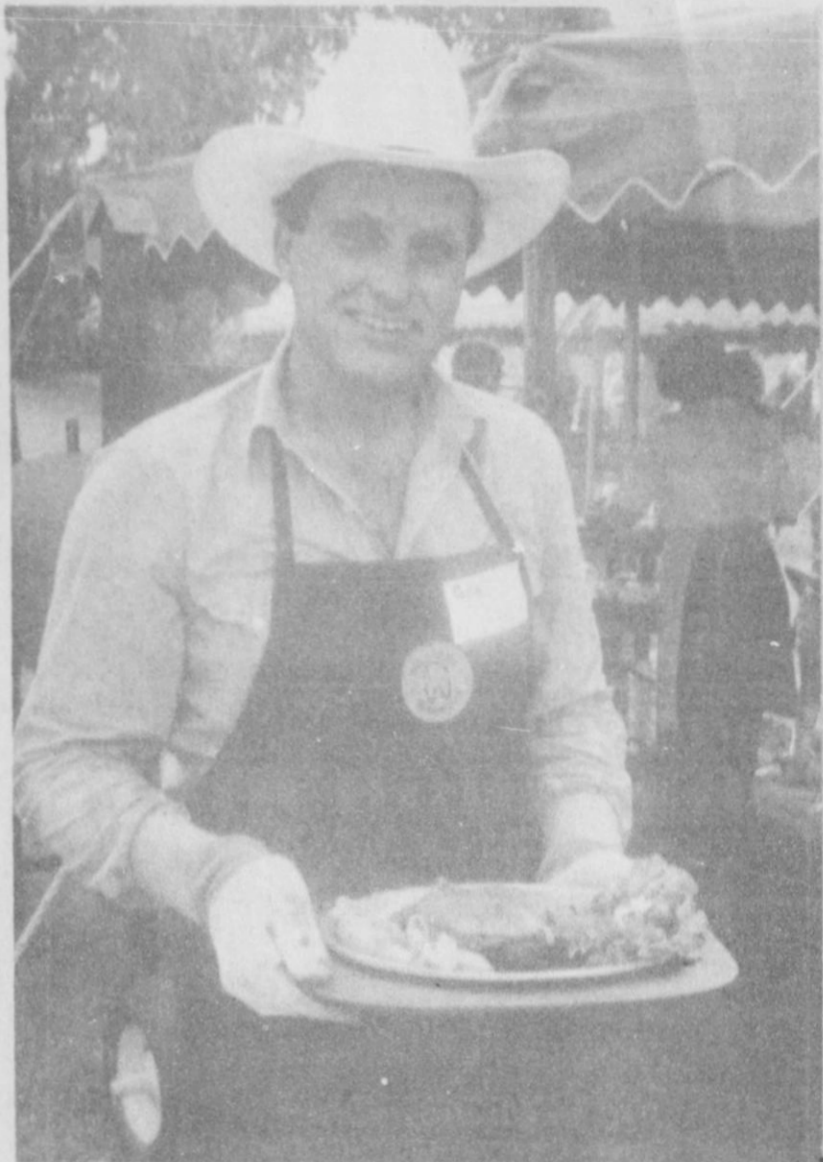

Mesquite Grilled Steaks with Green Chiles

CORRECTION

- 6 (1 1/4" thick) rib-eye steaks
- 1/2 tsp. salt-free herb & spice seasoning (Ms. Dash)
- 1 1/4 cup teriyaki sauce
- 2 Tbs. browning & seasoning sauce (Kitchen Bouquet)
- 4 Tbs. worcestershire sauce
- 2 (4 oz.) cans whole green chiles, sliced in strips

If possible, use mesquite coals from wood fire; otherwise soak mesquite

wood chips 1-2 hours. Place steak in shallow dish; sprinkle one side of each steak with herb & spice seasoning. Combine next 3 ingredients and pour over meat. Marinate 1 hour. Prepare charcoal fire in grill; let burn 15 to 20 minutes. Cover coals with soaked mesquite chips. Remove steaks from marinade and grill over medium-hot coals for 6-8 minutes; turn, placing 3 strips of green chiles on each steak. Grill an additional 6-8 minutes or until desired degree of doneness.

Final Planting Date November 15

November 15 is the Final Planting Date for Insured Barley and Wheat in Hansford County, Texas, according to Jackie Harris, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Insured Barley and Wheat planted by November 15 must be reported by November 30 in order to receive full Crop Insurance Coverage. The Acreage Report reflects the actual Acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

"During the Growing Season, if damage occurs, notice should be given promptly," Harris said.

Crop Insurance based on actual production history (aph), is available this year to producers of Wheat, Barley, Oats and Rye in addition to Corn, Grain Sorghum, Soybeans, Peanuts, Cotton, Rice and other Crops.

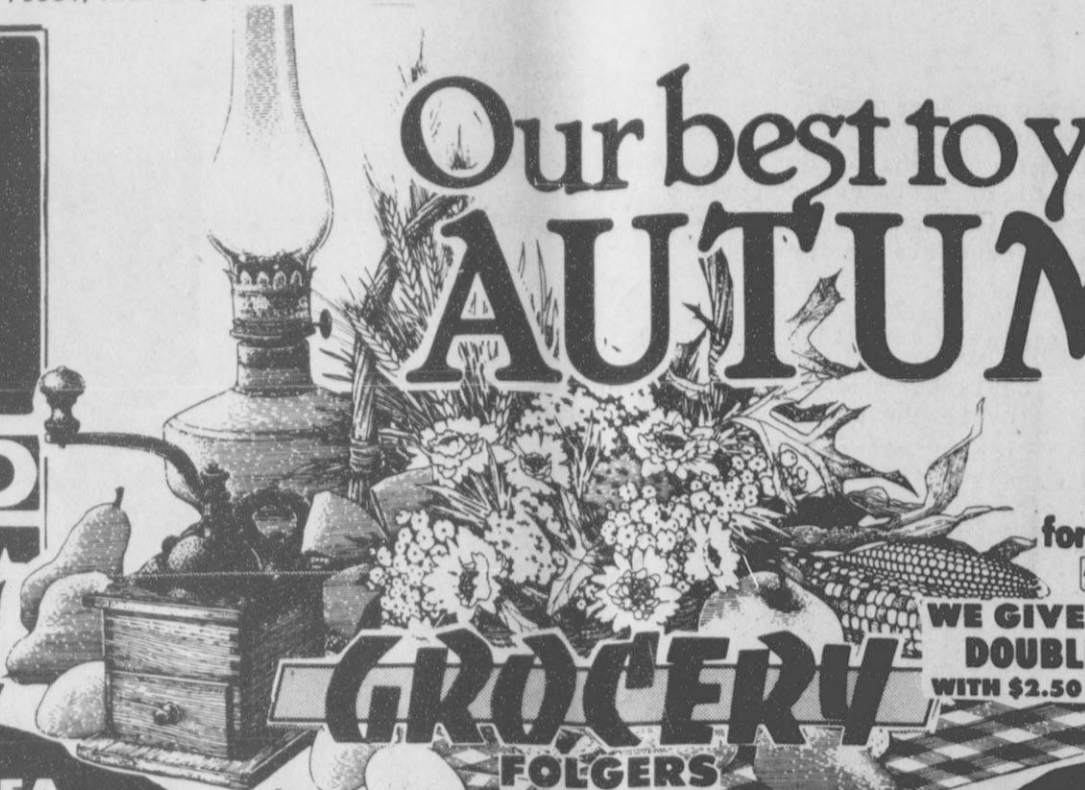
