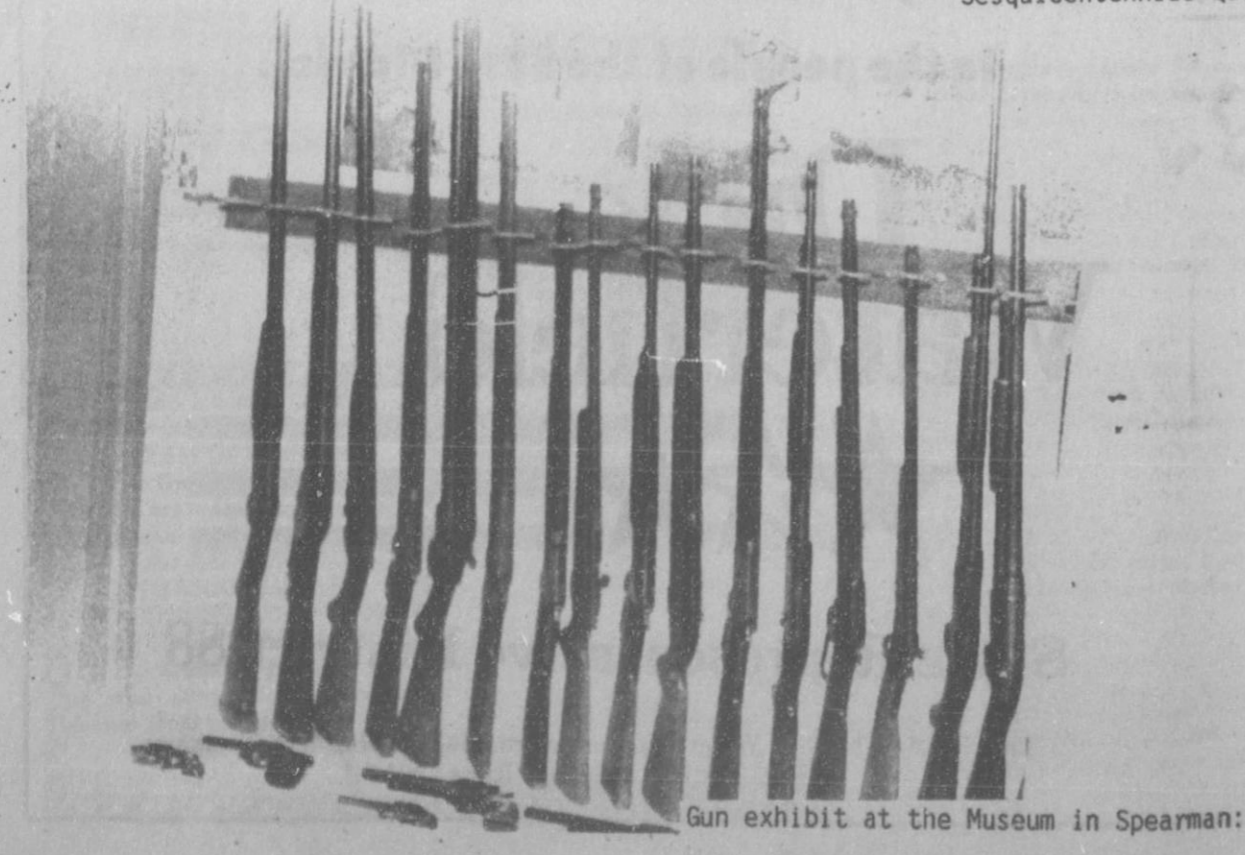

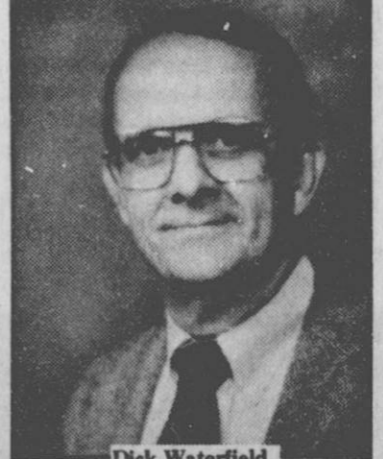

Satellite Arts and Crafts Festival

More than 200 booths laden with paintings, sculpture, macrame, toys, dolls, jewelry, woodcrafts, quilts, baked goods, frames and games will be on display at the Satellite Arts and Crafts Festival Nov. 22 & 23 inside the Expo Center in Perryton.

All the items are handmade by artists and craftsmen from a six state area, Wanda Estes, Director of the Satellite Center said.

Estes and JoAnn Allen, an assistant at the Center, were especially fond of a brass sculptor, Les Seamster of Allison, who will be back this year.

"He had etched brass pictures—one of an eagle I thought was outstanding. It looked like it was in flight. It was done like etching on glass, except it was on brass.

"When the artist was finished, the eagle portion of the etching was filled in with dark brown; a spotlight accented the color and gave a sense of depth."

"The show kind of reminds me of Silver Dollar City," said Allen. "It takes you back in time. There are things there you can't buy in department stores, all kinds of woodcrafts and handmade items."

Many of the art show patrons do their Christmas shopping at the show, Estes said, picking up unique items that are sure to be a special delight at Yuletide.

The Satellite Center a sheltered workshop for adults with mental retardation, keeps 10 percent of the total table sales from each exhibitor.

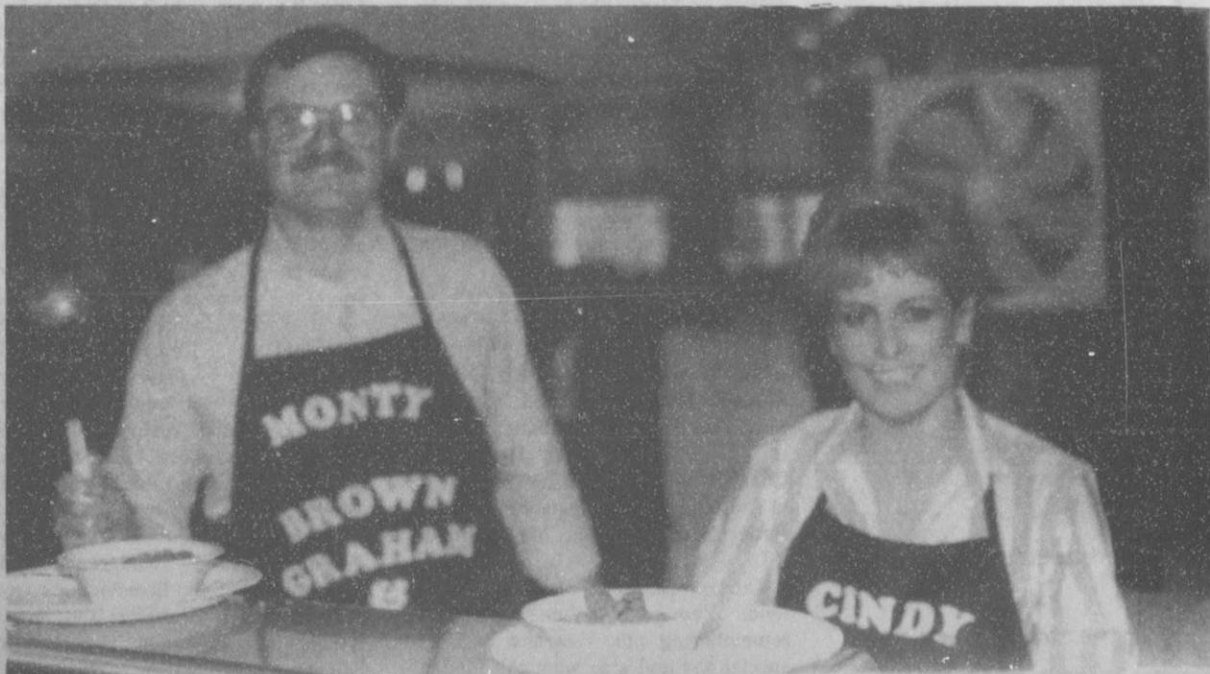
Funding collected from this year's sale will help support the workshop activities.

SAFETY ALERT

Notice For LP Gas Customers

A safety warning has been issued to people who own LP gas-heating systems, including central furnaces, boilers, pool heaters, conversion burners, floor furnaces, gas-fired logs and recreational vehicle heaters.

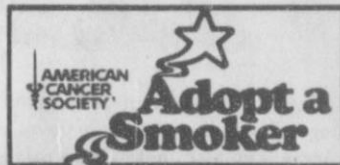
If you bought your system between the years 1966 and 1975, and it has a Honeywell combination gas valve, it may be hazardous and could fail. In such an instance, the valve does not shut off the gas supply when the pilot light is out. Since LP gas is heavier than air, it may accumulate near the floor. If the combustible gas is exposed to an ignition source such as electric sparks or matches, a fire or explosion may occur causing property damage and personal injury.

If you fear you may be at risk, check your furnace or heating appliance and identify the model number on the combination control valve. Numbers being recalled include C5133, C5134, CS5133, CS5134, V4136, V4146, V5189, V7284, V8129, V8136, V8139, V8146, V8169, V8188, V8133, V88138 and V88193.

If the gas control has one of these numbers, you should immediately call Honeywell toll-free at 1-800-328-8194. The recalled LP controls will be replaced with newer models at the company's expense.

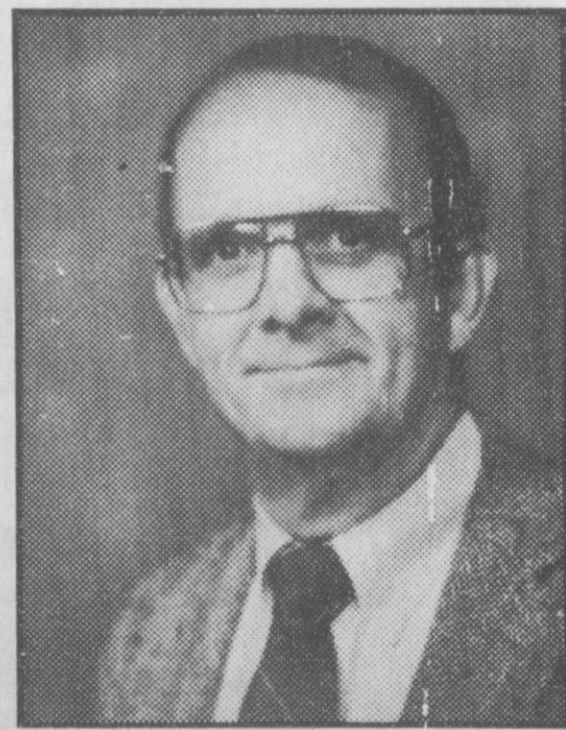
Juroska has seven years of classroom teaching experience, and an additional nine years of administrative experience. He is currently High School Principal at Commerce, Texas.

Sesquicentennial Quilt on Display at Museum

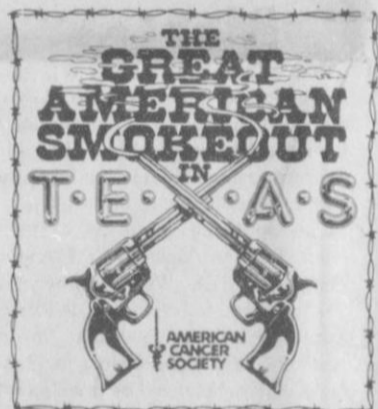
Last fall plans were made to construct something that would be outstanding and tell a story in the State of Texas. The Sesquicentennial was coming up and the Panhandle wanted to let Texas know just how they felt about the 150 years of traditions, memories, economies and values of the pioneers of our area.

A contest was held in each county to construct a quilt block depicting the county's situation. One winner was sent in to the Panhandle Plains Museum where Jo Anne Arasim, curator of Textiles and Beck Saunders, Clothing Specialist for TAEX, held an old fashion quilting bee to construct this unique quilt. Hansford County's block was submitted by Nelle Evans of Gruver.

The Texas Panhandle Sesquicentennial Quilt measures 114 1/2 inches wide by 97 1/2 inches long consisting of 30-14 inch hand applied blocks on white backgrounds. These have been hand-quilted together with a solid red 3 inch border sashing in a crisscross

pattern, adjoining all blocks into an overall design known as the Rone Pattern. There is a 4 inch wide navy blue border sashing with a rope design around the outer edge of the quilt.

The month of November will be your chance to view this unique quilt at the Stationmaster House Museum. It will be ondisplay November 3 thru 25. A

Final Planting November 15

November 15 is the Final Planting Date for Insured Barley and Wheat in Hansford County, Texas, according to Jackie Harris, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Insured Barley and Wheat planted by November 15 must be reported by November 30 in order to receive full Crop Insurance Coverage. The Acreage Report reflects the actual Acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

"During the Growing Season, if damage occurs, notice should be given promptly," Harris said.

Crop Insurance based on actual production history (aph), is available this year to producers of Wheat, Barley, Oats and Rye in addition to Corn, Grain Sorghum, Soybeans, Peanuts, Cotton, Rice and other Crops.

"Increasingly, our Insured Producers and discovering that with a yield guarantee which reflects production capability, Crop Insurance establishes a Farm Income Floor. Thus, Cash Flow and the ability to repay a loan may be more accurately projected," explained Harris.

40th Anniversary Alzheimer's Disease

November, 1986, will mark the fourth anniversary of federal recognition of efforts to combat Alzheimer's Disease, when President Ronald Reagan once again designates November as "National Alzheimer's Disease Month."

"The emotional, financial and social consequences of Alzheimer's Disease are so devastating that it deserves special attention," the President has said. "Research is beginning to reveal many of its mysteries. Until a cure is found, however, afflicted families need our hope and understanding... Let us mark this month by striving to educate ourselves about Alzheimer's Disease and by participating in appropriate activities and observances."

Congressional recognition of Alzheimer's was boosted in 1982 with the designation of "National Alzheimer's Disease Week," the observance was extended to a month in 1983.

This official recognition of efforts to conquer Alzheimer's Disease has been accompanied by a steady increase in federal and state support for research and assistance to victimized families. In the five years, federal expenditures for research into the illness have multiplied to an estimated \$50 million in 1986, up from \$16.7 million initially.

Among key Alzheimer-related legislation currently being considered by Congress is a bill that would launch five explorative projects to determine the feasibility of expanding Medicare

coverage for Alzheimer victims. The projects would investigate victim and caregiver needs such as outpatient drug therapy, respite care, adult day care, counseling and other in-home services, and make recommendations for revisions in Medicare programs.

"This is truly a breakthrough piece of legislation because it acknowledges Alzheimer's Disease as a permanently debilitating disease, with an enormous emotional and financial cost to caregiving families," notes Jerome H. Stone, chairman emeritus of Stone Container Corporation and founding president of Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association (ADRDA). ADRDA, a privately-funded national organization battling Alzheimer's Disease, has drafted a major position paper, "A National Program to Conquer Alzheimer's Disease," that is one of the more widely-used models for legislation at both the federal and state levels.

ADRDA's 149 Chapters and Affiliates across the U.S. are using "National Alzheimer's Disease Month" as a focal point to implement special programs aimed at increasing public awareness of the disease. A variety of activities in education, family service, fund raising and community awareness and support are planned to heighten the national observation at the local level.

The Association will also launch a new national awareness - building public service campaign in November.

Isn't it great to receive affirmation for the work you are doing? The following letter reached me this past week, giving permission to use it for newspaper articles, board meetings, and grant proposals, but requesting that the name be withheld. The letter is also for you to read it and rejoice:

"Dear Mrs. Elzey: Six months ago, when I first became involved with the Crisis Center, I didn't feel like I was an abused wife. I had been hit, pushed, shoved, and called names. My opinion of an abused wife was someone who was beaten by her husband all the time.

"I started going to a support group and became aware of what they call verbal abuse. Sometimes the things my husband would say would hurt more than if he had hit me. Bruises and cuts will go away, but cruel words seem to stick in my mind for a long time."

"I feel the group meetings have helped me a lot. I'm able to say things to my husband now, and do things I want without feeling guilty. I realize now I'm a worthwhile person, and I am not to blame for everything that goes wrong in our marriage. Several months ago I took my child and left home. My husband was acting moody like he had in the past before becoming assaultive. In less than a week we got back together and were able to talk things out."

(As with most honeymoons, this one was also short lived. The lady found it necessary to continue with the support group and is so impressed with the Crisis Center, she made the following suggestion.)

"I feel that the Crisis Center needs a support group for men, and another for couples. Men need someone to talk to about their problems as much as women do. A group for couples would be good. Couples need to learn to talk to each other and control their anger. I am controlling my anger better because of the support group. I think the people are great and they're doing a great job, especially for me.
"My desire is that this marriage work. You have my permission to use my letter for newspaper articles."

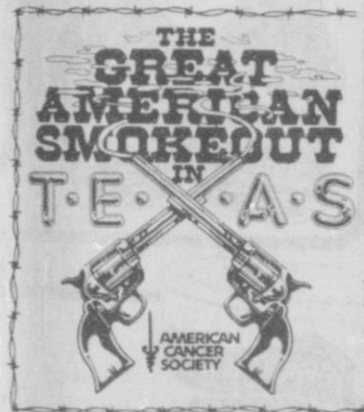

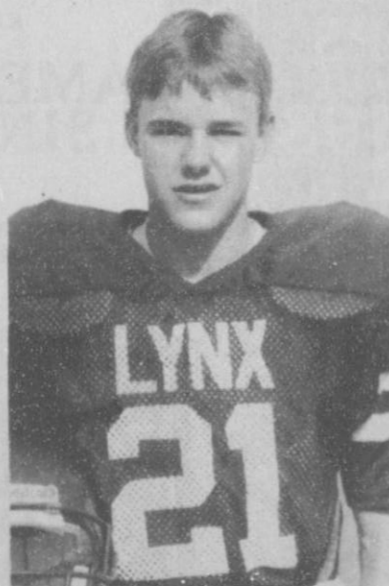
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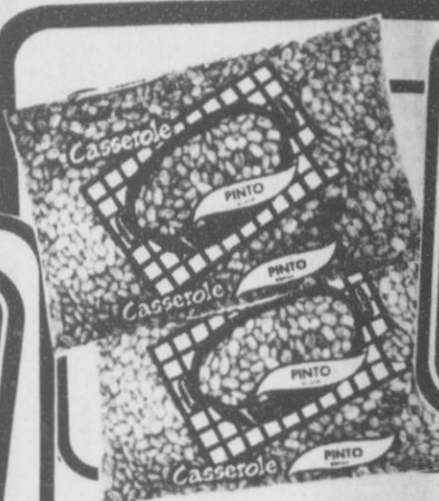
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
