## Groundbreaking Ceremony Huge Success



**Ground Breaking**

The Groundbreaking ceremony for the new Hansford Manor addition was held Friday, September 5th at 2:00 p.m.

The Ceremony was a huge success with several people in attendance. The program started off with Mr. Johnny Miller singing the National Anthem. Followed by the Rev. David Knuckles giving the Invocation.

President of the Hospital Board Jack Oakes spoke about the starting of the project. In 1985 the Hospital Board realized the need for expansion. There were about 40 people on the waiting list and at that time the Manor was losing \$10,000.00 per month. The Primary cause was lack of room and meeting the fix cost. They further determined that they needed 40 more beds and that this addition would give them a profit rather than a loss. Also the Manor would still continue their high quality of care and would continue to have a good staff and personnel. Their food & cleanliness would still be No. #1.

So on September of 1985 the Hospital Board started discussions with Cros/Croslin & Associates - Architects and Planning Co. Then the Bond Election in November carried 3 to 1. The People of Hansford Co. saw the need for this much needed facility.

Then President Oakes turned it over to Mayor J.C. Harris and he gave thanks for the possibilities that we have in this home. He also came to reserve a room for his personal needs in the future!

Next, Mayor, Pro-Tem Garner spoke about this being a great day for Hansford County and that 8 suites would be available. The suites would be apartment like in style. He thanked the Board for spending so many hours in running the Hospital and for having such foresight. The City of Spearman and Gruver salute the Hospital Board. Then came the moment we had been waiting for. The Groundbreaking was held.

President Jack Oakes took the Golden Shovel and "Bit the Dirt." It was a momentous occasion.

Refreshments were served by the Ladies Auxilliary and it was delicious. Many thanks to all that attended.

Monday of this week the construction of the addition started by surveying and moving of equipment. The Company of Reid & Strickland will use the southside parking lot as the storage area for the equipment. The Company is very interested in hiring

local people and the Board encouraged them to do so.

The projected time for completion is 330 days. The Contractor's are Reid & Strickland Construction and they will be overseen by the Architects of Cox/Crosslin and Associates.

There will be little or no inconvenience to the patients. The Patients are just as anxious as the rest of us.

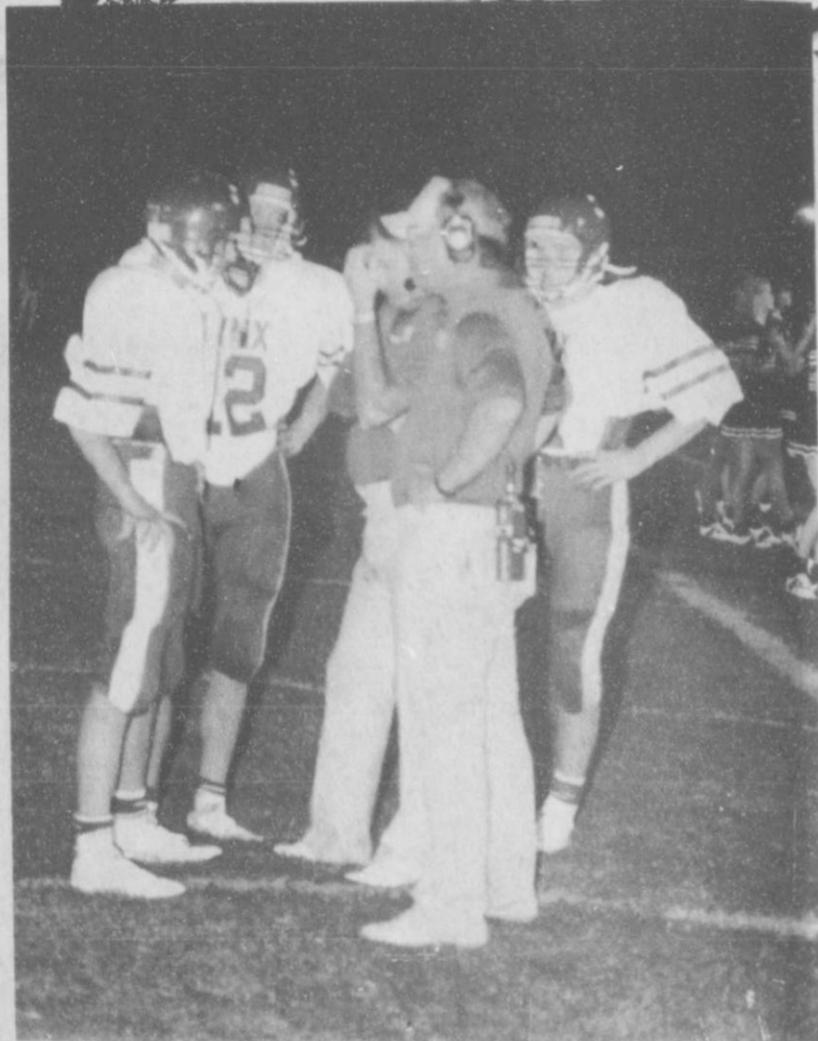

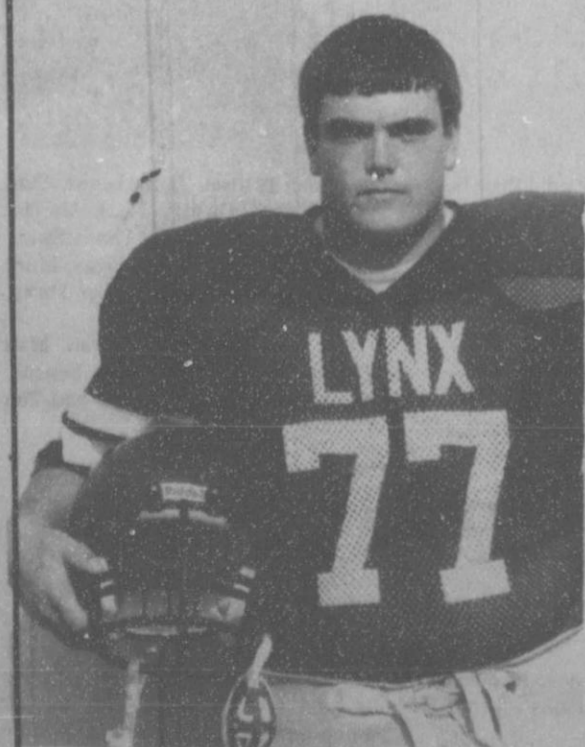

# - 8th Grade '86 LYNX Preview

The Spearman Lynx 8th Grade Football team will take on the Gruver Greyhounds on September 11. Their attack will feature the new Veer offense and the Split Six (a 6-2 alignment) defense. Offensive starters include: Jay York-Quarterback, Edgar Nava-Halfback, Ramon Rosales, Brandon Baker-Alternating Fullback, Chris Williamson-Right End, Mark Brown-Left End, Lee Villarreal-Flanker, Mac Sheppard-Center, Temp Sheppard-Guard, John Ethredge-Guard, Jarret Swan-Tackle and Leroy Cazarez-Tackle. The defense is at this point undetermined.

### THE VEER

The key to any success the Lynx will have this year depends mainly on the Veer offense. A system similar to the Wishbone, it features a more wide open attack than its predecessor it can be a very dangerous offense when executed correctly. It often uses a "wall" blocking theory, slanting most of the interior lineman to a certain area, creating an impenetrable barrier to defenders. It leaves several defensive lineman unblocked relying on the confusing blocking block patterns and the speed of the backs to keep these lineman out of position.

The Lynx 8th grade team scored only 54 points as 7th grade so any increase in offensive production will be welcome. Unfortunately, their starting Halfback, and their starting Wide Receiver moved during the offseason. Moving some out-of-position lineman will help the backfield, but will weaken the line.

Still, because of weaker opposition and the new Veer, fans should see a definite improvement in the Lynx 8th grade team. In fact, a few observers see the possibility of the Lynx breaking the .500 mark.

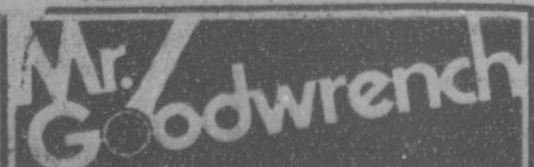
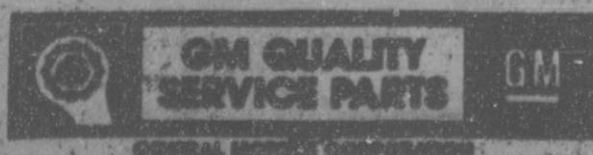

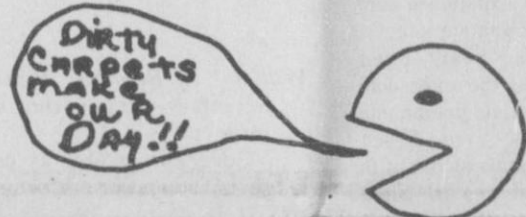

## Six Shots That Can Save Your Life

Vaccination is one of the best bargains around, but only 10 to 50 percent of at-risk American adults are taking advantage of it, reports the September Reader's Digest. Contrary to popular belief, the need for inoculations does not end with school years. As your children receive their shots, the magazine urges you to think about yourself as well. Inoculations against the following preventable diseases can save your life.

**\* Infection**--The U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta pinpoints several high-risk groups: persons with chronic heart and lung diseases; residents of nursing homes and other chronic-care facilities; all those age 65 or older; people with chronic diseases such as diabetes, anemia and asthma, and health-care workers. though many people avoid the annual flu shot for fear of side effects, doctors say that less than one-third of patients experience soreness around the vaccination site.

**\* Pneumonia**--Last year, pneumococcal pneumonia, the most common form of bacterial pneumonia, claimed about 25,000 lives. Essentially the same population at risk of flu should be inoculated against pneumococcal pneumonia. The CDC recommends not giving the vaccine to pregnant women who are otherwise healthy.

**\* Hepatitis**--There are between

400,000 and 800,000 carriers in the United States of hepatitis B, a severe infection spread through unsterilized hypodermic needles, unclean dental or surgical instruments, blood products and transfusions and sexual contact. Moreover, the hepatitis-B virus was recently identified as the single most important worldwide cause of liver cancer. The recommended recipients of the vaccine: health-care workers who deal with blood; hemodialysis patients, certain blood-product users; homosexually active men; prostitutes; drug addicts, and pregnant women in any high-risk group, such as refugees from the Far East.

**\* Rubella**--Often called German measles, rubella is still a problem. The CDC reported 604 cases in 1985. All non-pregnant females in their child-bearing years who do not have a record of a rubella vaccination should be immunized immediately.

**\* Measles**--Though measles is rarely fatal, it can cause ear infections, pneumonia and encephalitis. Vaccine recipients should be any young adult with no record of measles or no vaccination with a live-measles vaccine in childhood.

**\* Tetanus**--If you have ever stepped on a nail, you probably received a tetanus shot from your physician during treatment of the wound. The CDC recommends the combined tetanus-diphtheria vaccination, but they can be given separately. A booster injection every 10 years is good insurance.

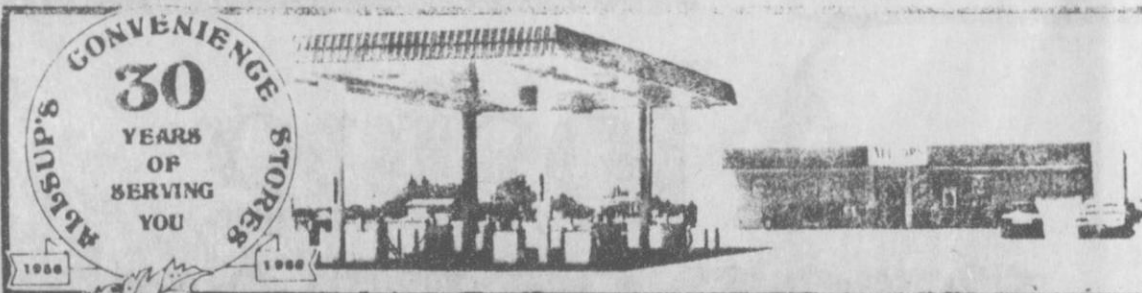

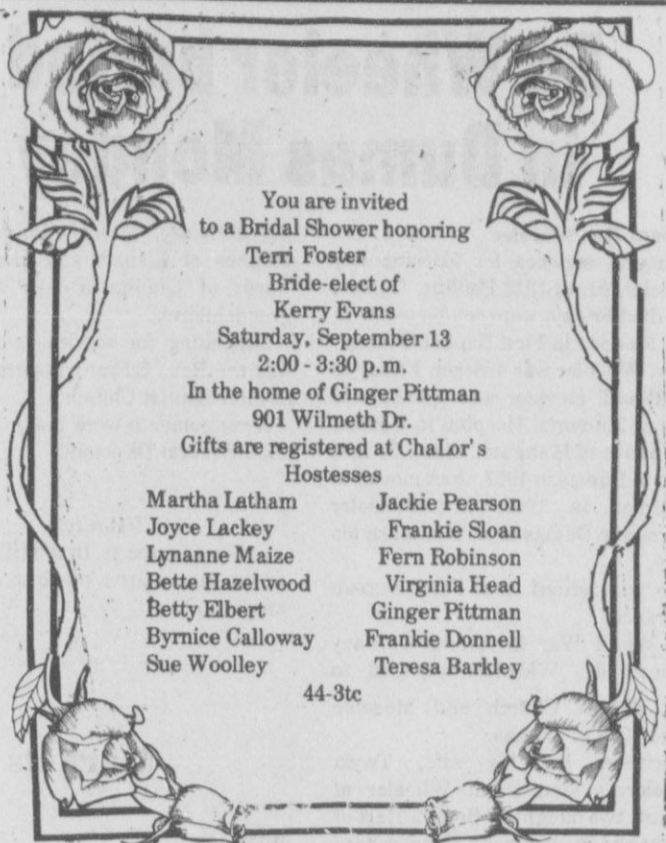

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

## ASCS Press Release

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has accepted 5,091,518 more acres of highly erodible cropland into the Conservation Reserve Program, Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Peter Myers announced today.

"We now have almost 9 million acres total from three signups," he said. "Our 5-year goal is to remove 40-45 million acres of highly erodible cropland from production for 10 years and with this level of participation we feel we are well on our way to meeting that objective. It's obvious that more farmers have been seriously weighing the benefits of participating in the Conservation Reserve."

In this latest sign-up farmers on 45,081 farms had submitted bids for a total of 6,420,964 acres. The accepted bids ranged up to \$90 per acre with an average of \$46.94 per acre.

Annual rental payments will compensate farmers for retiring highly erodible land from crop production. The amount of payment is determined by the bid per acre and the number of accepted acres.

Participants will also receive conservation payments of up to 50 percent of eligible costs of establishing trees and grass on the acreage placed in the reserve. The conservation payments will partially reimburse farmers for the one-time costs of establishing required conservation practices on the cropland.

Myers said land entered into the Conservation Reserve, as directed by the Food Security Act of 1985, will be ineligible for farming for 10 years and must be planted with permanent vegetative cover. "This program will bring many benefits, including the enhancement of wildlife habitat," he said.

Farmland and signed up to date totals 8,930,655 acres. During the first sign-up period, March 3-14, USDA accepted bids to enter 838,356 acres on 10,307 farms into the program. Bids on that signup ranged up to \$90 per acre with an average of \$41.82.

During the second period, 3,000,681

acres on 22,863 farms were accepted. Accepted bids in this period also ranged up to \$90 per acre with an average of \$44.23.

Additional sign-up periods for bidding will be announced later.

Detailed data on bids submitted and accepted during the Aug. 4-15 signup are listed in a state-by-state supplemental table.

--Under certain conditions federally-licensed warehouses may transfer stored grain to other warehouses.

--Farmers may request permission to buy grain at an approved warehouse and substitute that grain for loan collateral.

--Producers may deliver grain beyond their normal delivery point if local storage is short.

--Storage-short farmers may obtain 9-month non-recourse distress loans for grain stored in any farm storage facility, or even on the ground.

--Warehousemen have the option of requesting loading to reconcentrate grain owned by the CCC before harvest.

--Farmers are allowed to extend commodity loans for one-year, and CCC will pay farmers 26-1/2 cents per bushel for storage.

--Farmers with grain in the farmer-owned reserve and special producers' storage loan programs may rotate it out of storage 60 days before they replace it with newly-harvested grain.

--CCC has expanded the catalog of grain available for exchange with certificates to include specific inventories in identified areas where less storage is available and where loading orders have been requested.

--Made more extensive use of the inland waterway systems for moving corn out of corn belt counties and for emergency storage in barges.

--Additional personnel have been authorized for the Kansas City offices to speed up the handling of loading order requests to move CCC-owned grain and to redeem commodity certificates.
