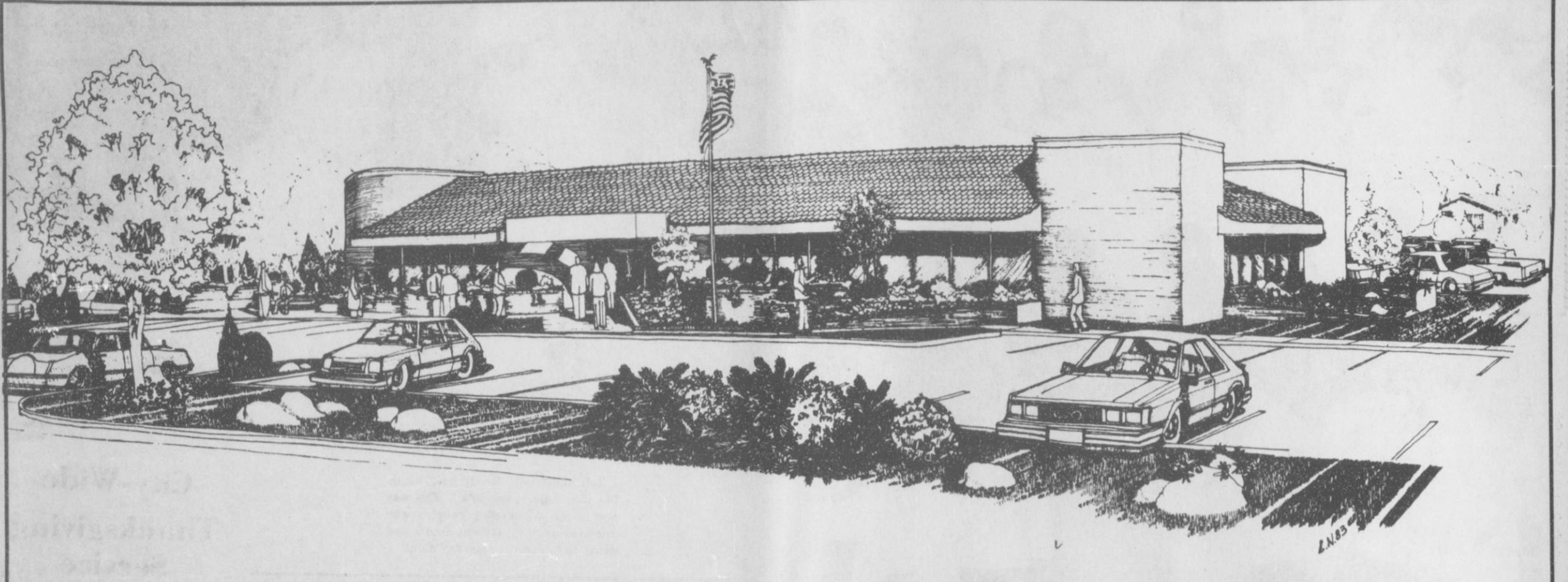
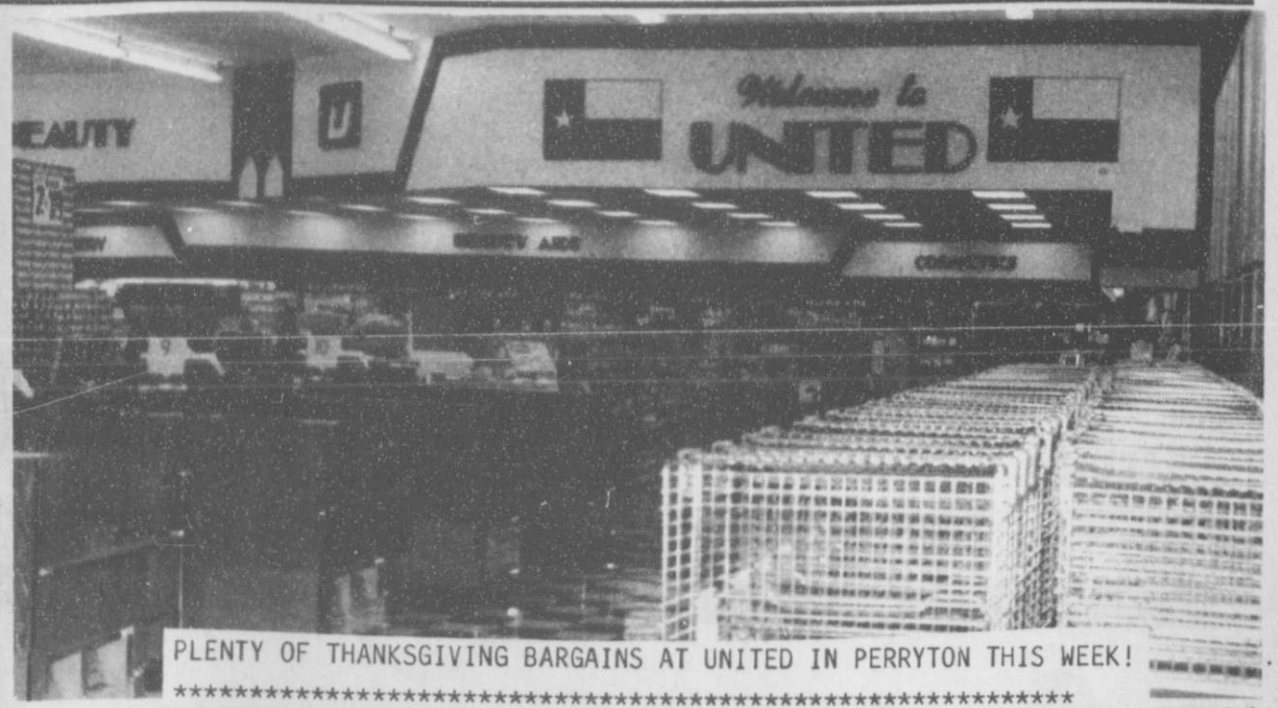

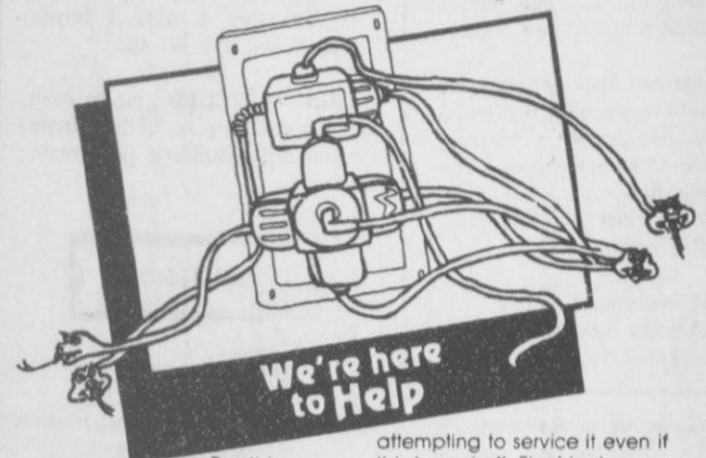

"I'M AN UMP; I TRY HARD, BUT I CAN'T DO A PERFECT JOB"

Donald Jensen was struck on the head by a thrown bat while umpiring a Little League game in Terre Haute, Ind. He shook off the blow, and finished working the game, but that night he went to a hospital with head pains. While being kept overnight for observation, the umpire wrote the following letter to parents of Little Leaguers everywhere:

"I'm an umpire. I don't do it for a living, but only on weekends for fun.

"I've played baseball, coached it, and watched it. But somehow nothing takes the place of umpiring. Maybe I feel deep down that I am providing a fair chance for all kids to play the game without disagreements and arguments. But there is one thing that bothers me about my job. Some of you folks don't understand why I'm there.

"Some of you feel I'm there to exert authority over your son. For that reason, you often yell at me or encourage your son to yell when I make a mistake. How many of you really understand that I try to be perfect? I try not to make a mistake.

"I don't want your son to feel he got a bad deal from an umpire.

"Yet, no matter how hard I try, I can't be perfect. I counted the number of calls I made in a six-inning game today. The total number of decisions on balls and strikes or safes and outs was 146.

"I tried my best to get them all right, but I'm sure I missed some. I could have missed eight calls today and still got about 95% right. In most occupations that percentage would be considered excellent.

"Let me tell you more about my game today. There was one close call that ended the game. A runner for the home team was trying to steal the plate on a passed ball. The catcher chased the ball down and threw to the pitcher covering the plate. The pitcher made the tag and I called the runner out.

"As I was getting my equipment to leave, I overheard one of the parents comment, 'It's too bad the kids have to lose games because of rotten umpires. That was one of the louisiest calls I've ever seen.'

"Later, at the concession stand, a couple of kids were telling their friends, 'Boy, the umpires were lousy today. They lost the game for us.' Well, I heard that and felt terrible. Those kids had made a lot of mistakes which had cost them runs.

"A parent or adult leader who lets a child blame his failures on an umpire is doing the worst kind of injustice to that youngster. That irresponsibility is bound to carry over to future years.

"As I sit here writing this letter I am no longer upset as I was this afternoon. At one point I wanted to quit umpiring behind the plate for a pitcher who pantomimed his displeasure at any close call.

"One could sense that he wanted the crowd to realize that he was a talented player who was doing his best to get along, and that I was a black-hearted villian who was working against him. This kid continued for two innings at the same time yelling at his own players' mistakes.

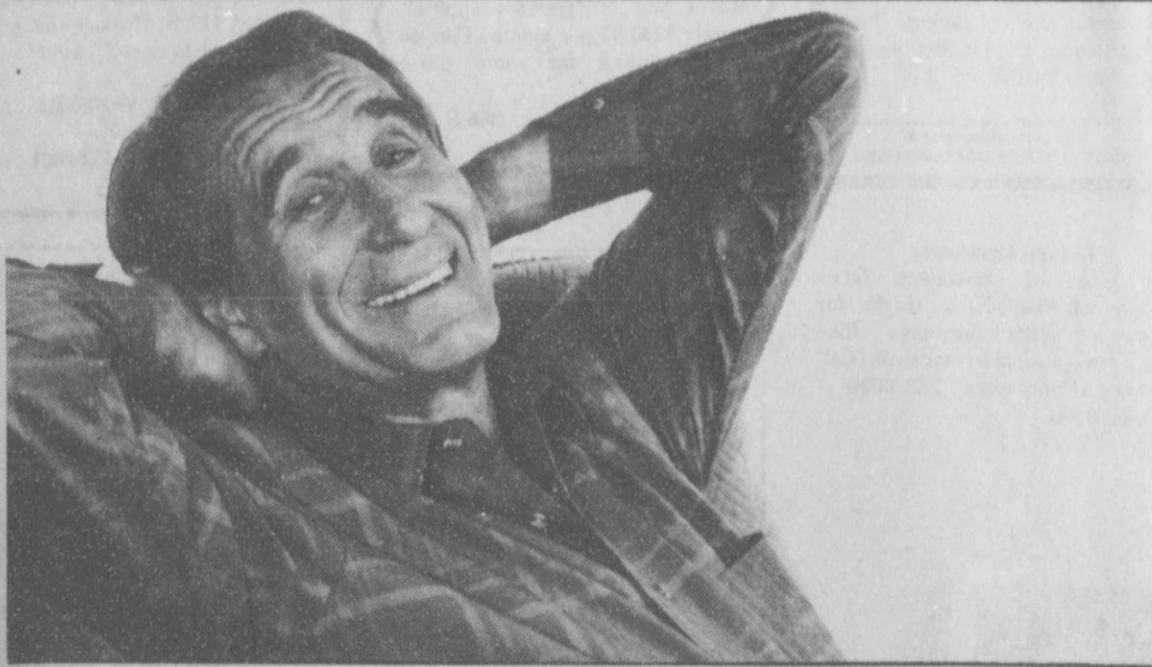
"For two innings the manager watched this. When the kid returned to the dugout to bat in the top of the third, the manager called him aside. In a voice that I was able to overhear, he said: 'Listen, Son, it is time you made a decision. You can be an umpire, an actor, or a pitcher. But you can be only one at a time when you are playing for me.'

"Right now it is your job to pitch and basically you are doing a lousy job. Leave the acting to the actor, the umpiring to the umpire, or you won't do any pitching here."

"Needless to say, the kid chose the pitching route, and went on to win the game. When the game was over the kid followed me to my car. Fighting to keep back the tears, he apologized for his actions and thanked me for umpiring the game. He said that he had learned a lesson that he would not forget.

"I can't help but wonder how many more young men are missing their chance to develop into outstanding ball players because their parents encourage them to spend time umpiring, rather than working harder to play the game."

(The following morning, Donald Jensen, part-time umpire, died of a brain concussion resulting from the blow by the thrown bat.)

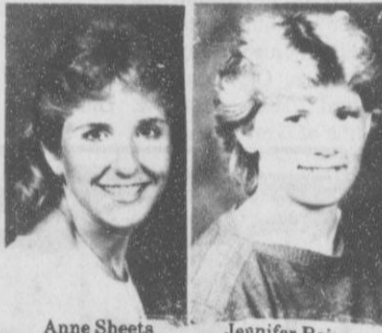

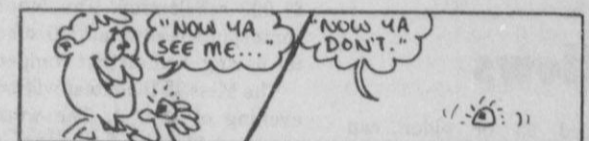

1987 Arbor Day Kits

To help Texas teachers and organizations conduct Arbor Day programs, the Texas Forest Service is again offering free program kits.

Each kit includes a loblolly pine seed packet with planting instructions, program aids for a local Arbor Day observance, suggested classroom activities for teachers, and a copy of the governor's proclamation.

Arbor Day is to be observed on Friday, Jan. 16, 1987 in Texas. It was first celebrated in Texas in 1889. Since 1949 it has been observed annually in Texas on the third Friday in January, although dates vary in other states. The purpose of the event is to promote a greater appreciation of the beauty and value of forests and trees in both rural and urban settings.

The official state observance for 1987 will be held in Euless. The public is invited to attend the state celebration, and hundreds of other public events will honor Arbor Day in other Texas locales.

State Property Tax Board News

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the local appraisal district office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead, according to Ron Patterson, executive director of The State Property Tax Board. To stop a delinquent tax suit, Patterson explained, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner can't lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Patterson said.

Once an homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes on the homestead as long as that person owns it and lives there.

Patterson stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. "During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent penalties and interest continue to add up," he said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax, penalty and interest."

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available from the chief appraiser of the county in which the over-65 taxpayer lives. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Patterson said.

Program chairpersons and teachers should address requests for Arbor Day kits (limited one per class) to: Texas Forest Service, College Station, Tx. 77843-2136. Distribution, on a first-come, first-serve basis, begins in mid November.

Shriners help make 'miracles'

(Editor's note: The Wheatheart Shrine is best known for the thousands of people that are fed by the members each year. But, all that fund raising is for a very worth cause—burned and crippled children. This is the first of a two part series about the Shrine Hospitals for Crippled Children and the children that are treated there.)

Over the last five years, almost a hundred crippled Panhandle children have had their lives changed by the Shrine Kiva Temple. Each has taken an expense paid trip to one of the best orthopedic hospitals in the world and have returned home ready to grow as normal children.

Since the early 1920's, the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children in Houston, one of 19 national Shrine orthopedic units in the nation, has been providing care for children suffering from polio, scoliosis (curvature of the spine), osteogenesis imperfecta (brittle bone disease), spina bifida, club foot, rickets, hand and back problems.

The current forty bed facility operates on a \$4 million budget each year and sees over 5,000 patients either in the hospital or on an outpatient basis. The costs are low because the medical doctors on staff donate their time to the hospital. "Most of our doctors are not Shriners," said hospital administrator Eleanor Jackson. "They are interested in the children and work for free to keep our costs low, so that we may serve more children."

The medical staff is not the only thing that patients get free of charge. The Shriners pay all medical expenses associated with the treatment of a patient of the hospital. "We do not accept any insurance, federal or state funding," said Jackson. "The \$68,000 Shriners in the United States raise money through dues and special projects to fund this and the other hospitals."

Jackson went on to say that once a child is admitted to the hospital that they could be in treatment for years to come in the case of a serious disease. "We continue to provide for the patient. We do not drop care," promised Jackson.

With a treatment success ratio as high as 90 percent, the Crippled Childrens Hospital has 441 patients on the waiting list for treatment. "We try to help as many as possible through the hospital but we are limited by the space available. It is our goal to expand our services so that more children can be helped. Currently we are increasing the number of patients that we can see on an outpatient basis," said Jackson.

Over 60 percent of the patients of the hospital come from Texas, 30 percent are from Mexico and the remainder are from the rest of the United States and other countries. Cerebral palsy is the disease that is most seen by the staff followed by club foot. "About 51 percent of the children we treat have a disease that is genetically caused," said Jackson.

The hospital is well equipped for treatment of osteopathic disorders. In the basement of the complex there is a fully equipped machine shop that manufactures braces for the children. "We build 60 to 80 braces a month in the shop," said prosthesis technician, Todd Denson. "Some of the more complicated ones take many hours of fitting and construction before they are ready for the patient to use."

To help doctors diagnose and treat walking disorders the hospital has installed a high-tech gait laboratory to measure the children's walk before and after treatment. Sensors are placed, with adhesives, to the hip, knee, ankle and foot joints of the child and he walks in front of five infrared cameras. Each motion of the joint is recorded in three dimensions and analyzed by a sophisticated computer program.

"We can see the progress that the child is making by comparing beginning tests with recent tests," said gait lab technician Nancy Scarbrough.

In some cases braces, physical and occupational therapy is not enough to correct the problem. The hospital performs 40 to 45 operations a month to correct osteopathic problems. "This is one of the few hospitals in the United States that does microvascular surgery on children," said Dr. John E. Williams. "We have the facilities to do nerve and bone transplants in children."

Williams described on case where a young boy had lost his thumb in an accident. "We remove a bone from his foot and attached it to his hand to make a new thumb for the child," said Dr. Williams. "The surgery took over twenty hours to complete, but the child is able to use his hand again."

As with the rest of the medical staff, the surgeons that perform the delicate operations donate their time and skills to the hospital. The head of the medical staff is Dr. Tom Caine, the team physician for the Houston Oilers.

"Orthopedic problems are not life threatening," said Jackson, "but they are disabilities that the child must overcome. You can not put a

price on what this hospital does. We have had children come here that were told that they would never walk again and they walk out of the hospital.

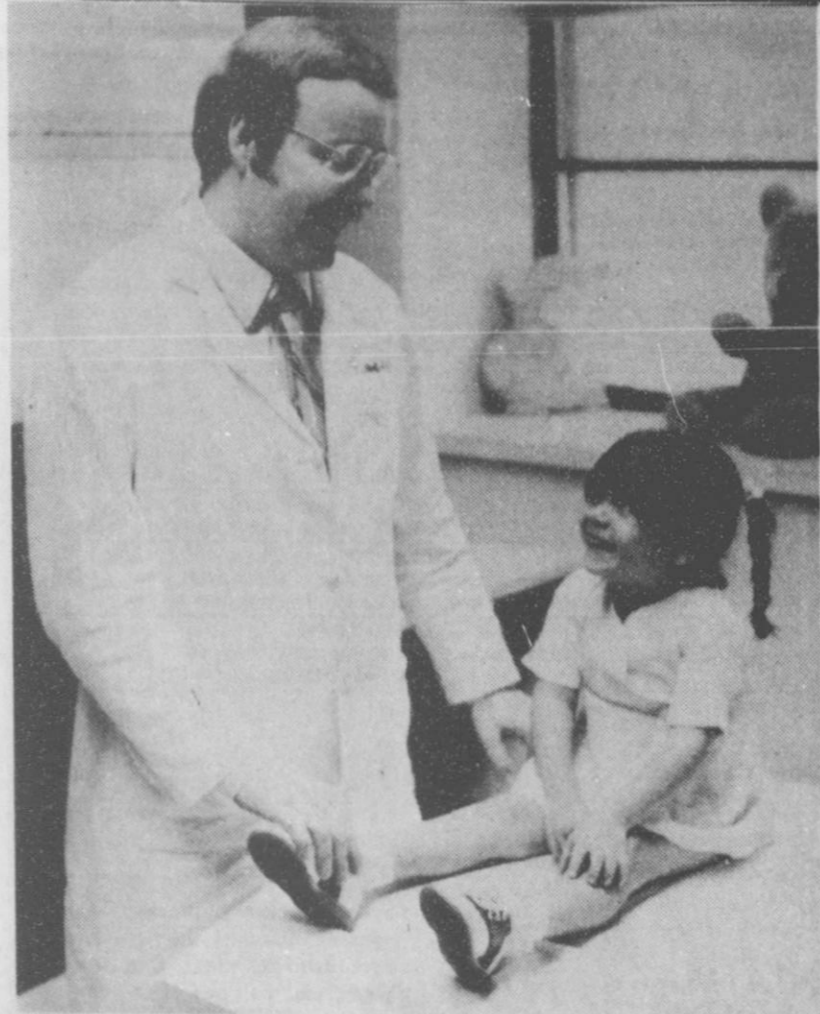
"Three years ago my daughter had surgery for a brain tumor that left the left side of her face paralyzed. Now, after treatment by this hospital, she is leading a normal life," said Jackson.

"In my eleven years with the Shriners Crippled Childrens Hospital I have seen a lot of miracles," said Jackson. "My hope is that we can reach children that we are not reaching now."

Children admitted to the hospital do not have to be the children of Shriners or related to a Shriner. The hospital will treat any child sponsored by a

Shriner. "If there is a child in need," said Jackson, "we will find a Shriner to sponsor that child."

The local Wheatheart Shriners have provided transportation to and from the Houston hospital for local children. Last year they spent over \$28,000 transporting children for treatment.

The legend, inscribed on a statue of a Shriner holding a crippled child outside the hospital, tells the belief of the Shriners organization. "No man stands so tall as when he stoops to help a crippled child."

The Spearman Rotary club is selling \$5 chances on a new CAMCORDER--which will be given away before Christmas.

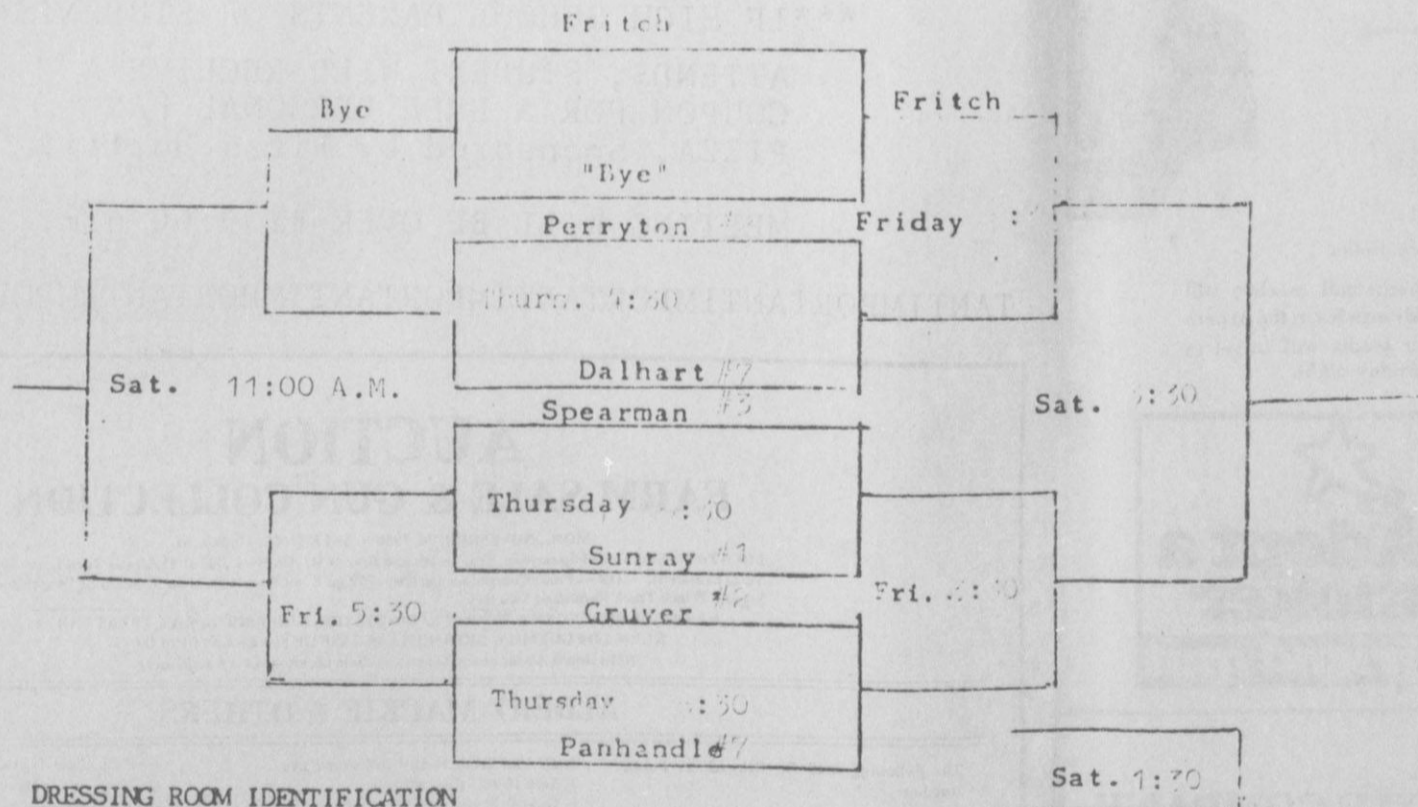

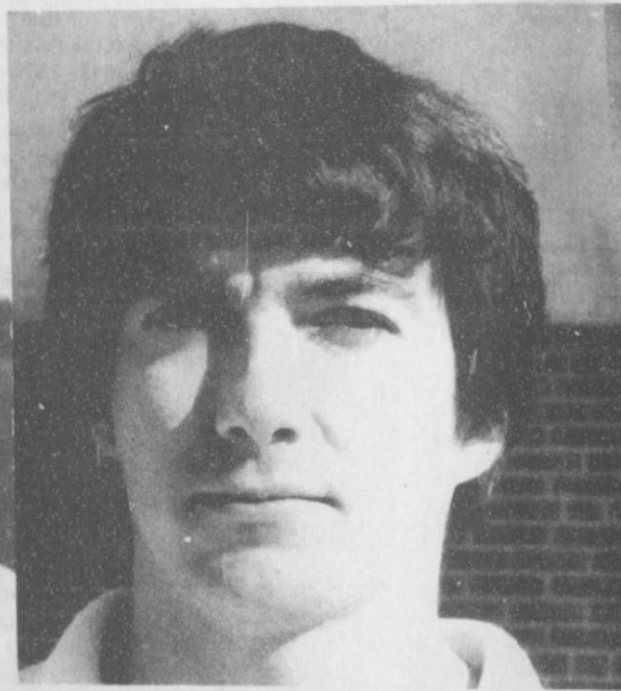
