
### Varsity

Not much Paw, Not much Power, but we will regroup and work on our mistakes. Penalties and mistakes kept the Lynx off balance, thus we were never able to muster any offense at all.

Offensively we couldn't stick to our game plan. We were always in a hole caused by a mistake, usually a penalty, and this enabled Sunray to stack their defense against us. When it is 3rd and 15, there is not much you can do to completely fool a defense. Our offensive grades were the lowest we have had all year. The team average was 39%. This is by far the lowest I've ever had and there is no possible way to overcome this unless you get unbelievable breaks.

Defensively we were a little better but couldn't take advantage of our defensive gifts. We received 6 fumbles, some with good field advantage but couldn't take advantage because of our in-effective blocking and etc. We also intercepted one pass and had 3 individuals grade high

enough to get recognized on defense. Matt Tucker recovered 2 fumbles and made 4 unassisted tackles to lead the defense with a score of 65, which is high enough to get him a star for his defensive guard effort. Dusty Hill made 2 unassisted tackles and blocked an extra point to come in second in receiving a star on defense while Will Black graded high enough to get a star also. Will intercepted one pass and had 2 un-assisted tackles. Scott Swan and David Cazarez were 2 and 3 respectively on our defense with scores of 42 and 40.

This week we are in preparation to meet the Stratford Elks. This is our first district game and it will be very challenging because they do so much with so little. They have only 19 suited out but all contribute to a winning cause. They have several gifted athletes and some size also. They do what they do well and make very few mistakes.

The Junior Varsity played a strong defensive game against Stinnett following the two junior high games last Thursday. After the loss to Gruver, the J.V. team went to work and trained hard for the Rattlers. Hard work payed off in a 12 to 6 victory over Stinnett. The Lynx's two touchdowns were made on running plays. One was made by #33 Pete Saenz and the other was made by #44 Mark Garcia. Extra point attempts by both teams failed. The J.V. team will play Stratford this Thursday at Stratford.

The Spearman 7th graders played an exciting game against the Stinnett Rattlers last Thursday in Stinnett. The entire game was a defensive battle. The only score of the game came on a running play by #44 Darian Hawkins, when he scampered across the goal line. This Thursday's game will be played in Stratford, with the kick-off time at 5:00 p.m.





# 1987 National Spelling Bee

Students in all public and parochial schools are invited to participate in the 1987 National Spelling Bee, co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University.

The Scripps Howard Newspaper, national sponsors, set the rules and limit participation to a student who will not be older than 16 by the end of the current school year or in a grade higher than the eighth.

Directors in the 46 counties assigned the AGN and WTSU have been named and are responsible for eliminations in their respective counties.

Serving as director for Hansford County will be Roy Harris, superintendent, Pringle-Morse Consolidated Independent School District, Morse.

Each county champion must be named by Mar. 14 in order to take part in the 1987 Regional Bee to be held on the WTSU campus on Apr. 11. Vying for the 1987 Regional title will be 46 young people from parts of the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas.

The 1987 district champion will go to Washington, D.C. in early June to compete in the National Spelling Bee. The trip, for two, will be provided by the Amarillo Globe-News.

There will be other awards for some of the top district finalists.

Bee coordinator is Gene Parker, director of placement, WTSU.

"Those of us at West Texas State who assist in this out-standing program praise the Amarillo Globe-News for making this program available to our young people. The benefits certainly are a plus and we commend the newspaper for their great support in education," Parker said.

Most schools use the booklet, "Words of the Champions", containing more than 3,000 total words (an increase of 500 new words). The 1987 issue of this book is priced at only 50-cents each and is available from Jeanne Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166.

Orders may be placed by individuals or schools.

Additional information about the Bee is available from the county director, Parker, or Mrs. Bartlett.

Most county directors hold a Junior Bee for the younger students in grades six and under. These Junior champs will also be guests at the regional competition, but will not spell unless he or she is named county winner.

Special recognition will be given the County Junior Champions.

## Preparing for the ACT Assessment

As the new school year begins, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to take the ACT Assessment.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

Most students take the ACT Assessment during junior year or early in senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

High School guidance offices have the information and forms students need to register for the ACT Assessment. ACT also provides free copies of the booklet, **Preparing for the ACT Assessment**, which contains information about getting ready for the examination, plus a complete practice test.

The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$10.50. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10.00 late handling fee. For 1986-87, ACT has established this test date schedule:

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. The Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. It focuses on interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and the institutions and agencies the student specifies.

The ACT Assessment is a major service of The American College Testing Program, which has national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa.

## 4-H Program Continues Vital Role

COLLEGE STATION—No one can question the fact that young people are the future of America, and the 4-H program is continuing to play a vital role in preparing youth for the future by providing training in leadership, citizenship and coping skills.

Thus the theme of the upcoming National 4-H Week, Oct. 5-13, "4-H for Youth for America," points to this country's richest resource, its young people, says H.T. "Tom" Davison, state 4-H leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. The Extension Service is the parent organization of the 4-H program, an informal, out-of-school educational program for youth between the ages of 9 and 19 that is based around local clubs.

"Through 4-H we try to provide youth with opportunities to learn and experience what life has to offer, Davison points out. "We also lay the groundwork to help 4-H members explore opportunities for personal growth and to gain skills that will be useful in later life."

Texas boasts 203,585 4-H members. Nationwide, 4-H is more than 4.3 million members strong. Looking at the Texas 4-H enrollment, there are 105,541 girls and 98,044 boys. Some 37,000 members live on farms, with almost 100,000 residing in suburbs and cities with a population of more than 50,000.

Adult volunteer leaders are the backbone of the 4-H program as they provide the organizational leadership for local 4-H clubs as well as

training and resources in a host of subject-matter areas. Some 600,000 volunteer leaders support the 4-H program nationwide, with more than 16,000 of those in Texas. Davison estimates that the time, travel and support contributed by these volunteer leaders across the U.S. is valued at more than \$1 billion a year.

Looking at the 4-H program in Texas, Davison notes that the most popular project area is foods and nutrition, which boasts 43,700 members. Other popular project areas include energy, 30,500 members; embryology, 20,300 members; health (eye care), 16,700 members; are safety, 15,300 members.

The number of 4-H clubs and special interest groups in the state total 3,335.

## Home Economics Briefs

**HOUSEHOLD INVENTORY HELPS WITH INSURANCE CLAIMS-** Having an inventory of household items can save the stressful and frustrating job of having to piece together what was stolen or destroyed in a natural disaster. "People tend to remember conspicuous items, such as a chair, television or videotape recorder," says family economic specialist Dr. Marjorie Marman. "But most homes also have dozens of small items whose value adds up to a considerable loss." After a fire or theft, it may also be difficult to think clearly enough to remember everything that was lost or stolen, adds the Texas Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

**MAKING A HOUSEHOLD INVENTORY-** Keeping a household inventory to use for insurance purposes in case of theft or natural disaster is not difficult. Texas Agricultural Extension Service family economics specialist Dr. Marjorie Marman offers these suggestions for setting up an inventory:

oWalk through each room of the house and list every item. Be as

descriptive as possible about the items.

oTake pictures to supplement the descriptions.

oKeep original receipts on all purchases and get appraisals on jewelry and silverware.

oUpdate your inventory regularly to include new purchases.

oStore the inventory, pictures and receipts in a safe-deposit box or some other location away from your home. If you keep your inventory on a home computer, make a copy of the disk to store in a separate location.

**CALORIE COUNTING AND FROZEN FRUIT BARS-** Frozen fruit bars have become the latest dieter's delight. But are they actually a "low-calorie" alternative to regular frozen fruit-flavored bars? According to a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist, the answer is "No." Dr. Alice Hunt points out that national brand frozen fruit bars contain from 50-80 calories per 2 1/2 ounce bar. The regular frozen fruit confections contain about 60 calories per 2 1/2 ounce bar.



### A Fall Calendar of Food Safety Tips

#### September - Go Back to School with lunches safely packed

When school starts this month, send your child to school with a satisfying, nutritious and safe lunch:

\*Fix lunch the night before. Freeze sandwiches on coarse-textured breads that won't get soggy on thawing.

\*Include a cold or frozen item or commercial gel with the packet lunch. A thermos will keep beverages cold, or pack drinks packaged in wax-paper cartons that need no refrigeration.

\*Wash out lunch boxes or totes every night. Never use a bag that is wet or stained for packing a lunch; it could contain bacteria that might contaminate food.

#### October - Fight Food Poisoning at Tailgate Parties or Covered Dish Suppers

Cooler weather doesn't guarantee food safety.

\*Use a thermos to transport a hot supper. Check the seal to be sure it fits tightly. Rinse the thermos with boiling water right before use. Heat foods to boiling before filling the thermos.

\*A thoroughly cooked casserole will usually stay safe (and warm) in cool weather if well insulated. Try several layers of aluminum wrap, followed by newspapers, and a towel. Discard any leftovers.

#### November - Let's Talk Turkey

\*Always thaw frozen poultry in the refrigerator or covered with cold water outside the refrigerator. Change water frequently.

\*Turkeys should be stuffed just prior to cooking.

\*Cook turkeys to 180 degrees F. internal temperature; stuffing should reach 160 degrees F. always completely roast a turkey at one time at an oven temperature of at least 325 degrees. F.

#### December - Let Food Safety be the Centerpiece of your Holiday Buffet

Buffet entertaining is great for the holidays when friends and relatives drop by. But be sure to follow these food safety tips:

\*Never allow perishable foods to stay out longer than 2 hours.

\*Keep buffet servings small and replenish the empty serving dishes as needed with food that is hot or cold.

\*Heated serving dishes should keep cooked food at least 140 degrees F.



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## 40,000th Echocardiogram Given at Children's Hospital

Three-month-old Christina Phelps, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Matt Phelps of Muleshoe and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Gressett of Spearman, was the 40,000th recipient of an echocardiogram at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

An echocardiogram is a painless, nonpenetrating test which scans the heart's internal structure, valves, veins and arteries while checking velocity of blood flow in and around the heart.

The echocardiogram showed that the heart murmur, which was found in Christina on a routine visit to her pediatrician, was innocent and there was no heart disease.

## FARM SAFETY

September 21-27 is National Farm Safety Week and Southwestern Public Service Company once again is reminding area farmers and ranchers to be especially careful when working around electricity.

"While power lines carry needed electricity to farms and ranches," said SPS safety manager Bill Greaser, "even the slightest contact with these lines can injure or kill."

In this part of the country, irrigation pipes coming into contact with power lines is the leading cause of electricity-related farm injuries and deaths, Greaser said.

"Irrigation pipe can be a deadly conductor of electricity," he said. "If someone lifts a tall section of pipe into an overhead line, he could be severely burned or electrocuted."

"But, any equipment with parts that extend high enough to touch power lines can create a danger," Greaser added. "Be especially careful when using a combine, cotton stripper or module builder, portable grain auger, skid steer loader, bale wagon, or any other equipment whose parts are tall enough to come into contact with a power line. When working on the farm, play it safe and always look up for power lines."

SPS continually stresses the need to "watch up for safety," a message that is emphasized in informational materials offered by the Company to area farmers and ranchers. These materials are available from any SPS office.

Southwestern Public Service Company provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-square-mile area of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

## School board members will attend meeting

The Annual Joint Convention of the Texas Association of School Administrators and the Texas Association of School Boards will be held Friday, September 26th thru Monday, September 29th at the Henry B. Gonzales Convention Center in San Antonio. Many school superintendents and board members from member districts throughout the state will be in attendance, including several from the local area school districts. Each school district may appoint one board member delegate to attend the convention proceedings on Saturday, where proposals submitted by member districts during the year are presented and voted on. The proposals generally focus on changes in school law the two associations support, lobby for and strongly encourage the legislature to pass, for the improvement and benefit of our students and schools. Supplemental to the convention, as in years past, administrators and board members may select a large variety of training and information seminars to attend. As a result of recent school reform laws, board members must acquire at least 20 hours of approved training prior to elections in the spring of 1988, and at least 6 hours each year thereafter. In addition to the pre-convention seminar on Friday, 21 of the

103 seminars offered during 11 sessions on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, are approved as specific training for board members. With a full schedule of selected seminars, a board member can acquire up to 13 hours credit toward the 20 hour requirement.

As specified by law, training must encompass the 12 standards defined by the Texas Education Agency, including ethics - board/supt. roles - communication - policy - goals - curriculum - finance - law - personnel - board meetings and training. The other 82 seminars range in subject from supplements to the 12 standards, to drug abuse, child abuse and neglect, accreditation, federal programs, construction, parental and community involvement, tutorial programs, vocational education, and a multitude of their school related subjects. In addition three general sessions on Sunday morning, Sunday night, and noon Monday for all in attendance, will feature guest speakers. They are to be actor Hugh O'Brien, Incumbent Governor Mark White, and Past Governor, gubernatorial Candidate, Bill Clements.
