### **ACP LOANS NOW** AVAILABLE

farmers of Hansford county, the Farm Security Administration will make immediate loans to those who are complying with the Agri. Con. program so they may have funds to undertake needed protection of their lands from wind executed. from wind erosion.

Farmers unable to participate in the 1939 AAA soil conservation program because of lack of funds for material may now secure FSA funds for this work.

Loans will be made up to 60 percent of the AAA payment. The entire amount of the loan must be used for necessities to prepare the land for a crop.

prepare the land for a crop, which will also serve as a wind which will also serve as a which erosion prevention crop, such as aorghums, millets and sudan grass. These necessities can in-clude machinery, gasoline, oil or other supplies.

In order to be eligible for the FSA loan, an applicant must be recommended by the AAA counthe standay-monday committee and be unable to secure the necessary credit elsewhere, said Winfred H. Fowler, and the FSA's policy of making loans only to farmers unable to secure credit from any other source. The borrower who can get financing when he needs it from any source is not eligible for FSA loans. The farmers also must agree not to execute an assignment of their execute an assignment of their

payment other than to the FSA. Thirty-six hundred farmers in Region 12 last year took advan-tage of these loans. They bor-rowed a total of \$712,292 which was used for soil conservation practices and repaid from ACP

Detailed information about the loans can be obtained from the FSA office in the Hansford court house or from the local ACP committee.

## Plans To Mobilize For War On 'Hoppers Made Friday

means within a few weeks to be-gin a fight to kill grasshoppers as soon as hatching of the insects begins was planned at a conference of farmers, local of-ficials and government repres-entatives here Friday March 24.

Prompt action on the part of farmers in getting spreaders ready to begin work and to get county mixing stations ready for operation on an expanded scale to turn out the larger volume of poison expected to be used this

year was strongly urged.
That the county is fixed with a serious hopper problem was pointed out by W. J. Spicer, gov-ernment entomologist, who, with District Agent Parker Hanna attended the meeting here and other similar meetings in the 23 Panhandle counties faced with

the brunt of the infestation.
Egg counts made by entomologists during the winter indicate that Hansford county is in an area which might suffer a loss from 10 to 40 percent because

of the hoppers.

Hanna, who presided at the meeting reported that under the provisions made over the Panhandle to combat the hoppers

to report on locations of hatch-ing beds of the hoppers so that poison may be spread and later check up on the effectiveness of

the poison.
Under normal conditions most of the hoppers will hatch out within 30 to 45 days after hatching starts. Spicer expressed. Last year an uneven hatch kept young hoppers coming on up

## South of Gruver Is Report Coming In

Good rains and snow which averaged well above 2 inches fell over Hansford county Mon-day night and Tuesday. The high spot for moisture reported to Spearman was a small strip a-bout 15 miles wide South of Gruver. Buster Cator reported approximately 2 inches rain and snow in this area, with an inch rain and snow measuring .50 at

In Spearman the moisture recorded a total of 1.10 inches rainfall Monday night measured .65 inch and the snow added a 45 inch and the show added a 45 inch moisture, according to the records of Fred Brandt, U. S. Weather Observer. Moisture coming at this time places wheat producers in the

most favorable position of many years. In places over the county wheat had begun to suffer from wheat had begun to suffer from lack of moisture. ## **ACP LOANS NOW** AVAILABLE

In effort to further assist the farmers of Hansford county, the Farm Security Administration will make immediate loans to those who are complying with the Agri. Con. program so they may have funds to undertake needed protection of their lands from wind erosion.

Farmers unable to participate in the 1939 AAA soil conserva-tion program because of lack of funds for material may now se-

cure FSA funds for this work.

Loans will be made up to 60 percent of the AAA payment. The entire amount of the loan must be used for necessities to prepare the land for a crop, which will also serve as a wind erosion prevention crop, such as sorghums, millets and sudan grass. These necessities can include machinery, gasoline, oil or other supplies.

In order to be eligible for the FSA loan, an applicant must be recommended by the AAA county committee and be unable to secure the necessary credit elsewhere, said Winfred H. Fowler, local FSA supervisor. This is in line with the FSA's policy of making loans only to farmers unable to secure credit from any other source. The borrower who can get financing when he needs it from any source is not cligible for FSA loans. The farmers also must agree not to execute an assignment of their payment other than to the FSA. FSA loan, an applicant must be recommended by the AAA coun-

Thirty-six hundred farmers in Region 12 last year took advan-tage of these loans. They bor-rowed a total of \$712,292 which was used for soil conservation


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


