

As this bill has not been up for a vote, no plans were made to count on these funds, but, it was pointed out, that the additional money would lighten the cost to counties and farmers.

Over the entire area an estimated 13,428 tons of poison mash will be needed this year, compared to 5,661 tons used last year, if the insects are to be stopped.

Most farmers no longer fear the loss of livestock by the proper use of the poison, those present Friday expressed. Spiced quoted figures showing that a cow would have to lick up all the poison on 2-3 of an acre in a day

to get enough to be fatal or drink 1,200 gallons of running off water from land covered with poison in a day to be fatal. Hansford county used 451 tons of bran in 1938 and will need 1,463 tons in 1939, with 73 spreaders to be built.

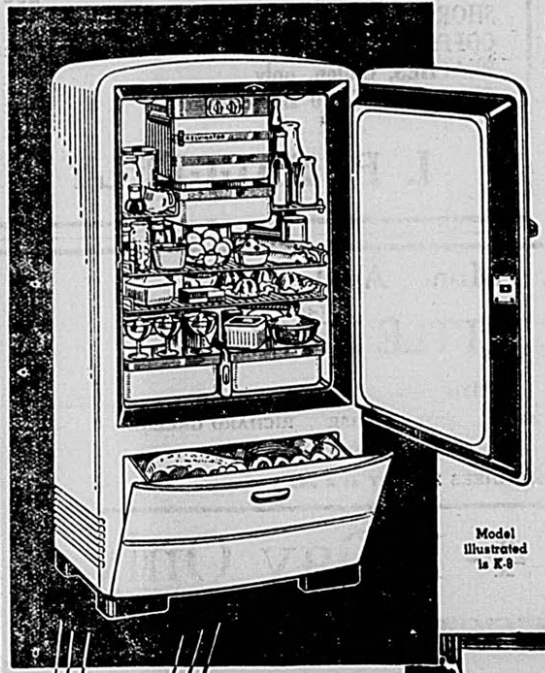

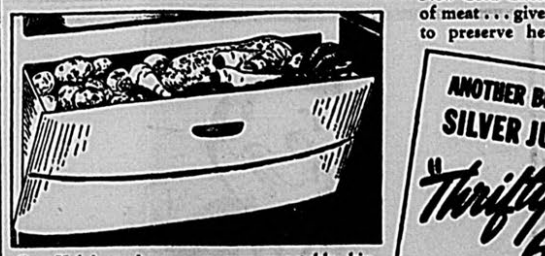
