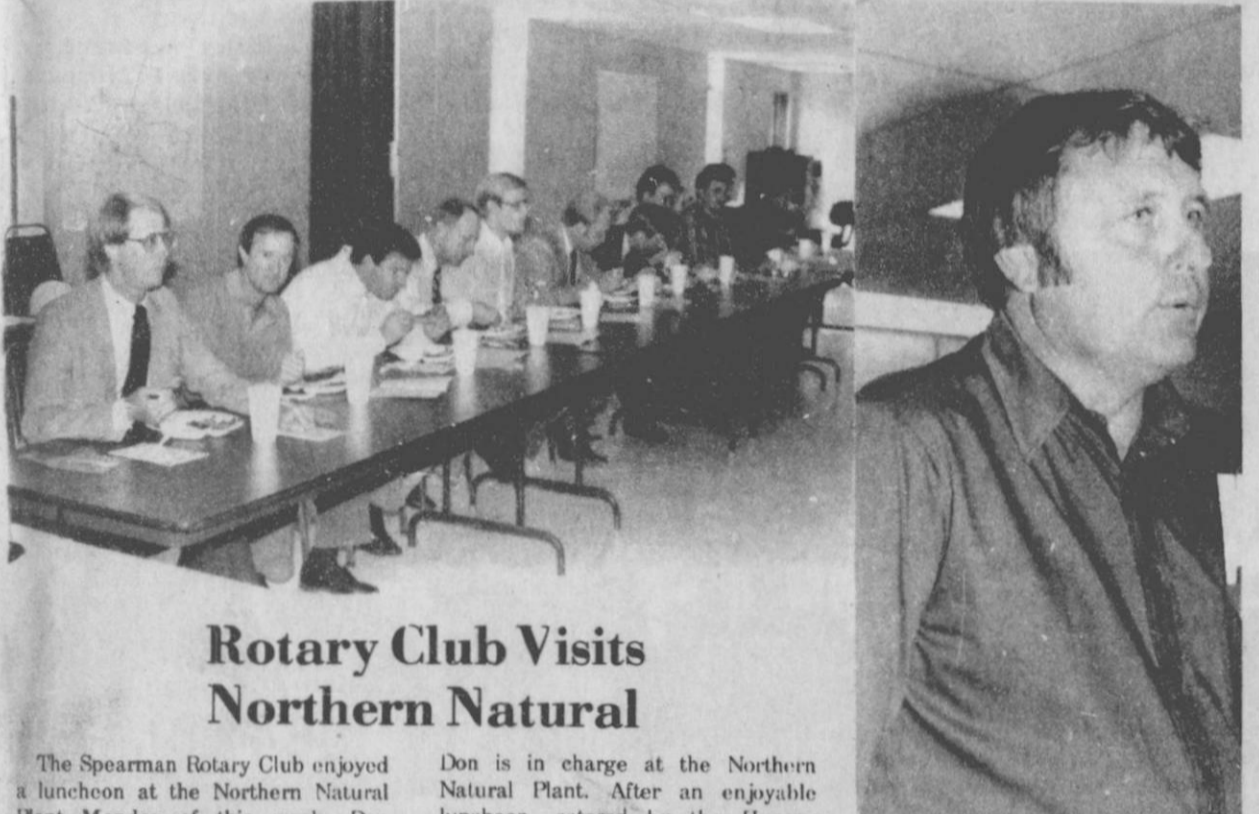

The Spearman Lynx and the Stratford Elks locked horns in a defensive game Friday night at Lynx Stadium. Both teams had 13 first downs and only 27 yards seperated them in yards gained. The kicking of Stratford's quarterback #11 Doug Pittman was the deciding factor of the game. Pittman hit two field goals in the first quarter. Also during the first quarter the Lynx's #45 Dusty Hill was injured and was unable to return to the game. The second quarter was scoreless and the teams went to the locker rooms with Stratford leading 6 to 0.

This Lynx used his jinx as he scored a touch down against the Stratford Elks here Friday. The Lynx will travel

On Stratford's first possession of the third quarter, they threatened to score. From Spearman's 37 yard line Stratford found daylight on the left side. After 16 yards and only the goal line left #23 Lance Brooks was hauled down from behind by Spearman's #21 Kris York. Unable to move the ball Stratford had to settle for their third field goal. Later in the third quarter

Stratford scored again on a 4 yard run and the point after was good. Spearman massed together for a

strong scoring drive in the fourth quarter with a brilliant show of passing. #10 Brett Davis completed 4 of 5 passes for 87 yards and the touchdown. Pass completions were made to #12 Mark Garnett for 44 yards, #80 Keith Benson for 8 yards, and two to #40 Jeff Gustin for 15 yards and 20 yards. Extra point conversion failed with 2:47 left in the game. Neither of the two teams were able to get a strong drive going for the remainder of the game, and Stratford won by a 16 to 6 score.

We moved the ball well, played good defense and were able to stick to our game plan; but costly mistakes were our downfall again. We felt like

Three fumbles and three interception on our part and great field goal kicking's on Stratford's part was the offensive. We out gained them 246 yards total offense to 219, and had one good opportunity to score and didn't. Our kicking & game was greatly improved as was our passing offense. We had 128 yards receiving (7 of 13) for our best night thus far. Our rushing offense was also better. (118 yards).

Defensively we were at our best. It was led by David Cozarez, Scott Swan, Jesse Lozano, Will Black and Matt Tucker, with score of 56,47,45,30, and 28 respectively.

Offensively we graded 65% and this is up from 39% for last week against Sunray. Mike Pearson graded 80% and was followed by Kevin Nelson Mark Garnett, Brett Davis and Allen Gardiner, with a score of 77,75,74 and 70% respectively.

Dusty Hill hurt an ankle early and we got to look at some other quarter-

back, Allen Beeson and Stan Brandt. They had a very good night and should play an important part the rest of the season.

Jeff Gustin came in and caught 2 passes from his half back position. One was a touchdown, his first of the year.

I thought we should have won the game. The Lynx played well and above what we have been doing. We are getting better and everything should be falling in place. Our attitude is great and if we could reduce some of our mistakes we should have a good football team the last half of the season.

We are in preparation to meet the White Deer Bucks this Friday. They have a good unit and have a 2-2 record. They have lost to Canadian and Sunray and have beaten Claude and Clarendon. Sunray beat them 21-0 and us 19-0 so this gives you some key as to what kind of team they have.

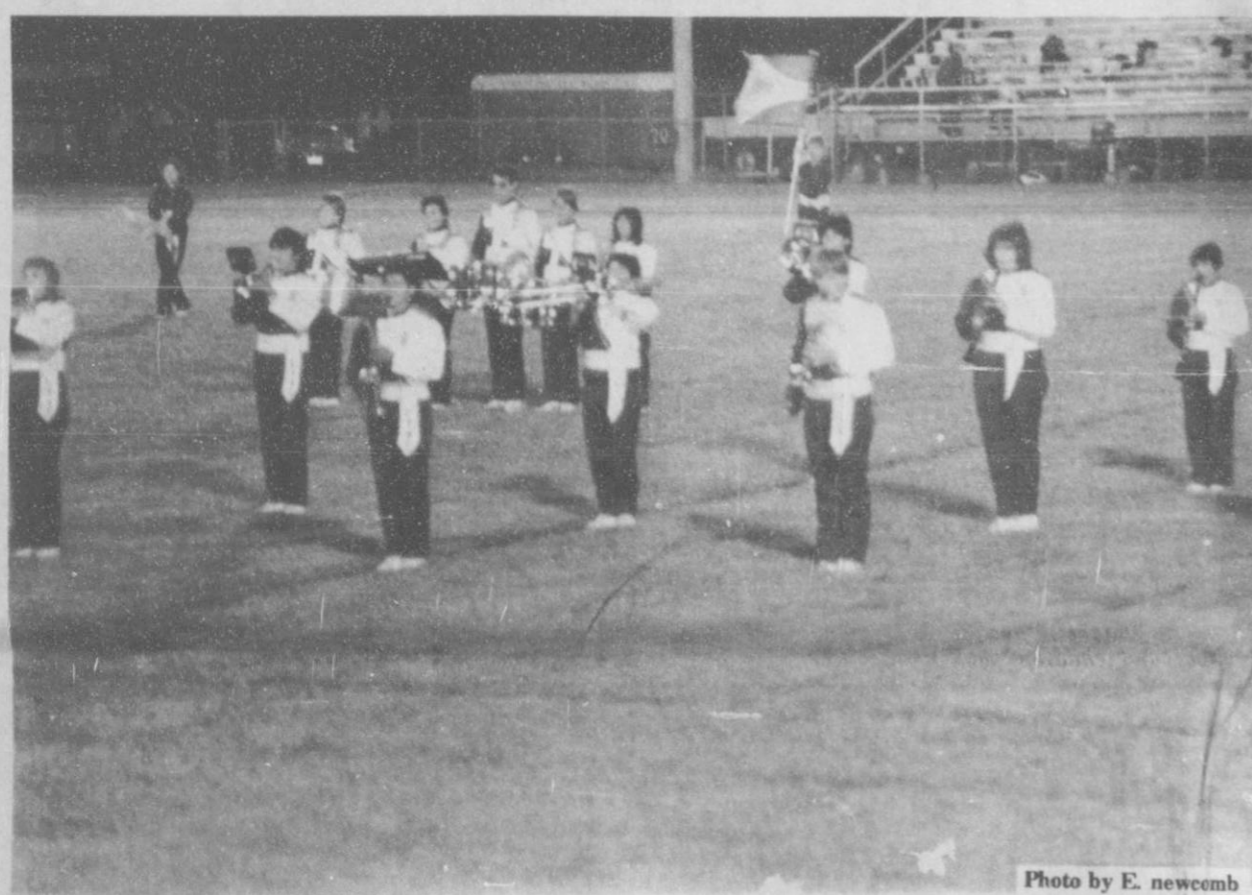

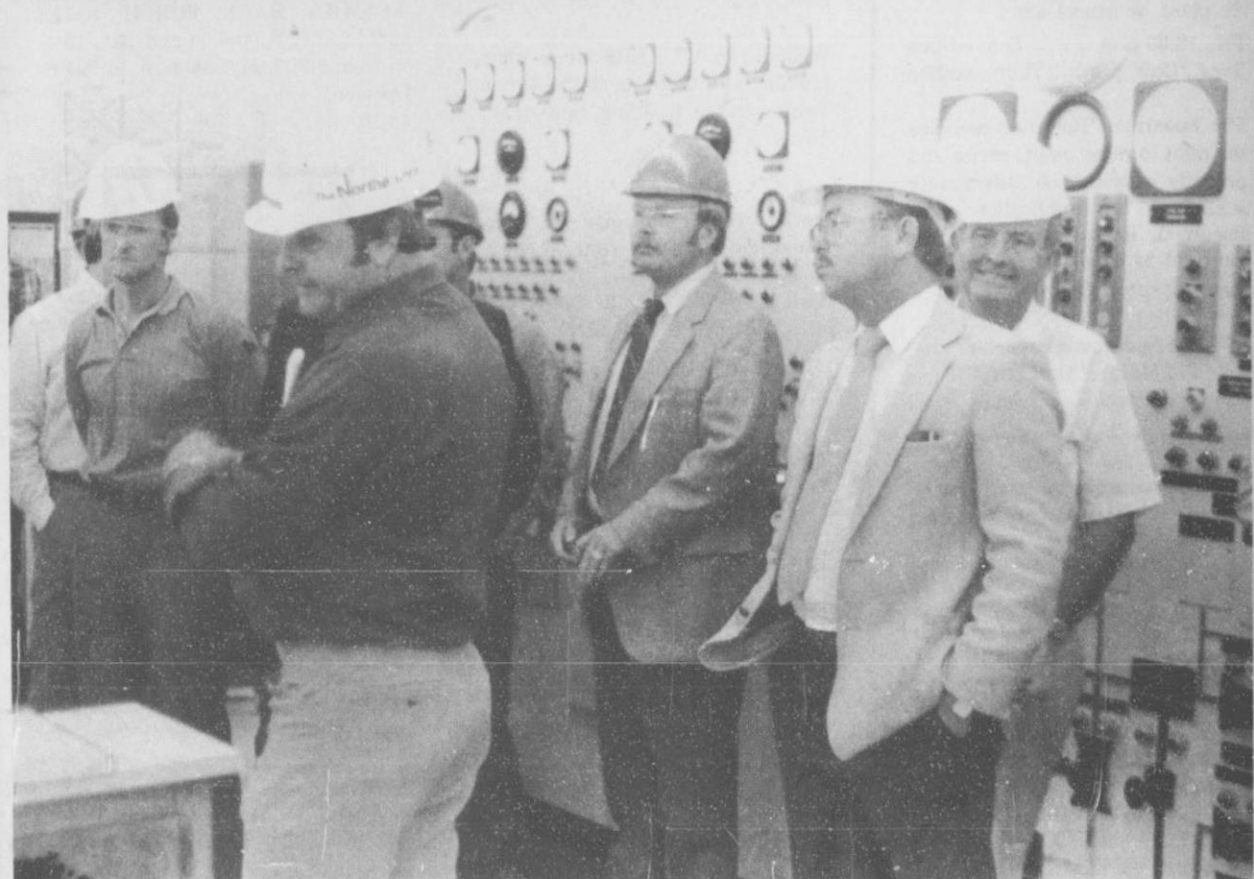
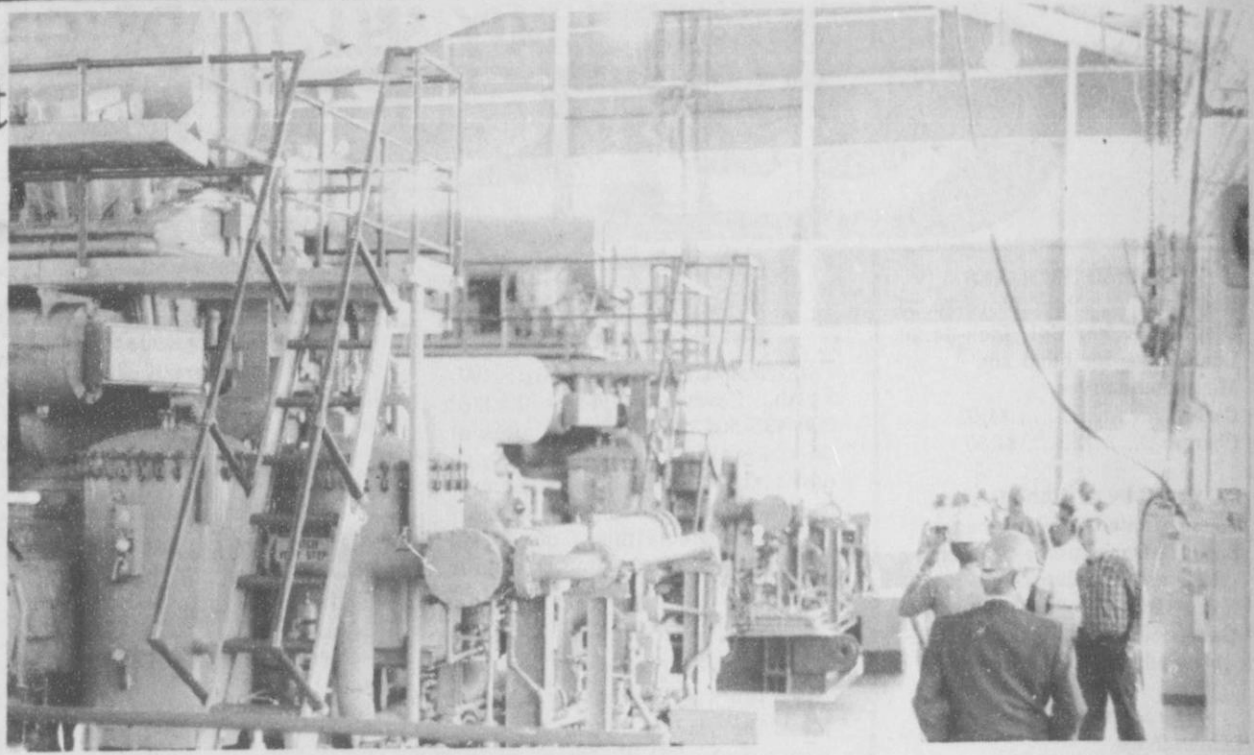
Prior to earning his medical degrees Henderson received a BA from McMurry College and a Master's degree of theology from Perkins School of Theology at SMU.

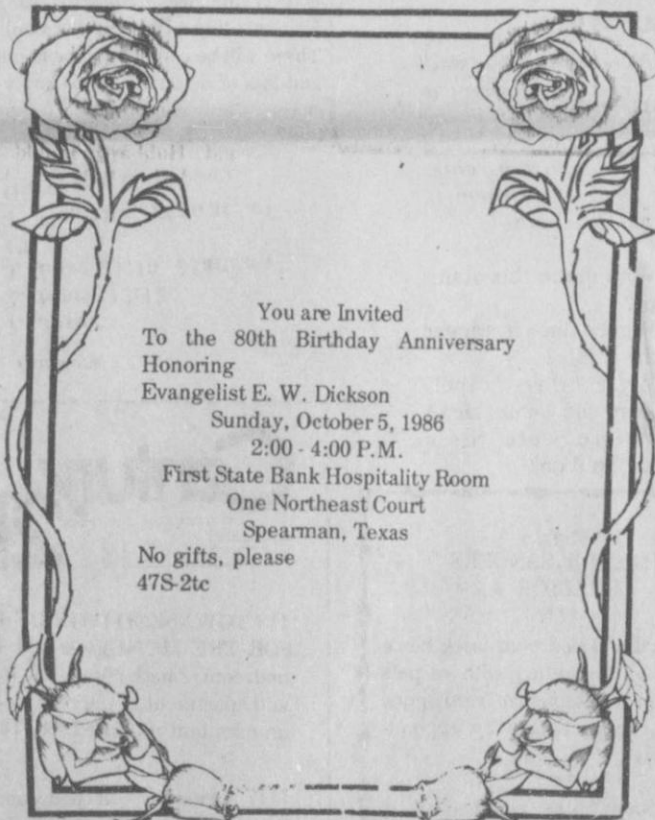

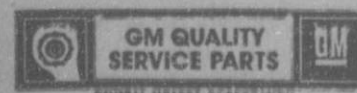

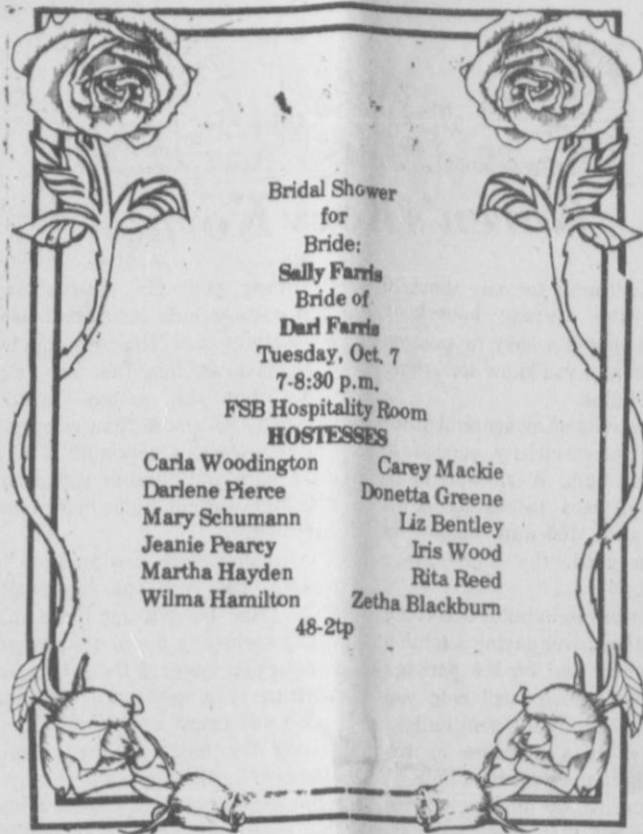

Lighting accounts for only about 10 percent of the average household electric bill, but it's easy to save on that 10 percent if you know something about light bulbs.

Watts are units of measurement for the amount of electricity needed to power a light bulb. A 200-watt bulb, for instance, uses twice as much electricity as a 100-watt bulb. The more watts used, the higher your electric bill.

Most of us buy light bulbs according to watts, without ever paying attention to the lumens listed on the package label. But the lumens will help you pick the most energy efficient bulb.

The lumen is a measure of the amount of light given off by a bulb. A bulb giving off 2,000 lumens is twice as bright as one that produces 1,000 lumens.

Now, consider both watts and lumens on different bulbs. For example, compare one 100-watt 1,750 lumen bulb to two 60-watt 870-lumen bulbs. Together, the two 60-watt consumer 20 percent more electricity than the 100-watt bulb, but produce 10 less lumens of light.

The 100-watt bulb, with more lumens per watt, is the energy-efficient choice in this situation. Your best buy will be the bulb that gives you the most lumens per watt, has the longest life and will cost the least over its life.

With these facts in mind, you should be ready to "lighten" your energy load, rather than simply grabbing the least expensive bulbs of the store shelf.

Illuminating Facts on Incandescent Bulbs

Although standard frosted incandescent light bulbs are the most commonly used household bulbs, they are the least energy efficient since they produce less than 20 lumens per watt.

However, there are several ways to use incandescents more efficiently.

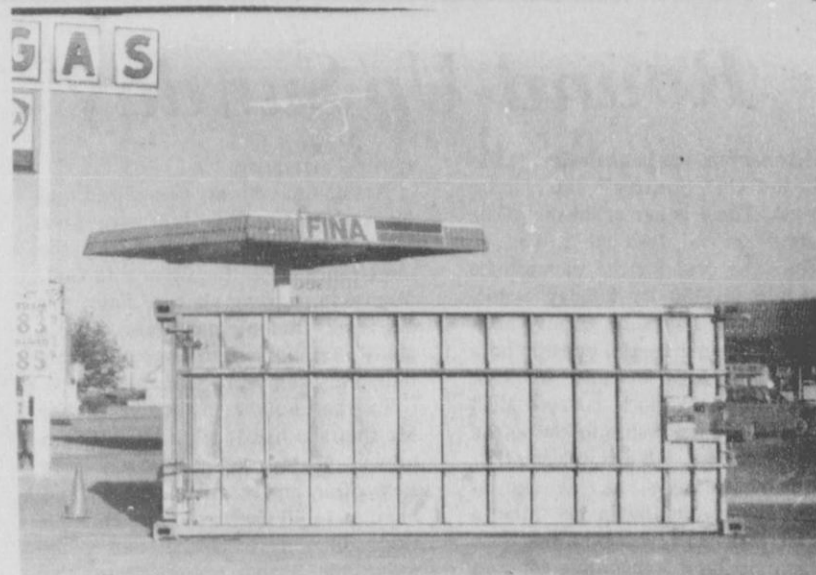
