

First State Bank had beginnings in 1917 . . .

Bank celebrates 70th anniversary

Like a stately Texas cottonwood, it's weathered droughts and floods, dust bowls and depressions but the First State Bank of Spearman has also enjoyed prosperity and plenty along with its Hansford county neighbors during its tenure as the oldest and largest financial institution in the county.

This Friday, the Hansford bank will celebrate its 70th Anniversary -- with its roots reaching back to July 10, 1917 and the opening of the Guaranty State Bank of Hansford.

This was the forerunner of the ultra-modern First State Bank and, at least by looking at the banks' financial statements at the time, was built on a simple premise -- to serve the people.

And the First State Bank will be celebrating their anniversary with a special open house Saturday afternoon

from 2 to 5 o'clock in the bank building located at One N. E. Court in Spearman.

Special events for Saturday's celebration include a Western art exhibit by Jack Sorenson of Amarillo, an autography session by John Erickson of Perryton, door prizes and refreshments.

Perhaps modern bank examiners, given the current financial climate, would have looked with disfavor upon the first Guaranty State Bank report of condition.

The Guaranty had just taken over the assets of the Hansford County Bank, an unincorporated firm, and there were \$18,782.89 in loans and discounts compared against deposits of \$15,386.63.

Things have come along way since those early banking days. With total

assets of \$47,698.30, the next 70 years saw the Hansford banking institution undertake numerous moves along with a name change and the outright purchase of another Spearman bank.

Today total assets are over \$61-million and included in that is their 13,000-plus square foot banking home which includes an automated teller machine for after-hours banking along with drive up teller facilities.

To gain a perspective on the changes, today many homes run more than \$47,000 the bank had in assets. And it's no surprise to find modern-day vehicles with a list price of \$18,000 or better -- the total amount loaned to all of Hansford county on July 10, 1917.

Today's First State Bank is a long cry from those early banking days in old Hansford. The financial institution

has undergone three different names along with the purchase of a competing bank. It survived a move from old Hansford to Spearman and has had several banking homes since then.

The bank was organized by W. S. McNabb who served as president for the young financial institution for one year, who then turned the reins over to L. G. Blackmer who served until 1925.

In November, 1919, the bank was purchased by I. E. Cameron of Guymon, Ok.

He moved the bank from old Hansford into Spearman in December of 1919 and the bank became the Guaranty State Bank of Spearman.

In 1929, the name changed again, becoming the Fidelity Bank of Commerce.

In 1930 the bank again became a

myself at the moment.

Says condemnation court trial in error . . .

Martin requests new court jury trial

A motion of a new trial has been filed by attorneys for James Martin of Spearman in the aftermath of a condemnation suit which awarded the Hansford landowner almost \$14,000 in an 84th District jury trial June 9.

At presstime, a hearing before been requested by the defendant in the case, or by Martin's attorneys, the case, or by Martin's attorneys.

The motion for a new trial requests the court to set aside the jury's verdict and judgement with the defense stating, "the trial court erred in admitting into evidence the zoning ordinance passed by the city of Spearman and the county of Hansford . . ."

The motion further states that Martin was denied due process by the admission of the zoning ordinance as evidence.

The trial came about when the city of Spearman began acquiring property and air space for an airport expansion. Federal Aviation Administration guidelines required the additions in order for the city to qualify for an FAA grant to help pay for the expansion.

The city had been in negotiations with Martin since 1983 for 5.41 acres

of land and air space over another 27.03 acres. Originally, the city had asked Martin to donate the land.

Following that, the Spearman city commission made their first of a series of written offers which ranged from near \$10,000 to a final offer of \$36,500 after the land was appraised utilizing FAA guidelines.

Later, a special commission awarded Martin a \$46,000 figure which was also declined by the Hansford land owner.

The June 9 jury trial in Spearman awarded Martin \$13,949.50 as total payment for land, air space and damages.

The motion for a new trial also states, "Because such evidence was admitted for the jury to consider and because statements of counsel were made that same (the zoning ordinance) was legal and binding and

because the objections which were made by the Martins to such were proper, the trial court has committed error."

The motion requests the court to set aside the verdict and judgment and

that the case be tried again with the exclusion of the ordinance in question.

No answer to the motion has been made by the city of Spearman, nor has the attorneys for Martin requested a hearing on the motion.

Area farmers report damaged wheat acres

Hansford county farmers have reported a total of 30,000 acres of damaged crops through Monday afternoon, reports Keith Martin of the Hansford county ASCS office.

The bulk of the damage has come off wheat acres, notes Martin, and includes both freeze damage and hail damage.

"We're looking at reports anywhere from about 20 percent damage to total crop failure," notes the ASCS manager. "I wouldn't be surprised to see that figure double or even triple before we're through."

Farmers report damage to the ASCS office even though disaster payments are no longer paid by the federal government. Since the inception of federal crop hail insurance, disaster payments have been curtailed.

"Farmers make the reports just in case the government ever declares a disaster payment," notes Martin.

Hansford farmers planted some 160,000 acres of wheat this year, reports Burt Williams, Hansford county extension agent.

Late snows in March coupled with numerous spring thunderstorms which have dumped hail all across the county account for the biggest part of the crop damage.

"I don't think there's anyone in the county who hasn't had some hail," declares Williams. "I've heard reports of nine bushel irrigated wheat."

Wheat is not the only damaged crop, notes Martin of the ASCS. There have been 100 acres of oats, 1,000 acres of corn and 200 acres of barley also reported in as damaged.

"We haven't even begun to get reports on the milo yet," he notes.

home-owned institution when a group of Spearman businessmen pooled resources to purchase the assets from Cameron.

The Spearman coalition which bought out the Guymon operator included J. R. Collard, P. B. Higgs, Walter Wilmeth and H. B. Hart.

The purchase was effective January 1, 1930, and the name was changed again -- this time to the First State Bank of Spearman.

Walter Wilmeth and P. B. Higgs were presidents that first year, then in 1931, Collard was elected president and served for the next 21 years until his death in 1952.

C. A. Gibner, a long-time Hansford banker, succeeded Collard to the presidency of the bank. Like his predecessor, Gibner served the bank until his death this spring and it was under his leadership the bank flowered and blossomed along with the rest of Hansford county.

The Hansford financial institution has grown from a 1-man operator to a 28-employee business over the intervening 70 years.

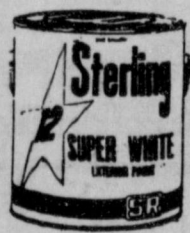

Device increases gas mileage by 22%

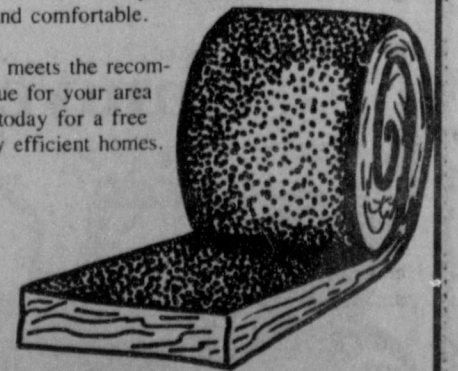

For family of Leigha Ottinger Perryton . . .

It comes one day at a time

Editor's note: The following story is reprinted with permission from Sunday's **Perryton Herald** and is written by staffer Mary Dudley. Leigha is the niece of Spearman farmer Fred Mans.

Leigha Ottinger is a sweet, loveable little nine-month old girl, adored by her parents and relatives. Like most other babies, she will soon be christened at First Christian Church.

Unlike most other babies, she's dying.

Diagnosed when she was about seven months old as having Smith-Lemli-Opitz Syndrome, she has been in and out of hospitals and

given round the clock care since she was born.

The syndrome is characterized by several abnormalities that separately are of minor concern, but grouped together indicate Smith-Lemli-Opitz Syndrome. Leigha has several including ambiguous genitalia, cleft palate, webbed second and third toes, simian crease in her palm, feeding difficulty and seizures.

It affects the brain, causing microcephaly, an abnormal smallness of the head. When brain growth increases very rapidly during the first six months of life, the brain cannot expand sufficiently,

causing loss of several functions. With the syndrome, mental deficiency ranges from moderate to severe.

Less than 50 cases have been reported in the United States since 1964, when the genetic disorder was identified.

Born Sept. 30, 1986 in El Dorado, KS, her young parents, Marshall, 18 and Cindy, 17, moved to Perryton recently at the urging of Marshall's mother, Patti Warren.

Leigha is fed continuously from a Kangaroo pump, which looks similar to an IV unit. The \$500 pump drips Nutramigen, the only milk-

like product she can digest, through a gastrostomy tube in her stomach. The feeding tube must be monitored for air bubbles, which cause her pain, and also to make sure the tube is correctly positioned in her stomach.

Gaining weight now, she weighs 11 pounds, six ounces, about double from her five pound, 10 ounce birth weight. Leigha has been in and out of hospitals since she was born, suffering from dehydration and various infections.

Her mother or grandmother takes her once a week to Texas Tech Health Sciences Center in Amarillo for check-ups and a

feeding clinic.

Monitoring her at night because she has a choking problem due to phlegm, either Cindy, Patti or Patti's daughter, 16-year-old Gina watches over little Leigha.

"If she's quiet at night, you check on her," Patti said.

Besides the emotional strain, the financial strain has been hard on the family. Marshall works as a farm hand for his uncle Fred Mans in Spearman, and Patti helps out as much as she can.

In Wichita, KS at the Wesley Medical Center, bills mounted to around \$500,000 for Leigha's care, of which Medicaid picked up most of the cost.

Nutramigen costs \$11 a can, which lasts about a day, and Leigha has several prescriptions to be filled, including phenobarbital to control seizures, laxatives, medicine to give her energy, another to help her digest fatty tissues, not to mention the antibiotics to combat the infections she easily gets because of her lowered immunity. The bags which hold the formula for the Kangaroo pump also cost \$6 each.

Bills from the past, as well as bills Medicaid did not pay are coming in, and finding aid in Texas has proved frustrating. They are on the waiting list for the Texas Crippled Children's Fund, and applied for Medicaid in the state over a month ago, with no result.

They have also applied for disability Social Security benefits, but are unsure whether they will receive them for the baby. Cindy's grandmother gave Marshall and Cindy a car so they could transport Leigha to and from the hospital, and they were told that because of the car they may be denied benefits. In Kansas, they were denied Social Security benefits because Leigha's many problems were not considered disabilities, Cindy said.

They have also visited with public health nurse Joan McLellan, who could start a milk program, for babies who need it, if enough sign up. Patti said there is another baby in town that needs it. The program would provide a case of milk a month, which would ease their financial burdens.

Asking for help has not come

easily for the family. But as Cindy said, when one's child is involved, there isn't anything you wouldn't try.

"What really concerns me is that I've never had to deal with this problem," Patti said. "I didn't realize the emotions this poor family (of handicapped children) goes through, the expense this poor family goes through."

While it sounds like a tremendous burden to bear, there is no mistaking the immense love the family has for Leigha. It has taken them months to accept that there is a good possibility that she will die, but hope is always present.

"At first I was really angry when the doctors told me (she was going to die)," Patti said.

"But what she's taught Grandma is to love and to be patient, and to trust in God."

While many other parents would be happy when their new baby does new things, the Ottingers are ecstatic. Cindy said that when Leigha first tried to crawl, before she began to regress, all the family gathered around her, cheering her on.

"Everything she does is an achievement," Pattie added.

Cindy is not convinced Leigha is totally deaf, however.

"At times, we really feel like she can hear. . . There are several tones they can hear even if they are deaf."

They talk to her often, and read to Leigha. Both Patti and Cindy said they treat her like a normal baby, and do the same things with her as any other parents would.

Both agree that Leigha has brought their family closer, but Cindy added that it is still difficult for Marshall, because he is so afraid of losing his daughter.

Patti takes a philosophical approach to the situation. "It's one of those things you take one day at a time. . . and hope for a miracle."

"Whenever I hold her in my arms, I think, will I hold her tomorrow, or next week?" Patti added.


She pointed out that the doctors in Kansas were very impressed at how well Marshall and Cindy have handled the whole situation, con-




